## YOUNG MAN MEETS HORRIBLE DEATH.

W. B. McKinley Victim of Accident Last Saturday Evening—Accidentally Shot and Bleeds to Death.

## CLOTHING TOOK FIRE.

H. B. McKinley, a young man about eighteen years of age, living on what is known as the Werner place five miles down the river, met a horrible death last Saturday evening by accidentally shooting himself with a ten gauge shot gun, and after he had bled until he fell his clothing took fire and badly burned the body.

About five o'clock in the evening young McKinley took a shot gun and went down to the lake to try and kill some ducks. That was the last time he was seen alive. About nine o'clock his brother-in-law, W. P. Collis, with whom he was living, became uneasy and went across the slough to the Walker farm, where a party was organized to search for the boy whom they thought had become lost. In following a wire fence, the direction he was seen to go, about half a mile from the house they found his gun, one barrel discharged, the end lying on the bottom wire. Blood stains were found and the trail was taken, which led directly toward the house. After following it about

His left arm was blown nearly off by the discharge of the gun, and his clothes had taken fire and all of the right side and shoulder was badly charred. The clothing was burned from the body except in places where they were blood soaked.

From statements made by parties who went over the ground it was evident that the unfortunate young man was crawling through the wire fence when the gun discharged. Leaving the gun he started for the house, bleeding fearfully. After going about four hundred yards he fell from weakness, and there was evidence that he crawled through the weeds for several yards after he had become so weak that he could not stand on his feet. Whether his clothing had begun to burn to any extent before he lost consciousness is not known, but those who viewed the body before it was moved are of the opinion that the flames did their work after he was dead.

Justice Stedham went down and viewed the body and returned a verdict that death was due to the accidental discharge of gun.

The body was brought in Sunday evening and laid to rest in the Cotulla cemetery.

Deceased was an orphan and is survived by a young sister, and a married sister with whom he is living. This family moved here a few weeks ago from San Antonio.

## CAMPAIGN FOR CLEANER TOWN.

City Authorities and Civic League to Co-Operate and Work to Begin in Earnest Monday Morning.

## CONDITIONS UNSANITARY.

At a joint meeting of the City Council and the ladies of the Civic League yesterday, it was decided to at once enter into a campaign of town cleaning. The appearance of a case of meningitis in the town prompted this action. The case appeared in the Negro colony and was the little daughter of the colored school teacher. The child died Tuesday evening.

Not only is the cleanup campaign to be carried on for the prevention of the spread of this disease, but the step is necessary to prevent unnecessary sickness of the populace during the warm weather months. Physicians who made statements at the meeting declared this the dirtiest town South of San Antonio and with our great climate if proper sanitary conditions were maintained there would be but little use for the service of doctors.

Fly breeding time is here and by thoroughly cleaning the premises and removing the breeding places, millions of the first crop of flies will be destroyed. Flies are the greatest purveyors of disease.

The proper precautions at this time will result in billions less to "swat" later on.

Stringent orders have been issued by the Mayor and City Health Officer, with the assurance that the order will be enforced, and every citizen is urged to co-operate for a cleaner town.

The appearance of the meningitis case has caused no undue alarm. No quarantines have been put into effect; there is a full attendance at the schools and so far as we know nobody has left town. But precautions are being taken. From the number of atomizers and amount of throat wash sold at the drug-stores, every man, woman and child in the town is following the instructions given out by the City Physician.

The city will furnish a car of lime to be used in the Mexican part of town where the poorer people live and are unable to buy it. This idea was carried out once before by the county and was found to be of great value. When this class of people find they are going to be furnished with the lime they take extra precautions in cleaning up so as to have their premises ready for the lime.

## FREEZE CHECKS LETTUCE MOVEMENT.

Some Damage Done to Crop in Nueces Valley—Temperature Down to 30 and Plenty of Ice.

## UNUSUAL FOR MARCH.

The freeze last Saturday night did considerable damage to the lettuce crop in the Nueces valley consequently shipments have been much lighter this week than they would have been. The outside leaves were badly "bit-ten," and it is necessary to let the plants clean up a little before they are put on the market.

