ONION HARVEST IS NOW ON.

FIELDS DRY AND HARVEST IS IN FULL BLAST.

The last three days the weather has been very favorable for the onion men, drying the fields out and admitting the harvest to open up in great shape. Many onions have been plowed up since Thursday and Monday we will see loading on all the spurs. Up to this date very few cars have moved owing to very unfavorable weather and wet fields.

The yield is going to be light, but just what per cent the shortage will be cannot be told at this time. The short yield is universal all over the onion belt.

Four inspectors are now located here, one for each loading station. The inspection is very strict, but the class of onions shipped so far required considerable culling. The grade that is now coming out of the ground is much better and clean. Much fancy stuff will go out next week. Up to last night 17 cars have gone out from this station. Monday they will begin to move by train load daily.

MEXICO IS TO BE HELD RESPONSIBLE.

Washington, April 14.—The Mexican government, according to the view at the State Department, will be held accountable for the loss of life and injury to Americans of Douglas, Ariz., during the fighting between federals and insurgents at Agua Prieta yesterday. No matter whether the fire of the federals or that of the insurgents inflicted the injury it will be the federal government to which the United States will look for reparation.

As soon as official reports upon the fighting and the casualties sustained by Americans shall have been received representations will be made to the Mexican government, it is said, and in due course the claims of those injured will be presented.
