HISD interim will step down in June

Hedley ISD will soon begin an active search for its next fulltime superintendent following an announcement by Interim Superintendent Bill Wood at last week's school board meeting.

Wood said he intends to step down as interim superintendent effective June 1 after holding the position since June 2013.

"I feel like we've made strides here in terms of board cooperation, finances, and other areas," Wood told the Enterprise this week. "We have put money back in fund balance, and things are going positively. That's a good time to bring someone in, and I told the board they need someone here seven days a week and seven nights a week."

Wood, who resides in Claude, also noted that he's on his eleventh year of doing interim work after retiring from a long career in education.

Wood said he is preparing the qualifications and salary information for application packets for the superintendent search, and he intends to present a timeline for the search at the February board meeting.

Election sign-ups underway

The sign-up period is underway for citizens interested in serving on the boards of six local governments.

Filing for ballot places began Wednesday, January 28, at the cities of Clarendon, Hedley, and Howardwick; the Clarendon and Hedley school districts; and the Donley County Hospital District.

The City of Clarendon has the mayor's position and two seats on the Board of Aldermen up for election this year. Those jobs are twoyear terms and are currently held by Mayor Larry Hicks and Aldermen Doug Kidd and Sandy Skelton.

Hedley has three two-year positions up on its Board of Aldermen, seats that are currently held by Aldermen Tonya Metcalf, Kathy Spier, and Dusty Wilkinson.

Howardwick has its mayor and two aldermen's positions up for election for two-year terms. Those are now held by Mayor Mike Rowland and Aldermen Jim Cockerham and Gail Leathers.

Thank God for shoulders we stand on







vocal minority and now to having even that limited voice muzzled. That can't be good, and Republicans should be wary that the wheel of fortune - and changing demographics - may one day reverse their current status.

Politicians always like to talk about the "democratic process" and what a great "democracy" we live in. But pure democracy can be the worst kind of evil, which is why our state and federal founders developed a system of republican (small "R") government with checks and balances and protections for minority views. The heavy-handedness of the current majority, however, teeters on bringing Texas in touch with absolute democracy where the will of the majority (fifty percent plus one) can override any other concern.

You like open government and private control of groundwater in West Texas? Well, with absolute democracy and no voice for the minority, crony politicians can corrupt government functions and a majority of urban Texans can do what they want to with rural groundwater.

And what happens in a generation or two when the left is back in power? Perhaps a conservative nightmare comes to life with free abortions in clinics across the state, mandatory Pre-K classes, and strangling regulations on oil, gas, hunting, and fishing. Won't that be fun?

According to the Tribune article, the new Senate rules also eliminated committees focused on open government, jurisprudence, economic development, and government organization. What's the reasoning behind that and what does it mean for Texans?

For now, the right has all the "might" in Texas, and it's marching forward at an alarming rate. But conservatives would do well to consider the long term ramifications of what their steamroller approach can bring down the line. The pendulum will one day swing the other way, and we may not like it when it does.

My ears would especially perk up as I would listen to my father and grandfather discuss the impact of the inheritance tax, or death tax, and the dire possibility that we would have to sell part of our land to pay the taxes.

Even at the age of 12, this seemed fundamentally unfair. Like most farmers and ranchers in the area, we weren't rich. The value of our ranch was in the land itself, not sitting in a bank somewhere.

my family's work was never lost on me. We were and still are a part of the less than one percent of the U.S. population that raises safe and healthy food for people here at home and abroad. And if what economists say is true, we will need to raise 70 percent more food by 2050.

On the first day of the new Congress, I introduced a simple, twopage bill that would permanently and fully eliminate the death tax. I've introduced this bill several times before, and I will continue to push until the tax

New Ear Drops for Swimmer's Ear

Finafloxacin (Xtoro) ear drops have been approved by the FDA to help treat a condition that is commonly known as swimmer's ear. This condition affects the outer part of the ear. It is an infection (acute otitis externa) of the ear and external ear canal. Otitis externa is typically caused by bacteria when the ear is moist. Swelling, redness, pain, and ear discharge can occur. Finafloxacin ear drops are applied to the ear to help kill two major types of bacteria that causes the infection. Finafloxacin is an antibiotic that belongs to the drug class of the fluoroquinolones. This group helps eradicate bacteria by interrupting the bacteria's genes.

The results of the clinical trials that led to approval of finafloxacin ear drops showed a seventy percent cure rate in the people who used the ear drops compared to a thirty seven percent cure rate in people who received an ear drop that did not include the antibiotic, finafloxacin. The most common side effects of Xtoro include nausea and itching of the ear.
