For President's Safety.

The most notable incident nected with the President's departure arose out of the presence of Baron Spee von Steraberg, the German minister. He was the only member of the diplomatic corps who went to the depot to see the President of, and tid Iy, telling him he greatly appreciated the courtesy. During that chat

That is good, we will have ame long rides together.
