Even if the potatoes do not make over 150 bushels to the acre which is a conservative estimate, this will mean about $\$ 80,000$ distributed to the growers around Hattiesburg; and it is estimated that the growers
of sugar cane can realize about $\$ 100$ per acre for their crop of syrup. The Hattiesburg factory will employ 250 hands during the present year, and of
these 225 will be women." hese 225 will be women."
