

## WEST TEXAS WILL GO STRONG FOR HOBBY.

Dallas Texas, July 13. — Adrian Pool of El Paso, who was in Dallas Friday, declares reports are being circulated that Ferguson was very strong in West Texas are unjust to West Texas and not warranted by conditions in any considerable portion of West Texas. "It is true" he said "that Mr. Ferguson will receive some votes in counties in West Texas, except Hudspeth and Colberson. It is also true he said that he will receive a considerable vote in several West Texas counties. It is also true that he will probably carry Gillespie county, but any statement that he has strength in any number of West Texas counties is false.

You can draw a line from Denison to Laredo, through Dallas, Waco, Austin, Temple, San Antonio and designate Texas lying west of this line as West Texas. Governor Hobby will carry 90 per cent of the counties west of this line. He will probably carry more than 90 per cent, but it is safe to say Ferguson will not carry 10 per cent of these counties. For example there are 20 counties on the Texas and Pacific railway from El Paso to Dallas, including El Paso and Dallas counties. Governor Hobby will carry 19 of these counties. It is safe to say that he would carry all of them for the race in Taylor county is close and no man can tell who will carry a county when there is any thing like a close vote in the county, but in the other counties on this railroad the race is so one sided that any amateur can see that Hobby has an overwhelming majority.

"Also take the Southern Pacific counties from El Paso to San Antonio. There are 12 counties. It is safe estimate that Governor Hobby will carry 11 out of 12 of these counties. Take the Orient railway beginning at Alpine and running north through 13 Texas counties. No man who is familiar with the conditions in these counties could possibly claim that Governor Hobby would carry less than 12 out of the 13 counties.

"Take the Santa Fee railway beginning at Temple and running through Sweetwater to Amarillo, traversing 14 counties, no one familiar with the conditions will claim that Hobby will lose more than two out of the 14 counties and anyone familiar with these two counties will tell you that the

tace will be close either way. The other 12 counties are so overwhelmingly for Hobby that no one else is running.

"Take the Ft. Worth and Denver beginning from Dalhart to Ft. Worth, through 14 counties. Governor Hobby will carry every one of these counties and will carry them by such overwhelming majorities that you cannot say there is even a contest for the governorship in these counties.

Take the Wichita Valley from Wichita Falls to Ballenger. This traverses five counties but it does not traverse any counties where Hobby will lose many votes, except Taylor county.

These roads traverse the most thickly populated section of West Texas and what applies to them applies to all West Texas.

For example take the great Panhandle of Texas, which is now rather thickly populated. This whole area is as near solid for Governor Hobby as it is possible to have any section of the country in any kind of race. It is true that Governor Hobby will lose some votes in each of these counties, but the total will be so small that it will not be a matter of any importance. Governor Hobby will receive more votes at Wichita Falls than his opponent will receive in the whole Panhandle.

The good women of West Texas are largely responsible for the conditions existing through out West Texas. Governor Hobby during the last Legislature, stood for the things that the women of West Texas have always stood for. He fought for the things that they have been fighting for and they have been in this fight since the last called session of the legislature.

They have been working for Hobby, organizing for Hobby and talking for Hobby in every village in West Texas. They have made it so plain to a few politicians who are against Hobby that Governor Hobby represented the things they had been fighting for it drove these politicians out of the field, and now it is difficult to hear a voice against Governor Hobby anywhere in West Texas.

The women of West Texas have not only been talking for Hobby but they have been acting for him. They have practically all qualified to vote in the primary for the specific purpose of voting for Hobby for Governor. In every town in West Texas you find good women driving cars from early morning to late in the evening, gathering up every woman who was qualified and taking her to the registration booth for the purpose of qualifying to give Governor Hobby a vote.

There are at this time some 12

or 15 precincts in West Texas where Governor Hobby will not receive a majority of the votes, but there are not that many counties in the whole of West Texas where he will not receive a majority of the votes cast and in most cases he will receive from 80 to 90 per cent of the total vote cast for Governor.

## Adjutant General Answers Letter of Captain Fox.

Austin Texas,  
July 3, 1918.

Capt. J. M. Fox,  
Marfa Texas;  
Dear Sir:  
Replying to your letter of the 11th, relative to your resignation in which you assail the Governor as playing politics, I take the liberty of answering, knowing as you know, that the Governor has personally nothing to do with your resignation nor any politics being in it; The evidence disclosed, after thorough examination, as you know, that 15 Mexicans were held in the custody of your men after they had been arrested and all disarmed. This is verified by all proof even to admission by the parties and information gathered by this office and by agents of the United States Government; We are not interested in your political views when a question of the honor and decency of the State is involved. As this Department has announced heretofore, the troublemaker and lawless Ranger has no place on the border where international complications can be brought on that will involve our nation in the war in Europe; You know, that every man, whether he be white, black, yellow or brown, has the Constitutional right to a trial by jury, and that no organized band operating under the laws of this State has the right to constitute itself Judge, jury and executioner and shooting men on no provocation when they are helpless and disarmed; We are fighting a world war now to overthrow ruthless autocracy and therefore we do not propose to tolerate it at home; You were not forced to resign by the governor for political reasons, but your forced resignation came in the interest of humanity, decency, law and order, and I submit that now and hereafter the laws of the Constitution of this State must be superior to the autocratic will of any peace officer and vandalism across the border can best be suppressed by suppressing it on the Texas side first.

