

"However," said Almand, "producers should be alert for a possible greenbug buildup during March with increasing daytime temperatures and should make frequent field inspection for these pests.

"In making field counts for greenbugs, a person should make a minimum of five random checks each consisting of one linear foot of row while walking diagonally across the field. More counts may be necessary in large acreages. On small plants. the greenbug can be counted on the plants. On larger wheat, the plants should be slapped to one side and the greenbugs on the ground estimated for each linear foot



Hub Community To Host Meeting

"Irrigation Costs & Man-Techniques." Forage Crops for A Year Roung Livestock Grazing Program," and "Insect Control Recommendations For Grain Sorghum, Cotton, Wheat & Corn' are three topics to be discussed Thursday, March 13 at 7:30 p.m. in the Hub Community Center.

"The most valuable natural resource that most county farmers have is their underground water supply," said Parmer County Agent Ronnie McNutt, "Leon New, Extension Service Irrigation Specialist from Lubbock, will present information on management techniques on how to better utilize our underground water. Tips on how to determine irrigation costs will also be discussed by New. Of interest also will be a discussion on latest research findings in irrigations.



Report on student disorders. I said that the Congress and the President have a clear responsibility to put "law and order" ahead of anything else and to enact and enforce stringent laws to deal with Comminist conspiracies as well as the flagrant disregard of human rights.

Since then, U.S. Attorney General John N. Mitchell has said he expects to authorize criminal prosecution of "hard-line militants" who he says have been crossing state lines to incite riots by college students.

Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967. inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970. inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and
