Bid on Proposed Paving Accepted

Budget, Contracts, Bids Filled Agenda

Numerous items of business faced the Muleshoe City Council at their regular meeting Monday afternoon. First and foremost on the agenda was opening and approving bids for the proposed paving programs of various streets in Muleshoe. Bids were taken on a complete paving program and the council will determine which paving holds priority at a later date.

A public hearing on the paving program will be set in the future.

Six paving contractors submitted bids for the proposed paving program. The low bid in the amount of \$207,180 for triple penetration or \$233,980 for hot or cold mix was accepted as submitted by Jake Diehl. Other contractors submitting bids included J. W. Milligan, \$244,834.45 for triple penetration; Pioneer Pavers, \$223,200 for triple penetration; W. D. Turner, \$226,500 for triple penetration and \$256,800 for hot or cold mix; High Plains Pavers, \$212,900 for triple penetration and Kerr Construction Company, \$263,475 for triple penetration paving.

After reviewing bids received, City Councilmen accepted a bid for a year supply of gasoline for city use. Mobil Oil Company submitted the low bid in the amount of \$1,808; Gulf Oil's bid was \$1,829 and Continental Oil Company's bid was in the amount of \$1,880.

Councilmen set March 28 at 3 p.m. as the time and date for an open hearing on the proposed annexation to the City of Muleshoe of the Country Club Addition and the proposed annexation of a balance of a tract of land where Muleshoe Ford Tractor Co. is located. Cont'd. on Page 3, Col. 5

Credit Union Manager J. M. Forbes discovered the Saturday night burglary on Sunday morning when he went to the office.

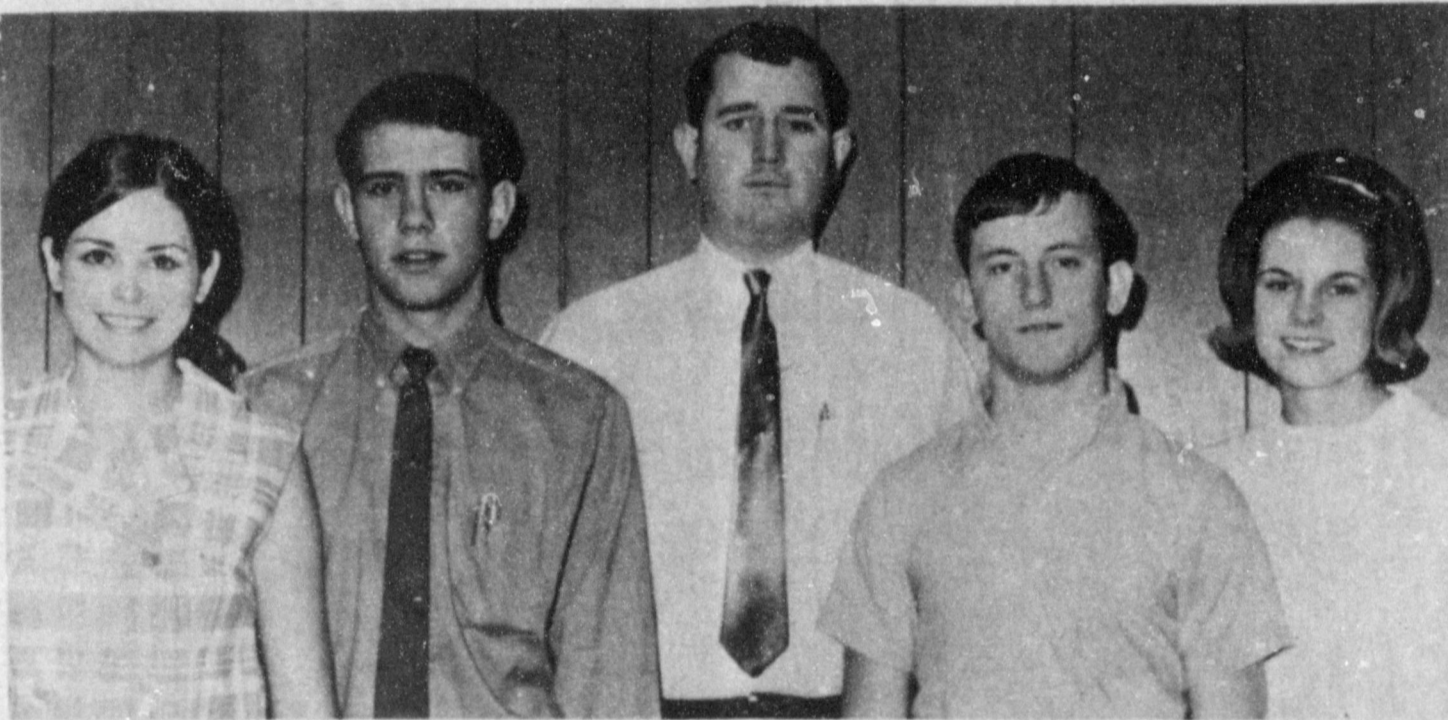
Entry had been made by breaking a window in the back of the building, then apparently reaching inside to Cont'd. on Page 3, Col. 4

Greenbug Control Aided by Research

Greenbugs, that little bug that ruined many fields of grain sorghum last summer, have been creating a problem in winter wheat, especially in irrigated areas north, northwest and northeast of Muleshoe.