However there has not been a standstill by any means. Three cases were sent out by fast express during the week, two to New York and one to St. Louis. These cars were loaded by A. A. Simpson, C. B. Curwell and the Holland-Texas Farm. Several cars were also sent out by freight and an average of about 300 hampers are sent out every night by local express.

Up to last night 28 solid cars of lettuce had been shipped, ten cars of mixed stuff, but principally lettuce, and three cars of cabbage. Fifteen or twenty cars of lettuce would have moved this week had it not been for the freeze, but the movement is expected to be heavy the next ten days.

Prices are ranging from 75c to 80c. In the Cotulla district there are about 135 acres in lettuce this season, and the yield runs more than a car to the acre. However, it is a hard matter to get out a crop clean, as part of it will go to seed or burst open in spite of all that can be done, but some growers have gathered over 800 hampers to the acre.

The crop is being handled through the Association and representatives at St. Louis and Chicago have notified the San Antonio office that the lettuce from this point is the finest that has been put on those markets this season.

## Auction Sale of Altito Lands.

An auction sale of the Altito pasture lands was held at one of the wells on the property last Wednesday. This land was originally sold with the intention of having a drawing, but federal laws prevented this part of the program being carried out and the owners have been trying to induce the buyers to select their tracts, and we understand all but about 285 have done so. These tracts were auctioned off Wednesday. Some of the purchasers were in a bad state of mind and contended that the company should pull off the drawing as they advertised to do or refund their money. Nearly the entire day was spent in wrangling over the matter, before the auction started.

## MANY STATES STORM SWEEPED.

Terrific Gale Sweeps Central West and Mississippi Valley, Leaving Death in its Wake.

## EAST AND WEST SEVERED

New York, March 21—The East and the West were severed today as effectually as if a Chinese wall had sprung up over night in the Ohio and Mississippi valleys. Wind, rain, sleet and hail storms, which raged last night and continued this morning caused the worst wire blockade the telegraph and telephone companies have known in years.

Scores of lives are believed to have been lost. Property losses will reach hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Millett, Texas, March 18—The farmers experienced quite a setback by the recent freeze. Many watermelons and potatoes as well as some early cotton were bitten down to the ground. Some think there is some hope for the potatoes but cotton and melons will all have to be replanted.

**MADE AT HOME  
SHOW A SUCCESS**

**ATTENDANCE AT EXPOSITION  
OVER 22,000—EXHIBITORS  
WELL PLEASED.**

Two doorkeepers were required last Saturday night to take up tickets at the Made-in-San Antonio exposition. It was the largest crowd that has yet visited the show and apparently, the happiest and most interested. A conservative estimate of the number of persons who passed in the doors between 6 and 11 o'clock Saturday night was 5000.

M. B. Pletz, general manager, in speaking of the exposition last night, said: "I have managed several similar shows and some of them were bigger, but I have never seen such general co-operation from everybody. We are already making plans for a bigger exposition next year; the people of San Antonio realize now what can be done in this line and before many years have passed we will have an exposition that will draw visitors from all parts of the state."

He stated further the exhibitors had already received orders for goods as a direct result of the show; that more than seventy manufacturers had asked for booth reservations next year, and that the show would have more attractive features and special programmes.

The school children and newboys were admitted free yesterday afternoon and they were not slow to take advantage of the program that had been prepared for them. "They came in droves," as Mr. Pletz expressed it, "and took everything that was offered them that looked like it was good to eat."

The number of tickets taken at the door during the week was between 22,000 and 25,000.

**TRADE EXCURSION  
ON UVALDE AND GULF**

**MERCHANTS ALONG ROUTE NOTIFIED TO BE PREPARED TO GREET EVANGELISTS.**

Seventy-five business and professional men of San Antonio have already made reservations for the trade excursion on Tuesday, March 25, over the San Antonio, Uvalde & Gulf Railroad, by the Jobbers' and Manufacturers' League of the Chamber of Commerce. It is expected that there will be at least one hundred and fifty in the party, and every berth in the six standard Pullman sleepers, which will make up the special train, will be occupied, and some of them will carry double.

