GREAT TUN OF HEIDELBERG

heads of Wine.

The construction of the great tun of Heidelberg, in the castle of the Princes Palatine of the Rhine, was begun in 1589 and was not finished until more

It was composed of beams twentyseven feet long and had a diameter of eighteen feet. The iron hooping was 1,100 pounds in weight, and the cost, figured in our money, was nearly \$12,000. It could hold 528 hogsheads and the value at that time of the wine it contained was in the neighborhood of \$10,000.


When the cellarer drew wine out of the cask he ascended several flights of wooden stairs leading to the top; about the middle was a bunghole, into which was inserted an instrument made in the form of a spout, with which the wine was drawn up and placed in a vessel provided for the

There was another tun built, evidently succeeding the one just describ in 1751; this was 36 feet long and 24 feet high, with a capacity of 800 hogsheads, or 283,200 bottles. This cask has not been in use since the latter part of the Eighteenth century.





Producers Hard Hit By High Rail Rates.

Declaring that the prosperity of the communities producing fruits and vegetables has been destroyed by the high freight rates, and that acres and acres of cabhag are being plowed ununder and rottening in the fields and that other vegetables growing, and to be grown, are being abandoned, on account of the high cost of hipping, Sam H. Cowan, attorney for the American National Live Stock As: ociation, blames high freight rates for the high cost of living in he United States at present, the curtailment of the distribution of the Nation's food supply and that crop diversification plans eave been thrown to the winds as the result of "outragous transportation charges.

The railroads say they cannot haul the traffic without these high rates. Mr. Cowan says, That, of course, is because of the enormously increased expenses of operation and it is expected to visit that upon the individual poor producer, working and toiling with his hands in the field to buy necessities and support his family and his home.
