Deadline nearing for state tuition plan

AUSTIN - Texas Comptroller Susan Combs reminds Texas families to enroll their children in the Texas Tuition Promise Fund and avoid future increases in tuition and required fees at Texas public colleges and universities. The current enrollment period for the state's prepaid college tuition program ends Feb. 28.

The Texas Tuition Promise Fund allows participants to lock in the cost of undergraduate tuition and required fees at Texas public colleges and universities based on current prices.

Under the plan, families can prepay tuition and required fees for a four-year degree, two years of community college or just a few semesters at Texas public colleges and universities by purchasing tuition units.

Enrollment in the program at 2013-14 prices will close Feb. 28. Plan information, current prices, enrollment forms and more are available online at www.Tuition-Promise.org.



Farm Bill food-stamp cuts won't affect Texas

The massive farm bill that President Obama is signed Friday cuts \$8.6 billion in food-stamp benefits over a decade, but Texas recipients won't be affected.

That's because the cuts target programs in about 15 states that increase food-stamp benefits — formally known as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, or SNAP - to offset the cost of heating recipients' homes. Texas is not among these so-called "heat and eat" states.

"The farm bill's change to those rules shouldn't affect people getting SNAP in Texas," said Stephanie Goodman, a spokeswoman for the Texas Health and Human Services

The Tyranny of good intentions

If logic decided policy in Washington, federal spending would be low, the budget would be balanced, the benefits of regulations would exceed the costs, and policymakers would guard against unintended consequences. Unfortunately, the nation's capital is largely impervious to logic, and the tragic results are obvious for all to see.

Emotion and intention seem to have become the principal determinants of government policy. People are poor? Increase the minimum wage. Not everyone can afford a home? Create a dozen housing subsidy programs. Some people don't have health insurance? Enact Medicaid, Medicare, and Obamacare. There is an infinitesimal chance of something bad happening somewhere somehow? Issue a regulation making everyone spend a lot of money and effort to ensure that it doesn't.

As the officials involved mean well and their ideas sound plausible, never mind the consequences. No need to detain our leaders; they have other crusades to lead.

This widespread inability to compare consequences to intentions is a basic problem of humanity. In fact, it's one of the reasons the Founders desired to limit government power and constrain politicians. How to deal with people who meant ill was perhaps the most important problem of foreign policy. What to do about those who wanted to do good - and thus often were more dangerous - was mostly a concern of domestic policy.

For instance, the newly created federal government possessed only limited, enumerated powers. Even if you had weird ideas for transforming the American people, it wouldn't do you much good to get elected president or to Congress. The federal government wasn't authorized by the Constitution to engage in soul-molding.

Moreover, there would be strong resistance to any attempt to expand federal power. The constitutional system preserved abundant state authority. Three federal branches offered "checks and balances" to abusive officials or majorities. Even Congress was divided into two very different chambers operating on very different rules.

Most important, the majority of Americans shared the Founders' suspicions. Not every early citizen was a proto-libertarian, but the narrow area of debate - over, say, the national government undertaking "internal improvements," or federally-funded development projects - is unrecognizable today. At the end of the nineteenth century a Democratic president still was willing to veto unemployment relief because he believed Congress had no authority to approve such a bill.

However, over the following century-plus, virtually every limitation on Washington was swept away. Equally important, as faith in religion ebbed, faith in politics exploded. Americans periodically declare themselves to be skeptical of government, but many go on to simultaneously affirm their support for virtually every federal program. Today those who think with their hearts rather than their minds have largely taken control of the nation's policy agenda.

Nowhere has this been more destructive than in the area of poverty. How to deal with the poor who, Jesus told us, would always be with us?

As Charles Murray demonstrated so devastatingly three decades ago in his famous book, Losing Ground, ever-expanding federal anti-poverty initiatives ended up turning poor people into permanent wards of Washington. Worse, unconditional welfare benefits turned out to discourage education, punish work, inhibit marriage, preclude family formation, and, ultimately, destroy community.

No one intended this result. Rather, the creators of the welfare state wanted to help unmarried mothers and, more importantly, their children. But by failing to consider the impact of incentives on behavior, advocates of the poor inadvertently created more of them and made it harder for them ever to escape that condition. It took the 1996 reforms to reverse much of the culture of dependency.

Similar is the minimum wage, which may become a top election issue this fall. Unless businesses are charities, raising the price of labor will force them to adjust their hiring. One can argue about the likely impact of any particular increase, but it is not enough to intend that low-skilled workers earn more. How many of those low-skilled workers will be hired if employers are told to pay more than the labor is worth? There isn't much benefit in having a theoretical right to a higher paying job if you are not experienced or trained enough to perform it.

Equally dramatic is requiring car seats for infants flying on airplanes. Advocates claim that doing so could save lives in a crash. However, raising the cost of flying for families, especially with more children than money, would encourage more people to drive. The evidence is unequivocal that driving is more dangerous than flying the same distance. That is, mandating car seats almost certainly would end up killing some children. Again, the conflict between intentions and consequences.

Admittedly, worrying about consequences seems cold and utilitarian. But consequences are the truest test of any policy. And ugly experience teaches a powerful lesson: Most of the time government is far better at hurting than helping its citizens. Hence the traditional laugh line: "I'm from the government and I'm here to help you." What you intend often doesn't matter nearly as much as what you actually accomplish.