The merchants in the towns along the railroad between San Antonio and Uvalde are advised by letter yesterday of the coming of the trade excursionists, and were urged to meet the train on its arrival at their stations. The league does not expect the merchants to furnish any entertainment, and will devote every minute of every stop made to becoming better acquainted with the local business men.

The letter was sent to the merchants by D. J. Straus, president of the league, and H. A. Hirschberg, secretary, and is as follows:

**Letter to Merchants.**

"As you have perhaps heard the Jobbers' and Manufacturers' League of the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce expects to visit your city some time on Tuesday, March 25. The San Antonio, Uvalde & Gulf Railroad has provided us with a special train, and there will be from 100 to 150 business and professional men in the party. We shall carry our own band and refreshments with us.

"Needless to say we are looking forward to our visit with much pleasure. Our schedule is not yet entirely complete, so that we cannot tell you as to just what time we shall be in your city, but we shall try to advise you of this a day or two in advance of our coming.

"We don't want you to go to any trouble to prepare for our entertainment; we want to give every minute of the time we shall be with you to meeting you personally. So, if you will just arrange to be at the station when our train pulls in, that's all we want.

"We shall also let you know the names of the members of the party in a few days."

The special train will leave at 8 a. m., and all stops will be made on the going trip. The special will arrive at Uvalde at 6 o'clock and will leave for San Antonio at 10 o'clock, arriving here at 7 o'clock the next morning. The members of the party are assured of a night's rest and will be kept away from their business only for one day.

The committee which is in charge of booking reservations for the party is composed of R. T. Pruitt, chairman; T. M. Dechman, Albert Steves, Jr., George W. Allensworth, Leon Goodman and Ray M. Mackey.

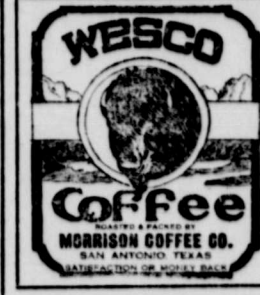

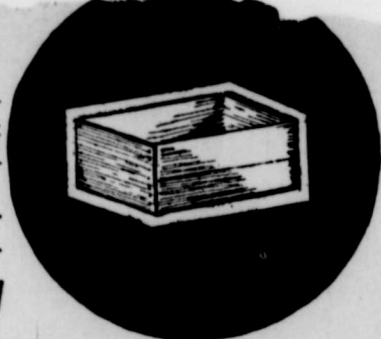

**No Drinks During Wilson's Regime and There Is Sadness.**  
 Washington, March 18.—There are to be no drinks at the White House. No announcement since the news of the passage of the Webb bill to prohibit the shipping of whiskey to dry states has cast such a gloom over the saloon district of Washington.

**BOARD DECIDES AGAINST OTHERS AS SCHOOLMA'AMS**  
 Woman Who Asked a Year's Leave to Become a Mother Denied Vacation—Only Five Members, One Spinster, Favored Grant.  
 NEW YORK, March 18.—The colleges of maternity cannot be allowed by a New York public school board, the board of education decided tonight in denying the application of Mrs. Katherine C. Edgell for a year's leave of absence to her child.  
 The case which has been pending several weeks, enlisted the sympathy of only five members of the board when it came to a final test. Of these two were women—one a mother, one a spinster.  
 Thirty-two members declared themselves by their votes unable to help this married woman high school teacher solve the problem of making the duties of a school mistress not entirely incompatible with those of a housewife and mother. By a vote of twenty-eight to nine, the board decided not even to allow the question to be debated.  
 A suspension of the by-laws was necessary to have granted Mrs. Edgell's application.  
 For purposes of study or for restoration of health, a teacher may appeal for absence without pay. Bearing children is a topic not mentioned in the by-laws, declared those who did not recognize the force of Mrs. Edgell's appeal.  
 The high school committee considered the teacher's request last week and adopted a resolution favoring it.  
 Any woman looking for a light job should apply at the gas works.

