

Some residents who then resist the caller or refuse to meet receive threats from the caller who says they will kidnap the resident's children or even "blow up your hometown." Blackburn reminds residents that if they haven't entered a contest, they aren't going to win anything and also that Publishers Clearing House will not call your home. Hang up and don't take the scammer's bait.

dropped 7.37 percent compared to the same period one year ago. The city received \$25,132.06 for the month.

Clarendon's sales tax collections for the calendar year-to-date are still head of this point in 2014, up 2.01 percent at \$96,522.27.

Hedley's sales tax figure also dropped for the month, down 12.56 percent to \$364.55 and bringing the year-to-date figure down 2.35 percent to \$1,598.59.

After months of declining revenue, however, the City of Howardwick saw a 26.59 percent uptick in its sales tax revenue to \$1,409.60, but that city still trails for the year, down 3.33 percent at \$3,296.38.

Statewide, sales tax revenue in February was \$2.46 billion, up 11.7 percent compared to February 2014.

"This marks the 59th consecutive month of year-over-year growth - an encouraging sign that Texas' diverse economic engine continues to drive spending growth," Hegar said.

Dogs, cats required to have city tags

City Hall is reminding Clarendon residents that dogs and cats four months of age and older are required to have a City tag.

City tags cost only \$1, are valid for the entire calendar year, and are available at City Hall. Residents need to bring proof of current rabies vaccination in order to get the tag. State law requires that all cats and dogs over four months of age and older be vaccinated for rabies and display the tag on the animal.

City officials say spring is around the corner and skunks are starting to move around. When feeding your cats and dogs, they encourage people not to leave any food out after dark because this will draw the skunks to your property.

The city had two rabies cases in bats last year, so residents are encouraged to watch for bats and tell their children not to touch them. City Hall also says it is time to get livestock and fowl permits issued or renewed. Anyone with livestock and/or fowl is required to get a permit from the Animal Control Officer at City Hall. These permits are required annually at a minimal expense. Failure to obtain the City Tags or Permits could result in a fine in the Municipal Court for violation of Ordinance 374, sec. 204.003. Residents are also reminded to get their new Garage Sale Permits, at no cost, and copy of the Garage Sale Ordinance at City Hall.

A product of the Texas Panhandle, Bean was born in Wheeler, and surely no one on the second floor of that drug store in 1932 ever imagined at the time that this boy would one day walk on the surface of the Moon. But as fate would have it, Bean

Circus elephants out to pasture

There's a certain irony concerning the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey circus owners' bombshell announcement. It began news rounds as a brief piece, seemingly no more than an afterthought. Effective in 2018, there'll be no elephants under the "big top," or in any other RBB&B venue.

The impact of "no more circus elephants" grew by the hour, becoming a lead story before day's end. Conversations of "elephant-less" circuses blanketed the nation. (On one of winter's coldest days - when thousands of motorists and truckers were victims of icedover roads - elephants would have been in high demand to pull them free.)

Circus owners claim they're weary of complaints about animal treatment and local ordinances which make it cumbersome for booking venues. They also sense a national mood favoring animal

replacing a single elephant. "Why so much?" grumbled the trucker.



Back in the real world, this triumph for elephants is worthy of their loudest trumpeting. The 13 elephants still performing will be put "out to pasture" at the circus' 200-acre Center for Elephant Conservation in central Florida with 29 "retirees" already there.

Bean was the fourth man to walk on the moon during a program that many consider as the greatest technical achievement of the American civilization. This boy born not so far from here was part of something that typified American greatness or, as some like to call it, American exceptionalism.

In all of human history, only 12 men have ever walked on the Moon - all of them Americans and no one since the Apollo 17 mission in 1972. Your editor was two years old then. Those younger than 42 have never seen someone do what Bean did.

Capt. Bean isn't concerned by this. He notes that the Pilgrims didn't land at Plymouth Rock until 128 years after Columbus sailed to the New World. But there was a lot of exploration done in those ensuing years... new lands and peoples discovered... new records set... and boundaries pushed further and further.

Politics is largely to blame for the languishing of the American space program. We haven't gotten a man out of earth orbit for four decades, and right now we can't even put an astronaut in space without hitching a ride from the Russians. In 2004, President George W. Bush outlined a new program designed to return humans to the Moon by 2020 and launch missions rights. Plus, they likely are tired of "elephant maintenance," with annual costs of \$65,000 per pachyderm.... *****

It's hard to imagine circuses without the lumbering grey animals. Before coliseums, they did the "grunt work," hoisting the poles to support the "big top." Alas, the really big tents are rare these days, as are the ever-dwindling elephant acts that once commanded center-ring attention.

