Weeds in vacant yards, lots and around business places drew first attention by council members. It was brought out at the meeting, that if the owner of a particular lot or piece of property refuses to cut his weeds, the city can go in with city equipment, mow the weeds and bill the owner. If the owner does not pay the city, said City Manager Albert Field, then an assessment can be run against

It was also noted that with the warm weather, flies are increasing around the garbage cans. Suggested was a sign for the dumpsters reading, "Close lids on trash containers for health purposes." One councilman said he has seen numerous mosquitos in Muleshoe during the past few days, and it is thought that the recent rains will increase the mosquito popula-

tion considerably. City Manager Field said the city mosquito spraying rig is almost ready to begin a summer

Another item discussed in the clean-up line was the incidence of abandoned cars and trucks on city streets and lots. A city ordinance provides penalties for not disposing of such abandoned vehicles and City Manager Field reported that 40 letters had been mailed recently to owners of property requesting removal of such vehicles. He said if they have not been removed within a reasonable time, charges will be filed on the owners.

Another item discussed was a report by Councilman Lyndal Murray on his preliminary work done toward acquiring a city parking lot. Several alternatives and possible sites were referred to during the discussion,

Two Manslaughter; One For Car Theft

New Mexico authorities may have to wait for awhile for a man being held in Bailey County jail.

Trouble on top of trouble faces Antonio C. Garcia, 23, of the Goodland community in southwest Bailey County. First indication of the multiple charges to be filed against Garcia came Saturday night when a radio message came in at the Muleshoe City Police Department asking all area officers to be on the lookout for a white and yellow late model Chevrolet pickup which had been involved in a fatal hit and run accident between Portales and Dora, N.M.

City, County and State officers from Bailey, Cochran, Lamb and Parmer Counties immediately began converging in southwestern Bailey County and northwestern Cochran County. They

were met near state lines by county and state officers from New Mexico to begin an extensive search which lasted for hours in the area. The search was to no avail Saturday night and officers returned to their respective posts to wait for daylight.

Information continued to dribble in to the police department for several hours Saturday night, as little by little, additional information was elicited on the hit and run.

New Mexico State Policeman Ottis Foster of Portales said the Jessie Gavlan family was traveling to Portales Saturday night when their car was struck from behind by a yellow and white late model Chevrolet pickup. The impact caused Galvan to lose control of the car and it rolled over. the accident. New Mexico officers reported that the vellow and white pickup had 'California-type' side mirrors on both sides, a short wheel base and a narrow bed. Later they reported the vehicle had Texas license plates. They also reported that the pickup would have damage to the right front fender and would have the right headlight missing.

Pig Situation Remains Stable For Past Year

COLLEGE STATION -- In January 1969, hog slaughter in federally inspected plants was running four to five percent larger than a year ago. It is expected to continue relatively large this spring, summer and fall, says John G. McHaney, Extension economist at Texas A&M University.

This expected increase is due to hog producers in the corn belt indicating last December, that they planned to have four percent more sows farrow during December 1968, and February 1969, than in those months a year earlier. They also intended to increase March-May 1969 farrowings by six percent, added McHaney.

Cold storage stocks of pork at the beginning of this year were about 11 percent smaller than a year earlier, said the economist. Moreover, no sizeable buildup in stocks took place this past winter. Thus, the market situation for hogs likely will be helped somewhat next summer by the smaller stocks of pork in storage.

Hog prices in the first half of 1969 will be under pressure from larger pork supplies and larger supplies of both beefand poultry. Also, hog prices in the second half of the year are expected to average somewhat on the lower side compared with prices in the second half of 1968. This is due to prices reflecting increased marketings. Fed cattle marketings are expected to remain large and supplies of poultry will likely continue large in the second half of 1969.

McHaney added, the hog-corn ratio will likely decline this year from the unusually high average of 1968. However, the relationship will still be rather favorable to hog production. This would suggest that the expansion now underway may continue through the year, although the rate of increase may slow in the second half.


