TxDOT gives green light to area jobs

Three short months after Texas voters approved Proposition 1, adding \$1.74 billion to the state highway fund, the Texas Transportation Commission last week approved the construction of 201 road projects. Starting in March, the Texas Department of Transportation will begin awarding projects to contractors with construction kicking off soon after.

"Citizens sent a clear message in November and TxDOT is carrying out its responsibility quickly, effectively and with a great deal of local input," said Texas Transportation Commission Chairman Ted Houghton. "Between Prop.1's \$1.74 billion and other funding sources, we are able to allocate \$2 billion to projects that will help address roadway congestion, safety and the growing demands on our infrastructure."

None of the projects will be in Donley County, but the Childress District received \$16.4 million in Proposition 1 money and will let three projects.

US 287 in Childress and Hardeman Counties will see a rehabilitation project on US 287 in Hardeman and some concrete repair and concrete repair on US 287 in Childress. This is a \$7 million project and lets in June 2015

US 83 in Wheeler County will have a \$7 million project to Super 2 US 83 form North of the Wheeler city limits to the Hemphill County line for 12.458 miles. This project lets in July 2015

FM 2697 in Wheeler County will see a \$2.25 million project to widen the roadway to 28 feet and an overlay

Other major projects planned for the area are an \$8.9 million project to Super 2 US 83 from north of Shamrock city limits for 13.947 miles, letting in July 2015; a \$4.1 million project to widen and overlay FM 1547 in Hall and Collingsworth counties. This project also lets in July 2015.

City will choose 2 aldermen this spring

The City of Clarendon will be the only local government to hold a competitive election this spring, but all other local governments did receive enough candidates to fill upcoming positions before the signup period closed last Friday, February 27.

Clarendon Mayor Larry Hicks is unopposed for re-election, incumbent Aldermen Doug Kidd and Sandy Skelton are both running for office again and will be joined on the ballot by Britton Hall:

The City of Howardwick will have an election to renew a local sales tax option in that city, but they will not have competitive races for elected office. Mayor Mike Rowland and Alderman Gail Leathers are signed up, and Brenda Hampton is signed up for the other alderman's

Clarendon ISD incumbents Wayne Hardin and Wes Hatley are returning to the school board, and Donley County Hospital Board directors Wayne Tubbs, Carey Wann, and Melinda McAnear are returning to their positions.

Hedley ISD has Dana Bell returning to its board, and recently appointed trustee Carole Ward has also signed up to stay in her position.

The City of Hedley had three candidates sign up on the last day. Incumbent Aldermen Tonya Metcalf and Kathy Spier are returning and will be joined by Sally Griffin.

This year's elections will be held on May 9. Local governments with uncontested races will cancel their elections.

Warrant Round-Up will begin Saturday

If you've skipped paying that speeding ticket that you stuffed in your glove box, you could soon find yourself wearing a pair of handcuffs when the Texas Warrant Round-Up begins Saturday, March 7.

Donley County Justices of the Peace and more than 200 other jurisdictions and law enforcement agencies across the state will be participating in the round-up, and officials say it's best to pay your fine now before it starts.

Local justice courts handed numerous open cases over to a collection agency in Amarillo, which has sent letters out to those individu-

The courts have already put a hold on the driver's licenses of the offenders in question, and if they don't pay up before February 25, warrants will be issued and the offenders will be arrested.

Precinct 3&4 Justice Denise Bertrand said Donley County has had good results from participating in the Texas Warrant Round-Up before.

"It has been successful in the past," Bertrand said. "I consider it a success when they pay their fine, and we don't have to put out a warrant or put them in jail."

As collection agents letters show up in mailboxes and word gets out about the round-up, local courts are already seeing an influx of people paying their fines.

If someone is unable to pay their fine, officials still say it's better to contact their offices before warrants go out next Saturday.

"Community service is an option if they can prove they can't pay their fine," Bertrand said.

Auto speedsters brag of "zero to 60" in warp speed; Galveston can emphasize Carnival's "zero to 2nd" in 15 years!...

Galveston has always had plenty of water, but it took a while to gain a foothold in the cruise industry until Carnival came calling in 2000, that is.

With numerous land attractions to offer visitors, Galveston has multiple reasons for storybook success, and has set new boarding records set annually.

Thanks to the arrival of the Freedom this month, Galveston is now home to a trio of Carnival vessels, including the Magic and the Triumph. More than 600,000 cruise vacationers will board CCL vessels in Galveston this year – more than five times the 2000 number....

The Freedom's maiden voyage was a red, white and blue extravaganza. In cooperation with "Operation Homefront," Carnival welcomed several hundred military personnel and their families for an overnight event on board the vessel which has undergone a \$70 million upgrade. Featured were numerous activities, including a performance by country music superstar Martina McBride.

At concert's end, CCL presented a \$100,000 check to "Operation Homefront," a volunteer organization that aids military families.

