Houston, Tex., Sept. 9 .- "The reaon so many penitentiary systems of outhern States are not self-sustainsouthern States are not self-sustaining is not because the practice of whipping prisoners has been abolished, but that the penitentiary systems are often permeated with graft and corruption." Such was the statement of Dan L. Lehon, general manager of the Southern division of the Paurus Detective Agency as the Bian Burns Detective Agency, at the Rice Hotel Wednesday night.

"The Burns Detective Agency is making a thorough investigation of the penitentiary systems of Mississippl. We have made startling reveations.

"I am absolutely opposed to the practice of whipping prisoners. It is a mistaken idea that the use of e 'bat' is an effective method of controlling them, as has been so well roven in the Northern penitentiaries. If prisoners can not be properly controlled without the use of the whip, it but proves the incompetency of the prison management. it has been proven in all of the upto-date and successfully managed penitentiaries that prisoners can be best controlled when treated like hu-man beings, which they are. 





A new machine gun has just been invented and is to be used by Uncle Sam's army. It is said by army experts to be the most destructive war machine yet invented, and is just the kind of a gun that would serve us best should we go to war with Mexico. The gun weighs only thirty pounds therefore could be easily carried over a rough country. It shoots 30 times svery 2 1-2 seconds and has a range of three miles. The gun is best operated by three men, although one man can operate it. 


