Judge Vaughn Accepts City Judgeship

To Assume Post On January 1

Numerous items of business were on the agenda when the Muleshoe City Council met in regular session Tuesday morning in the council chamber at the city hall.

First item was to discuss with Judge Joe Vaughn a date for him to take over the position as City Corporation Judge. In a meeting last week, Judge Vaughn was approved as the new city judge. To clarify his position on accepting the job, Judge Vaughn told commissioners he had tentatively accepted the new position, with the approval of the county commissioners. He said he had not met with the Commissioners Court as yet, but planned to do so on Tuesday morning to formally resign one of the two positions he presently holds. He is Veterans Service Officer (by appointment) and Justice of the Peace (by election). The judge told councilmen he planned to resign from the former job, and felt that a month's notice would be sufficient for the Commissioners Court to find a new Veterans Service Officer for the county. The judge commented, "I do want the job, but will not walk out on another job without any notice."

Saturday, December 6, at 2:30 p.m. is the time for the big, annual Christmas parade. This year, Curtis Walker is parade marshal and will be assisted by R.A. Bradley.

The parade will move north from the Boy Scout grounds and go down Main Street to Highway 84. At highway 84, the parade will turn west for one block, and return down South First Street to the Muleshoe Nursing Home before returning to their point of origin at the Boy Scout grounds. Immediately following the parade, float winners will be named.

First place winner in the floats will be presented a cash prize of \$200; second place \$100 and third place winner will receive \$75. There is also a special \$75 for out-of-town floats. The out-of-town floats will also be eligible for the other cash prizes. No special division of classes will be made this year. A total of nine floats were entered in the parade as of Tuesday noon.

Also featured in the parade will be the Muleshoe High School and Muleshoe Junior High School Bands, a Boy Scout Color Guard, Miss Muleshoe and Little Miss Muleshoe; the three Muleshoe Ambassadors and the Farm Bureau Queen. Others are expected to join the parade before time for it to begin Saturday afternoon.

Last year, a jet-age Santa Claus rode down the street with the parade, visiting with children along the parade route as he cycled along on his speedy golf-cart. He was accompanied by an almost lifesize elfin, complete with green costume. The

Judge Vaughn Lists Slower November Load

Court cases in Justice of the Peace Joe Vaughn's office slowed somewhat during the Thanksgiving holidays, with the final 10 days of the month listing 24 cases handled in his office.

Speeding, which is the consistently higher violation, leads the list of cases, with fourteen persons being logged in the record book for that offense.

THROCKMORTON HORNS TO CLASH

Last year, in a determined march toward the Regional title in 1-B football, Lazbuddie's Longhorns marched through an unbeaten season all the way until they tangled with Throckmorton for the Regional title.

Last year, the fleet-footed Throckmorton Greyhounds outraced the smaller Longhorns to a 27-6 win in the bout which was played at Post. With an average of 40 pounds weight advantage over the smaller Longhorns, the Greyhounds raced to victory, holding the Longhorns scoreless until the final 33 seconds of the one-sided tilt.

Troy Steinbock made it over from the 10 to put the 'Horns single TD on the scoreboard. Two interceptions and two fumbles early in the game proved to be costly for the formerly powerful Longhorn team. The 20-0 score at halftime last year was the first time the 'Horns had trailed at halftime during the 1968 season.

Friday night, Dec. 5, the Longhorns will again meet the Greyhounds for the Regional title. The battle will be held in the football stadium at Crosbyton and game time is 7:30 p.m. Coach Pat Casey said, "We want to play them again. This

time, I hope we are ready." This year, going into the Regional contest, Lazbuddie has one loss on their record. Bovina downed the team, 32-26, in the third game of the year. Through regular season play, the 'Horns gave up only 55 total points and gathered 338 points. In the bi-district game the Longhorns added an additional 14 points for a total of 352 and held their opponents' total points at 55.

What's Happening? Youth Football!

What's happening in Muleshoe...? Youth football, of course. Or, it will be happening soon if the Muleshoe Jaycees have their way about it.

At their regular noon meeting Monday, the Jaycees voted to become the local sponsor of Youth Football, Inc. Dick Johnson is chairman of the group working to secure the franchise for Muleshoe. This would be for boys in the 10 to 12 age group.

Johnson said the operation would be sponsored and controlled by a board of trustees of five members of the Muleshoe Jaycees and five commissioners who would be chosen from the community at large. The board of commissioners would be responsible for the complete governing of youth

football and would answer only to the Jaycee board of trustees. This would be mostly for financial arrangements for the operation.

It was brought out in initial discussions that it would cost \$3,000 to finance youth football, with a spread of three years to finance the plan. Initially, the Jaycees will give \$100 and the board of commissioners of Youth Football, Inc. will accept donations from businessmen and individuals in the area to make up the balance of the needed funds.

