

It di not pay to feed such high price corn to fatten cattle, and so the state of the sta stock men sold their cattle and the were killed and eaten and no other were bred to take their places. "If every farmer in Kansas and Missouri would do that the cattle shortage would soon be over and so would the excessive price of meat The trouble with the average West ern farmer is that he imagines he can't touch the cattle business unless he has a big herd of twenty-five to one hundred cattle. And so he has none at all. But there is good money in two or three steers on a small farm.

"But the farmers will not do that. They are too short sighted. We shall not see cheap beef for some years to come, and it is higher in price now than ever before in the history of this country. And now is the time for a man to go into the business. Pure bred cattle are lower in price now than they will be again in many years. The high prices did not affect the high bred cattle like it did the common stock. But we are beginning to feel it now The prices are beginning to go and within a year a high bre will br' a third

"That is why I advise the you man or the small farmer to make beginning in that business nov. There is going to be big money in it. It used to be that a stock man took three or four years to mature his cattle before he sent them to

PROTECTING GARDEN CROPS

FROM EARLY FALL FROSTS In locating a garden if it is desired to afford the various crops protection from early fall frosts as much as possible, slopes facing the south or west are preferable to northern or eastern slopes. Slopes facing the south receive the sun's rays more directly and for a longer time than those facing to the north. while western slopes receive the sun's rays in the afternoon for a longer time than do those facing to the east. Moist garden soils are pre-ferable to dry, if the location in each instance is the same, as the evaporation of moisture from the

on dry, cold nights always ha a tendency to raise the dew poin of the air, thus lessening the dan ger from frosts. It is also well to avoid placing the tenderest plants or the low ground; this permits then to lose their own heat from rapid radiation and also to catch the cold er currents flowing down from the

The only practical means of protecting large areas against frost in through retarding radiation by obscuring the sky. Those who are en gaged in gardening or orcharding of a large scale find this plan very effectual, but the small gardener sel dom resorts to it. Fires of damp leaves or any other material for fue that will make a great deal o smoke with very little fire, are en ployed in the large orchard or gar den districts when there is dange of a severe frost or freeze. ## SOAFINE HALF MILLION SEE NAVAL PROCESSION

6000 Marines and Sailors March While Crowds Cheer Them on Their Way.

Great Squadron, Illuminated for First Time, Lighting Up Seven and a Half Miles of Waterfront

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.-"The Conquest of New York" is complete. It was a foregone conclusion from the moment that Rear Admiral Os-terhaus sailed into the Hudson with his vanguard of eight battleships and anchored off the city. But the climax came yesterday, when 6000 blue jackets and marines, the flower of the naval fighting force of the Urited States, "took possession" of Manhattan Island, and its inhabi tants, to a man, woman and child, capitulated willingly to the gallant

Promptly at noon with one ac cord the cutters bearing the picked men from each of the big ships put off from the sides of the vessel and sped toward the float at the foot of Ninety-sixth street, beneath the admiring gaze of the thousands who had congregated on the heights of Riverside Drive to watch the de-barkation. Each ship contributed a company of marines to the column and a battalion of four companies of sailors. Every battalion was headed by its band. The entire force was under the command of Lieutenant Commander George L. Smith, beneath the flag of Rear-Admiral Fletcher of the flagship

Once ashore the naval hosts warmed up the slope to the thor swarmed up the stope to the thor-bughfare level and the marching or-ler was quickly established, the bands crashing forth strains of mar-ial music, while the companies de-ployed into their places. The ma-rines led the parade, and their lines extended down Broadway from Nine-






