

Record Crowd May See Lions Play Eagles For Share Of Crown Friday Night At Fourth Ozona District Game

The Ozona Lions will get another chance at a share of the district 3-A title Friday night in Ozona when they meet the undefeated Eldorado Eagles in a battle that will either give the title outright to the Eagles, or swing the race into a three team tie with Sonora sharing the other third of the honors.

The importance of the contest has resulted in the Sonora vs Big Lake contest being shifted to an afternoon game so as to allow fans from both Sonora and Big Lake to attend the Ozona vs Eldorado clash.

The presence of a large number of Sonora and Big Lake fans in addition to the Ozona and Eldorado crowd might well result in the largest crowd ever to attend a athletic contest in Ozona.

The Lions are expected to be back at full strength this week as Carl Montgomery is expected to be ready for the Eldorado clash after missing the Junction game with a infected bruise, picked up in the Big Lake Contest several weeks ago.

The invading Eagles have perhaps the largest team the Lions have faced this season and feature a bull like defense along with a strong passing game.

The Eagles have rolled to nine straight wins but have had their off moments, particularly in Rankin and Rock Springs where they narrowly escaped defeat at the hands of much weaker teams.

Eldorado gained the drivers seat in district play two weeks ago when they edged the Sonora Broncos 2 to 0 in a ball game played following a drenching rain.

The Eagles defense against running plays this season has been very impressive but in the Lions they will find a team that has the fastest backs they have faced and given good blocking, such runners as Tony Parker, Jim Doran and Jim Freeman could go all the way at any time.

The Lions found the Junction line real tough last week and Ozona's ground game was almost non-existent. If the Lions are to have any chance at all there will have to be a great improvement in the Lions front wall blocking this week.

The Lions secondary will be put to a real test on pass defense this week as the Eagles like other birds are pretty well air minded, having some big, fast receivers as well as at least two backs who throw the ball exceedingly well.

Scouting reports from Big Lake last week seemed to show that the Owls were able to contain the Eldorado running game fairly well, but could not cope with the passing game which resulted in a landslide 52 to 0 win for the Eagles.

In other district games the Eldorado crew slaughtered Junction early in the year, and as mentioned before edged Sonora in the rain 2 to 0.

Temperature Fall On Seasons Coldest Front Comes Wed.

Temperature Fall Into Thirties Expected Thursday Morning

An Arctic cold front pushing down through the center of the United States pushed through Ozona Wednesday morning bringing Ozona its coldest weather thus far this season.

The front which was expected to drop thermometers down into the thirties Wednesday night, did not touch off any rain as it pushed into Crockett County, but some light mist and cloudy weather did accompany the front.

A cold wave which hit Ozona in force last November 11, proved to be one of the coldest of the entire winter in Ozona in 1959, and another cold wave which struck one week later in 1958 also was the coldest of the season.

Weather forecasters had not predicted Wednesday that the cold front would produce any unusual weather, and it was hoped that the effects of the front would have worn off by Friday, leaving clear if cool weather for Friday nights football game in Ozona.

Included in the Russian visit were sight seeing tours in Moscow to Lenins tomb, The Red Square, Stalins Mausoleum, large Russian department stores, sports palaces, Operas, etc.

Dr. Golden also visited in several other countries while on the recent tour but was chiefly concerned now with acquainting Educational administrators in this country with the facts about the Russian educational system.

In addition to his B. S. and M. A. degrees Dr. Golden has taken advanced educational work at Colorado State College, the University of Texas, and Columbia University.

Heavy Crockett County Voters Go For Nixon Tuesday

Rutherford, Nugent And Johnson Win Crockett Contests

Crockett County voters did not go with the winter last Tuesday as they supported Republican Richard Nixon along with most of West Texas.

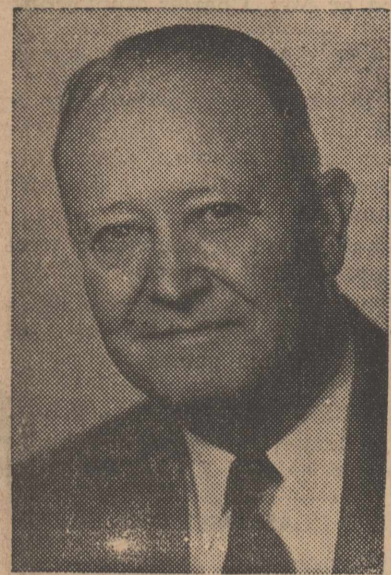
Nixon posted 635 votes in Crockett County to Kennedy and Johnson's 517. The 517 count for Kennedy was largely the result of heavy Kennedy votes in the South Elementary box and the Court House box.

