### Cardiac Equipment in Use at Hospital

### 55 Families Aided By Contributions

#### B.H. Black First Patient on Machine

Recently, the Journals have been running a series of articles on a fund drive in Muleshoe to secure cardiac emergency equipment for West Plains Memorial Hospital.

Last Thursday, a demonstration of some of the badly-needed equipment was given local doctors, nurses and hospital personnel. At the time, it was noted that although a little more than \$950 had been contributed, that was slightly less than one-third the \$3,000 needed to secure the equipment.

The hospital was attempting to wait until all the needed funds were acquired before purchasing the heart monitor, pacemaker and defibrillator. This all changed in a hurry

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within a few short hours.

Around 8:30 a.m., Friday, B. H. (Burrel) Black, was taken to West Plains Memorial Hospital with a coronary thrombosis. Late Friday, the doctor in charge asked if perhaps the equipment could be acquired due to the nature of the heart attack. Phone calls were made to secure the equipment.

On arrival, the heart monitor was hooked up to Black and special nurses watch his heart actions and tone on a five inch television screen. A continuous pattern moves across the face of the TV and shows the nurses how his heart is reacting, the steadiness of the heartbeat and any irregularity would show up immediately on the screen.

Thus, B.H. Black is the first heart attack victim to benefit from the newly acquired equipment in the hospital. Doctors and hospital personnel feel that perhaps many lives may be saved in the future, not only heart attack or cardiac patients, but unsuspected heart problems that show up from time to time during surgery. The heart monitoring system will be used in surgery as a preventative measure.

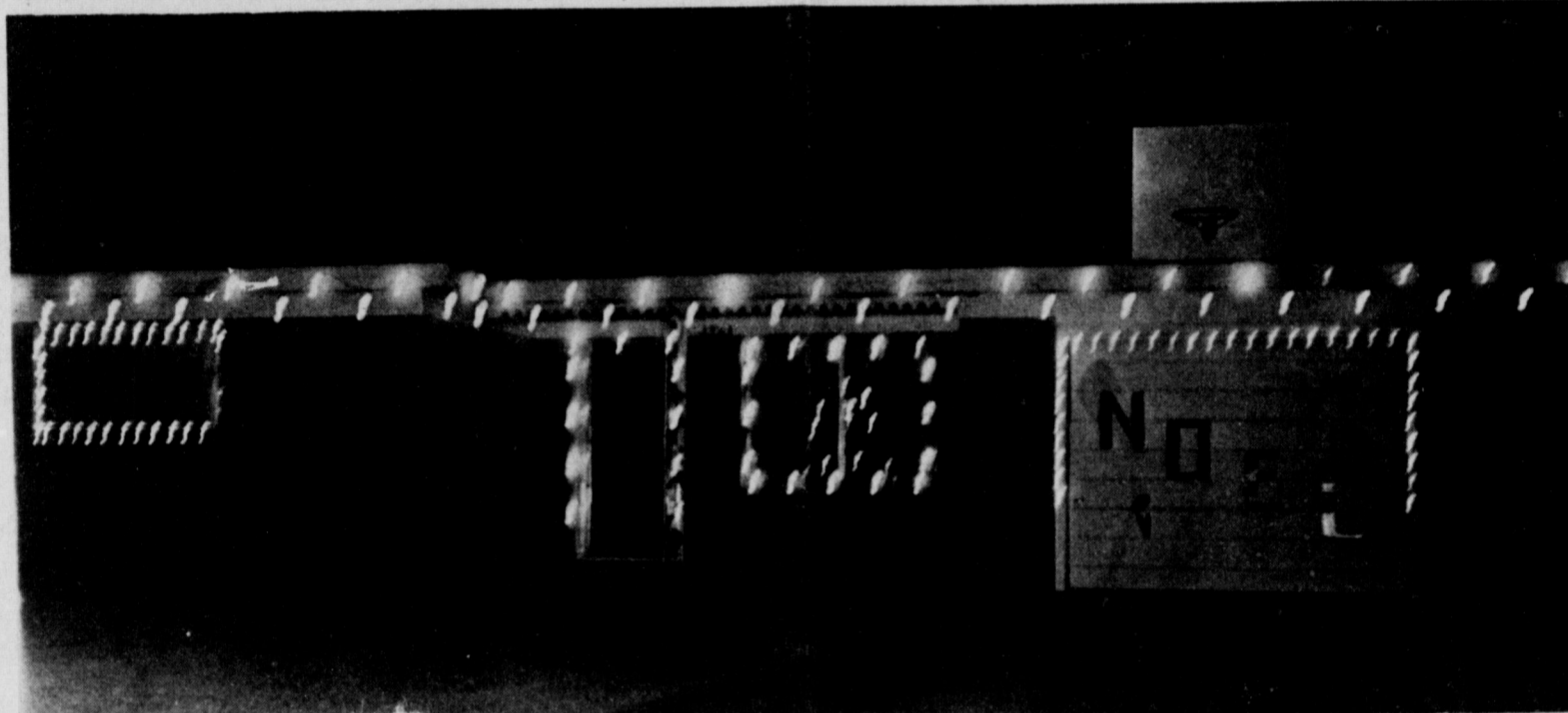
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#### VFW to Open Skating Rink Near Muleshoe