What it Wuz Wuzn't What It Looked Like

A startled young man Saturday afternoon was probably wishing he wasn't where he was and also probably made an immediate vow to never work again on Saturday afternoon, especially in a bank, where he had to go into the air conditioning vent to work.

It all began at 4:40 p.m. when a man came into the Muleshoe City Police Department and said that a ladder was propped up against the side of the First National Bank at the back and an out of town car was parked behind the bank. He said that he went partly up the ladder, Cont'd. on Page 3, Col. 7

Lyman Almond of the High Plains Research Foundation said no accurate damage can be stated until the weather warms up so actual damage can be surveyed.

"However," said Almond, "producers should be alert for a possible greenbug buildup during March with increasing daytime temperatures and should make frequent field inspection for these pests."

"In making field counts for greenbugs, a person should make a minimum of five random checks each consisting of one linear foot of row while walking diagonally across the field. More counts may be necessary in large acreages. On small plants, the greenbug can be counted on the plants. On larger wheat, the plants should be slapped to one side and the greenbugs on the ground estimated for each linear foot of row."

"Also," continued the agronomist, "the need for applying insecticide depends on the number of greenbugs present, size of plants, temperature, time of year, Cont'd. on Page 3, Col. 5

Hub Community To Host Meeting

"Irrigation Costs & Management Techniques," Forage Crops for A Year Round Livestock Grazing Program," and "Insect Control Recommendations For Grain Sorghum, Cotton, Wheat & Corn" are three topics to be discussed Thursday, March 13 at 7:30 p.m. in the Hub Community Center.

"The most valuable natural resource that most county farmers have is their underground water supply," said Parmer County Agent Ronnie McNutt. "Leon New, Extension Service Irrigation Specialist from Lubbock, will present information on management techniques on how to better utilize our underground water. Tips on how to determine irrigation costs will also be discussed by New. Of interest also will be a discussion on latest research findings in irrigations. "With the increased interest and build up of cattle feeding in the county and area, more farmers are adding a stocker-feeder program to their farming set up. This gives them an additional source of income as well as have a local supply of cattle for the feedlot. However, most stocker-feeder programs are on a seasonal basis (fall and winter). 25 Year Prison Terms Handed To Two Men

Two of the three Lubbock Negro men who were charged in the August 19, 1968 robbery of a Hereford man were found guilty of the charge by an all-male jury in Hereford Friday, and sentenced to 25 years in the state penitentiary.

Linner Lee Younger, and William Lewis, who were charged along with James Hodges, had been charged with robbery by assault in connection with the robbery of Dave Broadwell, Hereford.

The same three men were charged with robbery by assault in Muleshoe in November, 1968, following a complaint filed by a Muleshoe real estate agent.

In the Hereford incident, the men were apprehended in Amarillo following the robbery. Descriptions of the three men and the car they were believed to be driving was radioed to area law enforcement officers and within an hour an Amarillo policeman had spotted a vehicle answering the description of the wanted vehicle and men. The car sped away as he tried to stop it, but was

stopped a short time later after the Amarillo patrolman radioed for assistance. Broadwell picked the men out of a line-up in Amarillo and they were returned to

Hereford where they were charged.

Younger and Lewis were tried jointly last Friday in Hereford District Court, but Hodges will be tried at a

later date.

Last year, on November 20, 1968, J. A. (Allen) McGee, 72, reported to local police officers that he had been robbed of \$2,500 shortly before going to the police department at 12:37.

McGee, a local real estate agent, told officers that he was parked at the site of a drive in restaurant being remodeled when a Negro man walked up to his car. He said the man asked him to take him to town and McGee agreed.