 Kohlman said he was about to take a trip through the troubled regions in Mexico and he wanted a will that was indestructible and one that would survive robbers or fire. His property is valued at \$50,000.  
 Still inflamed from the tattooer's needle Kohlman today exhibited his will to a few friends. There are but fourteen words in the "document," but lawyers say it is perfectly legal. It reads: "All my claims south of Red Hill, San Bernardino County, to J. H. Cart—H. Kohlman."  
**MAY DELAY U. S. PHTHISIS TESTS**  
 Washington, March 13.—Government tests of Doctor Friedmann's tuberculosis vaccine may be delayed indefinitely by the refusal of the Berlin physician to impart to the public health service the method of making vaccine from his cultures, or the size of the dose. It developed tonight that Doctor Friedmann has notified Surgeon General Blue he will not divulge his secret until the government physicians have recognized improvements in patients treated by him.

## NEED OF A CANNERY.

The low price of vegetables of nearly all kinds this winter demonstrates the great need of a cannery at Cotulla. Our experience is that there is always an uncertainty about the market of perishable products, and when the market is bad we should be in a position to handle the stuff we raise to some advantage to our pocketbook. Last year, for instance, take cabbage. The price was way up and the fellow with a few acres realized considerable money. What happened to the fellow who went long on cabbage this year? It has hardly been bringing freight charges, and many acres will be left in the field. Last year vegetables of all kinds brought good prices, but opposite conditions prevail this season, and what can the poor farmer do with the tons of stuff he has produced? He even hasn't enough hogs to eat all of it, consequently a great percentage is an entire loss. What we need is a cannery to take care of the vegetable crop when the market conditions won't justify shipment. With a good cannery of sufficient capacity there need be no bad years for the farmer in the Nueces valley. We can raise the stuff every year. There are no failures in production. Our failures come on the marketing end.

It appears to us that the local organization of truck growers would take steps toward building a cannery and thereby making themselves safe on all crops they raise. While lettuce has brought a good price this year, nothing else in the vegetable line has, and tons of products are now going to waste in the fields. It is time for action. It is time for closer co-operation. The golden dollars, that are rightfully ours, are slipping through our fingers, and this leak should be stopped.

Let's get ready for the next season, and then if the market won't justify the shipment of our products we'll "can it."

## ALAMO HEROES' MONUMENT.

The great movement for the erection of a monument to the memory of the heroes who gave up their lives in the defense of the Alamo while fighting for the liberty of Texas, is now well under way, and every bank in the State is lending its assistance by taking for sale tickets issued by the Alamo Heroes Monument Association. Every Texan will have the opportunity of contributing to this fund, and through this plan it is expected to raise funds sufficient to erect this wonderful structure. At Cotulla these tickets are on sale at both the National and State banks.

The citizens of San Antonio, where the monument is to be erected, are contributing liberally to this cause, and it is probable that no less than one million tickets will be sold in that city, but this is a ~~small~~ <sup>large</sup> amount which eventually will become the property of the State of Texas, and it is deemed fitting that every Texan shall have a part in its erection and thereby feel a personal ownership in it, so tickets have been distributed throughout the State and every Texan will have an opportunity to purchase them.

This monument will be 802 feet high, the highest in the world, and will cost two million dollars. It will be 85 feet square at the base, and the first four stories, rising to a height of about 75 feet, will contain a museum, art gallery, an auditorium that will seat several thousand persons, rooms for each of the different patriotic societies, including the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, the Daughters of the Confederacy, the United Confederate Veterans, the Grand Army of the Republic, the Spanish War Veterans, and the Society of Native Texans. Above these hall will be located a room for each county in the State in which may be maintained permanent historical and art exhibits. Means of ascent will be provided by four large elevators. At different heights large galleries will be erected, capable of holding about fifteen hundred persons, from which the country may be seen for many miles in every direction. The dome will be offered to the United States Government in which to maintain an observatory.

The lobby will be a world wonder and unique in its construction, being 50 feet high. Its center forms a well hole eight feet in diameter, rising to a height of 700 feet, where the Texas Lone Star will be set in the ceiling, brilliantly illuminated.

