Clean-Up Campaign Plans Complete

Snow Erases Spring Weather

Nearly Two Inches Falls In County

A large area of the Panhandle and the South Plains had a blanket of white early Wednesday morning with heavy snow continuing throughout the day. The United States Weather Bureau predicted continued

snow for Wednesday, Wednesday night and Thursday.

Nearly two inches of the fluffy, wet snow has accumulated in Bailey County by mid-morning Wednesday, and area farmers expected the moisture to be a boon to early planting.

Bailey County Agent J.K. Adams commented Wednesday that he is predicting most of the farmers consider that the moisture from the snow will be helpful to them by melting clods and making planting conditions more desirable.

He said, "The snow will help shape the surface of the land and prepare it for planting. Actually, it is only surface moisture but, we have good bottom moisture and the present snow may go deep enough to meet the deep moisture."

"All in all, the land preparation is the main thing to be considered from a snow of this type," he concluded.

From a high of 75 degrees on Monday, the temperature dropped to a steady 30 degrees on Tuesday, wiping out the previous springlike weather in the area.

Some fruit trees which had burst into bloom throughout the area are expected to sustain varying degrees of damage to possible fruit.

Company, vegetable brokers, of Hereford. MAIF Chairman Harmon Elliott said other fresh vegetable crops will be planted soon. Lettuce, cabbage, onions and carrots will be planted by Bailey County farmers in addition to the various other vegetable crops produced locally each year.

Planters Begin Onion Setting Near Muleshoe

Following long months of searching and checking on possible fresh vegetable brokers to handle vegetables produced by Bailey County growers, chairman of the Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation Harmon Elliott has announced a good beginning for the county.

He said the T.J. Power Company of Hereford, vegetable processors, will handle the brokerage of locally produced vegetables for about 600 acres in the county.

Workers were busy Monday morning hand planting 50 acres of New Mexico Yellow onion plants just north of Muleshoe near Cox Drive in Theatre. They were planting the estimated 300,000 individual plants for Dudley Malone.

Elliott said that in the program this first year, the 600 acres will be devoted to onions, cabbage, lettuce and carrots.

City ordinances were discussed and possible ways the Committee can cooperate with City officials in the Clean-Up Campaign. It was disclosed that there is an ordinance against uncovered trash cans. More of the large green containers now in use in certain parts of the City will be purchased as quickly as funds are available.

Regular trash pick-ups were discussed, along with the City's problems, and the possibility of having large items picked up during the special emphasis days of April 4 and April 11. The City Manager gave assurance the city dump grounds would be kept open on those special days.

The city ordinance on junk cars was discussed, and it was learned the City has authority to move junk cars (which will not run) to the city dump, even

from private property. The City of Muleshoe does not have an anti-litter law, but there are State laws to cover the situation.

Offensive billboards on city land can be taken down, it was reported.

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Fire Destroys Farm Home Near Muleshoe

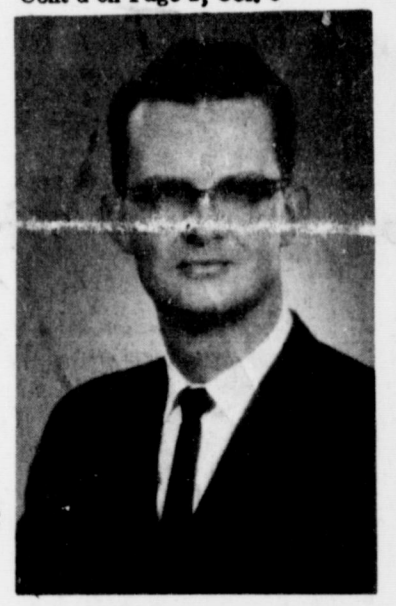
A mid-afternoon fire Monday destroyed a small frame and stucco house on the Ronnie Ethridge farm in the Longview community.

Members of the Bailey County Volunteer Fire Department received the call about the fire at 3 p.m. and by the time the first fire truck reached the blazing home a few minutes later, the roof had collapsed and the entire house was consumed by the flames.

