

Jones 5K to be run Saturday

Runners and walkers will gather on the Clarendon College campus this Saturday to raise awareness about child abuse during the second Chance Mark Jones Memorial 5K Walk/Run.

As of Tuesday morning, more than 120 people had registered for the event, which is hosted by the Clarendon Lions Club and coincides with Child Abuse Prevention Month.

Sign-ins start at 8 a.m. at the Bairfield Activity Center. The 9 a.m. race will start and end at the Bulldog Gym and through the city, around Prospect Park - the site of the proposed Chance Mark Jones Memorial Playground, and past several historic structures, including the Donley County Courthouse, the First United Methodist Church, and the S.W. Lowe House.

Race registrations are available at the Clarendon Visitor Center at the Mulkey Theatre, and race packets can be picked up at the Visitor Center all day this Friday, April 11.

Proceeds will go towards a playground project in Prospect Park, which will be designed to include four play components that will meet the needs of children with disabilities. The race and playground are intended to honor the life of fouryear-old Jones, who died from abuse in 2011.

The Bridge is a comprehensive, child-focused program that offers a highly effective, one-stop approach to child abuse investigation.

Falling for **April Fools**

Personal experiences racked up across threequarters of a century-including yips and yaps at lecterns spanning five decades—offer positive proof that many times, utter silence is preferable to spoken words.

I was reminded of this age-old truth the other day when my Uncle Mort called. Upon his mention of a new-found interest in

ornithology, the call-received in the morning hours of April 1--likely meant my 101-yearold relative was up to his old tricks--"spoofing it up" on April Fools' Day.

Interrupting him was as tempting as a clearance sale american on banana splits, a promise of by don newbury bonus airline miles, or biggest-

ever senior citizen discounts. Assuming this was his annual BIG JOKE for the holiday, it was little short of miraculous that I remained silent....

Maybe I was stunned to hear Uncle Mort pronounce "ornithology" with both clarity and unbridled excitement. What sparked this new-found interest in birds? It couldn't have involved "tweeting," since he stated that if God had intended us to "tweet," we'd all look like "Tweety Bird."

Perhaps his mind was jarred with the long-ago memory of Mr. Wallace Wimple, the little mushmouthed guy on Fibber McGee and Molly's radio show. (Wimple, always the patient listener, worked in mentions of his every-present "bird book." A standard line on each episode: "That ain't the way I heerd it, Johnny.") Or maybe Mort was prepping me for the old story of two buzzards, flying lazily aloft on a hot summer day. One of the buzzards said, "Patience, heck, let's kill sumthin'." Another possibility involved the two feisty magpies in "Heckle and Jeckle" cartoons seen in olden days at the picture show. Or, maybe Sesame Street's "Big Bird" was in play.

Okay, I admit it--my mind was largely in neutral when Uncle Mort said his interest centers specifically on crows, and how they've developed New England accents. I was hooked, eager for him to fill in several additional blanks.....

Pray tell, what was Uncle Mort talking about? Since his prejudices have been stacking up for decades, I figured crows with New England accents would rile him from the git-go.

Mort has little use for Yankees-a name mentioned regularly in his diatribes against the government. He's long been opposed to southern migration of northerners, and is on record supporting turning 'em back when they reach the Oklahoma/ Texas border.

"Clearly, the feds are a full 180 degrees off target; they're guarding the wrong river," he's opined....

Again, I felt like a 14-carat bird-brain, falling for one of Uncle Mort's favorite pastimes—fooling me....

Wealth inequality a danger to USA

Income inequality continues to increase rapidly. It just as rapidly continues to grow as a contentious and increasingly major issue in American political and economic discourse. Corre- address to spondingly, there has been a radical and furious pushback from the right, particularly the right-wing tea party extremists.

Additionally, a few conservatives argue that focusing on inequality is unwise because taxing high incomes will cripple economic growth. Some even argue that it's unfair, that people should be allowed to keep what they earn. And some of the more rancid right wingers argue that it's un-American that we've always celebrated those who acquire wealth, and that it actually violates our national creed to suggest that some people control too large a share of the wealth.

Actually, they're right. Imagine that. I agree! Seriously, would a real American actually say this? "The absence of effective State, and, especially, national, restraint upon unfair money-getting has tended to create a small class of enormously wealthy and economically powerful men, whose chief object is to hold and increase their power," and then follow that statement with a call for "a graduated inheritance tax on big fortunes... increasing rapidly in amount with the size of the estate."

