HICKS SPOKE IN CAMPBELL'S BEHALF.

PACKED HOUSE GREETED THE SENATOR FROM SAN ANTONIO.

Made Impressive and Convincing Arguments in Favor of His Candidate and was Frequently Applauded.

Hon. Marshall Hicks of San Antonio spoke at the Court House Thursday night to a large audience in behalf of Tom M. Campbell for Governor.

Col. W. A. H. Miller of this city made a brief talk and then introduced Mr. Hicks. Mr. Miller is a personal friend of Col. Campbell, and said that the fact that he was a native born Texan and Confederate veteran should induce every man to vote for him.

Senator Hicks opened up by giving an outline of Mr. Campbell's life from boyhood up, and he spoke from personal knowledge for he was raised in the same county as Mr. Campbell. He pointed out that Mr. Campbell had been a straightforward man all his life and no one could truthfully say aught against him.

He then took up the "rebates" and "home exemption" charges that have been brought against Mr. Campbell, and proved to the satisfaction of every man present, we believe, that there was absolutely nothing in them.

Mr. Campbell's platform was then taken up and discussed in a thorough manner, and Mr. Hicks said if Col. Campbell was elected Governor he would carry out the policy of the greatest Governor Texas ever had. The speaker said that ex-Governor Hogg, just before his death declared himself for Campbell for Governor because, he said, "By-god, they can't buy him nor they can't bluff him."

Mr. Hicks said Campbell was the laboring man's friend and the laboring classes from one end of the state to the other were supporting him. He also pointed out the fact that corporations and every large daily newspaper in the state had their 16 inch guns trained on him.

Mr. Hicks said that Judge Bell, Judge Brooks and Mr. Colquitt were all gentlemen, honest, capable and worthy of being Governor of this great state, but that the platform of Mr. Campbell struck him as being the best one ever written.

In regard to the recent proposition of Mr. Campbell to the other candidates that the man that received the largest number of votes in the primaries should have the nomination and the others withdraw, Mr. Hicks said that all three of them favored the election of governor by the people instead of conventions, and had expressed themselves as having such a law passed two years hence, but when Mr. Campbell proposed to do that now they said he spoke too quick.

Mr. Hicks said that he had not intended to take an active interest

in this campaign until Mr. Campbell was stricken ill. Then he went on the stump for him as hundreds of other men throughout the state have done. He said he was paying his own expenses and was not riding on a pass.

The speech throughout was clean and entirely free from abuse of the other candidates, and from the frequency of applause it appeared as if the whole house was for Campbell. What few voters that were "on the fence" are all off on the Campbell side today.

Senator Hicks returned to San Antonio yesterday morning.

It Was In The Eighth That The Awful Work Was Done.

The Cotulla and Pearsall ball teams played on the local diamond Thursday evening and the visitors done our boys up in fine style. The score was 19 to 10. The game was about the bumpiest that has been played here in a long time, both teams playing like a bunch of washer-women. With the exception of the eighth inning one team did about as bad work as the other and the score was about even, but in the eighth the home boys lost their heads and the visitors bunched their hits and stacked up the runs.

The first three innings the visitors failed to score, while the home boys made four runs. In the fourth a wild throw from home plate to third, another from third to first and still another from pitcher to first let in four runs. In the fifth and sixth each side scored twice. Six innings had been played and it was a tie score. In the seventh the visitors got in two more and the

home boys one. Then came the awful eighth. Two men were out and two men on bases and no runs. The next man at the bat should have been thrown out on first but through an error of the pitcher the ball was thrown in home and the man on third returned safely. With the bases full Little went to the bat and rapped one clean over the center fielder, and this started the work. Before the thing could be stopped seven men had crossed the home plate. Pearsall scored twice more and Cotulla once.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Fixing Salaries and Per Diem of Legislators.

House Joint Resolution Authorizing the Submission to a Vote of the People of the State of Texas of a Proposed Amendment of Section 24, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, Fixing the Salaries and Mileage of Members of the Legislature, and preventing the Acceptance, for Themselves or for Others, by Members of the Legislature of Free Passes, Franks, Rebates, Privileges or Advantages from Certain Persons and Corporations.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas; That at the next general election of the State of Texas, or at any previous election, in case an election for the State shall be had ordered by the Governor for other purposes, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas, for their approval or disapproval, the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas as provided for in Section 1, Article 17 of said Constitution, relating to proposed amendments thereto, it being intended to amend Section 24, Article 3, of said Constitution, relating to the pay of members of the Legislature, so that the said Section shall read as follows:

Sec. 24. The members of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury such compensation for their service as may from time to time be provided by law, not exceeding one thousand dollars for the year succeeding their election payable in equal installments, on the first days of January, February, March and April of the year succeeding their election, and five dollars per day for each day of every special session held during the second year of the term for which said members shall be elected. In addition to said compensation the members of each house shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed three cents per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land regardless of railroads or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established, and by said table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of any regular or called session. It shall be unlawful for any member of the Legislature during his term of office to accept any free transportation over any railway line or lines in this State, and any member of the Legislature violating this Act prohibiting the acceptance of free transportation shall forfeit the office to which he has been elected. And it shall be unlawful for any of such members to accept, receive, have, use or enjoy, directly or indirectly, for themselves or any other person, any free pass frank, rebate, privilege or advantage not accorded to the general public from any railroad company, telegraph company, telephone company, sleeping car company, or other corporation, or any persons firm or corporation acting as a common carrier in this State. Any member of the Legislature violating this provision shall forfeit his office. And the necessary laws shall be enacted to carry out the provisions of this Article.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Relating to Certain Exemptions from Taxation.

Joint Resolution to amend Section 2 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, Relating to certain Exemptions from Taxation.

Be it resolved by the Legisla-

ture of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 2, of Article VIII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended that the same shall read as follows, to-wit:

"All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the Legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; actual places of religious worship; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools, also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages; that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Section 2. The Governor of the State shall and he is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the next general election for State and County officers.

Section 3. The qualified electors for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas shall vote upon this amendment on the day of _____ at which election all persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "For amendment to section 2, Article 8 of the Constitution exempting from taxation endowment funds used exclusively for school purposes." And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "Against amendment to Section 2, Article 8, of the Constitution exempting from taxation endowment funds used exclusively for school purposes."

Section 4. The sum of \$5000 or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication, proclamation, and election.

Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Levy of Tax to Pay Jurors.

Joint Resolution Amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, Providing for the Levying of a Tax of not Exceeding fifteen Cents on the One Hundred Dollars Valuation, to Pay Jurors.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for road and bridges, and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the one hundred dollars valuation, except for the payment of debts incurred prior to

the adoption of the amendment September 25th, 1883, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twenty-cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; in any one year, and except as is in this Constitution otherwise provided; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax-paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special local laws.

Sec. 2. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting this amendment to the Constitution to the qualified voters of the State of Texas, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1906, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots. "For the amendment to authorize the levy of a tax to pay jurors." The voter opposed to this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, "Against the amendment to authorize the levy of a tax to pay jurors."
