## Two Accidents Injure Two Area Residents

Joe Jesko of Route One, Friona, is in St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo as a result of an early morning accident Sunday.

The accident was seven miles north of Muleshoe in Parmer County. It happened about 7:15 a.m. Sunday morning, April 20. Jesko, traveling south on Highway 214 veered off the highway in his 1968 Ford and when he pulled back onto the highway, lost control, swerved across the highway and the car turned over onto its right side on a sloping embankment.

Mrs. Joe Jesko, a passenger in the automobile, received injuries to her rib area, however, did not require hospitalization. Jesko is reported to be in neck traction in St. Anthony's being treated for injuries to his neck.

The accident was investigated by Muleshoe Texas Highway Patrolman Gene Sisemore.

Sisemore investigated another accident in Bailey County on Monday night, April 21. The second accident in two days occurred 25 miles southwest of Muleshoe near Stegall.

The highway patrolman reported that a 1969 Chevrolet pickup being driven by Joe Thurl Lemons struck a cow about 8:30 p.m. Monday. The pickup was damaged on the right front fender, hood, grille, radiator and bumper. No one was injured in the accident.

## May 27 Last Day of School School Board Vetoes Junior-Senior Prom

An estimated 40 interested Muleshoe residents, ministers and others attended the regular monthly meeting of the Muleshoe Independent School District School board.

At the meeting, a petition was presented, along with a letter, asking that a Junior and Senior Prom be held following the annual Junior-Senior Banquet.

Petitions were presented the school board with 564 names of people who were in favor of the prom proposal.

**BULLETIN**

Congressman Bob Price Wednesday morning announced an OEO Grant for the Summer Head start program which affects Bailey County.

The OEO grant is a part of the PESO Education Service of Region 16, Amarillo.

Allotted as a Federal Share was \$147,392 with \$135,365 being new Federal Funds and \$12,027 being part of programmed funds.

Local share of the program is \$49,508 for a total of \$196,900.

Project chairman is Huleyn W. Laycock and the counties served by the PESO Region are Bailey, Swisher, Terry, Parmer, Hutchinson, Dickens, Cochran, Crosby, Floyd, Hale, and Lamb.

Involved are a total of 1,358 children in 84 classes at 34 different centers.

It was requested that the Junior-Senior Prom be held on the school campus, after the banquet and to provide entertainment, other than dancing, for those who choose not to participate in dancing.

Following a lengthy and detailed discussion, the vote was denied by a vote of four to three. The present policy was referred to as follows:

"The Schools will not sponsor school dances and that no ballroom or square dancing shall be held on or in any school facility. No parent sponsored group shall be allowed the use of any school facility for any recreation activity, not sponsored by the school."

Board members voting against the prom were Jinks Meyers, John Gunter, Aubrey Heathington and Joe Embry. Voting in favor of the prom were Eugene Black, Carl Bamert and Dr. Charles Lewis.

Dr. Charles Lewis was re-elected president of the school board and Carl Bamert was named vice president and Eugene Black resumed his former position as secretary.

Election returns from the April 5 election were canvassed and new members signed the oath of office.

Joe Embry was appointed by the board to issue diplomas at the Commencement exercises to be held May 27 at 8 p.m. in the High School auditorium.

The board approved the closing schedule for the current school year and school will be dismissed at 2 p.m. on Monday and Tuesday, May 26 and 27. The last day of school will be Tuesday, May 27.

## They Came to Run

I believe more than ever that the most accurate method of measuring an athlete is not through football or basketball, but, during track season. This has been proven correct at Lazbuddie during the 1969 season.

With 10 boys, a District Championship came to be. As a result, Lazbuddie qualified in nine individual events and two relays. Of course, no one figured them as contenders at the Regional Meet; no one . . . but nine boys.

Lazbuddie struck fear into the favorites, Booker and Meadow, by winning the 440 relay in 44.5 from the eighth lane, which makes it extremely tough.

The mile relay had yet to win and by this time it was a point of pride that we should, as only a dropped baton would help Meadow or Booker to the Regional Championship.

