## Longhorns Receive Numerous Awards

Two honors were bestowed on Lazbuddie football personnel and another Longhorn received honorable mention in the Amarillo Daily News awards to Class B players and coaches.

The story from the December 16 issue of the Amarillo Daily News is as follows:

Derrell Matthews, Lazbuddie's powerful halfback, has been named by the Amarillo Daily News Class B Area Back of the Year narrowly edging out halfback John Reece of Lockett for the honor.

Matthews' fancy stepping sparked the Longhorns to their second straight District 2-E title and bi-district championship and only Throckmorton's regional victory tarnished a great season for the 170-pounder. Matthews played courageously against the Greyhounds continuously battling for extra yardage despite a painful ankle bruise.

In leading Lazbuddie to a 10-2 season, Matthews ground out 1,732 yards and scored 158 points. . . second in scoring only to Clarendon's Jim Moore in all area classes. Matthews also was a mainstay in the stubborn Longhorn defense. Perhaps the most versatile back in the area, Matthews threw a halfback pass for a touchdown and moved into the quarterback spot in the second half against Throckmorton.

Matthews participated in the longest play of that game. . . a 36-yard bomb from Monte Barnes in the second quarter at a point when Lazbuddie appeared to be taking control of the game.

Reece, who turned in the most spectacular single game performance of the season in the area, rushed for 1,814 yards on 244 carries for a 7.4 average. Reece was held to less than 100 yards in only one game. Against Chillicothe early in the season, Reece scored six touchdowns and four extra points while rushing for 350 yards on 33 carries.

Mark Britten, a Groom junior, claimed the Back of the Year accolades with an obvious assist from quarterback Danny Blackwell, an honorable mention back.

Blackwell hurled 11 TD passes and Britten hauled in nine. The scoring bombs covered 118 yards. Britten caught 14 of Blackwell's 16 season completions. His blocking and receiving earned him unanimous choice on the 1-E All-District team. Blackwell rushed for 1,028 yards on 120 carries, scored 15 TDs and nine PATs for 108 points.

Defensively, named were: Terry Scott, line and Mike Casey, secondary.

The nine outstanding players include one sophomore; three juniors and five seniors. Lazbuddie lost two games during the past year. The first was a 32-26 loss to Bovina in non-conference play and the second was a 20-8 loss to Throckmorton in regional play-offs.

## School Board Agenda Busy

Although school tax collections were 74.44 percent complete in December of 1968 and only 73.88 percent complete in December of this year, collections are \$11,683.06 ahead of the same time last year.

In 1968, a total of \$414,795.80 had been collected and this year, in December, \$426,478.86 had been collected.

As of December 15, discounts allowed were \$12,218.96; penalty and interest collected amounted to \$912.58 and delinquent taxes collected amounted to \$4,464.25.

With a 1969-70 budget of \$542,617, a total of \$122,980.27 remains to be collected by the end of the term.

Another report heard by the members of the Board of Trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District at their regular meeting Monday night was a report that football income had increased to \$514.30 more than was collected in 1968.

From \$6,443.05 income in 1968, the increase noted that the income was \$6,957.35 in 1969. The season began on September 12, and concluded on November 21. The income encompassed the eighth, ninth, Varsity B games and Varsity games played both on the home field and away from home.

**Classing Samples Continue Steady**

Cotton harvest operations resumed last Tuesday after the interruption by the adverse weather, according to W.K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the USDA.

Sample receipt declined daily at the four area USDA Classing Offices as harvesting came to a halt.

Volume classed was still high due to the accumulated backlog of cotton at the gins and area classing offices.

The USDA Cotton Classing Offices at Lubbock, Brownfield, Lamesa and Levelland classed approximately 246,000 samples during the week ending Friday, December 12th. This brought the total classed at the four offices this season to 911,000. The four offices had 24,000 unclassified samples on hand on Friday. This brought the total classed and received

by the four offices to 935,000. Estimates indicate that 79 to 75 per cent of this season's crop is now out of the fields.

Strict Low Middling Light Spotted was the predominant grade at Lubbock last week with 22 per cent of all cotton classed. Strict Low Middling made up 12 per cent, Low Middling Light Spotted 17 per cent and all Spots and Tinges 30 per cent. Thirty-three per cent was reduced in grade because of bark, and 7 per cent was below grade.

Staple length continued to average approximately 31/32. Sixty-one per cent stapled 31/32, and longer.

Forty-seven per cent of the cotton classed at Lubbock last week was in the desirable micronaire category of 3.5 to 4.9. This compares to 51 per cent for the previous week.

