Governor Perry calls on FEMA to assist Texas in fighting wildfires

AUSTIN - Following severe appealed on March 20, 2009. wildfires that swept across North Texas this week, Gov. Rick Perry today reiterated his request to FEMA to issue an emergency declaration for 199 Texas counties based on the threat of wildfires. Perry also authorized additional state resources today to combat the ongoing wildfires across the state.

"The rapidly spreading wildfire threat across North Texas demonstrates how quickly conditions can change and the importance of heeding warnings from local officials," Gov. Perry said. "Iurge Texans, particularly in the northern part of our state, to exercise extreme caution and monitor the situation closely."

FEMA pending declaration would provide federal assets and firefighting resources to assist the state in battling ongoing wildfires. Perry originally requested this declaration on February 24, 2009. His request was denied on March 17, 2009, and

Today firefighters are battling more than 20 major fires burning across 60,000 acres. Resources responding in support of fire include 67 fire engines from various fire departments across Texas, 37 bulldozers to cut fire lines, and 21 aircraft, including two Texas Military Forces Blackhawk helicopters and contract aircraft State agencies, including the

Texas Department of Transportation, Texas Forest Service and Texas Military Forces, are responding to fires across the state. Local and volunteer fire departments are providing vital firefighting personnel and resources to combat these wildfires. Volunteer organizations are also providing assistance and support for residents and first responders as needed.

On Thursday, 49 major fires across Texas resulted in more than 100,000 acres burned,

destroying the small cities of Stoneburg and Sunset in Montague County. Forty-three fire departments from Dallas, Tarrant, Denton, Ellis, Grayson operations across the state and Collin counties responded to the urgent request for fire fighting assistance under the mutual aid statewide agreement.

Since Jan. 1, 2009, wildfires Texas have burned approximately 240,000 acres, destroying 161 homes and damaging 20. Due to proactive efforts, firefighters have been able to save 5,939 threatened While weather conditions are expected to improve, with higher humidity and calmer winds, the State Operations Center stands at the highest level of activation.

Based on the recent wildfires, the governor is adding Clay, Cooke, Hamilton, Jack, Montague and Wichita counties the state disaster proclamation for counties threatened by wildfire conditions.







A Dispatcher's Life is One of **Varied Talents and Emotions**

By Chief Thomas Wagoner Loveland Co. Police Department

Someone once asked me if I thought that answering telephones for a living was a profession. I said, "I thought it was a calling."

And so is dispatching. I have found in my law enforcement career that dispatchers are the unsung heroes of public safety. They miss the excitement of riding in a speeding car with lights flashing and sirens wailing. They can only hear of the bright orange flames leaping from a burning building. They do not get to see the joy on the face of worried parents as they see their children begin breathing on its own after it has been given

Dispatchers sit in darkened rooms looking at computer screens and talking to voices from faces they never see. It's like reading a lot of books, but only half of them.

Dispatchers connect the anxious conversations of terrified victims, angry informants, suicidal citizens and grouchy officers. They are the calming influence of all of them-the quiet, competent voices in the night that provide the pillars for the bridges of sanity and safety. They are expected to gather information from highly agitated people who can't remember where they live, what their name is, or what they just saw. And then, they are to calmly provide all

that information to the officers, firefighters, or paramedics without error the first time every

Dispatchers are expected to be able to do five things at onceand do them well. While questioning a frantic caller, they must type the information into a computer, tip off another dispatcher, put another caller on hold, and listen to an officer run a plate for a parking problem. To miss the plate numbers is to raise the officer's ire; to miss the caller's information may be to endanger the same officer's life. But, the officer will never understand that.

Dispatchers have two constant companions, other dispatchers and stress. They depend on one, and try to ignore the other. "Sincerely Elvis" Show at Lake Volunteer firefighters to the rescue-again

Well, Clyde Volunteer Firefighters have come to our rescue, again.

Last Thursday, I was eating lunch and looking out the window at my home in the Shalimar addition in the west part of Clyde. I was cussing the gale-force wind that was blowing the dirty brown dust straight at my house.

Suddenly, that dirty brown turned to gray. "Oh my Lord." I thought, "That's SMOKE!"

I also own the newspaper in Cross Plains and immediately thought about that devastating fire there in December of '05 that destroyed more than 100 homes. Many of them were under big oak trees, like they are here in Shalimar. Plus, the smoke was coming from the direction of the high school and intermediate school.

I grabbed a camera and headed in that direction.

I couldn't get very close but the first person I spotted at the scene made me feel a whole lot better. "Hey, Don," Fire Chief Billy Dezern yelled to me and it was apparent he and his crew already had the fire UNDER CONTROL!

In a matter of minutes they had stopped the fire at the high school property fenceline; they had kept it from crossing Interstate 20; they had stopped it only yards from a nice home on the west and they had snuffed out any danger to the homes in Shalimar.

Billy said the fire was probably caused by two highline wires getting together and sparking in the high wind.