Other races found Crockett county giving strong backing to J. T. Rutherford in the 16th Congressional district race and to Jim Nugent in the race for state representative in the 78th district.

With the exception of the presidential race only John Tower, Republican candidate for U. S. Senator was able to post enough votes to make a race with any of the Democratic candidates for both national and state offices along with local County races.

A total of 1218 votes were cast in Crockett county some eighty-six off the 1956 count which found 1307 votes cast in the County. In the Senate race Johnson re-

Ozona Lions Whips Junction Eagles In Home Dist. Game

Rugged Eagle Line; Lions Score 20 To 0 Friday Night Game

The Ozona Lions used three big plays to whip a stubborn Junction Eagles team 20 to 0 last Friday night at Lions stadium.

A rugged Junction line held the Lions to one first down until the final quarter, even though the Lions scored all three of their touchdowns without a first down figuring in any of them.

The Eagle defense was so effective that at half time the Lions had garnered but 21 yards rushing, while Junction was picking up 87, but despite this the Lions were leading 14 to 0.

The Lions scored first in the second quarter on a startling pass play which caught the fans as much by surprise as it did the Junction defense.

After a scoreless first quarter during which the Lions had been stopped cold at every turn, the Eagles kicked to the Lions with Freeman being downed on the Ozona twenty-nine yard line.

One play sent the ball to the thirty-one, just as the quarter ended, and on the first play of the second quarter the Lions broke the ice.

Jim Freeman fired a quick pass to Mike Stiles and the Lion end shook off one tackler and raced sixty yards to the end zone, just outdistancing an Eagle who was in hot pursuit. The pass and run covered 69 yards and as things turned out was all the Lions needed.

The try for two points failed, and the Lions lead 6 to 0. The scoring play marked the first time the Lions had been out of their end of the field.

The Lion tally apparently stung the visitors and following Ozona's kickoff the Eagles cranked up a drive that seemed to be going quite well until Tony Parker picked off a Junction pass in the wide flat and scampered 65 yards for the second home score.

A pass from Jim Freeman to Mike Stiles picked up the two extra points and what had seemed to be a very shaky lead was suddenly turned into a rather formidable one.

The second half found the Lions coming to life some on offense but once again it took only one play to pick up the nights final score.

Jim Freeman's punt rolled out of bounds near the Eagles twenty following several minutes of fruitless play in the third quarter, and the Eagles took over, cracking five yards on a slant by fullback James Hodges. With second down coming up an Ozona linebacker crashed in and parred the quarterback casing a fumble on which a Lion promptly pounced.

With the ball on the twenty-five Jim Freeman slanted inside the Junction left end and then pitched back to Tony Parker who raced 25 yards untouched for the final score.

In the final period the Lions got their only drive of the night under way and marched all the way from their own seven to the Junction three, before a penalty, a busted play, and another penalty pushed them back out of scoring range.

With time running out in the fourth quarter Junction got their best drive of the night under way but could not outrun the clock and the buzzer brought a halt to the contest with the ball on the Lion seven yard line.

Defensively the Eagles got fine line play all night, but the Lions had the speed on the critical plays and that was the game.

The Lions got good line play from Deeny Holden, Wayne Albers, Bob Childress and Mark Baggett. For Baggett it was a reversal of from since he had recently been benched for playing well below his normal pace.

**Notes From The
County Agent's Office**

The West Texas Chamber of
Commerce is sponsoring a Live-
stock Feeding Tour to the Mid-
west from November 26 to De-
cember 1, 1960. The tour will in-
clude visits to the Chicago Inter-
national Livestock Exposition, Io-
wa State University feeding re-
search labs and many cornbelt
feeding operations of cattle, hogs
and lambs.

Anyone interested in this tour
should contact the Agriculture and
Livestock Department, West Texas
Chamber of Commerce, P. O. Box
1561, Abilene, Texas, for reserva-
tions. Price tag for one person is
\$165.00. Travel will be by pullman
via Santa Fe.

Anyone can grow roses, accord-
ing to A. F. DeWent, head, De-
partment of Floriculture, Texas
A&M College. They may be plant-
ed in the fall or spring. In Texas,
fall planting is generally preferred.

Aim for quality and you will
also get quantity. Many gardeners
try to grow too many varieties or
too many plants. Given careful at-
tention, Mr. DeWent says that 10
well chosen varieties will pro-
duce as many flowers and give
far more pleasure than 50 poorly
tended plants.

