Local Contractor Gets Sidewalk Work.

Bids for the construction of approximately 4,000 square feet of cement sidewalk in Cotulla was opened on 15th and the work was awarded to Mr. R. A. Guinn, a local contractor. His bid was the lowest, 14 1-2 cents per square foot.

Work putting in this sidewalk will begin within a short time.

Band Has Employed Leader.

Some him farmer had to make the produce that dollar or he would be loser. The farmer had very little bee training at this time, so he at once procured books on apiculture, such books as were to be had at that early date, for apiculture as practiced at the present time was just being born into existence. He began the hard study necessary to master the bee and his habits. He also began to build new hives, or hives with movable frames in which to handle these bees.

The bees multiplied with him. He studied their needs and wants and administered to them; he continued to make hives, and ere long his friends and neighbors wanted hives of the improved type, so that they also could reap good harvests of honey just like the young farmer. The matter of hive making and increase of bees by the new and improved plan grew too much for this farmer to handle and a man was employed to assist in the work. Soon the business grew too much for the two to handle and the third man was employed.

Success continued, more men were needed, more house room, a factory was needed to be operated by power to do the great amount of work coming his way. The business grew until a journal on the bees was needed and this was added; a fine encyclopedia on bees was imperative need and this was published. The business continued to grow and prosper until today the goods from the farmer's factory are used in every civilized country on the globe and the sun never sets on the hives produced by this factory.

What a strike! What a success! Wherefore all this? Where is the key? Would we not all do this if we knew how? Yes, and the matter can be answered in very few words, or in two words as to that, brains and energy. What a contrast between our two young farmers! The one applied brains to the avocation of apiculture, the other did not; the one succeeded, the other's hopes were blasted. On this story hinges our subject, "Success and Failure in Apiculture."

The causes for the greatest part of failure can be best impressed on the minds of the people by instances and facts. Let us now examine a hive and see the interior and make notes. We find that the two outside combs in a modern beehive have melted and fallen against the sides of the hive, sagged down, are broken, and offer no breeding surface. The next combs are largely drone combs, combs in which male bees are reared and never worked bees, and the rest are full of holes, blotted with patches of wax caused by many years of queen rearing. The remaining combs are wholly useless for brood rearing from these causes and others, such as shortening of cells by long usage, sagging, becoming full of holes, pairing down, etc., thus rendering the breeding space of the hives very small compared with the needs of the bees.

ALLEN SAYS MATTERS ARE SHAPING UP.

From San Antonio Express

Noah Allen of Brownsville, assistant United States attorney, who has been in the city for the past week on business connected with the Cotulla irrigation project, stated yesterday that the project is progressing nicely and that matters are shaping up for early activities in the formation of the district and the prosecution of the development work.

In an account given of this proposition some days ago in The Express it was inadvertently stated that three dams would be constructed across the Nueces River, and three reservoirs est-

ablished, which would irrigate a total of 225,000 acres. Mr. Allen says it is not the purpose to build three dams and three reservoirs and water 225,000 acres, but to build one dam with one reservoir, which will irrigate 100,000 acres, if the largest reservoir contemplated by selecting from three separate dam sites is adopted.

"There are three sites for a dam under consideration," said he. "To build the dam at the highest point under consideration on the river, water would be provided for 50,000 acres; to build at the next highest point would furnish water for 75,000 acres; to build it at the lowest point under consideration it would provide for the irrigation of 100,000 acres. The number of acres that come into the district will determine which one of the three dam sites will be selected, and consequently the capacity of the reservoir. The indications now are that the lower site will be selected and water provided for the irrigation of at least 100,000 acres. No finer lands can be found anywhere in Texas than those under consideration in this project. With this body of land under cultivation and irrigation in La Salle County it will increase the production of wealth and values in the county. It will also create an immense amount of business for San Antonio. I feel sanguine over the prospects at this time.

Q.—Why is the first day of the week, (Sunday) the day usually observed as a day of rest, when the Third Commandment of the Law, given to the Jews by the Lord through Moses, is to the effect that the Seventh Day (Saturday) is the Sabbath Day; Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy? (W. E. J.)

