

Rapping on the wall didn't help, so he slipped on his clothes and knocked on their door. Explaining the cow's methodology in cabbage-eating, he made it clear that the girls should begin the quiet game immediately, and they did.

Hours later at breakfast, the same girls were seated at the next table. Their voices were familiar, but their faces weren't. Oh, how he wished his contacts had been in place when he'd threatened them earlier. Turns out they were members of another team from another university....

Proof positive of his commitment to academic excellence came with his recommendation that grade point minimums be INCREASED for athletes. It was so ordered, much to the delight of the faculty.

The requirement that players take their classes seriously worked. Thus, SRSU student athletes earn the right to play sports. Some 40 graduates of his programs now have doctoral degrees. Hundreds more are teaching and coaching.

Several years ago, he underwent a medical procedure performed by one of his former students....

Born in Athens and a graduate of Seminole, TX, High School, the 6-3 Sample was an all-state selection in basketball. At Wayland Baptist University, he made NAIA All-District three years-- once was named an NAIA All-American—and set a school career scoring record of 1,726 points.

Following graduation there, he served two years in the US Army before becoming a men's basketball graduate assistant while completing his master's degree at SRSU. He received his doctorate at East Texas State University in 1975.

No one in Alpine is more respected than this man whose values, goals, integrity and character are beyond reproach....

Sample has received a ton of honors, and with his wife, Belinda, has initiated a number of endowments throughout the university.

He's served as scoutmaster and as a board member of both AISD and the Wesley Foundation. Sample has been a Lions Club member for more than 30 years.

Dr. and Mrs. Sample are members of Alpine United Methodist Church. She is a former SRSU student and was payroll supervisor there for 25 years. Their children, Michael of Austin and Denise Dusek of Wall, are SRSU graduates, and grandchildren Jake, 14, and Melanie, 9, say they're SRSU bound....

He's been my friend for 30 years; I admire no one more.

The Samples plan to remain in Alpine, helping as they can as volunteers.



Some research indicates that there is a correlation between milder summers and winters and happiness. While mild climates can boost our mood, harsher climates can have a negative effect. During the winter months, many people suffer from Seasonal Affective Disorder, primarily due to the lack of sunlight that accompanies winter.

Happiness also responds to fragrances. If we want to feel more cheerful then we need to stop and smell the roses - literally. Researchers have discovered that the smells put forth from flowers have positive influences on our emotions. Studies have found, too, that perfumes can have a prosocial effect and make folks more altruistic.

According to a study published in the Journal of Positive Psychology, those of us who listen to rousing music are better able to put ourselves into a positive mood. The results from a 2013 Harris Poll revealed that life satisfaction is higher for older adults than young adults. Almost 50 percent of Americans over the age of 65 are very happy, as compared to only 31 percent of those between the ages of 18 and 24.

Giving to others can give us a happiness boost. Whether it is through philanthropy or simply small acts of kindness, altruism makes us feel good. One study even suggests that the happiness gleaned from volunteering can increase our longevity.

University of Arizona researchers discovered that a spike in happiness occurred during social intercourse when people were engaged in more substantive conversations. Of course, if the conversation was with tea party types, it is highly like that the only spike that occurs is a spike through the heart of moderate Republicans, if such a beast still exists.

My recent convalescence allowed me to delve more fully into the characteristics of happy people. 



## Nazarene Youth lead well project Nominate a veteran

This project was started in 1990, and was initiated to recognize and honor those outstanding Panhandle veterans who have distinguished themselves in the service of our country. Over the years, we have inducted individuals from Pampa, Amarillo, Canyon, Claude, Miami, Higgins, and other area towns. These honored inductees have been recipients of such awards as the Silver Star, Distinguished Flying Cross and even three who received the Congressional Medal of Honor.

We can never completely show our appreciation to these individuals for their bravery, love of country and unselfish sacrifices, however in this small gesture, we hope to let the living and deceased know they are not forgotten and their sacrifices were not in vain. Unfortunately, some of those we honor have gone on to their final resting places, however, we feel confident where ever they are, they will hear their names called and know they have not been forgotten.


In years past, to be eligible for induction into the Hall of Honor, the nominee needed to meet one of four criteria; born here in the 26 county Texas Panhandle, raised here, went into the service while living here or served at the Pampa Army Air Field during WWII. Because of the interest in this program, the board of directors have elected to expand the eligibility to include those individuals stationed in the 26 counties

during their service, any individual who moved to the Panhandle after being discharged and made significant contributions in or to the military services and individuals who served in the Merchant Marine, Coast Guard or civilians such as those who fought beside the Marines at Wake Island in WWII. To nominate a deserving individual,

we need a short narrative on their life, what branch of the service they served in, the awards they received and if possible a copy of citations that accompanied the awards, plus any copies of newspaper clipping pertaining to the nominee. In the narrative, we are encouraging the writer to tell about the nominee's contributions to his or her community following his years of service to the military. This will give our selection committee a better idea as to the overall merit of the individual. We need to have all the nominations in no later than June 1. After the selection committee has made their selection, the new inductees will be notified as to the time and place of the banquet which will be held in Pampa on Sat., Aug. 16th, 6:30 p.m. at Pampa Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 1657 105 S. ## Drugs in the News

**Promising New Treatment for IBS** 

Positive results are being reported from two large clinical trials, still in progress. The testing is with a new medication for diarrhea predominant irritable bowel syndrome (IBS). The new medication is called eluxadoline (MuDelta). It has been shown to improve stomach pain and stool consistency. Because MuDelta is not designed to leave the intestine, there is low risk for side effects in other areas of the body. Currently, there are no approved products for the long term treatment of diarrhea predominant IBS.

IBS affects up to 15% of the US population. Symptoms commonly seen in individuals with IBS are stomach pain, bloating, gas, constipation, diarrhea or mucus in stools. People with IBS can experience both constipation and diarrhea. In IBS-d (the "d" stands for diarrhea), treatment is mainly based on altering the diet and lifestyle. To help manage IBS-d, for a short period of time, anti-diarrheal medications such as loperaminde (Imodium) are used. Anti-spasmodic agents such as dicyclomine (Bentyl) or hyoscyamine (Anaspaz) are prescribed less commonly.

NOTICE OF COMPLIANCE TARIFF FILING

Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO) filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) on March 19, 2014, its Petition requesting approval of its proposed Military Base Surcharge Tariff.

Section 36.354(a) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act (PURA), at Texas Utilities Code § 36.354, provides that each electric utility in an area where implementation of full customer choice has been delayed by the Commission in accordance with PURA Section 39.103 shall discount charges for electric service provided to a military base. Section 36.354(b) of PURA establishes the discount to be provided to military installations as a 20 percent reduction of the base commercial rate that the electric utility would otherwise charge to the installation.

Section 36.354(c) of PURA provides that the electric utility may assess a surcharge to all its Texas retail customers to recover the difference in revenue between the revenues from the discounted rate for military bases and the base commercial rate. Tariff Sheet No. IV-16 provides the Military Base Adjustment Factor per billing kWh as reflected below:


