## Internet Service, Little League Baseball Field Update and Treadway Park Restrooms and Upgrading Discussed by Cross Plains City Council

Doug Campbell met with the Cross Plains City Council on behalf of AMA TechTel, a local provider for high-speed internet and voice services for homes and businesses at their regular meeting September 10th. AMA TechTel is headquartered in Amarillo, TX and has been in the high speed internet and voice service in rural Texas since 1995. He stated that he would like to be on the water tower and did not think that he would be in competition with WesTex Connect simply because they are on a different frequency.

Mr. Campbell provided the city with a list of references and asked the council to consider his request. He left an agreement with the city and asked to be placed on the agenda for the next regular meeting. The council thanked Campbell for his presentation, and instructed Gosnell to check on the references and the contract with WesTex Connect to see about the legality. If this is approved, AMA TechTel will be able to provide Cross Plains and its rural area, as far out as 11 miles, with high-speed internet and phone service for \$50 a month.

Jonathon Law, with Grantworks, met with the council to go over the Planning Grant and to get two resolutions signed. The first resolution was authorizing the award of professional service provider contracts for the Texas Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Planning and Capacity Building Fund as follows:

That Grantworks, Inc. be awarded a contract to provide Texas CDBG project-related professional planning services for the Program Year 2009 Planning and Capacity Building Fund project, to cover the following studies: base studies, recreation/open space, economic development, subdivision regulations, and zoning ordinance.

That Jacob & Martin be awarded a contract to provide Texas CDBG project-related

professional planning services for the Program Year 2009 Planning & Capacity Building Fund project, to cover the following studies: water, sewer, drainage, streets, and a capital improvements plan. Karen Lenz moved and Bob Kirkham seconded the motion.

The next resolution provides that the City Council designates the Mayor, Mayor Pro Tem, and City Secretary as authorized signatories for the State of Texas Purchase Vouchers for the Texas Community Development Block Grant Program Contract. Peg Terrell moved and Lewis Fortune seconded.

Kenneth Brock and Gail Kaiser met with the council to go over the contracts with the council for the Texas Department of Aging and Disability Program for the Senior Citizens Center. Brock went over the Provider Total Budget with the Council. He presented the 2009/2010 rates at \$4.88 and \$5.35. Fortune moved to approve the rates and Kirkham seconded. Brock also asked the council to pass the resolution authorizing the Mayor and City Administrator to sign documents between the Texas Department of Aging and Disability Services and the City. Cassle moved and Kirkham seconded.

Also on the agenda was discussion of the Cross Plains Senior Citizens Center cooking the meals for the May, Texas Senior Citizens Center. It was pointed out that all the meals that are ordered from the May Center will be paid for by the May Center and Cross Plains will not be responsible for any of the paperwork. Kirham moved to begin providing the May Center meals on October 1, 2009 and Lenz seconded.

Scott Byrd, Little League President, met with the Council to update the council on what has already been done the last couple of years through donations and volunteer labor at the local little league fields. He went over the plans that he and the coaches have put together to get new backstops, new pitching cages, lighting on the pee-wee fields, a sprinkler system on the high school field,

border fences, dugouts, sideline fences, etc.

He informed the council that the little league officers would like to have a three year commitment on accomplishing these tasks and he also informed the council that the EDC and the School has committed \$25,000 to the project for this year. He asked the council to increase their budget for this year from \$2,500 to \$6,000 so that the first phase of the project could be completed this year. He also stated that the committee would present invoices to be paid and that no money would be given directly to them. He informed the council that several of the volunteers would be painting, digging ditches and other things that would cut costs on the project and would like to have some in-kind services as well from the city when the lights are to be put on the pee wee field.

He talked about the sprinkler system on the high school field and who would be responsible for the upkeep once the system is put in and that the high school agreed to pay for 1/2 of the water cost during the baseball season. He also pointed out that the City and School would be the only ones to have a key for the operation of the sprinkler system. Terrell asked when he would start the project and Byrd stated immediately. Terrell moved to give and additional \$1500 to the project. The motion died for lack of a second.

Kirkham moved to amend the budget for the full amount requested and to provide the maintenance over the sprinkler system since this will be city property. He also moved to provide the water cost during the high school baseball season and to pay the full cost during the rest of the year with the understanding that the city has control of the water during the rest of the season. Cassle seconded and motion carried with Terrell voting nay.

The Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce was on the agenda to discuss the motel tax. Karen Lenz serves on the Chamber Board and informed the council that the Roping Club has not picked up their portion of the motel tax since it has been allocated to them, even though many attempts have been made to get them to provide the needed information to get their portion of the allocation.

Gosnell also reported that she and Susan Schaefer have

The schools around here sure had some good ball games, and some wonderful sounding bands. Lets all go out and support our kids!

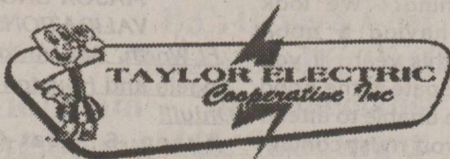

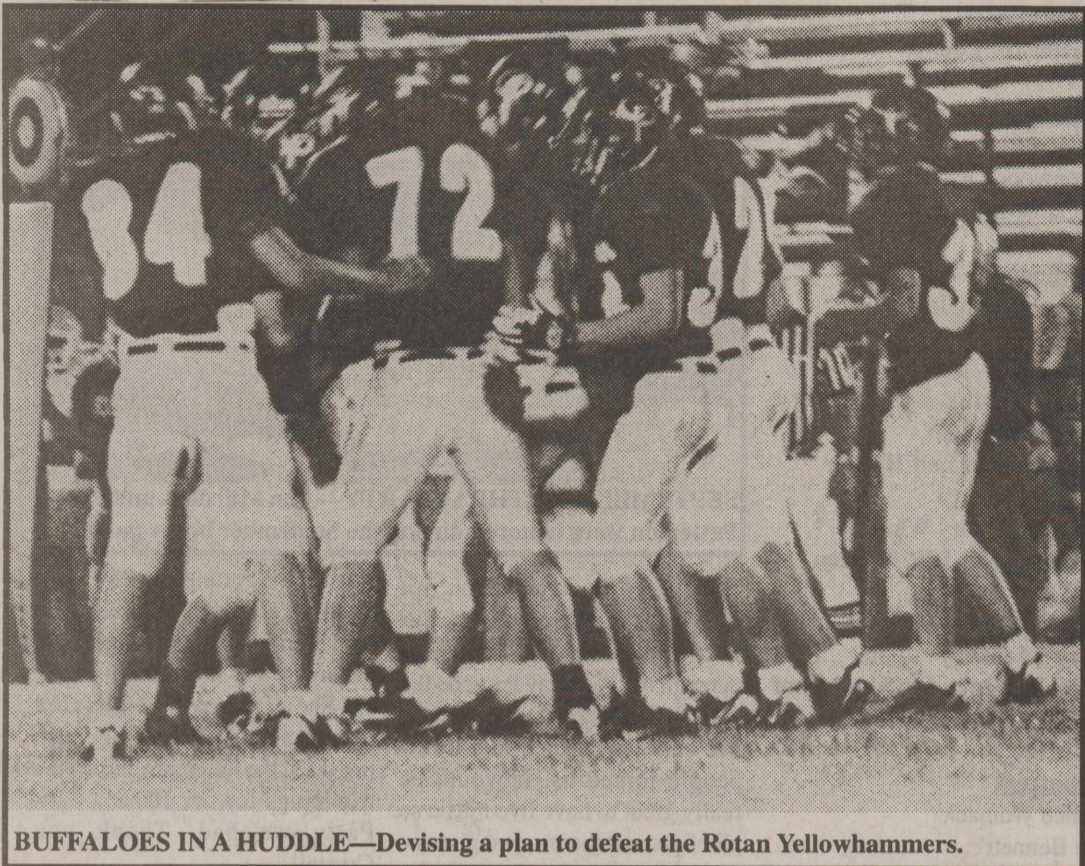

## Buffaloes Defeat the Yellowhammers 27-22 Friday Evening in a Home Game

The Buffaloes played their third home game in a row when they hosted the Rotan Yellowhammers. The weather was cool, just right for a football game.

The Buffaloes received the opening kick off, but after making a first down, a long pass to the Rotan 20 yard line was called back because a lineman was down field. The Buffs were forced to punt. Rotan ran a sweep on their first play from scrimmage; the back cut back inside and ran 65 yards for a touchdown. The score was Rotan-6, Cross Plains-0.