Sixty-three per cent of the cotton classed at Lubbock last week had Pressley readings of 80,000 pounds and higher, compared to 55 per cent the previous week. Pressley is an indication of fiber strength and the most desirable Pressley reading is 80,000 pounds and above.

Trading was brisk on the Lubbock market and prices were about the same on Strict Low Middling Light Spotted and better but were about \$1.50 per bale higher on Low Middling Light Spotted and the Spots and Tinges. Average prices ranged from \$10.00 per bale over the loan for White grades to \$25.00 per bale over the loan for Spots and Tinges. The lower grade, lower micronaire cotton was bringing the most over the loan. Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire range were: Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 29/32 - 18.00, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 15/16 - 18.55, Low Middling Spotted 29/32 - 16.55, Low Middling Spotted 15/16 - 16.95, Low Middling Tinged 29/32 - 14.95, and Low Middling Tinged 15/16 - 15.25.

Prices paid farmers for cottonseed were higher and ranged from \$40.00 to \$51.00 per ton. Average price last week was \$46.50 per ton, up \$2.50 from the previous week.

The treasures awaiting the group were games, food, music, and many other surprises.



After the party a number of gifts were taken to Muleshoe Nursing Home.

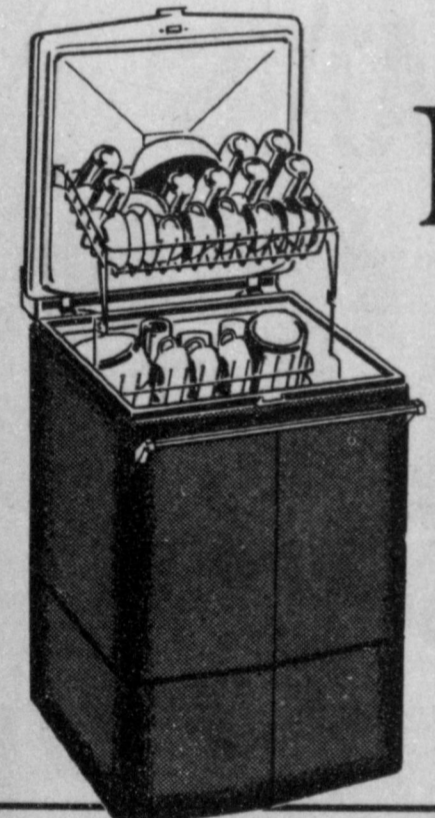

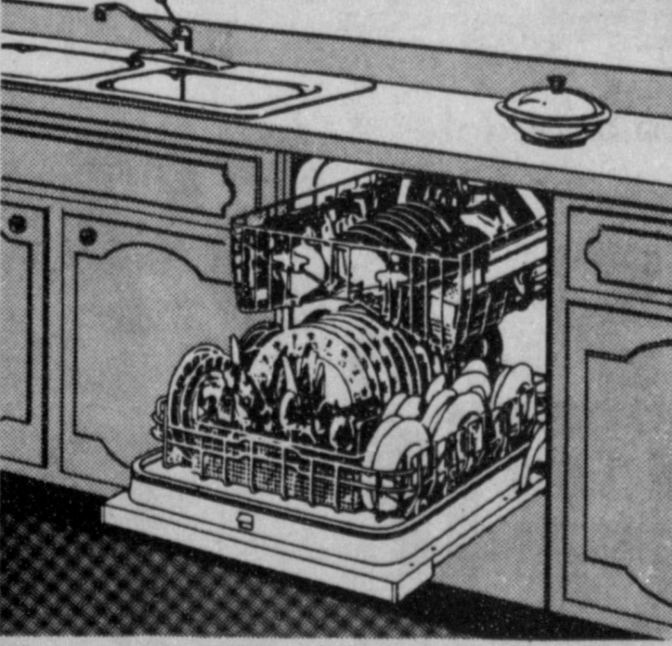

## Double Orange Meringue Pie

1 cup sugar  
6 tablespoons cornstarch  
1 3/4 cups water  
3 egg yolks, beaten  
1 can (4-5/8 oz.) Start Instant Breakfast Drink - Orange Flavor  
1/4 cup butter  
1 cooled baked 9-inch pie shell  
3 egg whites  
Dash of salt  
1/4 cup sugar

Combine 1 cup sugar and the cornstarch in a saucepan; mix thoroughly. Gradually stir in water. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture thickens and comes to a boil. Boil one minute. Stir a small amount of the hot mixture into the egg yolks, mixing well. Return to remaining hot mixture. Continue boiling 1 minute longer, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Reserve 2 tablespoons of the instant breakfast drink; blend remaining instant breakfast drink into hot mixture with the butter. Pour into pie shell.

Beat egg whites with salt until foamy throughout. Combine 1/4 cup sugar and reserved instant breakfast drink and add to egg whites, two tablespoons at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Continue beating until mixture will form stiff shiny peaks. Spoon over filling, carefully spreading to crust to seal. Bake at 425 degrees for about 5 minutes, or until delicately browned. Cool before cutting.

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Tex.--Even though the State of Texas has been given a year's reprieve by the federal government, and the new meat plant inspection law will not become effective here until December 15, 1970, State Department of Health inspectors are making visits to all plants which process meat and poultry.

Since October, they have contacted 2,200 plants, including locker plants. Report is that only 916 of those had ever seen a health inspector before.

Each plant operator is advised of the basic cleanliness standards which must be met before a meat plant even can be inspected. Rules range from "keeping all pets and loose livestock out of the plant" to "remove all insecticides, pesticides or rodenticides" from the areas in which food products are stored, processed or retained.

Next year, the processing plants will have to pass inspections or be closed. So far, no plant has been put out of business, but some have folded voluntarily when they saw the sanitary requirements they will have to meet.

So, if your favorite locker plant operator told you he couldn't process your deer this year because of the State Health Department, he was wrong. But he may be right in the future.

LOUISIANA--Texas Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has filed suit in federal court against the State of Louisiana in a boundary dispute.

Question is where the Texas-Louisiana border is physically located on Sabine Lake and River, as well as Sabine Pass, from the Gulf to 32nd degree North longitude.

Louisiana claims the whole Sabine--meaning all the oil royalties--while Texas claims the boundary is in the middle of the lake. Texas would gain perhaps \$2 million in royalties if it wins the suit.

COURTS SPEAK--A Bexar County teenager challenging Texas laws permitting longer sentences for juvenile offenders than for adult criminals on similar offenses lost his appeal to the State Supreme Court. Court emphasized the civil nature of juvenile proceedings

and that the aim is to train and rehabilitate rather than punish erring youngsters.

High court concluded that the Driscoll Foundation of Corpus Christi is not eligible for a tax reduction under a constitutional amendment permitting farm and ranch land on fringes of city to be taxed at agricultural value where farming is the owner's chief occupation.

Austin federal court has set the deadline for filing a brief in a case in which conservationists want to block construction of a golf course at Meridian Start Park. Their purpose: to preserve the habitat of birdlife (the golden-cheeked warbler).

Third Court of Civil Appeals in Austin reversed a Beaumont district court's ruling and reinstated the teaching permit of the Beaumont Barber College Branch in Beaumont. State Board of Barber Examiners had revoked the school's license since it didn't meet a law which requires 2,800 square feet of space and 20 of each kind of chair. Court said the law was not valid, and was "arbitrary, unnecessary and unreasonable and has no relation to the public health or welfare."

Bottle club operators have appealed to the Third Court of Civil Appeals seeking an injunction to prevent the Texas Liquor Control Board from enforcing its new rule allowing guests in private clubs only where they are accompanied by or introduced by the member.

Bell County district court enjoined Central Texas Airlines from operating without a Texas Aeronautics Commission certificate but will permit flights from Killen to Dallas until January 12 for benefit of Fort Hood GI's.

VOTERS--Nueces, Wichita and El Paso Counties presently have about the lowest voter registration figures among major Texas counties.

A survey on December 4 of voter registration for 1970, compared with 1968, showed that Harris County already has re-registered 400,000 of its 590,000--or 69 percent.

By contrast Nueces County had registered 10 per cent, El Paso 25 per cent and Wichita about 5 per cent.

State law permits county tax assessor-collectors to mail out postcards which the previous year's registrants can sign and mail back to re-register.

Most major counties are following this permissive procedure. As a result, the big city counties of Harris, Dallas, Tarrant and Bexar have high percentages of their voters ready to vote in 1970. But counties where local officials do not choose to do so have re-registered only a few. Registration deadline is January 31.

APPOINTMENTS -- Gov. Preston Smith has named three psychologists to the new Texas State Board of Examiners of Psychologists. They are Dr. Alvin John North of Dallas, Dr. John Ingraham Wheeler of Houston and Dr. Carl Finley Hereford of Austin.

Other recent appointments by Smith include: Attorney for 110th judicial district--George Wayne Miller of Floydada.

State Board of Veterinary Medical Examiners--Dr. Roy Albert Riddels of Sherman and Dr. Gordon Spillman Yeargan Jr. of Gainesville.