Mr. and Mrs. Jake N. Bagay was in the house at the time the fire broke out, but managed to escape the blaze. She said she thought there was an explosion preceding the fire, but Fire Chief Earl Ladd lists the cause of the devastating blaze as "unknown."

Firemen on the scene worked to keep the fire from spreading to a large diesel storage tank, outbuildings and a barn behind the Ethridge home. Some of the firemen manned hoses to put out the fire, using truck tanks and an irrigation well line, while other firemen pulled down the shabby stucco walls of the house to enable them to effectively fight the dwindling flames.

Although the Bagays lost all their personal belongings in the fire, no one was injured.

Rev. Don Travis of the Adrian Methodist Church will be song leader for the services.

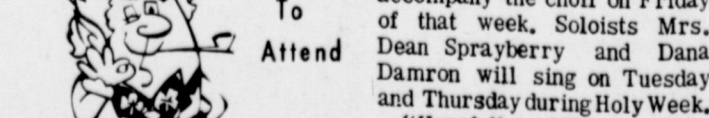

WHEREAS, the term of office of Joe Embry and Charles G. Lewis members of the Board of Trustees of this School District will expire on the first

Saturday in April, 1970 said first Saturday being April 4, 1970, and on said date a trustee election will be held in said School District.

WHEREAS, it is necessary for this Board to pass an order establishing the procedure for filing for and conducting said trustee election;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF MULESHOE INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

1. That an election be held in said School District on April 4, 1970, for the purpose of electing to the Board of Trustees of said School District Two Trustees.

2. That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be in writing and signed by the candidate and filed with the secretary of the Board of Trustees at the superintendent's office not later than 30 days prior to the date of said election.

All candidates shall file with said application the loyalty affidavit required by Art. 6.02 of the Election Code.

The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall post on the bulletin board in the building where the Board of Trustees meets the names of all candidates that have filed their applications in accordance with

the terms and provisions of this Order, and said Secretary shall otherwise comply with the terms and provisions of Art. 13.32 of the Election Code.

3. That said election shall be held at the following place and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election:

At Muleshoe Junior High School Building in Muleshoe, Bailey County, Texas, in said School District, with Ernest Kerr as Presiding Judge, and others and Clerks.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 8:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock

p.m.

4. Hazel Gilbreath is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and others and are hereby appointed Deputy Clerks for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at County Clerks Office Bailey County Courthouse Muleshoe, Texas within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said

place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee Clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail shall be sent.

5. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as near as may be, by the Election Code of this State, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

6. Immediately after said election has been held, the officials holding the same shall return to the president of the Board of Trustees in a sealed envelope a copy of the returns, poll list and tally sheet for said election, and this set of election returns shall be used by the Board of Trustees in canvassing said election.

Another copy of the return, poll list, and tally sheet of said election shall be delivered to the president of the Board of Trustees in an unsealed envelope and this envelope shall be available in the office of the superintendent open to inspection by the public for 60 days from the date of the election.

7. The presiding judge for said election shall return to School Business Office immediately after the votes have been counted the ballot box containing the voted ballots and all other election supplies and said ballot box shall be preserved and kept in accordance with the terms and provisions of the Texas Election Code.

8. The Board of Trustees shall give notice of said election, and this combined Election Order and Notice shall serve as Notice for said election. The President of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and instructed to post or cause to have posted said combined Election Order and Notice at three public places where notices are customarily posted in this school district, and said posting shall be made at least 20 days before the date of said election.

The president shall also cause a copy of this combined Election Order and Notice to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this school district is located. Said publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before the date of said election.

9. It is further found and determined that in accordance with the order of the Board of Trustees the Secretary posted written notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting on the bulletin board, located in the administrative office, a place convenient to the public, and said notice having been so posted and remained posted continuously for at least 3 days preceding the date of this meeting.

It is further found and determined that this district is located in Bailey and Lamb counties and that written notice of the date, place and subject matter of this meeting was furnished to the County Clerk of each county in which this district is located and that said notices were posted by the County Clerk of each of said counties on the bulletin board at the door of the county courthouse for said county, a place convenient to the public, at least 3 days preceding the date of this meeting. The returns of said posting shall be attached to the minutes of this meeting and shall be a part thereof for all intents and purposes.
