A silo on a small scale for the purpose of feeding milk cows, a few hogs etc., can be put in at a very small expense as demonstrated by C. B. Burwell on his farm just below town. Mr. Burwell made an excavation in the ground 12x16 feet, plastered the walls and bricked the neck the same as an underground cistern, and filled it with ensilage.

The total cost of making this silo and the harvest of his crop was only \$75 00 Thirty-five tons of ensilage was stored

Within the next year these small silos will be found on every farm and the tons of feed stuff that is annually wasted will be saved by "canning it."







A manure mulch is to be preferred to litter because it fertilizes. As far as possible I like to wrap all the perennials up to their ears in good strawy stable manure. Their tops may be nipped, but their roots will be alive and active whenever the soil around them is not frozen and in the spring sprouts will be dead top.

Where winters are not very severe I have piled manure over the canna beds and saved them perfectly. The peonies, lilies and all hardy plants should be given a good cover, not forgetting the rhubarb which should have the most of all. A bushel to the hill is not excessive for this plant, and the warmth of its civer will bring it up earlier in the spring while the fertility will produce big pink sprouts that will produce a No. 1 pie material.



Laredo, Tex., Nov. 17.—Considerable interest was manifested here in able interest was manifested here in the special report made by the grand jury of the Federal Court for the Southern District of Texas, which ad-journed last night. The report calls attention to the fact that investiga-tion has shown that there are a number of spies of the Mexican Governthis city who are watching all military an dother movements, shadowing individuals and making reports to their Mexican officers in Nuevo Laredo. These men practically admitted they were employed as secret agents when they were summoned before the Federal grand jury as witnesses in the case against seven Constitutional sympathizers previously arrested, charged with vio-lations of the neutrality laws. It is alleged one or two Americans are among the spies

The report requested that the Department of Justice be urged to take particular of Justice be urged to take some action toward deporting these undesirable citizens at the earliest possible moment. The matter has been put up to the Department of Justice in strong terms. It is known that at least fifteen spies of the Mex-

ican government are now making their headquarters in Laredo.

A report reached here today that the Federal military train en route to Lampazos from Nuevo Laredo was attacked by Constitutionalists near Rodriguez late yesterday afternoon, and the train was compelled to return to La Jarita. The coaches of the military train were middled with bullets, but no casualties resulted. The Federals who left Nuevo Laredo for Piedras Negras several days ago proceeded only a short distance, when they were compelled to stop and are now encamped near Colum-