Named to the Jaycee board of trustees for the program, are Ken Henry, Dick Johnson, Duane Seay, Curtis Walker and Bob Stovall. They will serve



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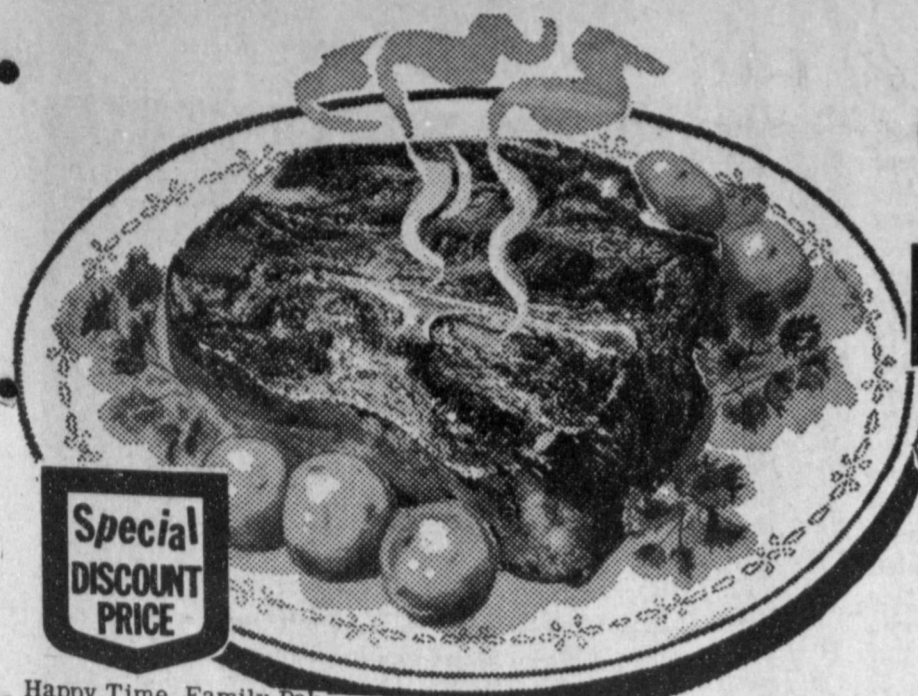

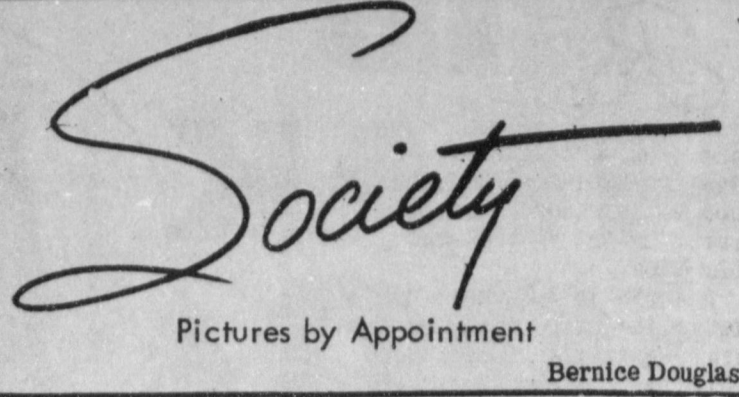

We will be looking for you to come Sunday morning and bring a friend with you.

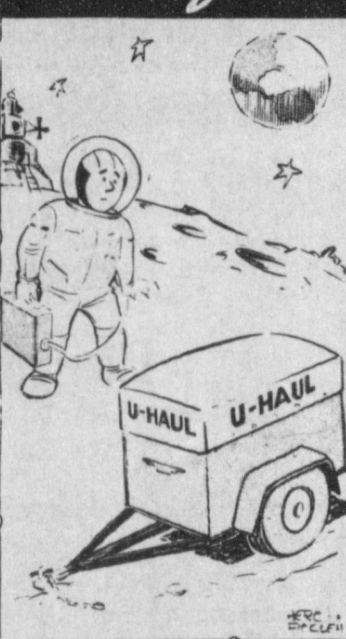

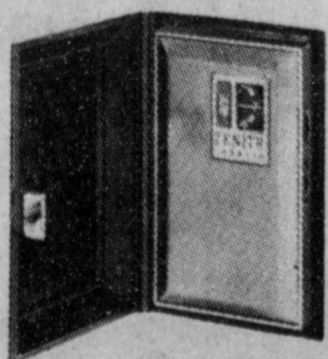
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Ronald Ashford Weds Miss Wallace

GSPA Begins Membership Drive Soon

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association launched its 1970 membership campaign this week. Statements for dues have been mailed to farmers throughout this grain sorghum producing area. A.W. Anthony, Jr., Friona farmer and GSPA President, pointed out that "GSPA dues are not to be mistaken with the collection of the five cents per ton assessments, at the elevators for the research and promotion work to be carried on by the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board."

GSPA has to be carried on with dues paid to the association. The dues for 1970 have been set at \$10 per member in the area of Texas that farmers are paying the five cents per ton to Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board. In areas outside the 29 county referendum area, dues will continue to be based upon two pounds per 1,000 pounds of production. The \$10 membership dues plus the assessments will average the same, for a million pound producer, as the regular two pounds per 1,000 pounds production.

"We feel the grain sorghum farmers must be represented when Congress, Farm Organizations, U.S. Department of Agriculture, and others are writing laws that affect our future. This is our purpose," Anthony added. Of immediate importance are issues such as: (1) Extension of feed grain program (GSPA is working for an extension with income improvements), (2) Limitation of payments (GSPA is opposing limitations at any level), (3) And any legislation or government policies effecting our pro-

ducers in labor problems, cost-price squeeze, export restrictions, etc.

Statements have been mailed along with the November issue of GSPA's newsletter. A return envelope is enclosed for use in mailing dues to GSPA Headquarters at 1212 14th Street, Lubbock, Texas.