Who would make such an outrageous statement? Surprisingly, to most current Republicans, it was Theodore Roosevelt, in his famous 1910 New Nationalism speech. During this time of his life and political career Teddy was a "moderate" Republican, trying to usurp power from the conservatives in the GOP. Hmmm? Can Republicans actually think like this and still be considered a Republican? Not in today's political climate.

Truth be known, in the early 20th century, many prominent, conservative Americans cautioned about the dangers of massive wealth concentration, and urged that U.S. tax policy be used to curb the growth of excessive riches. In yet another example, in 1919, the great thinker and economist Irving Fisher - whose theory of "debt deflation," remains essential to understanding our

current economic troubles, dedicated his presidential the American Economic Association largely caution-

wealth." He also spoke sympathetically to proposals created to limit inherited wealth through the heavy taxation of estates.

The concept of regulating the concentration of wealth, especially inherited wealth, wasn't just idle talk. In his landmark book, "Capital in the Twenty-First Century," the economist Thomas Piketty points out that America - which instituted an income tax in 1913 and an inheritance tax in 1916 - led the way in the increase of progressive taxation, that it was "far out in front" of Europe. Mr. Piketty even goes so far as to say that "confiscatory taxation of excessive incomes" (that is, in Texan speak, taxation whose goal was to reduce income and wealth inequalities, rather than to raise money for the government) was an "American invention."

Surprisingly, this "American invention" had deep historical roots in the Jeffersonian vision of an egalitarian society of small farmers. In 1910, when Teddy Roosevelt gave his speech, many intelligent Americans realized not just that extreme inequality was making nonsense of that vision, but that America was in danger of turning into a society dominated by hereditary wealth — that the New World was seriously at risk of turning into Old Europe. They became energized and forceful when arguing that public policy should seek to limit inequality for both political and economic reasons, that great wealth concentrated in the hands of a few presented a clear and present danger to democracy.

So, how did these viewpoints not only get driven out of the mainstream, but come to be completely rejected? Remember how inequality and

taxes on the highest incomes were treated in the 2012 presidential elec-Obama was unsympathetic to the rich. "If one's priority is to punish highly successful people, then vote for the Democrats," exclaimed Mitt Romney. Democrats heatedly (and untruthfully) in effect, accusing President Obama of thinking like Teddy Roosevelt. How in the world did that kind of thinking

We sometimes hear the claim that concentrated wealth is no longer an important issue, because the big winners in today's economy are self-made folks who owe their position at the top of the ladder to hard work, not inheritance. Yet that view is long out of date. New work by economists Emmanuel Saez and Gabriel Zucman discovered that the share of wealth held at the very top — the richest 0.1 percent of the population — has doubled since the 1980s, and is now as high as it was when Theodore Roosevelt and Irving Fisher issued their warnings.

We don't know how much of that wealth is actually inherited. Even so, it's interesting to look at the Forbes list of the wealthiest Americans. According to a recent publication, about a third of the top 50 inherited their large fortunes. Another third are 65 or older, so they will probably be leaving large fortunes to their heirs.

of people acquiring great wealth is now the U.S. Congress. We may not yet be a society with a hereditary aristocracy next decade or two.

The demonization of anyone who talks about the dangers of concentrated wealth is founded on a misunderstanding of both the past and the present. Such discourse isn't un-American; it's very much in the American tradition. Importantly, it's not at all immaterial to the contemporary world. The question is: who will be this generation's Theodore Roosevelt? Who has the moral courage. to address and correct a very serious threat to America?

New Device May Help Stop Ringing in the Ears

The National Institutes of Health (NIH) is planning to start a clinical trial to evaluate the effects of a device that may help reduce ringing of the ears, a condition that is medically known as tinnitus. A device known as the "Serenity System" is a device that will send signals in the nervous system to change the signals in the brain that may reduce or stop tinnitus completely. The US National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders (NIDCD) is funding this study that will be conducted in four centers across the United States.

There are many medications that may cause or worsen ringing in the ears. Nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) such as aspirin, naproxen (Aleve), and ibuprofen (Motrin, Advil) are popular over-thecounter (OTC) medications that may aggravate tinnitus. Antidepressants such as venlafaxine (Effexor), amitriptyline (Elavil), or fluoxetine (Prozac) may be associated with ear ringing. There are currently no cures for tinnitus. A hearing aid or a masking device are options that may help some people who suffer from this condition.