The Buff's defense, played tough the rest of the first half keeping Rotan out of the end zone. The Buff's offense moved the ball, but two fumbles, with Rotan recovering both, kept the Buffs out of the end zone. At the half the score stood Rotan-6, Cross Plains-0.

In the second half the Buffs came out and played an outstanding third quarter. The Buffs kicked off and forced the Yellowhammers to punt after a three and out. Cross Plains started a drive, but soon faced a fourth and two. Rotan jumped off sides,

which kept the drive alive for the Buffaloes. Two runs by Wheeler put the ball on the 10-yard line. From the 10, Savell scored, and the extra point was good. The score was Cross Plains-7, Rotan-6.

Sometimes, unbelievable events happen on a football field. On the kick off, Rotan ran the ball back for a touchdown, and the 2 point conversion made the score Rotan-14, Cross Plains-7.

The Buffalo defense stepped up, and on the Yellowhammer's next series forced Rotan to pass. Pressure by Self and Hedfelt forced a bad pass by the quarterback. Ford intercepted the ball and the Buffs went to work. Runs by Wheeler and Savell put the ball on the Yellowhammer 4 yard line. Ford scored, but the extra point failed, so the score was Rotan-14, Cross Plains-13. The Cross Plains defense forced Rotan to punt again, and the Buffalo offense took over. Wheeler scored on a 65 yard run, and Savell ran for the 2 point conversion. Cross Plains took the lead 21-14.

The fourth quarter was a nail biter. Rotan scored on a wrap around draw form 35 yards out, and the 2-point run was good.

Rotan took the lead 22-21. The Buffalo offense answered with a 45 yard touchdown pass from Savell to Allen, which put Cross Plains in the lead 27-22. The last few minutes were exciting! Rotan ran a double pass play to get the ball down to the Cross Plains 8 yard line. The Buffalo defense stiffened and kept Rotan out of the end zone. The Buffs took over on downs, and needed a first down to run out the clock. On a third and seven, Savell ran for the first down, and the Buffaloes were able to run out the clock to take a hard fought 27-22 win.

The defense held Rotan to 148 yards rushing, forced 1 fumble to halt a drive, had a pick to stop a drive, and cam up with some key tackles to halt drives by the Yellowhammers. The Cross Plains offense had 251 yards rushing and 81 yards passing for a total of 332 yards. Overall the defense and offense played tough and aggressive all night. Allan Wheeler had 172 yards rushing on 17 carries.

## Commissioners approve fee for District Court Records Technology Fund

The account may be used by the District Clerk of Callahan County, upon approval of the commissioners' court, for preservation and restoration services performed by the District Clerk in connection with maintaining a District Court Records Archive.

On a motion by Commissioner Cliff Kirkham and a second by Commissioner Bryan Farmer, the commissioners' court voted 5-0 to approve the \$5.00 District Court Records Technology Fund fee.

The order establishing a District Court Records Technology Fund follows:

### ORDER TO ESTABLISH A DISTRICT COURT RECORDS TECHNOLOGY FUND

As provided by the Government Code, Chapter 51, Section 1, Subchapter D, Section 51.305, the Commissioners Court of a county may adopt a District Court Records Technology Fund fee in an amount not to exceed \$5.00.

The fee shall be collected and reported, according to Subchapter D, Section 51.305, (c), by the District Clerk to the Treasurer for deposit into the District Court Records Technology Fund account. The account may be used, by the District Clerk of the County, upon approval of the Commissioner's Court, for preservation and restoration services performed by the District Clerk in connection with maintaining a District Court Records Archive.

Therefore, on this day the Commissioners Court approves the establishment of the District Court Records Technology Fund fee in the amount of \$5.00. The District Clerk shall implement the collection of this fee as of October 1, 2009.

—Minutes from the previous commissioners' court meeting were signed.

—Under public comments, Linda Chapel spoke to the commissioners' court about the maintenance of County Road 232.

—There was a lengthy discussion about Precinct #1 County Road 103 between the residents along the road and the commissioners' court. The residents and other concerned citizens who spoke were Neil Goodman, Daniel Mingee, Terry Goodman, Cynthia Clark, Debbie Hatchett, Cody Goodman, and Linda Chapel. No action was taken.