Both Marathon and Booker had terrific anchor men and Lazbuddie has been reminded at least 100 times that our anchor man would have to have a 30 yard lead to win. Lazbuddie was at a disadvantage as they had lane 9, but Frank Hinkson brought Larry Hodges the baton in second place and Larry regained the five yards only to lose it in the stretch. Mike Casey took the exchange and put forth his best effort of the year as he brought Steve Foster a 30 yard lead and Steve ran his best run of the year as he won by ten yards, holding off the Marathon and Booker anchor men.

All of this plus Monte Barnes' fifth place in the discus the day before, gave Lazbuddie 65 points to Meadow's 50, Booker's 47 and Marathon's 37.

Regional championships are not won every day and this group of boys have worked hard and deserve being number ONE.

Track requires more time than any other sport and local spectators saw the payoff Saturday at the Texas Tech regional meet.

I've passed out very few compliments during my coaching career, "one of my many weaknesses," but I've never been prouder of a group of boys.

Most of the cases handled during the last two weeks were for speeding, with 22 cases of speeding being filed; five cases were for no operator license and five for over registered weight.

Three were filed on for having expired drivers license; three on drunk charges; one for following too closely; two for running stop sign; four for no Motor Vehicle Inspection Sticker; two for no lease agreement; two for no Texas registration; two for being over registered length; one for failure to yield right of way, causing motor vehicle accident' two for driving

Support has been steadily growing for H.R. 8629, which I introduced on March 11, 1969, to relieve the devastating impact of Federal estate taxes on the families of farmers, ranchers, and small businessmen. As a result, I submitted a statement before the House Ways and Means Committee's hearings on March 28 and reintroduced the identical bill with cosponsors on April 1, 1969.

The need for enactment of my bill is clear, because inflated and unrealistic land prices have caused higher and higher inheritance taxes and forced liquidation of family operations in many cases when a landowner died. The same applies to many small businessmen whose heirs find that high estate taxes make it impossible to carry the business on from one generation to the next.

Principal reason for estate tax discrimination is the requirement that the tax be imposed on "fair market value" of the assets at the time of the owner's death. More often than not these prices are vastly inflated and are in no way comparable to the actual earning capacity of the property. My bill would provide a "fair alternative" to the present tax law and allow the executor the option of valuation at (1) fair market value (as under existing law) or (2) the higher of the decedent's adjusted cost basis or a value based on the reasonable earning power of the business as measured by taxable income. Earning power of the business would be computed on a prior ten-year average and a capitalization factor, and decedent would have to have been in the business for

at least 10 years prior to his death. For ownership under 10 years, my bill includes a special rule that demonstrated earning capacity and degree of ownership be considered under the "fair market value" option. Since the earning power of the shares of stock in an estate is generally considered the main factor in determining value, I believe that earning power should also be considered in the valuation of a farm, ranch, or closely held business for estate purposes.

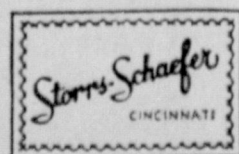

## Church Leader Raps Corporation Farms

The leader of a national organization which promotes agriculture and the rural community has spoken out by endorsing legislation introduced in the Texas Legislature to curb corporate farming. Msgr. John George Weber of Des Moines, Iowa, National Catholic Rural Life Conference Chairman, has issued a statement in support of H.B. 700 introduced by Rep. Charles Jungmichel of La Grange. The Jungmichel bill would make farming and ranching by conglomerate corporations illegal in Texas.

Msgr. Weber says, "Texas lost about four thousand farmers in 1968. With each seven to eight farms closed out, one business establishment on Main Street must also close. An estimate of twelve thousand people involved in the migration would be rather conservative. There are, undoubtedly, many reasons for the migration, the chief of which is the low income the farmer received for his investment, management, labor and risk. If 1968 were an exception to the trend, one might not be too alarmed, but this migration from the country to the city has been going on for years with many evil consequences.

"A new feature is developing in rural America which should

alarm every citizen of our country. This new feature is the invasion of agriculture by conglomerate corporations. According to a statement of policy at a recent national seminar on corporation farming, there is evidence that these corporate interests are utilizing a number of devices, including vertical integration of food production by conglomerate corporations; purchases of huge blocks of land for hedging and

speculative purposes; undermining of farm markets by price manipulation; by-passing of competitive markets; and mutually advantageous agreements with chain stores and food handlers. The manipulation of markets and the movement toward monopoly bodes ill for the consumer as well as for the farmer.

