During the past decade we have shown a deerease of 4 1-2 interat hive viaie. we mive had much agitation and considerable legislation seeking to illiterate and the younger generation is apparently better educated and both causes may have contributed towards our registering a better average.
in Ia Salle County according in La Salle County according to a per cent of our males of voting age are unable to write. The per cent in 1900 was 40.4. The percentage of illiterates among the native white-voters of this county is 21.9 , foreign born whit 65.8 and negro-per cent.

Out of $1,003,357$ males of vo ing age in Texas 109,528 or 11 per cent are illiterate. In 1900
we had in the entire State 737 we had in the entire State
768 voters and $151-2$ per cent were illiterate.

Thes figures show that in 1910 we ha 459 illiterate voters in the count which is approximately 75 pe fourths of the men who go to the ballot box cannot read and write Of course practically all of thes are Mexicans, and we dare sa the same condition exists in ad joining counties where the Mex ican population predominates These figures show the grea need of a pure ballo