Answer.—Christians have observed Sunday as a special day of worship because it was the day of the week on which the Lord Jesus was raised from the dead, and for no other reason, as there is no commandment for them to keep any day as a holy day. We know of no place in the Scriptures where it is stated that the Seventh Day was changed to the First Day. We understand that the Sabbath Day arrangement is still binding upon the Jews, as that Law, which was given to the Israelites, has never been annulled. The Apostle points out that there are two houses of Israel. One is a house of "servants" and the other is a house of "sons" (Heb. iii, 5, 6). The servants (the Jews) were placed under the Law and commanded to do this and that; among other things to keep the Sabbath Day holy. Not so with the sons; they are not ordered about like servants. We are not under the Law, the Apostle explains, but under Grace. The children of the Lord are not ordered to keep any day holy. They delight to keep every day holy unto the Lord, not in the sense of being idle, but in living holy, consecrated lives unto the Lord. We should have no quarrel with any as to the observance of one day above another. If any esteem one day more than another, well and good, it is between him and the Lord; we are not to judge in the matter.—See Colossians ii, 16, 17.

Q.—The Lord Jesus said (Matthew xxiii, 8), "Be not ye called Rabbi (Deutor or Master) for one is your Master, even Christ, and all ye are brethren." Are we to understand from these words that the Lord never authorized the formation of a Clergy? (D. D.)

Answer.—From these words of the Master it should be apparent at once to every free and non-prejudiced mind, that a clergy class was never authorized by the Lord Jesus. No body of men has ever had any right or authority to lord it over God's heritage. The Master Himself never attempted to dominate His followers and He never authorized any one to do so. He called His followers "brethren" and "the brethren" in the

to humble himself the most and render the most service. The Lord Jesus, in harmony with His teachings, set the example of humility and service by washing the feet of His disciples! (John xiii, 13-15.) The Apostles also, although endowed with special authority to preach the Gospel of the Kingdom, never arrogated to themselves titles and emoluments of position or office; but, on the contrary, went about as plain Peter, Paul, and James, laboring with their own hands to provide for their own necessities, and to assist others. They did not go about fleecing the Lord's sheep and expecting to be fed also; but they went about feeding the sheep, and, in many instances, providing for them. (Acts xv, 33-35.) How different the time-serving, hireling ministry of the present, the members of which are continually pleading for money, and expecting to be well-clothed and well-fed by their confiding flocks!

Q.—In Luke ii, 10, the angels declared in announcing the message of the birth of the Savior—"Behold we bring you good tidings of GREAT JOY which shall be unto ALL PEOPLE." If the majority of the race are going into eternal torment in fire and brimstone, how could this proclamation be said to be "good tidings of great joy to ALL people?" (Interested.)

Answer.—It would be sad tidings of great misery to the majority of the race and rather poor tidings to the remainder of mankind if the mistaken view were correct. Also the angels were a trifle too optimistic and greatly over-estimated the measure of joy contained in their message, if the larger portion of mankind is going to be everlastingly made miserable. If only the few saints are to be saved and all the remainder of the race are to be eternally made wretched, then how those good angels must have blushed when they delivered their message to the shepherds on the plains of Judea! However, it happens that the Scriptures do not teach a final torment for any of God's creatures, not even for Satan himself, for we read that he is to be destroyed. (Hebrews i, 11.) The angelic proclamation is to be fulfilled when all have heard the glad tidings of salvation through Christ, for the Apostle says, "God will have all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth." (I Timothy ii, 3, 4.) Continuing, he explains how all will be saved when they shall come to the knowledge of the truth—"For there is one God, and one Mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus, who gave Himself a ransom for all, to be testified in due time." (I Timothy ii, 5-6.) Therefore all are to receive knowledge of the truth—the Christ in this present dispensation of the world in the coming Christ and His Church will save the world as Kings unto God.—See Revelation iii, 21; xx, 6.