GOP kicks unemployed while down

Good ol' Dubya said it best when he claimed that conservatives could be compassionate and conservative. He was calling for a tough-minded, yet fair, economic policy. Unfortunately, what we actually got, mostly from Republicans - was the opposite. Last week offers a wonderful example of the continuing hard-hearted, softheaded character of today's GOP, as Senate Republicans once again used the filibuster to block aid to the long-term unemployed.

Exactly what do we know about the long term unemployed in America?

Well, first of all, long-term unemployment in America is still near record levels. Historically, the long-term unemployed, those who have been out of work for 27 weeks or more, have usually been between 10 and 20 percent of total unemployment. Today, that number is 36 percent! Even so, extended unemployment benefits, which went into effect in 2008, have now been allowed to lapse. Therefore, most of the long-term unemployed are not receiving any support whatsoever.

Second, just in case you think the typical long-term unemployed American is one of "Those People" - nonwhite, drug-crazed, licentious, etc. - you are wrong. Fully half of the long-term unemployed are non-Hispanic white folks. Naturally, college graduates are much less likely to lose their jobs than workers with less education, but when they do lose their jobs they are actually more likely than others to join the ranks of the long-term unemployed. Also, baby boomers and those workers over the age of 45 are especially likely to spend a long time unemployed.

Finally, in a weak job market, longterm unemployment tends to be selfperpetuating, mainly because employers actually do discriminate against the jobless. Over the years many people have long suspected that this was the case, and last year a Northeastern University study confirmed that such was, and is, the case. The author of the study, Rand Ghayad, sent out thousands of ficti-

who were currently employed. This all indicates that the long-term unemployed are mainly victims of circumstances. They are mostly ordinary Americans who had the bad luck to lose their jobs at a time extraordinary economic and labor market weakness, with at least three times as many seeking jobs as there are job openings. Once they lost of compassion. their job, the simple fact that they were unemployed made is extremely difficult to find a new job. As we all know, this can happen to anyone, anytime.

So, how can our politicians justify cutting off modest financial aid to their unlucky constituents? Some tea party types justified last week's filibuster with the stupid argument that we can't afford to increase the deficit. In reality, Democrats combined the benefits extension with measures to increase tax receipts. Even so, this is a wacky objection at a time when federal budget deficits are not just falling, but actually falling too fast, hurting our economic recovery.

Tea party types are adamant in perpetuating the lie that we have so much long-term unemployment because people tempt. aren't trying hard enough to find jobs, and extended benefits are the reason for the aforesaid lack of effort.

People who say things like this, people like Rand Paul and Ted Cruz, probably think that they are actually tough-minded and realistic, when they are actually just ignorant and stupid. They are actually selling a fantasy that is at odds with all the evidence. Consider

this: if unemployment is high because labor supply, why aren't wages going up?

Unfortunately, the economic evidence has a well-known liberal bias, which causes all tea party types to throw up. The more their faulty economic doctrine fails - remember back when the Fed's actions were supposed to cause runaway inflation? - the more fiercely conservatives (tea partiers) still cling to that doctrine. It has now been more than five years after this financial crises plunged the US and the Western world into to an apparently permanent slump, making nonsense of free-market orthodoxy, it is nigh impossible to find a leading tea partier who has changed his or her mind on anything.



Blood Clot-Reducing Medication Endorsed

A panel of scientists and researchers from the FDA has decided to endorse a new medication called vorapaxar (Zontivity). The endorsement comes after close review of information that was presented from clinical trials. The panel recommended that the medication be approved as part of a combination of medications to help reduce the risk of a heart attack or stroke in people who have already had a heart attack. This medication works by blocking a receptor in the body that helps platelets form a clot. Platelets are a type of blood cell that clumps together to form a clot which can lead to a heart attack or stroke. By stopping the clot from forming, the risk of a stroke or heart attack may be reduced.

The results from the clinical trial conducted with vorapaxar were presented in 2012 and included over twenty-six thousand individuals. During the study, the researchers noted that there was an increased risk of bleeding. If approved, this medication may carry a warning to physicians that it should not be used in people who have had a recent stroke or bleeding from the head.

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



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








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NOTICE OF RATE CHANGE REQUEST

Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO) has filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) for approval of a Transmission Cost Recovery Factor (TCRF). SWEPCO made the filing on December 19, 2013. The filing was made in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and Commission Substantive Rule 25.239. A TCRF allows a utility to recover its reasonable and necessary costs for transmission capital and wholesale transmission charges approved by a federal regulatory authority incurred since the end of the test year in the utility's last base rate case. In this application, the time period for SWEPCO's transmission capital investments, to be recovered through the TCRF, is December 31, 2011 through September 30, 2013. SWEPCO also seeks to recover approved transmission charges that are not otherwise being recovered through current rates.

SWEPCO requests that the Commission approve a TCRF that would result in an increase in revenues of \$9,843,696 per annum, an increase of 3.50 percent in overall annualized revenue. All customers in SWEPCO's Texas retail rate classes are affected by this request.

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
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
