Why not a swarm, for a lome? The effect on the bee industry will be to drive the bee keepers out to the alfalfa districts. The losses from spraying were so general this year in all the fruit sections of Colorado that bee keeping was a loss to those engaged in it.

The flight of bees is variously es-tmated at from 10 to 60 miles an hour. The latter speed was given after having turned bees free from running train, but Cheshire very poperly says that this furnishes no evidence of their velocity when the real decines the train corries the three or four miles away from the orchards during bloom, if alfalfa is orchards during bloom, if alfalfa is not grown for a cover crop in the orchards, in which case the later sprays will poison the bloom be-neath the trees. This can be reme-died by cutting the alfalfa or clover before blooming. 

THOROUGHLY PRACTICAL Geese should be purchased and mated before New Year's, so that they may be thoroughly accustomed to their new quarters and acquainted with one another well in advance of the breeding season. AMENDMENTS TO PERMI IRRIGATION DISTRICT

Austin, Texas. - Representa ve A. D. Rogers of Wise Coun is championing an amendme of the State Constitution th would permit the organization irrigation districts and for t levy and collection of a tax for the construction of reservoin dams and channels. He says is a meritorious proposition that ought to be supported by ever Texan He is not afraid to hav its provisions considered and ha given it to the press with the view of inviting discussion from newspapers and individuals, and in order that those disposed to criticise may have ample opportunity to do so.

The suggested amendment follows:

Section 1. That section 8 of the constitution of the state of Texas be amended by aiding thereto section 20, to read as follows:

Section 20. In addition to the powers of taxation granted in the foregoing sections, it shall be lawful for the Legislature of the State of Texas to authorize the land owner of any county or political subdivision thereof, or any group of one or more adjoining counties or group of adjoining political subdivisions of one or more of such counties, to organize irrigation districts in said counties, groups of adjoining counties and groups of adjoining political subdivisions thereo without regtrd to county lines. In making provision for the

cost of construction of irrigation works within said territory, it shall be lawful to levy taxes and create an indebtedness to rest as a charge on and be secured by a lien on the irrigable land for the use and benefit of which said irrigation works have been or may be constructed.