### HEALTHY LIVING-THE GLYCEMIC INDEX TO EATING

In our series on developing a healthy lifestyle, we started with fiber in the diet, and its importance. Since I subscribe to the old saying "You are what you eat", we will look at some general guidelines on a healthy diet and the great results of such a lifestyle.

In searching for a good understanding of the optimal way to eat, the greatest discovery to come along has been something called the Glycemic Index.

Simply put, each food we eat will require a certain amount of insulin in order for the body to utilize the food. The more insulin required, the higher the Glycemic Index, and the more quickly the body uses up the energy from the food. The body will use this energy because of activity or the energy will be stored up as fat or a substance called glycogen. With this understanding, let's look at the advantages of a low glycemic index diet.

A tremendous advantage of a low glycemic index diet is that a person is able to lose excess weight and maintain a more normal weight much more easily. The reason this happens is due to the fact that hunger is decreased and a person feels full for a longer period of time.

Many risks of chronic health conditions, such as heart disease, high cholesterol, and high triglycerides are lowered.

Improved control of diabetes and hypoglycemia occur, due to a lesser need for insulin by the body.

Women suffering from polycystic ovarian syndrome fare much better.

Importantly, prolonged

physical endurance during stressful exercise occurs and the recovery time is decreased.

Keeping in mind that a lower glycemic index food requires less insulin for the body to utilize the foods nutrients.

Let's look at some food examples. One of the things you will immediately notice is that the numbers may surprise you.

Food: Glucose-Glycemic Index-100; baked russet potato-98; carrots-92; honey-87; mashed potatoes-80; corn flakes-80; white rice-72; white bread-69; beets-64; bananas-62-white sugar;59-green peas-51; potato chips-51; sweet potato-51; white spaghetti-50; grapes-45; apples-39; ice cream-36; yogurt-36; whole milk-34; pears-34; peaches-26; cherries-23; fructose-20; soybeand-15; peanuts-13.

