Hedley approves trash rate increase

Hedley citizens will soon start paying more to have their trash hauled off after action at last week's city meeting.

The Board of Aldermen voted January 9 to raise sanitation rates by \$2 per Dumpster. City Hall says the rate increase will help maintain a recently purchased trash truck and go toward other sanitation expenses.

The higher trash rate will go into effect in February.

The city also is anticipating raising water rates but is waiting to learn how much its wholesale cost from Greenbelt Water Authority is increasing.

Hedley and Howardwick did not receive good news, however. Hedley's January allocation slid 25.47 percent to \$309.28, and Howardwick's sales tax revenue fell 29.93 percent for the first month of the year.

Across the state, Combs said that sales tax revenue was \$2.25 billion, up 3.9 percent compared to the same period a year ago.

"Consumer spending in retail trade contributed to the latest gain in state sales tax collections," Combs said. "Other sectors such as telecommunications also contributed to the monthly growth, and state sales tax revenue has now increased for 45 consecutive months."

The sales tax figures represent November sales reported by monthly tax filers.




Here are 15 reasons for federal government wastefulness:

1. The government has become so huge that federal auditors, private watchdogs, and congressional oversight committees cannot even begin to review all the spending. The federal government funds more than 2,200 subsidy and benefit programs, and they are all susceptible to waste, fraud, and abuse.

2. People tend not to spend other people's money as carefully as they spend their own. For federal decision makers, the source of funding for their favored programs can seem to be distant or abstract, but private-sector decision makers must weigh the costs and benefits of spending their own money.

3. Unlike in the private sector, poorly performing federal agencies are not subject to takeover bids, nor do they go bankrupt, and thus there is no built-in system to eliminate failed activities. In the private sector, roughly 10 percent of U.S. companies go out of business each year, and corporate executives get ousted all the time. In the private sector, poor performance gets punished.

4. There are more political rewards for federal policymakers to add new programs and expand existing ones than to weed out low-priority programs and waste. By contrast, private-sector decision makers are forced to make tough decisions.

5. Federal managers face no profit incentive, giving them little reason to proactively reduce waste and cut costs. Indeed, without profits to worry about, federal managers often favor budget increases without any idea about whether expansion will add net value to society above the taxpayer costs.

6. Without the profit motive, there is little incentive for government workers and managers to innovate. There is less motivation than in the private sector to try and produce better services of higher quality.



8. Even if a federal agency wanted to adopt business-style efficiencies, the output of much government work is hard to measure, which would make it difficult to set performance goals for managers and workers.

9. Even if federal performance could be easily measured, federal worker pay is generally tied to longevity, not performance. Federal workers receive rising salaries even if they perform poorly.

10. Disciplining federal workers is difficult and they are rarely fired, which can result in agencies carrying heavy loads of poor performers.


11. The government needs complex regulations and extensive paperwork to carry out routine functions such as procurement. One reason is that in the public sector there are no clear goals such as maximizing profits. Another reason is the need to prevent public corruption. The plethora of rules adds to federal inefficiency and sluggishness.

12. Because of the frequent turnover of political appointees in federal agencies, many agencies experience continual changes in their missions driven by transitory and political factors.

13. Congress imposes extra costs on federal agencies in carrying out their duties, such as resisting closure of low-value facilities or cutting projects that affect the states or districts of important members.

14. Federal agencies can get influenced or "captured" by special interest groups that steer policies toward narrow goals, rather than broad goals.

15. The sheer size of the federal government makes coordination and decision making for many activities very difficult. The multiplicity of congressional committees and executive branch agencies has led to a great deal of overlap and duplication in federal activities.

Maintaining the purchasing power of the dollar is critical to a strong U.S. economy and to the economic wellbeing of middle-class American families. The Constitution grants Congress power over our nation's currency. One hundred years ago, Congress assigned this responsibility to the Federal Reserve. The Fed's centennial anniversary, reached last month, marks an appropriate time for a constructive and bipartisan review of America's central bank's performance over its first century and the proper role for the Fed in the future.

History proves that a sound and stable dollar is the best foundation for robust economic growth. Absent stability, price inflation steals from the pocketbooks of American families, punishes savers and increases uncertainty. This weakens business investment, job creation and real income growth for families, especially for those working to climb the economic ladder.

Even if consumer price inflation remains tame, asset-price inflation can create unsustainable bubbles that devastate the American and global economy when they burst. On the flip side, deflation can be equally destructive, leading to debt defaults, bankruptcies and finanor begin aggressively reining in its easymoney policies to avoid stoking new asset bubbles or planting the seeds of future inflation.

There are concerns about the dual mandate that Congress placed on the Fed in 1977; picking winners and losers in the credit markets, which jeopardizes the political independence of the institution; the make-up of the Federal Open Market Committee; and the transparency of the Fed.

