The verdict we believe, pleased nine-tenths of the people of the state, and he has been almost overwhelmed with telegrams of congratulations. In some instances nearly entire towns signed messages, a sample of which read like this: "We rejoice at your acquaittal and endorse your manly defense, of your home, womanhood and girl children, and Texas justice and Southern chivalary still lives in the hearts of honest jurors."

The trial lasted nineteen days and the attorneys took over one hundred bills of exceptions. The jury was only a few minutes declaring him not guilty. Old man Boyce was shot to death in the Motropolitan hotel at Ft Worth last January by Sneed who contended that he planned with his son in wrecking his, Sneed's