Correctly, schools were evacuated but due to the quick action of the firemen, students were back in about two hours, in time for the day's last period. Baird Firefighters helped out,

but it was mainly the Clyde firefighters' task. All the county's volunteer firefighters have been working "overtime" for several months

Remember, these people are volunteers. They have jobs and families, but they drop what they're doing and rush into danger when the siren wails. The Clyde Volunteer Fire now due to the horrendous Department is currently

holding its annual fund-raising.

I don't know about the other

departments in the county, but I'll bet they wouldn't turn down a donation.

Most of us spend a pile of money each year on property insurance. To me, a donation to our volunteer firefighters is like buying fire insurance.

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

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Taking A Cue From Pro-Growth Texas Policies

By U.S. Sen. John Cornyn Recently I opposed the \$3.6 trillion federal budget proposed by President Obama and Democrat leaders in Congress. Simply stated, their budget taxes too much, spends too much, and borrows too much.

Perhaps most disappointing is how this budget treats small businesses, which are responsible for generating nearly 75 percent of all new private sector jobs. President Obama has proposed raising net taxes by \$1.4 trillion over the next 10 years. The bulk of this burden will be shouldered by our state's most successful small businesses. The President's plan includes raising the top two tax brackets to a nominal rate of 36 and 39.6 percent. He also wants to limit the deduction for charitable donations and for state and local sales taxes— a deduction that provides Texans with over a \$1 billion in federal tax relief every year. Altogether, the effective marginal tax rate on thousands of our small businesses could be more than 40 percent.

I have heard firsthand from small businesses in Texas that cannot afford a tax increase. On a recent visit in Tyler, I met Don Thedford, who opened Don's TV and Appliance with just one other employee 30 years ago. Today, Don has close to 50 employees who sell and service appliances and electronics. Don attributes much of his ability to grow his business over the past decade to the across-the-board federal tax cuts of 2001 and 2003. Since 2000, Don has hired eight additional workers to

seven more service technicians, six more clerical workers, four more sales people, and two more management positions. Don also added a new retirement plan for all his employees, in addition to the health benefits that he's offered for years. The recession has taken its toll on Don's sales. With home sales down, there is less demand for appliances and electronics. Don conveyed that higher taxes could force him to lay off some of his employees or trim the benefits he currently offers. In Lubbock, John and Vicki

Hoffman have owned J. Hoffman's & Brighton Collectibles, a women's clothing and accessories boutique, since 1974. They employ 12 individuals and have experienced steady growth in recent years. Like Don Thedford, the Hoffmans benefited from the tax relief enacted in 2001 and 2003. They were able to add many new brands and items to their store, and in 2003, they became an official retailer for Brighton Collectibles, a large national retailer of fashion items that can be found in 6,000 boutiques across the country. While they have been able to weather the economic downturn so far, John and Vicki believe the President's proposed tax increases will impact their business "significantly," forcing any plans to expand and hire new employees to come to a halt.

Here in Texas, we value the contributions of small businesses, and we have put pro-growth policies in place that attract entrepreneurs to invest in Texas and create jobs install and deliver appliances, here. These are the successful Texas policies I have worked to bring to Washington. I have consistently supported tax relief and incentives for our small business owners so they can continue to expand and create new jobs. For the past three years, I have offered an amendment to the budget that would make it more difficult for Congress to raise taxes on small businesses and working families. While I'm pleased my amendment passed on a bipartisan basis this year, that did not stop some from proposing to raise taxes on American families and small businesses to grow the size of Washington programs to an all-time high.

Washington should be supporting our small business owners, not burdening them with higher taxes. That's the vision that will lead to economic recovery, and that's what I'm fighting for in Washington. The best place to start is to look at what works and take a cue from our state's pro-growth, low-tax policies. After all, Texas has been able to weather the economic downturn better than most. I will continue to bring the experience of successful Texas policies to Washington, and I hope my colleagues there will join me in taking responsible, pro-growth steps to heal our nation's economy.

ACRE Program Enrollment Opens on April 27th

(Baird, TX), April 9, 2009 - cyclical Program. Robert Frost, Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service Agency in Callahan County announced today that producers can elect and enroll in the Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) program beginning April 27, 2009. ACRE is a provision of the 2008 Farm Bill.

"The Average Crop Revenue Election program is an innovative alternative to the traditional farm safety," Frost said. "This new option presents an opportunity for producers to review both programs and decide which one will work best for their operation."

Producers have until Aug. 14, 2009, to make their decision for the 2009 crop. USDA will not accept any late-filed applications.

Producers who elect the ACRE program for a farm

agree to: forgo counter-cyclical

payments; accept a 20-percent reduction of the direct payments; and

accept a 30-percent reduction in loan rates for all commodities produced on the

Commodities eligible for ACRE payments are wheat, corn, grain sorghum, barley, oats, upland cotton, long grain rice, medium and short grain rice, peanuts, soybeans, sunflower seed, canola, flaxseed, safflower, mustard seed, rapeseed, sesame seed, crambe, dry peas, lentils, small chickpeas and large chickpeas.

The ACRE program was created in the 2008 Farm Bill to give producers an option in lieu of traditional counter-cyclical payments. Producers may elect and enroll in ACRE for the 2009 crop year even if they have already accepted advance direct payments under the Direct and Counter-

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