**Ferguson and the Zone Law.**

"They passed the zone law in an effort to deny the poor lonely soldier who is a thousand miles from home, thinking of an old father and mother back there, a chance to take a drink to relieve his loneliness."

This declaration was made by James E. Ferguson at Paris and reported by the Ft. Worth Star-Telegram. Not with standing that President Wilson believes that we should have a sober army, notwithstanding that the United States Congress believes that we should have a sober army, notwithstanding the military authorities know that we must have a sober army or be defeated by the Huns, Jim Ferguson questions the wisdom of this policy by his utterance.

When the zone law was proposed it will be remembered that the daily papers gave accounts of the prominent brewers and their associates rushing to the state capitol in an effort to stop it, but Governor Hobby heard only the call of duty to his country and turned a deaf ear to these men who would do much to defeat and demoralize our army before it ever reached the shores of foreign soil.

Look what our sober army is doing today! Consider the minimum amount of disease and sickness among our troops! Would this be the case if our soldiers were allowed booze?

No doubt the military authorities of England and France advised our leaders to cut the booze off from the army right from the beginning, because they have suffered greatly from it. With the booze goes wicked women, and it has been shown that when booze is eliminated the percentage of social diseases among troops is small. Statistics show that England has lost 200,000 men from social disease, at one time 17,000 men were in one hospital. When a soldier is out of the war, he is out, whether put out by a German bullet or booze and women.

Our troops on the battlefield today are standing head and shoulder above other nations. Why? They are strong, vigorous men, capable of bearing the greatest hardships.

If the zone law had not been enacted German agents with diseased women and doped whiskey could have and would have disabled a great per cent of our men and made them unfit for overseas duty. The work would have saved the German nation hundreds of thousands of tons of lead and powder. This was their planning and we are sure that every member of the German American Alliance cheered when Ferguson said let the poor boys drown their troubles in drink.

Every father and mother, sister and sweetheart who has a loved one in the army should be interested in his protection, and should appreciate Governor Hobby's efforts to aid and assist the military authorities.

If Jim Ferguson should again become Governor, from his utterances he would do everything in his power to restore the conditions that formerly existed about the camps. Put him down! On July 27th relegate him politically to the dungeon of the damned.

**SPECIAL TAX FOR MAINTENANCE OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND FURNISHING FREE TEXT BOOKS.**

House Joint Resolution No. 27.

Proposing an amendment to Art. 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by changing Sec. 3, providing for a thirty-five cent tax levy for the maintenance of the public schools of Texas, and providing free text books in public schools of the State of Texas, and making an appropriation, therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution, be so changed as to read as follows (creating a new section 3):

Sec. 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes and a poll tax of one (\$1.00) dollar on every male inhabitant of this State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and, in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollar valuation, as, with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State, and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general or special law without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation; and all such school districts, whether created by general or special law, may embrace parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature shall be authorized to pass laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts, and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such district, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties. And the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxing voters of the district, voting at an election to be held for that purpose, shall vote such tax, not to exceed in any one year fifty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1918, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for the levy of a special school tax for the maintenance of the public schools of the State and to provide free text books in the public schools of the State of Texas," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for the levy of a special school tax for the maintenance of the public schools of the State, and to provide free text books in the public schools of the State of Texas."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. That the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

(Note.—H. J. R. No. 27 passed the House of Representatives by a two-thirds vote, yeas 108, nays 22; and passed the Senate by a two-thirds vote yeas 23, nays 4.)

**TAKING OF TESTIMONY IN CRIMINAL CASES.**

House Joint Resolution No. 2.