While cruise ships offer wall-to-wall entertainment and activities, I'm always intrigued by "regular people" with stories to tell and/or talents to share....

I was struck by a Washington state party of 12. Of the dozen, 10 were family, including two sisters, three brothers and their spouses. Several of them hung out many afternoons to play their ukuleles.

They claim to be "ordinary" musicians who simply love to play. Still, folks stopped by - some requesting songs from a small hymnal.

It was their second cruise to bring ukuleles along for impromptu sessions....

A new initiative - Camp Ocean - is offered for children ages 2-11, and trappings of Dr. Seuss abound. A parade featured several dozen pre-schoolers marching the length of the ship with assorted bells and whistles.

Parents who might have snagged the "instruments" from them at home eagerly watched, offering, "That's my boy," or, "That's my girl" brags.

On the final sea day, they joined 300 children for breakfasts of green eggs and ham, ordered from clever menus written rhyme-like by an aficionado of the good doctor. Throughout the week, Seuss characters - The Cat in the Hat, Sam I Am, Thing One and Thing Two - were on hand for photographs. The Cat had the hardest time. His hat spanned nearly half of the character's almost 10-foot height, necessitating knee-bending through most doorways....

Always welcome are the smiles and helpful countenance of ship personnel who hail from throughout the world. They are genuinely happy to be there, and so are we.

The place where Texas became Texas

It all started in a small town nestled between the Barrington Farm and the Jordan Creek along the banks of the Brazos River - that's where the early seeds of the Lone Star State were planted.

If you're from Texas, you're probably familiar with names like Davey Crockett, Sam Houston, and Steven F. Austin. It would be hard to grow up here without repeatedly hearing the story of how our ancestors beat oppression, won the Texas Revolution, and declared independence as the Republic of Texas.

Certainly, you 'Remember the Alamo.

For two weeks, Mexican soldiers had been launching attacks at Texas' southern border in attempts to squander our budding independence. They quickly drained our resources and numbers. But they could never drain our spirit.

In the midst of the fight, five newlyelected Texas delegates hunkered down along the Brazos' banks and rushed to put pen to paper. Time was of the

essence. Messengers reported that just 350 miles south, the number of remaining Texan soldiers had dwindled into the double-digits. They were desperate to defend the Alamo against an onslaught of thousands of fresh

by sen. john cornyn Mexican soldiers, and they were failing. The five delegates burned the midnight oil - literally - jotting down ideas that

The next morning, the other 54 delegates returned to what we now call Independence Hall to make it official. It was March 2nd, 1836, and the first lone star had just been hoisted into the sky as a symbol of Texas freedom and the now independent Republic of Texas.

would soon change history.

For ten years, the Republic thrived on the same ideals that still drive our state: freedom, personal responsibility, and plain old hard work. On December 29, 1845, Texas became the 28th state

to join the United States - the first state with history as its own independent nation.

Although the Republic of Texas was short-lived, the Texas spirit lives on. Look around, and you'll see we're still Texans undeterred, working hard to provide for our families. Our state's employment boasts the fastest growth rate of all 50 states, and creates the most international trade of all 50 states. And we still fight just as hard to protect our ideals and our neighbors.

County Commissioner Ben Perry hit the nail on the head when he told me what we Texans know too well: "Being a Texan doesn't describe where you're from, it describes who your family is."

So as spring comes along and we celebrate new beginnings of all kinds, I know across Texas we'll all be celebrating the beginnings of our great state, right here in Washington-on-the-Brazos, nestled between the Barrington Farm and the Jordan Creek. That's where Texas became Texas.

For God in His wisdom made it impossible for people to know Him by means of their own wisdom. Instead, by means of the so-called 'foolish' message we preach, God decided to save those who believe."

For while I was with you, I made up my mind to forget everything except Jesus Christ and especially His death on the cross. Drugs in the News

New Drug Approved for Eye Allergy Symptoms

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved Pazeo (olopatadine hydrochloride ophthalmic solution) 0.7% for the treatment of symptoms associated with allergic conjunctivitis symptoms that include red, itchy eyes. In two clinical trials, Pazeo was shown to provide significant relief from eye allergies for up to 24 hours from the time of treatment. This finding allows Pazeo to be a one-drop daily product. It was also found to be just as safe as other eye drops. Researchers believe that Pazeo will be an exciting new option in eye allergy relief therapy. This new eye solution is expected to be available by prescription in March 2015.

As much as about a third of Americans are burdened with seasonal allergy symptoms. Almost 80 percent of these individuals experience symptoms such as allergic conjunctivitis, which is commonly referred to as eye allergies. These allergies cause inflammation of the conjunctiva, which is the clear layer of skin overlying the eyes. Allergic conjunctivitis is not usually harmful to a person's eyes, but it can cause discomfort.





Clarendon College baseball player Michael Cruz was honored last Thursday for NJCAA and WJCAC awards.