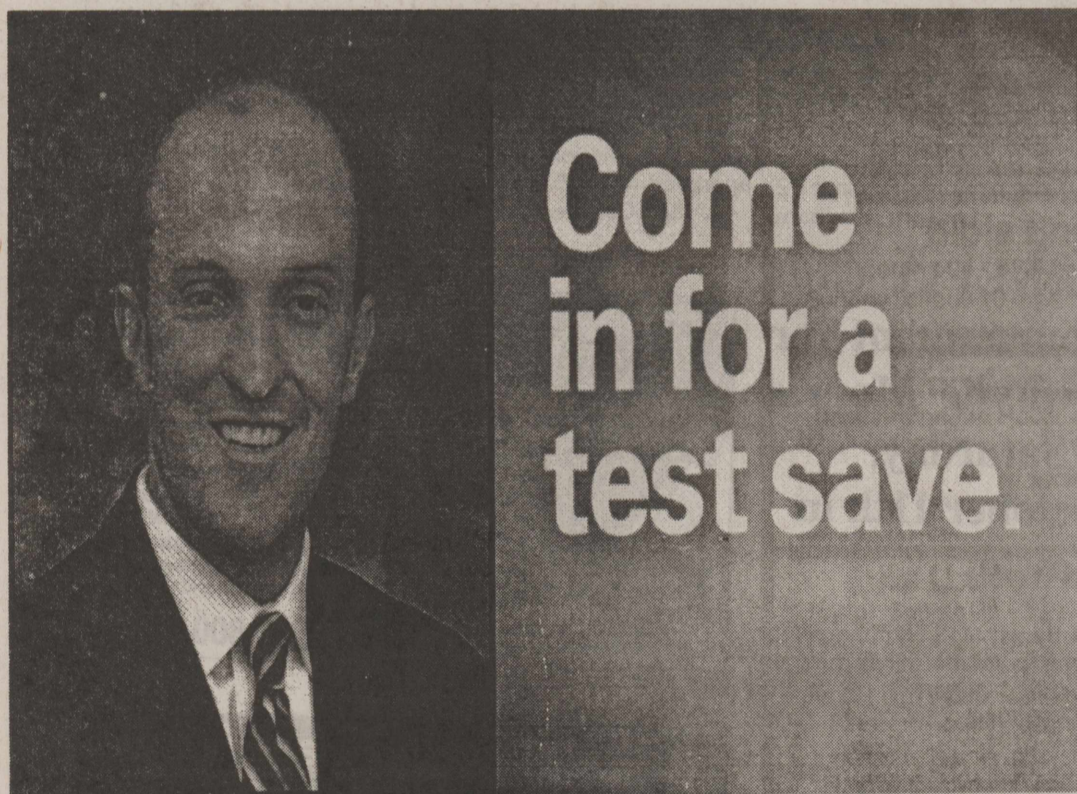

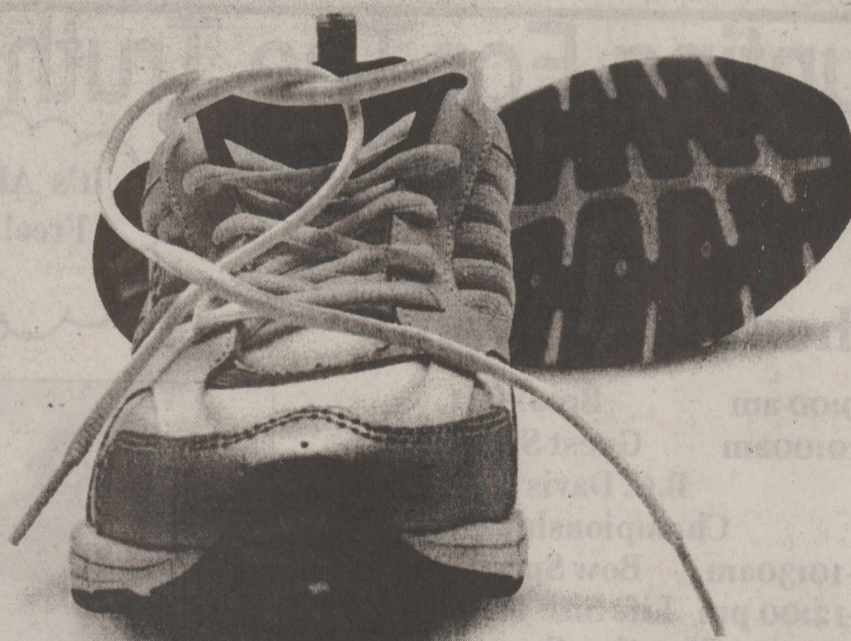

### Early voting for Constitutional Amendment Election begins in Baird October 19th

Callahan County voters will go to the polls Tuesday, November 3rd to cast their ballots for or against eleven propositions in a Constitutional Amendments Special Election, while voters in the city limits of Baird will also cast ballots for or against the sale of alcoholic beverages in the city.

Callahan County Clerk Donna Bell said due to the expected small voter turnout on election day, only one early voting location will be open.

Bell said the only early voting location for the Constitutional Amendment Special Election will take place in Room #302 at the Callahan County Courthouse located at 100 West 4th Street in Baird.

Early voting will be conducted weekdays from 8:00 a.m. until

5:00 p.m. beginning on Monday, October 19th. Early voting at the Baird location will conclude on Friday, October 30th.

Also, Bell said only four voting precincts will be open on election day Tuesday, November 3rd. Voting will take place from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, November 3rd. The voting precincts open election day include:

Precinct #1 (Clyde): Clyde Woman's Club, 317 South First Street in Clyde.

Precinct #2 (Eula and Precinct #7 (Oplin) will combine and vote at the Eula Lions Club located at 5776 FM 603 in Eula.

Precinct #3 (Baird) and Precinct #5 (Putnam) voting will take place at the Baird Activity Center located at 228 Walnut

Street in Baird.

The Precinct #4 (Cross Plains) and Precinct #6 (Clyde) voting locations will cast their ballots at the Cross Plains Community Center located at 108 Beech Street in Cross Plains.

Bell said the registered voters of the City of Baird will be voting on the Local Option Election for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption only.