McGee told investigating officers that the man asked him to take him to a house near town and that when they reached the house, they were Cont'd. on Page 3, Col. 6

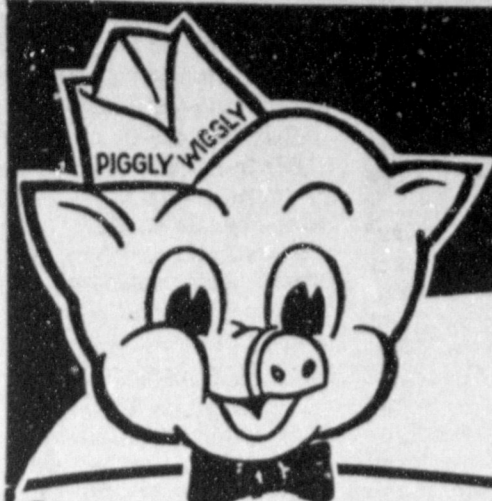

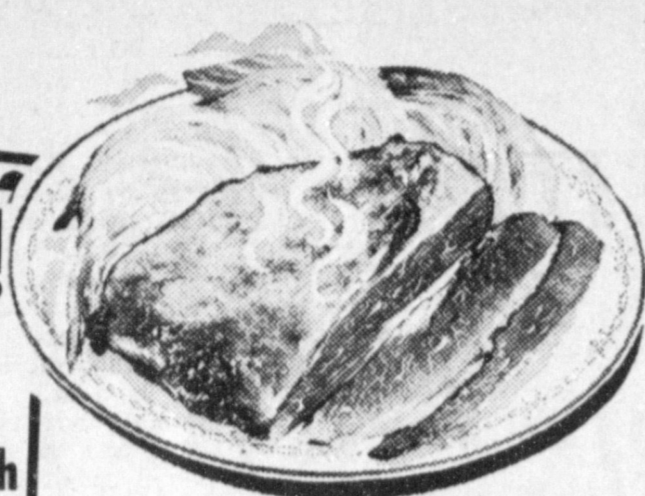

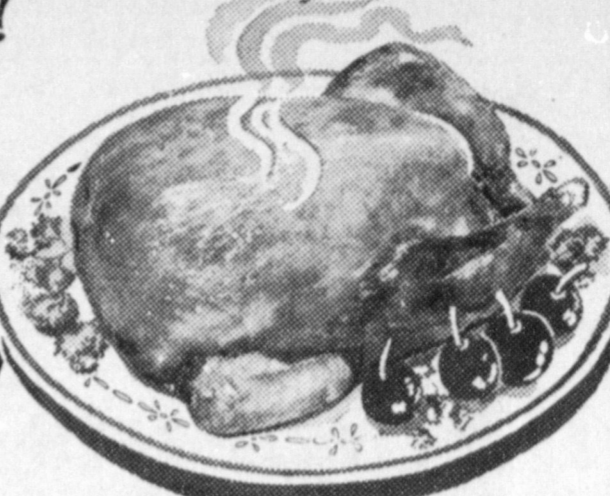

The budget for fiscal year 1969-70 was discussed at the meeting after a public hearing had been announced previously. No action was taken at the meeting and the budget was tabled for further consideration.

In other action, the city council accepted and ratified a Title I grant from the Texas State Library and signed an agreement for the grant of \$1,000; authorized execution of contract for Ralph Douglas, City Engineer, for his services; approved payment of \$2,616.88 for putting emulsion on city streets and executed a contract in the amount of \$3,904 to sandblast and repaint the inside of the overhead city water tanks.

moisture conditions, stage of growth and presence or absence of beneficial insects. Irrigated crops can withstand large populations of greenbugs without a marked loss in yield.

"Research has shown that control of greenbugs should be considered when 100-300 greenbugs per linear foot of row are detected on wheat three-six inches in height. On wheat four-eight inches in height, control should be initiated when greenbug numbers reach 200-400 greenbugs per linear foot of row. On larger wheat 6-16 inches in height, 300-800 greenbugs per linear foot of row warrant control. Greenbug control is more effective when temperature is above 50 degrees."

joined by another man. He said the men threatened him with "bodily harm" and told him that "they would hurt me if I would get them some money."

The men allegedly refused to accept the cashier's check and waited outside while McGee went back into the bank to cash the check.

From the bank, said McGee, the men departed from the McGee vehicle and got into a 1968 Thunderbird.

Following investigation by local officers, warrants were issued for three Lubbock men: Linnar Lee Younger, 29, William Lewis, 25, and James Hodges, 28. Following their apprehension in Lubbock, the men were released on bond.

der, to where he could see on to the top of the bank and an air conditioning vent had been removed. Wasting no time, he reported it to the police dispatcher.

The dispatcher called Chief Harold White and Assistant Chief Ray Cline, Sheriff Dee Clements and Deputy Sheriff David Roberts. When the officers arrived at the bank, they found the doors to the establishment locked. The officers climbed to the roof of the bank, after notifying the dispatcher to call someone from the bank to bring a key.

Deputy Roberts went into the vent and called for whoever was inside to "come out." The man in the vent said, "Yessir, I'm a-comin'." And he did, shaken and almost speechless. He offered an explanation that he was supposed to be there, that he was working on the speaker system of the bank. Tommy Gunstream identified the young man and said that indeed, he was supposed to be working on the speaker

system and had to go through the vent to get to the wiring. But no matter, the young man immediately gathered up his tools, replaced the vent, removed the ladder and left...immediately.