"The statement concludes: 'If large corporations and non-farm interests become pre-

dominant in agriculture, the need for many Main Street businesses, schools and churches and municipal facilities will be eliminated . . . . . This impact on community life makes the corporation farm invasion a human, as well as an economic problem. It is a problem which demands the concern of all Americans. Some actions recommended were: (1) the enactment of the Metcalf Bill on the national level which would limit the write-off of taxable non-farm income against farm losses; (2) the enactment of H.R. 676 introduced by Congressman Neal Smith, which would place weekly limits on the number of cattle slaughtered by meat packers from their own feedlots; (3) enactment of legislation to make credit available to young farmers on a long term, low interest basis; (4) the enactment of legislation to give farmers bargaining power as a countervailing force to the economic power of corporations to engage in farming, but will eliminate conglomerate economic power of corporations; (5) the enactment by state Legislatures of laws regulating corporation farming.'

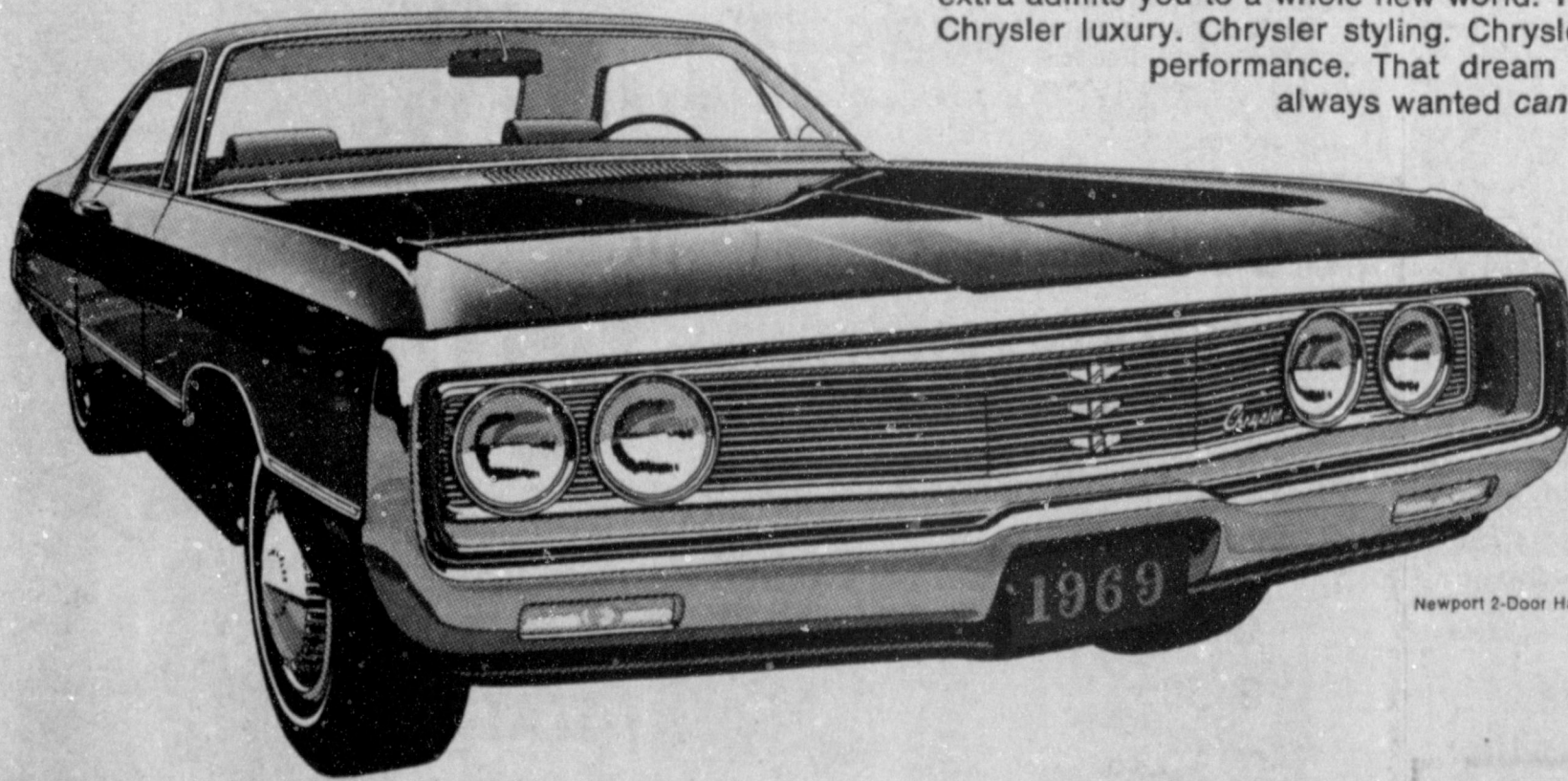

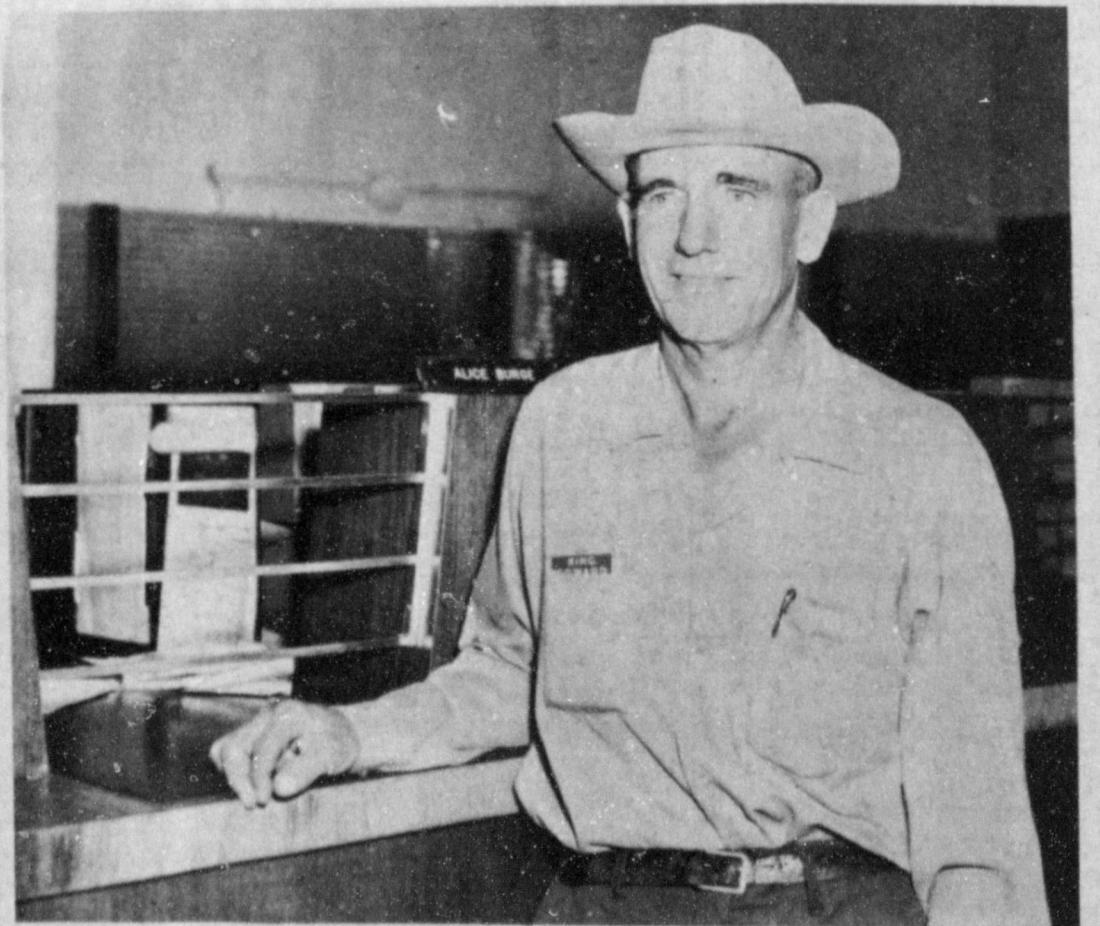