#### New Method Used For Car Licensing

AUSTIN--Texas drivers will find registering their motor vehicles for 1970 easier than ever before, thanks to a new registration system devised by the Texas Highway Department.

The Department expects more than seven million vehicles to be registered during the year and there will be several new wrinkles.

First, license plates will have a new color scheme -- light blue on a reflective white background.

Second, for the first time, motor vehicle registration renewal applications will be mailed to every vehicle owner in Texas during January. The registration period begins February 1.

The renewal application will arrive in the mail in a slender envelope marked, "Important -- This is Your License Plate Renewal Application."

The application itself has instructions printed on it. It is a three-part form which should not be torn apart.

When the registration period begins, the vehicle owner need only take the application and the fee -- to the county tax office. Or he can order his plates by mail.

With the application, he will no longer need to present his certificate of title or the last year's registration receipt.

If he decides to go to the county tax office or a substation, he will find shorter waiting lines. With the application, the clerk will need only

to receive the fee, affix to the application a sticker showing the registration number and other data and hand over the 1970 plates.

Some vehicle owners may find it even more convenient to go through the registration process by mail.

Although owners can register their vehicles in person until April 1, there is a March 1 cutoff date for mail registration. This allows 30 days for delivery before 1970 plates must be displayed on vehicles.

If the vehicle owner wants his plates mailed to him, he should send his registration application to his county tax collector, with the registration fee

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#### Local Business Name Holiday Closing Times

Almost all business will come to a halt next week for the Christmas holidays, with local business and professional people having from one to three days for the most part, to enjoy this special season.

Open will be the law enforcement agencies and the hospital, with perhaps just a few necessary businesses on Christmas Day.

Most grocery stores plan to close at 4 p.m. on Christmas Eve and remain closed on Christmas Day. Department stores plan to be closed on Christmas Day.

The Muleshoe City Hall and the Bailey County Courthouse both plan to close at 5 p.m. Tuesday until Monday morning.

Postmaster Spencer Beavers said the post office will be closed on Christmas Day with no rural, city or package delivery. First class box mail and newspapers will be handled, he added.

Muleshoe State Bank and the First National Bank will both be closed only on Christmas Day and the Texas Department of Public Safety Drivers' License Division will be closed Wednesday until Monday.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office and the Soil Conservation Service both report they will be closed only December 25 and most other government agencies will be closed only that day.

Corral will close at 6 p.m. Wednesday and re-open on Saturday at 6 a.m., El Nuevo Leal's will be closed Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday and

An elderly woman quietly wipes a tear threatening to slip down her withered cheek, a new sparkle can be seen in hunger-dulled eyes of children, an unsmiling face, worried and worn, breaks into a sudden, unexpected smile--these are all sights seen by representatives of the Goodfellows during the first days of the week.

The Goodfellow operation began 15 years ago in Muleshoe with five families who needed help in order to enjoy Christmas. This year, more than 55 families were delivered baskets and boxes of food, toys and clothing. An average of six persons per family benefited from the Goodfellow operation this year.

One of the anonymous, blindfolded Santa Claus' said, "We

received more cash donations this year than ever before and the best response when money was requested. Also, we received more cooperation from the four local schools than ever; this operation could not be carried out without the help of the local school students and personnel who work so hard to help make it successful."

He also commented that when the Goodfellows were boxing up the food, toys and clothing at the old city hall, people they had never seen before wandered in and wanted to help. "Why, two young boys even came in off the street and offered to help. The helped us for a couple of hours. A man who was waiting for his wife while she was shopping came by and helped for awhile, I just don't think I have ever seen anything like the help we got this year."

