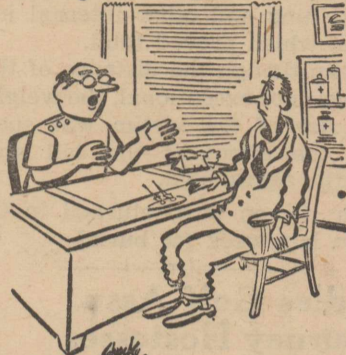

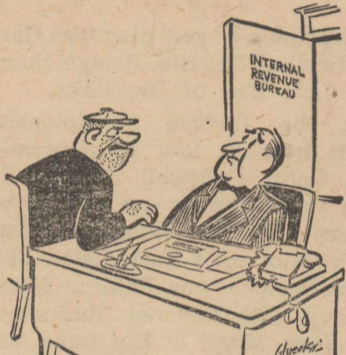

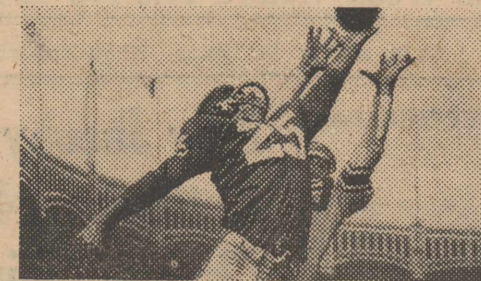

If you desire, you can pay your taxes in two payments — First Half in October or November and the last half by June 30 without penalty.

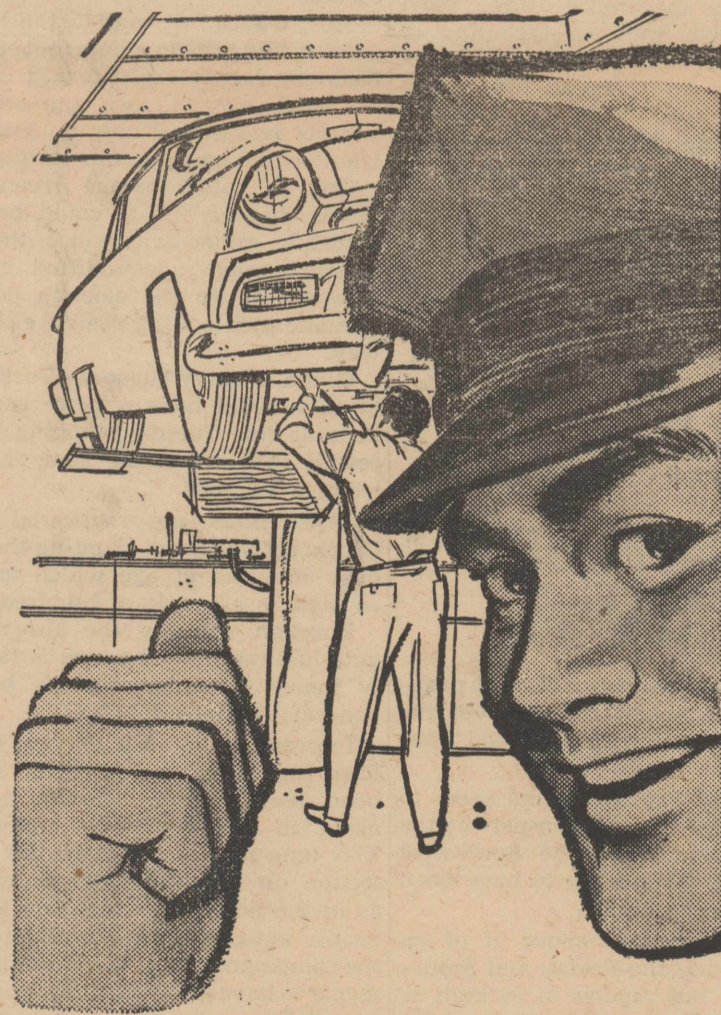
No discount on first half payment but on last half payments 3% discount if paid before April 1; 2% if paid before May 1; and 1% if paid before May 31.