Essentials for success with roses
are: proper planting, a sunny lo-
cation and well drained soil. Start
with No. 1 grade plants, and have
the ground ready when the plants
arrive. Make sure roots are never
exposed to sunlight or drying
winds.

Initial testing of cattle in the
county for brucellosis was com-
pleted last week. 7,260 cattle were
tested in 178 herds. 59 reactor cows
were found in 19 herds which was
over 10% herd infection for the
county. Ranchmen had 572 calves
vaccinated against brucellosis. All
herds with reactor cattle will have
to be retested and the percentage
of infected herds reduced to 5%
or less before the county can be
declared a certified free bruce-
llosis county. Dr. John Redden,
local veterinarian, has been en-
gaged by the Texas Animal Health
Commission to make the retest on
infected herds in the county. Re-
test of the infected herds should

reduce herd infection in the county
to a percentage below the mini-
mum required 5% and the coun-
ty should be eligible for certifica-
tion as a modified free brucellosis
county around the first of the
year.

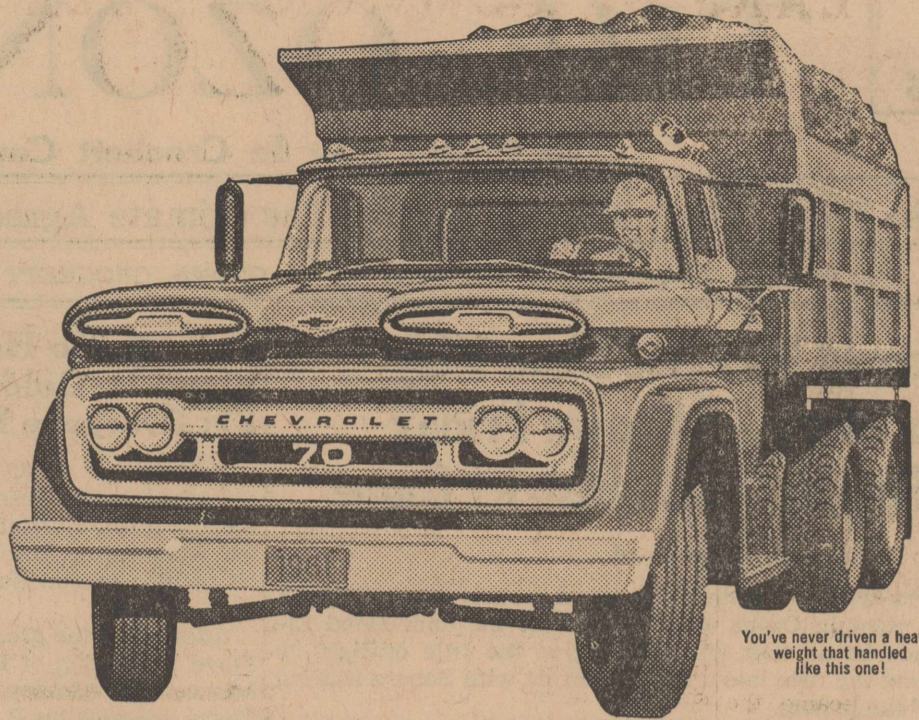

1913-1917

Mrs. J. B. Smith, became the President of the "13 Club in 1913, and the study of Shakespeare was continued. There seems to be no year book for 1913-14 or 1914-15. On April 12, 1913, the Merchant of Venice was presented to the public, with the following cast of characters, some out side the club membership: The Duke of Venice, Mrs. Ward Brooks; Prince of Monocco, Mrs. B. B. Ingham; Antonio, Merchant of Venice, Mrs. Jim Moore; Bassanio, Mrs. B. I. Mauldin; Gratiano, Miss Willie Johnson; Salario, Miss Womack; Salario, Mrs. A. P. Utterback; Lorenzo, Jessica's lover; Mrs. Bright Baggett; Shylock, the jew, Mrs. W. E. West; Lancelot Gobbo, a clown, Mrs. Belle Gore; Old Gobbo, Mrs. H. W. B. Montgomery; Leonardo, Mrs. Roger Dudley; Balthazar, Miss Mary Davidson; Portia, Mrs. Frank Friend; Nerissa, Portia's companion, Mrs. J. B. Smith; Jessica, Shylock's daughter, Mrs. W. E. Smith. The local Merchants supporting the cost of programs by advertisements on the inside cover were:

Ozonia National Bank, Capital & Surplus \$90,000; W. S. Smith Co., cold drinks — drugs; Ozonia Improvements Co., ice-water-lights, electric fixtures; PV & RC Telephone Co., W. T. Steward — Manager; Barton-Smith — Cold drinks,

pure Ice Cream; units after the play; W. F. Coates — Saddlery and Harness; G. L. Bunker — general merchandise; Chris Meinecke — fresh groceries — Country Produce; R. R. Baker — up-to-day Tailoring — gents furnishings; L. B. Cox Cr., Dry Goods and groceries.