Admission to the lobby of the monument always will be free, but to ascend to the upper portions of the shaft and to visit the museums, art gallery, etc., \$1.00 will be charged, except to holders of the tickets now being sold at 50 cents each for the construction fund. These tickets will not only entitle the holders to visit every part of the monument, but also carry the privileges to each holder of inscribing his or her name, residence and birthplace in a roll of honor to be preserved in the Alamo monument museum.

Any person may obtain from his bank as many

of these tickets as desired at 50 cents each, and know when purchasing them that not only will the money be expended in a noble, patriotic cause, but will eventually be the means of enlightenment to the people of this State and the whole civilized world in the history of our State.

The New York World charges the American Ambassador to Mexico, Henry Lane Wilson, with taking part in Mexican politics to the detriment of the Maderos and to the advantage of Diaz and Huerta, and has named twelve separate and specific charges against him. To one who has been half way keeping up with the Mexican situation it was evident that Wilson, for some reason, was leaning to the side of the usurpers. His great hurry to notify the United States Government that the killing of Madero and Suarez, was, as given out by the Mexican officials, caused Americans generally to lose confidence in their representative. We hope the World will accomplish what it has started out to do—get Henry Lane's scalp.

Colonel Sterritt and Jeff Cox, of the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, are working hard in the Senate to defeat the House irrigation bill, saying that it would mean a waterless Texas, and without water fish do not thrive to any extent. We hardly think that the results from the bill would mean what the two gentlemen would lead us to believe, and if it should be of the opinion that the conservation of the great floods that are annually wasted in the gulf would be of more benefit than the fish and oyster industry. Hundreds of thousands of acres of land could be reclaimed and made to produce a livelihood for thousands of families.

Southwest Texas raises an abundance of feed, and to get the most good out of it we should have silos in which to store it. Farmers in every part of the State are beginning to realize the great value of the silo, and from statistics recently compiled Texas now has 214, and the majority was erected during the past six months. Four manufacturing plants have been established in the State recently. Statistics show that beef can be produced cheaper on rations of ensilage than any other method, and if some of our stockmen would adopt this system in preference to running their steers on 20c per acre land they would realize more profit.

Texas has her onion kings, cattle kings, cotton kings, and now comes La Salle County with a Lettuce King. A. A. Simpson of Cotulla has the record of producing a greater acreage of lettuce this year than any individual in Texas. On his farm two miles from town he has 25 acres in lettuce that he is now putting on the market, and receiving good prices for the product. W. J. Coleman is probably the veteran grower of lettuce in the Cotulla district, and has a "patch" that covers 17 acres this spring. The yield is from 600 to 1,000 hampers per acre, and the price that the growers have been receiving runs from 50 cents to \$1.50 per hamper.

Newspapers are giving wide publicity to the announcement that the San Antonio, ~~United States~~ <sup>United States</sup> ~~Gar~~ <sup>Gar</sup> railroad proposed to plant trees along its right of way. Even papers outside the State have commented on the novel scheme, and if carried out promises to be a great advertisement for Southwest Texas. The territory through which this road passes is covered principally with cacti and mesquite, and the planting of pecans, fig date palms and oranges would be a great hit for a scenery standpoint, besides pointing out to the traveler and the homeseeker the value of the soil in producing nut and fruit bearing trees.

A bill to supplement the Webb liquor bill in the National House, known as the Humphrey and Fuller bill, has been reported favorably by the House Committee of the Texas Legislature. The bill forfeits the charter of any common carrier transporting interstate shipments of liquor into Texas local option territory and provides felony punishments for all employees participating in such shipment. If this bill carries employees will take the pains to make careful investigation of all shipments of a suspicious character.

San Antonio is making great preparations for the Fiesta of San Jacinto, the city's annual celebration of Texas Independence. Railroads have announced exceedingly low rates, and old San Tone can be counted on for her usual hospitality and consideration and comfort and welfare for all who come within her gates.

A steer, Texas raised, was on exhibit at the Fort Worth stock show. He weighed 3,030 pounds, and is said to be the largest in the world. Have all the States been heard from, or do we go unchallenged?