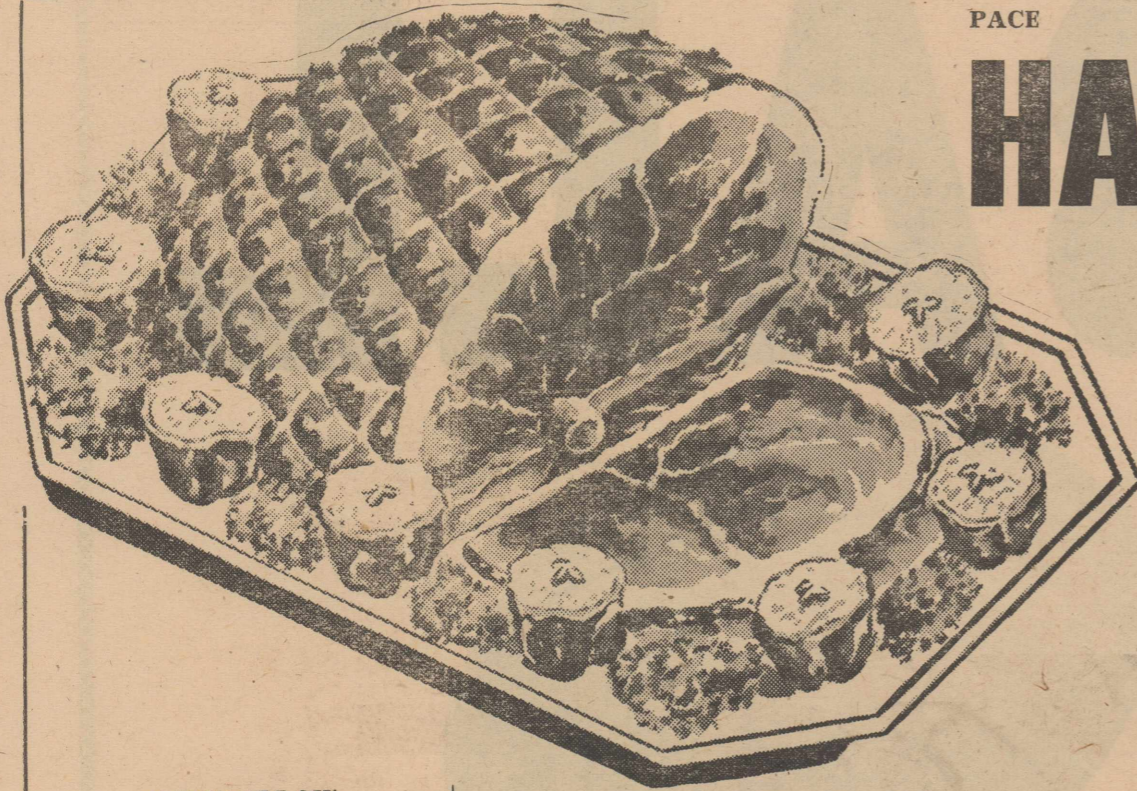

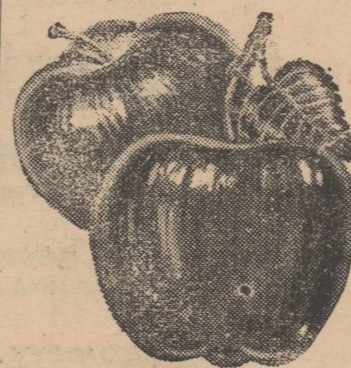

Notes From The County Agent's Office

Is everything ready for that hunting trip? Run through your check-list one more time, then underline the safety measures there. Edwin H. Cooper, Extension Wildlife Specialist, says that there is no substitute for "thinking safety".

Cooper makes some important points to be remembered.

1. Make sure your ammunition is correct type and size for your gun.
 2. Never point your gun at anything you don't intend to shoot.
 3. Never bring a loaded firearm into the house or camp.
 4. Use caution in shooting in the direction of nearby ranchhouses or highways.
 5. Be sure of your target before you fire.
 6. Unload your gun when crossing fences or climbing trees.
- Experienced sportsmen know

the safety precautions, but every year many young, inexperienced hunters enter the field for the first time — and, after all, a reminder is good for all of us. So far a good hunt and a safe one — be careful!

The first frost of the winter has hit some areas of the county, and it could mean trouble for some livestock producers. Johnson-grass and sorghum sometimes develop a high prussic acid content after a frost, and this is very dangerous to livestock.

Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian, explains that certain chemical changes occur in the frost wilted plants, and these changes animal within a very short time after the damaged plant is eaten. Whether a poisoned animal can produce the prussic acid. The poison acts quickly and can kill an animal depends upon how quickly a veterinarian can get to it, Dr. Patterson points out. Graze such plants only after they have completely dried and then use caution, warns Patterson.

Mrs. Kate Baggett 1912-1913

At the election of officers in January of 1912, the Ozona Shakespeare Club elected Mrs. Kate Baggett president. Other officers were Mrs. Blake Mauldin, first vice president; Mrs. Frank Friend, second vice president; Mrs. J. B. Smith, third vice president; Mrs. Will Baggett secretary - treasurer; and Mrs. J. E. Connor, parliamentarian. The Blakes and Spells had moved away, and the Conors and Smith came to replace them in the school system.

The members were Mrs. J. W. Odom, Mrs. Paul Perner, Mrs. E. B. Baggett, Jr., Mrs. W. E. West, Mrs. W. S. Smith, Mrs. W. H. B. Montgomery and Mrs. S. E. Couch, thus making a membership of thirteen, which became the limit of members, and the club changed its name to the "B Club" Mrs. Clayton's name was not on the roll, this may have been when they moved to San Angelo.

The first yearbook was published this year. The study topic was Shakespeare's Richard III and King Lear. The meetings were held twice monthly, with roll calls which were quotation quizzes. The club colors were pink and white, the flower the pink carnation. Business meetings were discontinued when they began to infringe on time allotted to study.

Mrs. Baggett gave up active club work when the club stopped the study of Shakespeare, and was made an Honorary Member in 1916 and has always held a respected place in the hearts of all club members.

She was born, July 27, 1855, in Charleston Missouri, the daughter of William Wright Goode and his wife Rebecca Wilson Goode. Her father was a native of Virginia and her mother was from western Tennessee. When four years old, she came to Central Texas with her parents, who settled on a farm in Bell County, their farm and ranch covered part of the land now included in the city of Temple.

She was married to James Monroe Baggett, Sr., in 1878 in Bell County where they ranched several years, moving to Coryell and McCullough County until 1884, when they moved to the Otinappa ranch, located 20 miles west of the city of Durango, Mexico.

After her husband's death in 1887, Mrs. Baggett and her two sons moved back to Belton where the boys attended school. In 1897 they moved to Austin and soon to Crockett County. She made her home with her son, W. R. Baggett, for many years. Her other son was James Monroe Baggett, Jr.

"Mother Baggett" was a devoted member of the Methodist Church. She died July 30, 1941 and is buried in Cedar Hill Cemetery in Ozona.