To amend Section 10, Article 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for certain rights of accused persons in criminal prosecutions, and the manner in which the case may be prosecuted, and providing for the procuring of the testimony of the witnesses for both defense and prosecution.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 10 of Article 1 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended that the same will read and hereafter be as follows:

Sec. 10. In all criminal prosecutions the accused shall have a speedy public trial by an impartial jury. He shall have the right to demand the nature and cause of the accusation against him, and to have a copy thereof. He shall not be compelled to give evidence against himself, and shall have the right of being heard by himself or counsel, or both, shall be confronted by the witnesses against him and shall have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, except that when the witness resides out of the State and the offense charged is a violation of any of the anti-trust laws of this State, the defendant and the State shall have the right to produce and have the evidence admitted by deposition, under such rules and laws as the Legislature may hereafter provide; and no person shall be held to answer for a criminal offense, unless on an indictment of a grand jury, except in cases in which the punishment is by fine or imprisonment, otherwise than in the penitentiary, in cases of impeachment and in cases arising in the army or navy, or in the militia, when in actual service in time of war or public danger.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of this State at the next general election for State and county officers.

Sec. 3. The qualified electors for members of the Legislature shall vote upon said amendment at the said general election and at which election all persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot the following: "For amendment to Section 10, Article 1 of the Constitution, providing for prosecution of criminal cases by information, or indictment, and taking of testimony of witnesses by deposition, under certain circumstances," and those opposed to such amendment shall have written or printed on the ballot as follows: "Against the amendment to Section 10, Article 1 of the Constitution."

Sec. 4. The sum of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds of the State Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of publishing, proclamation, and election.

(Note.—H. J. R. No. 2 passed the House of Representatives by a two-thirds vote, yeas 123, nays 4; and passed the Senate with amendments, by a two-thirds vote, yeas 21, nays 1; and the House concurred in Senate amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 123, nays 0.)

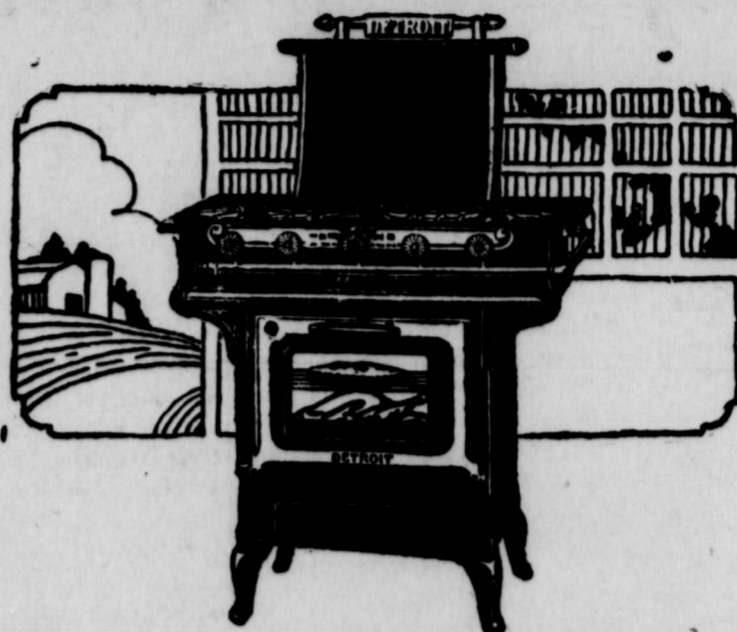
A tenor soloist of international reputation will also be heard—one who is extremely popular in Texas—John McCormack. He will appear on Friday, Oct. 25th.

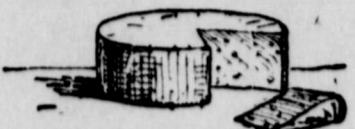

Mix with the liquid the melted fat, syrup and eggs. Combine the liquid and well-mixed dry ingredients. Bake as a loaf in a moderately hot oven for one hour or until thoroughly baked. Nuts, raisins or dates may be added if desired.

**BARLEY FLOUR COOKIES.**  
1/4 cup fat 1/4 cup chopped nuts  
1/4 cup sugar 1/4 cup chopped nuts  
1 egg 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
2 tablespoons milk 1/2 teaspoon cloves  
2 cups barley flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder

Combine the ingredients as for cake. Add enough barley flour to make a dough still enough to be rolled. Roll thin, shape with small cookie cutter and bake on tin sheet.

## MILK IS MEAT.

Clean and bone the carp. Place it in an oiled baking pan, salt and pepper the surface, add two bay leaves, juice of one lemon, and cover with sour cream. Bake until the fish and cream are a golden brown. Serve the fish on the platter and strain the cream sauce over it.

**BAKED FISH, ARMENIAN STYLE.**  
3 ripe tomatoes or 5 tablespoons stewed tomatoes  
2 onions Salt and pepper  
3 pounds fish meat 1/4 cup beef fat or oil  
1/2 bunch mint 1 cup water

Place the tomatoes and sliced onion in layers in the baking dish. Lay the skinned and boned carp in the dish and cover with a second layer of sliced onion and tomato. Sprinkle the finely chopped mint, salt and pepper over the top. Pour over this the melted fat or oil, add water, and bake in a hot oven at least half an hour or until the fish is tender.