Fowlerton is installing a waterworks system, and has voted bonds for the erection of a commodious school building. The new city on the east side of the county is always doing something.

Southwest Texas did not wait for St. Patrick's Day to begin the wearing of the green.

Growers are having good weather for lettuce shipping.

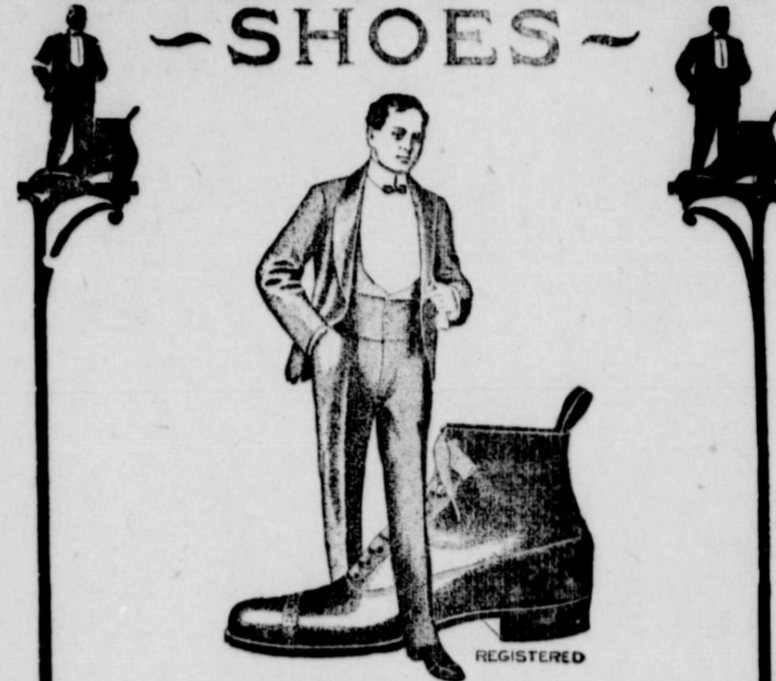

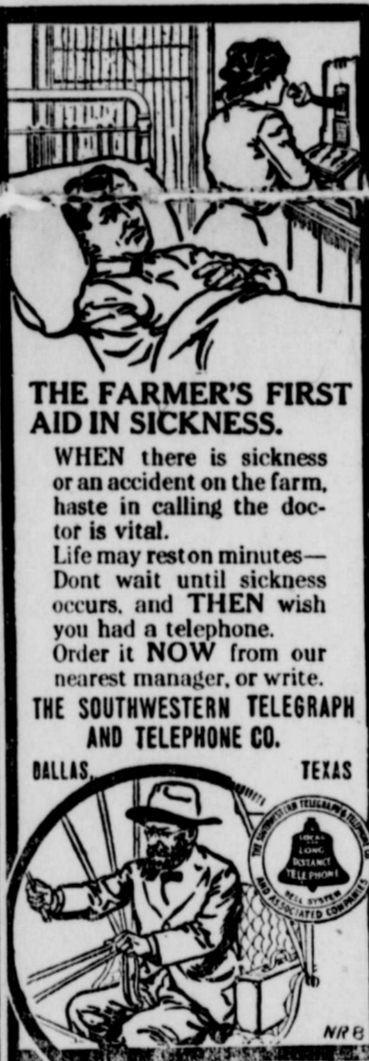

**MASSACRE AT SCUTARI IS NOW PREDICTED**

British Paper Calls on Powers to Prevent Such Slaughter by the Montenegrins.

London, March 18 (Tuesday), 4:30 a. m.—That the entire population of the Turkish fortress of Scutari will be slaughtered when that city falls is predicted by a traveller who writes to the Manchester Guardian and who the newspaper says, has had every opportunity to know the temper of the Montenegrin and Serbian besiegers. It appeals to British Foreign Secretary Grey and to the European powers to take steps to prevent such a massacre.

The writer says that Serbian officers at the port of Durazzo boasted to him that they had exterminated the Moslem Albanian tribe of Lyuma. He continues:

"Later a Montenegrin officer assured me very earnestly: 'We have exterminated the Rugeva tribe. When we had overpowered them we made them all pass under the sword. I assure you that not one of the tribe remains.' The Montenegrin's reason was that the tribesmen were animals—savage beasts."

