it and the land couldn't be had. He pointed out the difference in conditions today. At the conconclusion of his remarks Mr
Russell introduced Judge Noah Allen.
Judge Allen reviewed the plans and work of the company and expressed his absolute confidence
in carrying the work to comple in carrying the work to comple
tion. Mr. Street, a developer of the lower Rio Grande next took the floor. Mr. Street told how six years ago he went into the

GOOD ROAD PROGRESS
The campaign for good roads is in its infanc in the United States, if we can believe the Goo
Roads Year Book for 1913. Indeed, what ha been accomplished indicates that we have hat nothing more sericus than a skirmish and that cording to the estimate of the yistance. A otal mileage on public roads on December 3 1911, was $2,222,248$ and that the total mileage 0 mproved reads on that date was 224,485, whi cent. This is a net increase of 1.44 per cent compared with the figures for the pervious year
Texas leads all the states in road mileage. th cotal being 128,981, but it is far in the rear in proved read mileage, the total 4836 miles. meage of improved roads, Indianna continues which represents 367 per cent of all the roads he state. Ohio runs Indianna a close race w only 27.13 of Ohio's total road mileage. Geos has made a big jump with 22,043 miles of impro miles of good roads, or 10.1 per cent of the tots mileage. Wisconsin has 10,167 miles of improv ed highways, which is 16.64 per cent of tha
State's mileage. In tates mileage.
In perceftage
In perceftage of improved roads Massachusett:
leads all the states with 568 . The total mileage in that state, however, is only 17,272 The percentage of improved roads in Rhode Island is 50.7 , but the total mileage is only $2,120.75$. Rhode Island is the smallest state, and therefore
has the smallest mileage of roads. Texas, the largest state, has the largest mileage, amounting cent of the rads, are improved. Texas however is tuilding rcads rapidly and the improved mileage constantly is growing.

California has 8588 miles of good roads, about 18 per cent of the tofal mileage. Illinois has about 9000 miles of gocd roads, which represent only abcut 10 per cent of the total. California is adding progress.
The North is far al ead of the South both i mileage of good roads and percentage of increase Somecounties are exceptionally progressive and are making gocd hea'way. Hundrods oi counties awakening in the South until some plan is evolved that will convince all the peuple of the importance of gocd roads and their influence upon general