Memorable are their "trunk-totail" linkage as the gigantic animals led downtown circus parades.

And who can ever forget millions of dads hoisting youngsters on their shoulders for better looks?...

An aside is an oft-repeated yarn. A dozen elephants led a circus parade. The lead elephant was struck by an 18-wheeler; lawsuits began.

The circus owner wanted a sum several times larger than the cost of

42. That's believed to be almost exactly the number Carthaginian hero Hannibal utilized during his heralded wintry crossing of the Alps in 218 BC. The span between Hannibal's feat and RBB&B's "phase-out" date is 2,236 years!

The Alps' crossing – with numerous deadly battles waged during the ravages of winter - took the lives of thousands of soldiers, horses and most of the elephants. In fact, some accounts say the only surviving pachyderm was the one Hannibal rode in on. And no comfortable haven awaited him or his elephant

P.T. Barnum - and his "Greatest Show on Earth" - could only dream of the impact his shows would have on Americans when he imported the first Asian elephant in 1870. Soon the pachyderm was the symbol of his traveling menagerie.

Tigers, dogs and goats are still performing, and a Mongolian troupe of camel stunt riders joined the circus this

Parades and much else are diminishing. Life - ever more complicated remains a circus....

Maybe parades could be added at the Florida elephant preserve.

What a rare treat for children who could manage to get there. Key to this might be for children to do the "parading," with elephants stationed along the way. The kids could see the elephants, and the elephants could see them. Call it a "virtual parade."... *****

But we have to stop worrying about how many calories are in a school lunch, how to make life easy for the non-productive, or how to have a government program to take care of people from the cradle to the grave. We need leaders who lead, a government that sets goals which actually push us to achieve greatness, politicians who respect and understand the importance of science, and a president who will inspire to again be the greatest nation on God's earth.

But until that happens, I will be thankful that my kids got the opportunity to meet an American hero and hope that they understand the greatness of the man and the enormous importance of what his generation did for all mankind. My son says he wants to go to Mars. (Shoot a mile, his old man would like to go to Mars!) And who knows? Maybe someday, when things are right, maybe he - or his sister - can follow in the footsteps other kids from the Panhandle, like Alan Bean and Rick Husband, and blaze a trail in the sky.

No one is safe while the Texas Legislature is currently in session. The most uncompromising elements of the Republican Party are running the state, and this week they're making headlines with the passage of an open carry bill out of the Texas Senate. The measure now goes to the House, and the governor has already indicated he'll sign the bill into law.

Other than returning Texas to the wild, wild West, it's not clear what the advantage of this law would be. Concealed carry is one thing, but having a good number of the population walking around with a gun on their hip just seems to increase the likelihood that some nut job will get his hands on a firearm. Open Carry is getting all the press, but here's some other things the boys and girls in Austin are up to. The budget proposed in the House zeroed out funding for the Courthouse Restoration Program that Donley County and others have benefitted from. It also zeroed out funding for the Texas Trails program that has helped boost heritage tourism to rural communities. And more good news... no fewer than six bills have been filed to curtail your right to know what's happening in your local governments by eliminating or truncating public notices in newspapers. Instead of making government more open and more transparent, there are forces in power who would like to see things kept out of the public's view.




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Blood Thinner Cuts Heart Attack Risk

A major clinical study called PEGASUS-TIMI 54, which involved over 21,000 individuals showed that Brilinta, significantly cut the risk of death or heart attack in those who had a history of previous heart attacks. People who participated in the trial had experienced a heart attack within the past one to three years and were given Aspirin along with Brilinta therapy. Brilinta belongs to a group of medications called antiplatelet agents. It works by stopping the clumping of platelets (small fragments) in the blood. Platelets tend to clump together to stop bleeding when there is damage to a blood vessel. The clumping can cause a blood clot and lead to a stroke or heart attack. Heart attacks are one of the leading causes of death in America. A heart attack occurs when the flow of oxygen-rich blood to section of heart muscle suddenly becomes blocked and the heart is unable to receive oxygen. If blood flow isn't restored quickly, the section of heart muscle begins to die. Each year, 26 percent of women 45 years and older die within a year of having a heart attack compared to 19 percent of men.





Mason named Defensive Player of the Year By Sandy Anderberg


Senior Bronco Charles Mason has been named the Defensive Player of the Year by participating coaches in District 2.

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
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
Lady Broncos take on Alumni in softball game