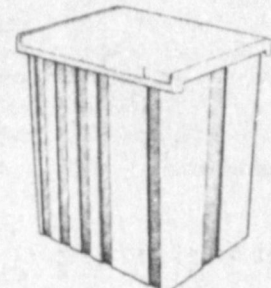

Washington Report

In a recent Washington Report on student disorders, I said that the Congress and the President have a clear responsibility to put "law and order" ahead of anything else and to enact and enforce stringent laws to deal with Communist conspiracies as well as the flagrant disregard of human rights. Since then, U.S. Attorney General John N. Mitchell has said he expects to authorize criminal prosecution of "hard-line militants" who he says have been crossing state lines to incite riots by college students.

Last year, I and other Congressmen introduced anti-riot legislation which became part of the 1968 Civil Rights Act, and makes it a federal offense to cross state lines with intent to incite, organize, encourage or take part in a riot.

These are encouraging words in view of the mounting mass of evidence of a national or international conspiracy behind the student unrest. The same faces appear at one disorder after another on campuses across the nation. The Attorney General appears to be convinced that a small group of people is making "almost a vocation" of starting trouble on the campus. "There is a distinction between the hard-liner with the militant approach

and the young innocent who likes to protest," he said. "We should break out the hard-liners and distinguish them from the others."

Governor Ronald Reagan at the National Governors Conference here recently proposed a Federal investigation to determine if there is a nation-wide plan or organization behind the current outbreaks. Attorney General Mitchell said the Justice Department is already making such an investigation.

At the same time, President Nixon directed Vice President Agnew to discuss with the governors what action, consistent with the traditional independence of American universities, might be taken at the state and Federal levels to cope with the growing lawlessness and violence on our campuses.

In a letter to the Reverend Theodore M. Hesburgh, President of Notre Dame, Nixon said that if the integrity of our universities is to be preserved, then certain principles must be re-established and certain basic rules enforced. "Intimidation and threats remain outlaw weapons in a free society," he wrote. In speaking of the student rebellions, George F. Kennan, diplomat, historian, and educator, said: "Universities are there for purposes of education. They are not supposed to be exercises in political democracy. The term democracy refers to the procedures of Government and defines the relationship between the individual citizen and those who hold the ultimate power of disposal over his person and property; it has no proper applicability to the administration of the educational process." "Higher education," Kennan said, "is not an absolute right nor is the enjoyment of it devoid of responsibilities. In an age when there are far more applicants for enrollment in our leading institutions than these institutions can handle, there is no reason anyone should be tolerated as a student on one of these campuses who is not prepared to give the university his respect and whose presence and activity there are disruptive of the educational progress of other students."

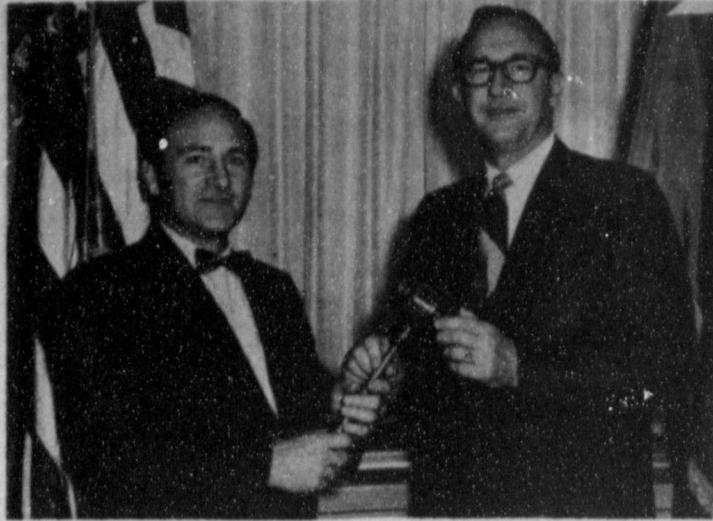
Gary Smith, Spade Grad. Commended

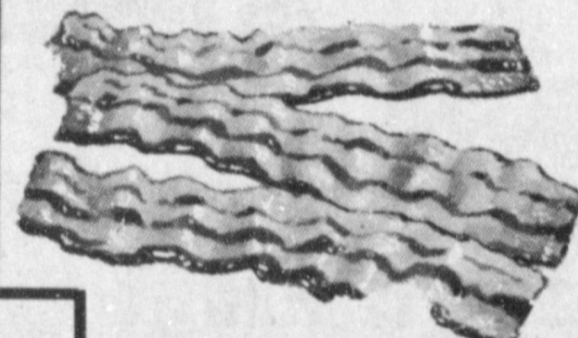