Law Study Committee Mental Health and Mental Retardation--Don Wooten of Snyder, Hale County Judge C.L. Abernethy and Mrs. Helen Jane Farabee of Wichita Falls.

State Board of Health named James L. Bearden of Andrews and Henry H. Sprouls of Tyler to State Sanitarian Advisory Committee.

Speaker Gus Mutscher appointed Reps. Bob Salter of Gatesville; Russell Cummings, Houston; James D. Cole, Greenville and Malouf Abraham, Canadian, to work with Rep. James W. Stroud of Dallas on a Texas Election Code study committee.

HOSPITAL FUNDS LET--State Board of Health allotted \$992,902 to Port Arthur for construction aid on new St. Mary Gates Memorial Hospital and \$227,125 in Hill-Burton federal assistance to the Central Plains General Hospital, Plainview.

State Commissioner of Health Dr. James E. Peavy says the 1970 state plan for construction and modernization of hospitals and related medical facilities is available for public review. Thirty-three applicants seek \$23.6 million in Hill-Burton funds for projects to cost \$66 million.

LOAN BONDS SOLD--Student loan bonds totaling \$15 million were sold at 6.2510 per cent interest to Harris Trust and Savings Bank and Associates of Chicago. Total interest on the bonds, over a 25-year period, will run to more than \$16.5 million.

Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, is mulling a proposal to require co-signers on student/loan applications to assure better pay-backs.

Board approved petition for junior college election in Wilbarger County (Vernon) but rejected similar appeals for junior college votes in Yoakum County (on Texas-New Mexico line) and Hardeman County (Quanah).

ON VETERANS BENEFITS President Nixon has signed a bill which will bring survivors' benefits for the widows of lower grade servicemen more in line with the rise in the cost of living. The new system will be a flat rate for each rank.