The leading Belgrade newspaper is quoted by the writer as recommending that no quarter be given to the civilian inhabitants of Scutari and that the town be levelled to the ground.

In the discussion in the house of commons on the address in reply to the speech from the throne Premier Asquith said:

"An agreement on one or two points only, and these not vital ones, is required to secure the complete accord of the powers on the question of the boundaries of Albania."

The premier confirmed the report that Turkey has agreed to mediation by the powers, and they are now waiting to hear whether the allies will accept it.

Mr. Asquith reiterated that a settlement has been reached on the questions of Serbia's economic access to the Adriatic shore and of an autonomous Albania under European guarantee.

**\$50,000 GIFT FOR TEST**

Ex-Senator Lorimer, Believing in Chicago's Claim, Establishes a Laboratory.

**CHICAGO, March 18.**—Belief that Dr. Peter R. Duket, a Chicago physician, has produced a serum which will cure tuberculosis resulted today in the application at Springfield for a charter to establish the Lorimer Foundation St. Rita's Laboratory for Tuberculosis.

Ex-Senator Lorimer has given \$50,000 to start the laboratory and has arranged that his sons shall carry it on after his death. It will be established in connection with the Bennett Medical College of Loyola University. Its doors will be open to the world.

While the first tests at the new laboratory will be by Dr. Duket, other doctors will not be barred from taking advantage of the facilities offered. Dr. P. F. Friedmann probably will be invited to come.

Speaking of his experiments, Dr. Duket says:

"My attention was drawn to the treatment of tuberculosis by some experiments conducted along that line by Dr. Osler of Johns Hopkins University and Dr. Koch, the celebrated German physician, and I began at once to devote all my spare time to research work and experiments. After thirteen years' work succeeded in producing a lymph with which I was willing to begin treatments.

"This treatment has been tried in altitudes varying from sea level to more than 6000 feet above sea level. Having concluded my experiments in extremely high altitudes in the summer of 1912 and being convinced of the merit of my discovery, I administered it under all sorts of climatic conditions. I came to Chicago believing it offered me the largest possible field for usefulness."

**KAISER CELEBRATES NAPOLEON'S DOWNFALL**

Also the Centenary of the Founding of the Iron Cross, the Badge of Great Courage.

BERLIN, March 18.—Emperor William and the Prussian people started today the celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the rising against the Emperor Napoleon which culminated in the battle of Leipzig, Oct. 16 to 19, 1813, when the combined Prussian, Russian, Austrian and Swedish armies overwhelmed Napoleon's troops and opened the way for the liberation of Germany from Napoleonic control and for the downfall of Napoleon.

Today is also the centenary of the establishment of the Iron Cross, a decoration given to German soldiers for the display of great courage on the field of battle.

In spite of a drizzling rain enormous crowds gathered to cheer the Emperor on his way to place wreaths on a number of Berlin statues, including those of King William and Queen Louise.

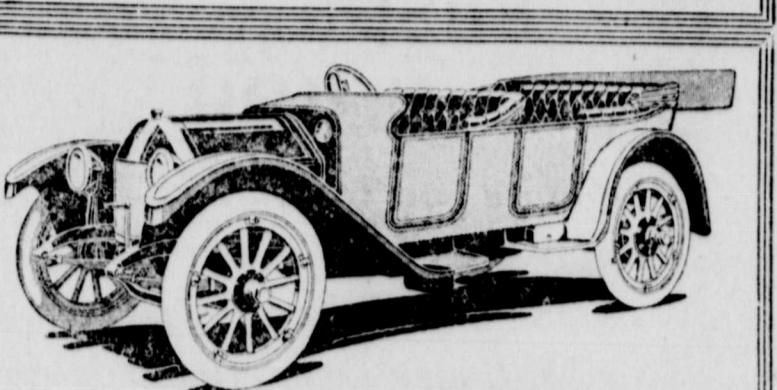