#### Corn Test Results Boost Irrigation

For the first time, results from an irrigation-fertilizer study on corn at the High Plains Research Foundation has placed a value on irrigation water in relation to the farmer's pocket book.

The study was conducted by Jim Valliant, Foundation soil scientist, in cooperation with Iowa State University and the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation.

In the study, five irrigation levels with five different levels of fertilizer applications were used on Pioneer 3306 hybrid corn planted April 17 single-rowed on 40-inch spacings with a plant population of 26,000 per acre.

"Two irrigation methods produced the best results," Valliant said. For identification, these methods are

labeled one and two. In Method one corn plots were irrigated at germination, tassel initiation (four to five weeks after germination) three weeks after initiation, tassel, silk, milk and soft dough stages for a total applied irrigation of 39.2 inches.

Method two had irrigations at germination, eight weeks after germination, silk and milk stages for a total irrigation application of 21.6 inches.

Corn under Method one in the five fertilizer levels showed an average yield of 148.2 bushels per acre with the highest yield of 155 bushels produced from the 150-100-0 fertilizer preplant application plus 100 pounds of nitrogen applied as sidress.

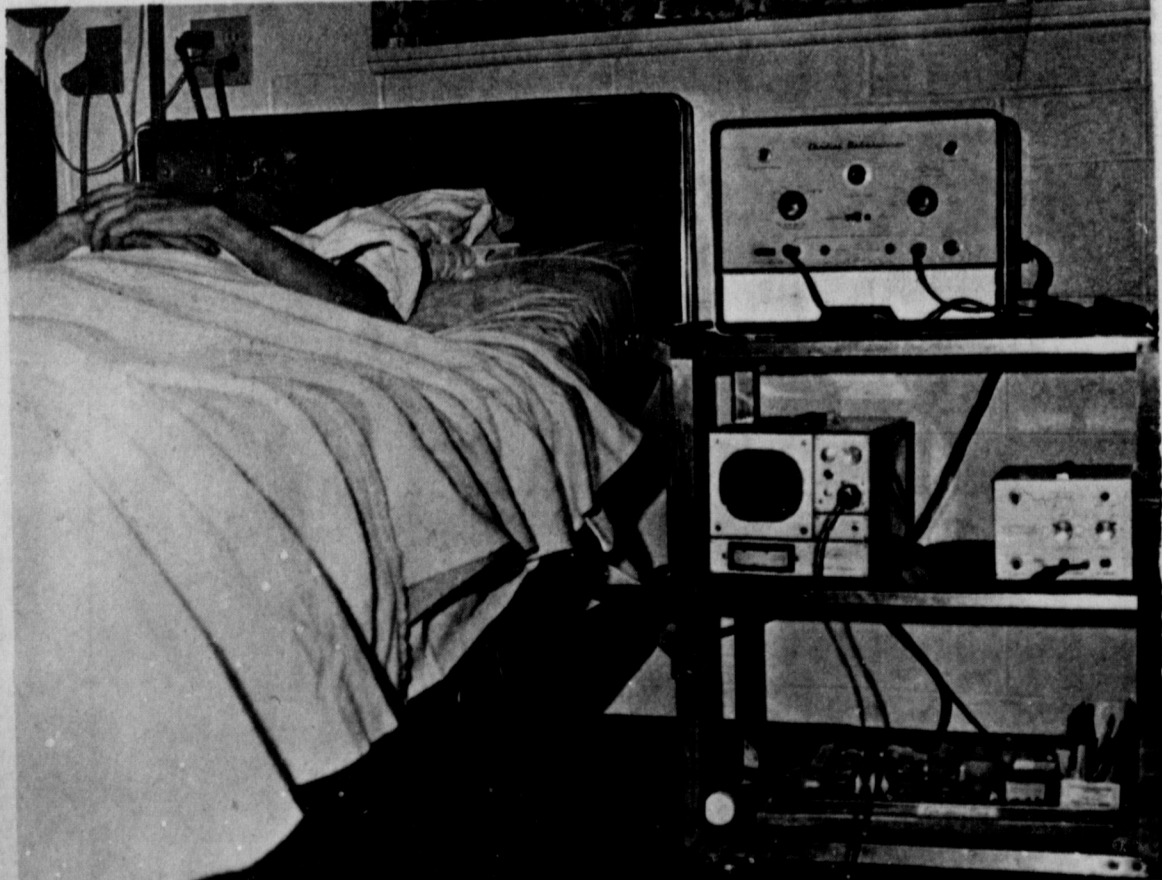
Under Method two, corn

yields on the five fertilizer plots averaged 132.8 bushels per acre with the highest yield of 148.4 bushels coming on the same fertilizer application as in Method one.