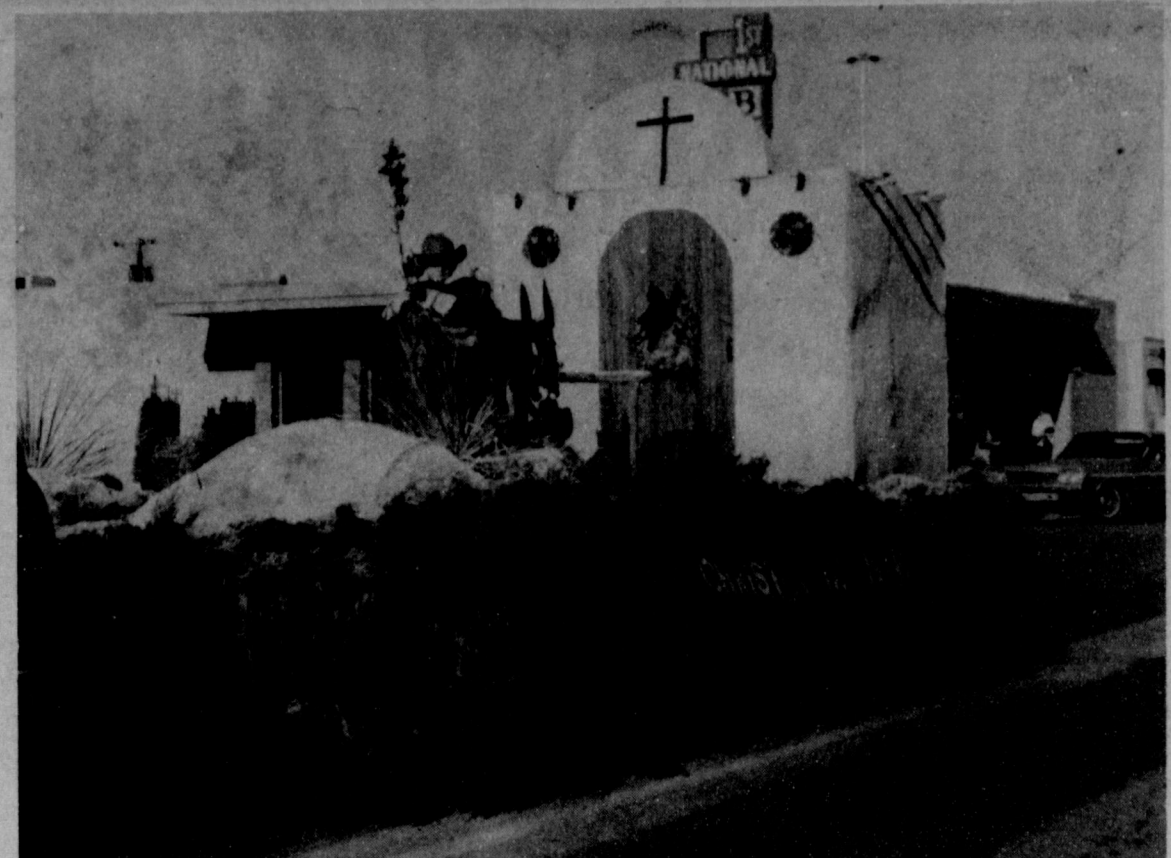
#### Cora Ann Weir

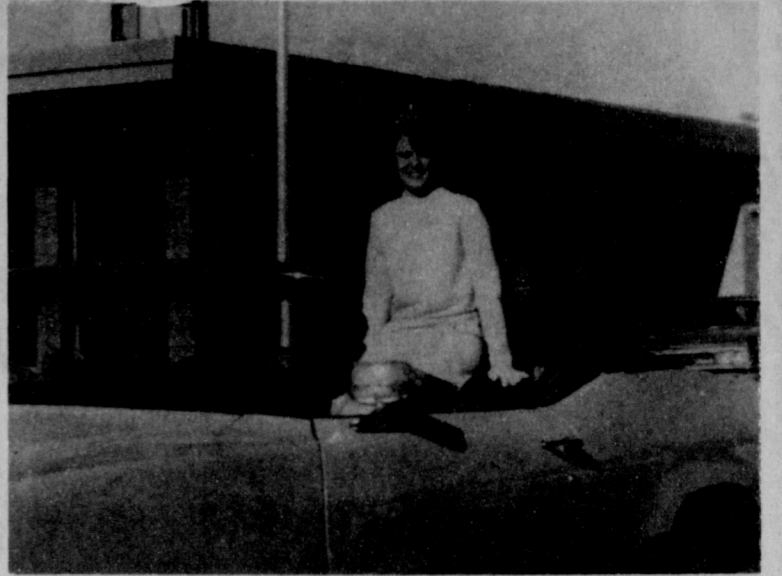

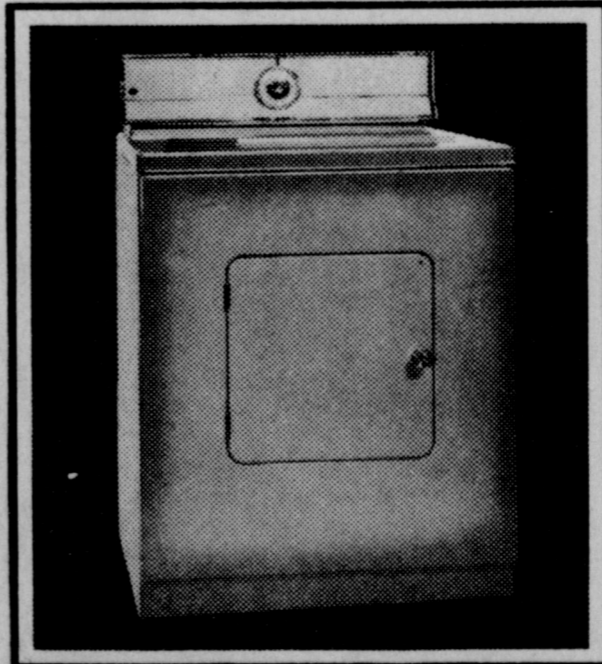

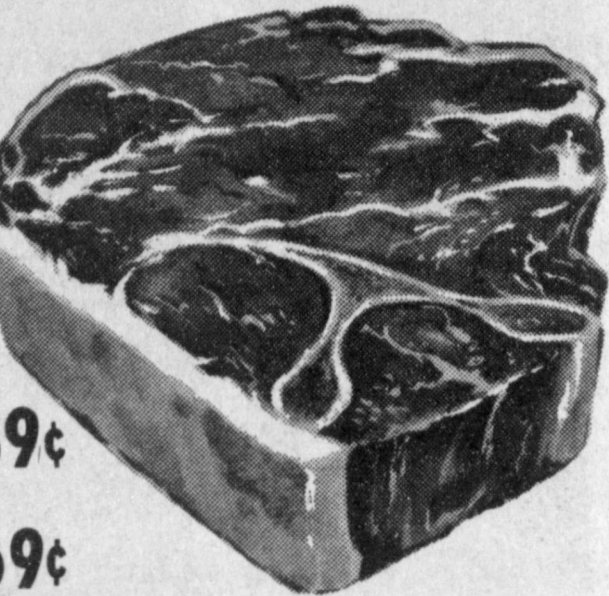