### NOTICE OF PUBLIC MEETING FOR THE PROPOSED LONE STAR TRANSMISSION 345KV TRANSMISSION LINE PROJECT

As Texas energy needs continue to grow, safe, reliable electric service depends on adequate transmission. At the direction of the Texas Legislature, the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) created five geographic Competitive Renewable Energy Zones (CREZs) in West Texas and the Texas Panhandle. These are areas for the development of new wind generation plants. The PUCT also ordered utilities, including Lone Star, to build over 2,300 miles of new transmission lines to connect these zones with other parts of Texas. Lone Star Transmission plans to construct approximately 300 miles of those new transmission lines to bring electricity from wind-rich areas of West Texas to consumers throughout the state. The preliminary proposed routes cross the following counties: Scurry, Fisher, Jones, Mitchell, Taylor, Callahan, Shackelford, Stephens, Eastland, Palo Pinto, Erath, Comanche, Somervell, Johnson, Bosque, Hill and Navarro.

Lone Star Transmission invites you to attend one of its open house meetings to learn more about the proposed transmission line project. Comments received from the public are important and Lone Star is interested in learning more about people's interests and priorities as they relate to this transmission line project. 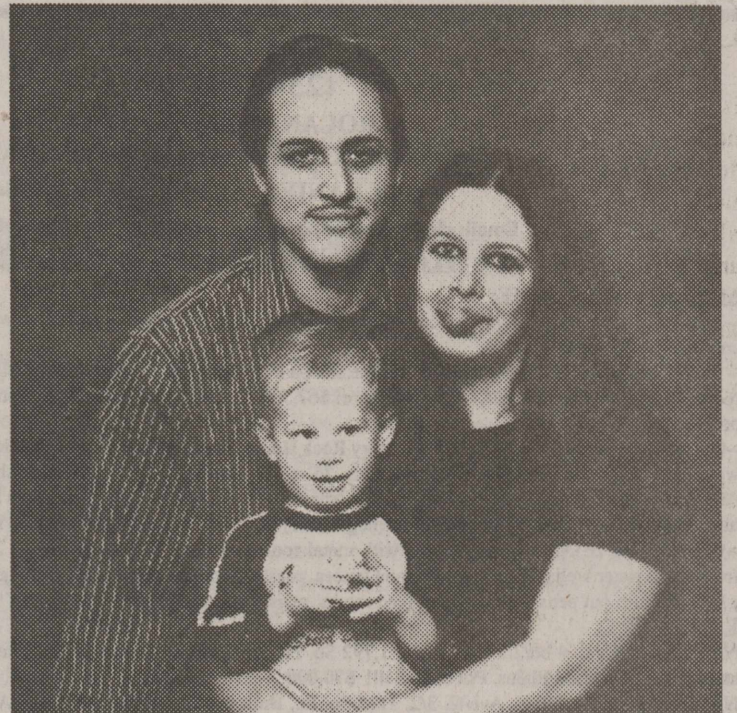



discussed the matter extensively and have agreed that since the Motel Tax must be spent on things that bring in tourism and specifically "heads in beds" that the funds need to be spent at the park area to upgrade and provide nice facilities when there are ropings, rodeos, etc. at the park. Therefore, Terrell moved to reallocate 8% of the Motel Tax from the Roping Club to the City of Cross Plains earmarked for renovations to city parks. Lenz seconded and motion carried.

Era Lee Hanke, EDC Representative, met with the council to discuss a "spec" building, or incubator building, that the EDC is interested in purchasing. She informed the council that the EDC Board has voted to purchase the Mack

McConal building located at 409 SW 4th Street in the amount of \$70,000. She informed the council that the board does have a tenant in mind, but felt that this was a good purchase even if the tenant in mind does not work out. She asked the council for their approval in the purchase of this building. Fortune moved to allow the EDC to purchase the building and Kirkham seconded. Lenz abstained from voting.

Discussion was held concerning the cost of electricity for the City of Cross Plains. Gosnell informed the council that she has received a couple of requests to place bids on the electricity for the City. She also informed the council that the City's contract with FirstChoice is not up until May 2010, and should another company beat their price, we can lock in their now price at today's rate but cannot take over until May.

However, if FirstChoice is the low bidder, the new price will become effective in 30 days. Lenz moved to go out to bid for the City's electrical cost and Cassle seconded.

Kerry Mann, Planning Chairman, met with the council to discuss the restroom facilities at Treadway Park. He informed the council that the Planning Committee, the Restroom Committee and the EDC have

been working together for the last year and a half to raise funds to build a facility at the back side of Treadway Park.