Perhaps the best way forward is to step back and take a longer view of the institution. We believe the moment is right for an objective, comprehensive survey of the Fed's existing mandate and policy framework. That's why we have introduced the Centennial Monetary Commission Act, which would establish an independent, balanced, bipartisan panel to collect evidence and make recommendations to Congress.

Such an evaluation is long overdue. The Fed's original mission was to provide an elastic currency within the context of the gold standard to combat seasonal financial issues. A hundred years later, its mission has obviously become much broader.

Today, in pursuing its employment mandate, the Fed has purchased more than \$3 trillion worth of Treasury bonds, federal agency bonds, and federal agency mortgage-backed securities - its so-called "quantitative easing" strategy. Its total balance sheet now stands at \$4.1 trillion — four times larger than before the crisis. The Fed has also generated a staggering \$2.4 trillion in excess reserves.

Admittedly, quantitative easing and extraordinarily low interest rates have clearly boosted stock prices. The S&P 500 Total Return Index adjusted for inflation has more than doubled since the official end of the recession in June 2009. America's middle class hasn't been as fortunate. Real disposable income per capita has increased by less than 4 percent. At this point in an average recovery, a family of four would have nearly \$11,000 more to spend than the Obama recovery provided. We don't begrudge Wall Street's success, but we do lament the fact that so many middleclass families on Main Street have been left behind.

While families' net worth on paper looks much better today than it did in 2009, will the gains prove illusory? Is America headed for a major stock market correction, or perhaps even another crash? Will the fuel of excess reserves spark general price inflation?

Most importantly, what is the best role and rules for the Federal Reserve to ensure America remains the strongest economy on earth through the 21st century?

What is the solution to these problems? There is no straightforward, technocratic way to "reinvent" the federal government to make it work with a decent amount of efficiency. Some of these problems can be reduced to an extent, but as long as the federal government is as large as it is, it will sadly continue wasting hundreds of billions of dollars from misallocation, mismanagement, and other problems.

The only real solution to the ongoing waste in the federal government is to downsize it. To improve the performance of American government, we should revive federalism and hand more responsibilities back to state governments, while privatizing federal activities where we can.

Unfortunately, the purchasing power of the U.S. dollar over time has been anything but stable. A dollar in 1967 is equivalent to barely 14 cents today.

The past decade of generally accommodative monetary policy has been accompanied by a significant decline in the international value of the dollar. This decline has added to the cost of international commodities such as oil and gasoline.

Europe's financial crisis and global uncertainty helped to restore some of the value of America's currency. Being the best-looking horse in the global glue factory is a dubious honor, though.

There are significant and thoughtful disagreements among policy experts and free-market leaders about whether the Fed should maintain its current policies

So why hasn't this explosion in the monetary base ignited higher general price inflation?

In normal times, commercial banks convert excess reserves into new loans and investments, boosting the demand for goods and services. However, in recent years, commercial banks have been reluctant to lend and invest, and so the Fed's dramatic monetary expansion hasn't increased aggregate demand to the levels we might have expected. Indeed, despite the Fed's "mon-

These are the thoughtful issues and long-term view the members of the Centennial Monetary Commission would address.

Both Republicans and Democrats have a common interest in getting monetary policy right. Good monetary policy provides the foundation for a strong economy that is essential to eliminating our fiscal deficit.

Given the centennial and the experience of the recent financial crisis, there has never been a more appropriate time to re-examine the Fed's role in American life.

New Medication Approved to Help Treat Seizures

The FDA recently approved a new medication to help treat partial seizures in people who are diagnosed with epilepsy. Eslicarbazepine acetate (Aptiom) is approved to be added onto existing medication therapy. Aptiom went through three separate clinical trials before getting approval. The most common side effects that study participants experienced included dizziness, drowsiness, nausea, and headache. Epilepsy is a nervous system disorder that causes seizures. Seizures may impact a person's consciousness and may cause uncontrollable physical or mental impairment. Epilepsy is more common in young children and the elderly, but it can strike at any age. People are more likely to get epilepsy if they have a history of stroke, head injury, dementia, childhood seizures, brain infections, or a family history of seizures. Partial seizures are the most common type of seizure seen in people with epilepsy. People who have simple partial seizures do not lose consciousness; however, movement, emotions, sensations and feelings can be affected.

Russell said it takes about 40 days for TABC to approve a license once an application has been completed. Permits that are in the process at about the same time will all be issued on the same day, he said.

TABC encourages business owners and employees to take seller/ server classes to learn the laws regarding selling and serving alcohol. Those businesses who complete such a course can receive "safe harbor" and receive more lenient punishment in case a violation occurs later.



We had 19 members, Sweetheart Minnie Buckhaults, and one guest this week - Brad Vanden Boogaard, who presented our program.




