### MERIDIAN HIGHWAY

Officials of the Meridian Highway, which extends from Winnepeg. Canada to Laredo, and from which an extension will be made to Mexico City, were here Wednesday, conferring with the citizens of La Salle County as to what would be done by this county and informing the county officials as to the extent of help by the state and Federal Government.

Mr. Colp, president of the Texas Division o' the highway, stated that the entire highway had been constructed or had been financed for construction with the exception of Frio and La Salle counties. He stated that any amount the county put up would be matched equally by the government. On this proposition however, the roads to be constructed must be of a permanent nature.

The meeting held Wednesday was an informal one and was attended by probably 25 business men, a majority of whom seemed to favor a bond issue for the project, and it is certain that the time is coming when La Salle county will issue bonds and construct her part of this highway. We understand that Webb county has loaned La Salle her engineer for a couple of days to go over the roads and get an estimate of cost per mile of building road. This preliminary work will be done at once. When it is completed and the engineer makes his report then some idea can be arrived at as to the amount of money that will be required.

### ONE HIGH SCHOOL A DAY

For Twenty-Eight Years That Has Been the Record This Coun-try Has Made.

In a pamphlet on high schools in this country, issued by the federal bu reau of education, it is stated that the total number of these schools in 1917-18 was 13,951. The mailing list of the bureau includes the names of 13,300 high schools. The number of these schools has increased over 452 per cent since 1890. This means that one high school has been established in this country each day in each calendar year since 1890-a high

school a day for 28 years. In 1890 60.8 per cent of the high schools were under public control, but in 1918 the public-controlled high schools were 87 per cent of the whole.

Men Who Repair Skeletons.

menders-the bone surgeon and the skeleton-assembler. Art schools, medical colleges, and students of anatomy require an accurately constructed skeleton to ald in their work.

All the bones must be properly assorted and carefully put together. They are strung on fine wires. The skeleton-assembler must also pick out of the hundreds of odd bones that are sent him the 200 or more benes that belong to the particular individual being reconstructed. It is not an easy task, and the price of skeletons is justified by the amount of work required to construct them,--Popular Science Monthly.

May Use South American Wood. The Pennsylvania railroad, owing to the unprecendented cost of railroad ties, has decided to investigate the adaptability of the hard woods of Central and South America for this purpose, it is announced. Normally the Pennsylvania system uses from 5,000,000 to 6,000,000 ties annually, The average net cost has risen fully war. Furthermore, white oak, which the company regards as the
