

Bids to be Opened Friday, March 28

Bill Cantrell, architect from Lubbock, presented the final drawings of the proposed City Hall for Muleshoe and the plans were accepted at a meeting of the Muleshoe City Council.

The council then authorized bids to be taken for the new construction. The bids will be opened at the City Hall on March 28 at 2 p.m.

On September 10, 1968, a bond issue in the amount of \$105,000 was approved by Muleshoe voters to build a new city hall.

A total of 5,052 square feet will be in the newly proposed City Hall with 4,103 square feet slated to be on the ground floor and 949 for the basement.

The ground floor will have offices for the city manager, city secretary, large business office, lobby, tax Girl Scout office, tax business office, record vault, council meet-

ing chamber, public rest- Cookie Sale rooms and three offices for the Chamber of Commerce. Began Today In the basement will be a coffee room which can be utilized as a small meeting

and storage area. Basic structure of the building is slated to be reinforced concrete frame with the exterior being masonry walls, primarily of face brick. The interior finishes will be primarily plaster with some vinyl fabrics and paneling in the council chamber. The ceiling will be suspended acoustical tile except for the council chamber

which will have a high, vaulted concrete ceiling. The floors of the proposed City Hall will be covered with resilient tile in all areas except the offices and council chamber, which are

slated to be carpeted. The basement of the new building is slated to be essentially the same finish as the ground floor of the struc-

Included in the plan is a drive-up window for the convenience of those who would wish to pay their utilities

in that manner. Parking will be provided for nine cars on the south side of the building and 15

on the north side. When the bids are opened, construction is expected to begin within ten days, fol-

lowing execution of contracts. For economy and comfort of operation, four zones of heating and refrigerated air conditioning will be installed. Areas not in daily use will be shut off, thus

Producers throughout the state should be alert for a possible greenbug buildup during the warmup following this period of

BUGS ON SMALL GRAINS-During February when wheat the Guild Center, Clovis. is generally 3-6 inches in height, control for greenbugs should be considered when populations range from 100-300 per linear foot of row. In South Texas where wheat is generally 4-8 inches in height at this time, 200-400 greenbugs per linear foot of row indicate that control may be needed. Occasionally populations of 25-50 greenbugs per foot of row on very young small grain plants may warrant control. This is especially true where oats and barley are involved since they are usually more susceptible to greenbug damage than wheat.

SMALL GRAIN -- Greenbug (Shizaphis graminum)-Medium to heavy infestions were detected in Briscoe County during the past week. Some control was being carried out in this county. During the week of February 3-7. greenbug populations were noted as follows: (1) Floyd