Tillage and Care of Fig Orchards

By W. A. DAUGHERTY

Twenty years with Agricultural Department—now Located at Cotulla, Texas

Tillage of soils began by pulling up virgin growth to make room for seed. The next step was the removal of weeds to give chosen plants more room. Today we think of it as a custom, but the art is primitive with many, and only since yesterday have scientific principles begun to be understood. Pioneers have always been adventurers; after them have come stockmen, then grain farmers, and lastly truckers and horticulturists with intensive work. Stockmen farm on horseback, and ridicule scientific work: men who study soils, drainage, plant food, tree selection and fruit markets are very different individuals. Fifty years ago those who practiced scientific horticulture were confined to the "gentlemen" class, to whom farming was a diversion. Nor has it been long since "Daniel Webster" added materially to the art by inventing an improved plow.

Tillage of fig orchards differs from ordinary cultural methods only in detail. There is a widespread impression that fig trees do not need cultivation; that cuttings can be put in the ground and left to grow a couple of years, until the owner returns for a harvest. "They produce abundant crops without any care or attention," wrote an official in a recent bulletin. That so many entertain this belief illustrates the lack of knowledge of the subject. As a matter of fact, nothing could be farther from the facts. True, here and there one may now and then find a soil that will grow and produce from very little attention, but such soils are away

three or four years. At first the lumps are so large there is no capillarity; air circulates in the interstices freely, promoting excessive airiness, while the clods are impenetrable to roots in search of food. If new soil is plowed deep, as I contend all new soils should be, and fined thoroughly with a disc or harrow, or both, one after the other—even with this cultivation many young trees and plants of all kinds planted therein are very likely to die out very rapidly, for as a rule do the best one can in new ground.

The coarse lumps giving inadequate humus to roots, and the complete loss of an enormous setting of fig cuttings last year, were due to just this condition, for the harrow pulverized only the visible surface. These conditions do not often take place in this section. There is too much sand in the soil to produce clods even in wet weather; and if our soil is plowed good and deep to begin with, and then properly harrowed, we will have very little trouble. But fig cuttings should be set out in prepared nursery grounds and transplanted with some of the soil on their roots, and with sufficient moisture one can confidently expect good results from figs in Southwest Texas.

We presume that La Salle county will go for Colquitt and Wolters in next Saturday's primaries but the candidates of the liquor interests will not get a solid vote by any means. The figure we cut in a state election don't amount to a very big drop anyway.

Will H. Mayes, candidate for Lieutenant Governor opposes making a vigorous campaign and spending thousands of dollars to be landed in the place that is regarded as a position of honor. He says that to engage in such a scramble is entirely at variance with his idea of statesmanship. We believe Mr. Mayes is correct. There is very little salary attached to the Lieutenant Governor's office, and is simply one of honor.

The Lorimer fight in the Senate is ended and Lorimer has been cast out of that body by a vote of almost two to one. To be exact—55 to 28. For many years Lorimer has been without honor in his home and was evidently out for the spoils, and the result of this long trial is a fitting end for such a man. That he was elected by fraud there appeared to be conclusive evidence, and notwithstanding his masterful plea of three days duration, the senators registered a verdict of guilty. Bailey, the junior Texas Senator, voted for Lorimer in both trials, but nobody expected Bailey to vote any other way.

Next Saturday the Democrats will hold primaries over the State of Texas, to select nominees for the November election. In Texas a nomination is equivalent to an election consequently the big fight is pulled off in July instead of November. There is a great struggle on for the Governorship, between Colquitt and Ramsey. Every part of the state has been invaded by orators from both camps, and the finish is expected to be close. The race for senatorship is three cornered, but from the looks of things Randell will be in about the position Davidson was left in the last primaries. The liquor interests have lined up solid to put Wolters over, and the prohibitionists are backing Sheppard.

The Texas Welfare Commission will consider the subject of compensation to employees for casualties occurring in course of employment and Tom Finty, Jr., of Dallas, is chairman of the committee having the subject under consideration.