Valliant pointed out that the corn yield at the 250-100-0 fertilizer level in method one was 3.96 bushels per inch of irrigation water applied while Method two produced 6.87 bushels per acre inch of water.

By figuring the cost of pumping an acre inch of water at \$1.07 Method one had \$41.94 in irrigation pumping costs while Method two costs \$23.11. Valliant pointed out that this study shows the money-saving importance of correct timing of irrigation to High Plains area crops.

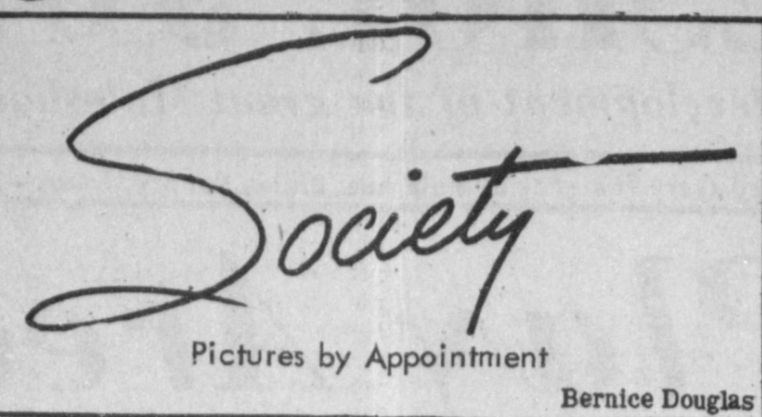

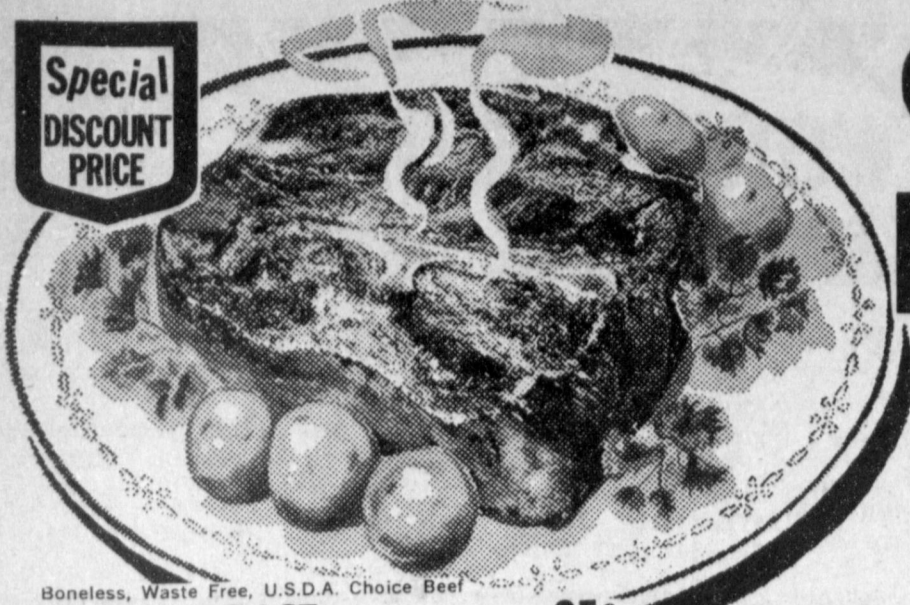

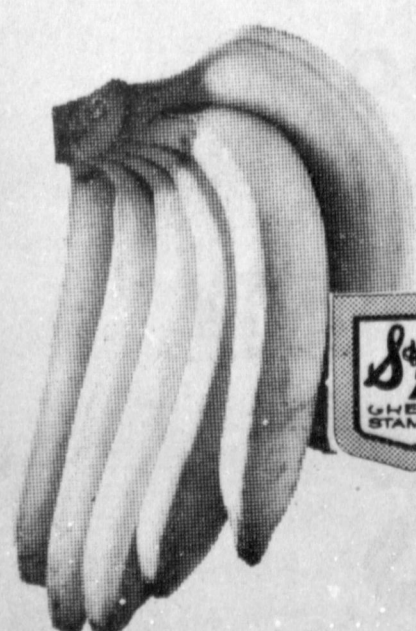