He also reminded the council that the Planning Committee had submitted a grant request on behalf of the City with the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department for a Trails Grant that would include a restroom facility but was unsuccessful in obtaining the grant.

Mann advised the council that the Restroom committees would like to begin the project by building a set of nice restroom facilities and then each year continue to raise funds and complete the renovations to park. He informed the council that the EDC has committed \$23,000 to the project and that the committee has looked at several restroom facilities would have two stalls in the women's and one stall and one urinal in the men's restroom.

Benny Free was present at the meeting and he stated that he felt that if the grounds were not locked up in the late afternoon that whatever you put there will be destroyed. He also stated that he has seen a lot of damage to the facilities and if secure gates and steel doors are not put on the facility itself, that it will be destroyed.

He stated that he had talked with Frankie Hyles and Rusty Reed and both indicated that they would build the facilities for their cost and that if we put in a facility like the one at the County Livestock Barn we could put in four stalls in the women's and two stalls and two urinals in the men's at a cost under \$20,000.

After a lengthy discussion, the matter was tabled until the next regular meeting.

The council, by general consent approved the previous minutes as presented and the police and judge's reports.

Jerry Cassle moved to pay the bills and Bob Kirkham seconded.

Cassle also moved to pay Don Gosnell 90 hours of comp time. Peg Terrell seconded the motion.

All members of the council were present. Employees present were Don Gosnell and Debbie Gosnell.

Members of the public present were Kerry Mann, Era Lee Hanke, Douglass Campbell, Benny Free, Lavay Chambers, Dorothy Driskill, Jonathon Law, Gail Kaiser, Kenneth Brock, and Kimberlee Watson with *The Cross Plains Review*.

all-expenses trip to Washington, D.C.

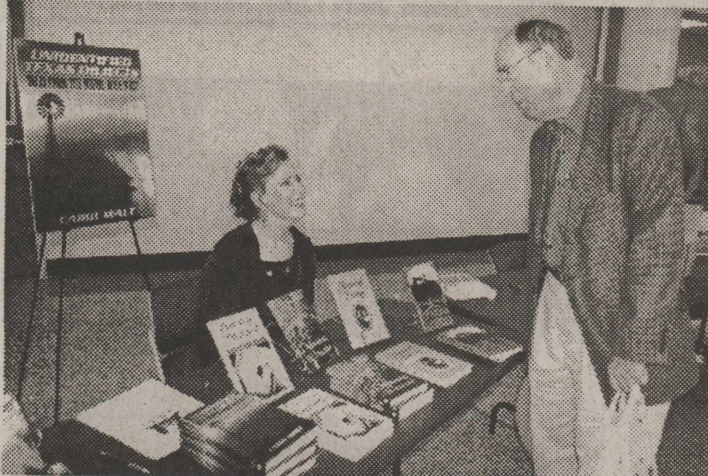

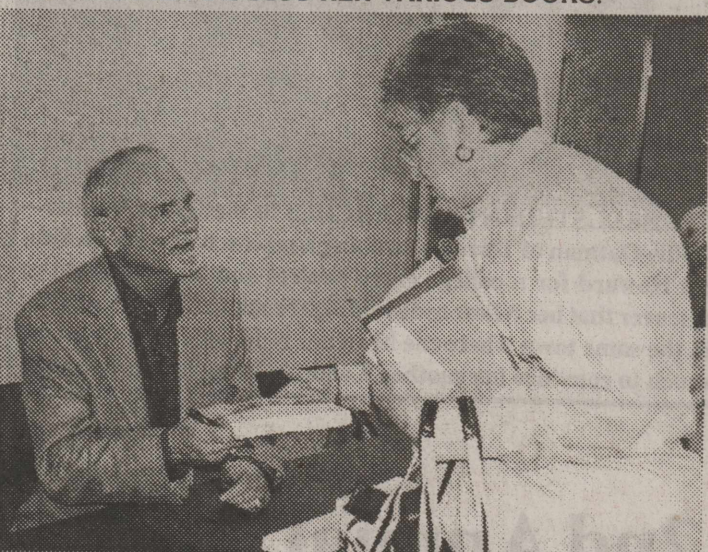