The club studied eight Shakespearean dramas during these five years.

In 1915, when Sixth District was organized in San Angelo, with Mrs. Leila Johnston, of Coleman as the first district president, the "13 Club", under the guidance of Mrs. Smith, decided that the pursuit of self-culture and so limited a membership, was a bit selfish, so they voted to become Federated with State and a member of Sixth District. They enlarged the membership and became The Ozonia Woman's Club, with Mrs. J. B. Smith the first president. The membership was so large that two departments were set up, the Literature with forty members and Needlework with thirty-three. The study was to be varied. Other officers were: Mrs. H. W. B. Montgomery, vice-president; Mrs. Jim Moore Recording Secretary; Mrs. Paschall Odom, Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. Roger Dudley, Treasurer. Members were: Mrs. Frank Friend, Mrs. W. E. West, Mrs. Paul Willoughby, Mrs. Elmer Stubblefield, Mrs. Early Baggett, Mrs. W. R. Baggett, Mrs. Austin Buck, Mrs. Mary Childress, Mrs. Pleas Childress, Mrs. L. B. Cox, Mrs. Elane Dudley, Mrs. N. W. Graham, Mrs. Floyd Henderson, Mrs. Bininghave, Mrs. Tom Nolen, Mrs. Nat Read, Mrs. A. P. Utterback, Mrs. A. W. Moseley, Mrs. Ned Friend, Mrs. U. E. Smith, Mrs. J. W. Odom, Mrs. W. H. man of the Needlework Department, with Mrs. Floyd Henderson, secretary and Mrs. B. B. Ingham, Press Reporter, same membership.

In April 1916 the Woman's Club presented the Ozonia High School with a Baby Grand piano.

In Mrs. Smith's fourth term of office, Mrs. Jim Moore resigned her office and Mrs. George W. Cox became the Recording Secretary. Mrs. B. I. Mauldin parliamentarian in Mrs. Roger Dudley's absence. The Literature Department's topic of study was South America, as planned by Dr. William R. Manning of the University of Texas, Austin.

In 1916, under the guidance of Mrs. Smith, the Department of Music was added, with Mrs. J. W. Odom, as chairman. They studied Wagner, Handel, and Mascagni. The chairman of the Needlework Department was Mrs. Walter Childress, with Mrs. A. P. Utterback as secretary, Mrs. Lee Childress the treasurer and Mrs. H. W. B. Montgomery as Press Reporter. New members were Mrs. Monroe Baggett, Mrs. Ward Brooks, Mrs. Roy Henderson, Mrs. John Lee Nesbit, Miss Gertrude Kern, Mrs. Joe Pierce, Mrs. Victor Pierce.

In September 1916, The Ozonia

Woman's Club presented the first Lyceum to Ozonia. Mrs. Smith was an interested and sincere club member as long as she lived in Ozonia, and she remained in club work after moving to San Angelo. In 1928 she was appointed State Chairman of County Co-operation, and attended the Biennial of General Federation of Women's Clubs to be held in San Antonio in 1929.

Mrs. Smith was born Miss Jessie Kersey in 1873, in Port Sullivan, Milane County, Texas. She attended Howard Payne College, and studied piano at Baylor University and was teaching piano in San Angelo, at the time of her marriage to Joseph Bungan Smith, August 8, 1900, at her home in Jones Prairie. Mrs. Smith taught the Martha Bible Class at First Baptist Church in San Angelo for 25 years, was a Life member of Sixth District Woman's Club a member of the Daughters of America Revolution,

and an Honorary member of The Ozonia Woman's Club. She died in San Angelo at her home after a lengthy illness on Feb. 28, 1956, is buried in Fairmont Cemetery.

She was survived by one sister Mrs. J. C. Cunningham of Fort Stockton and a number of nieces and nephews, including Mrs. Albert Bailey of San Angelo and Mrs. Bob Austin of Ft. Worth.

The 1960 football queen will be crowned at half-time of the Eldorado game. Her identity will be kept a secret until the time of the crowning.

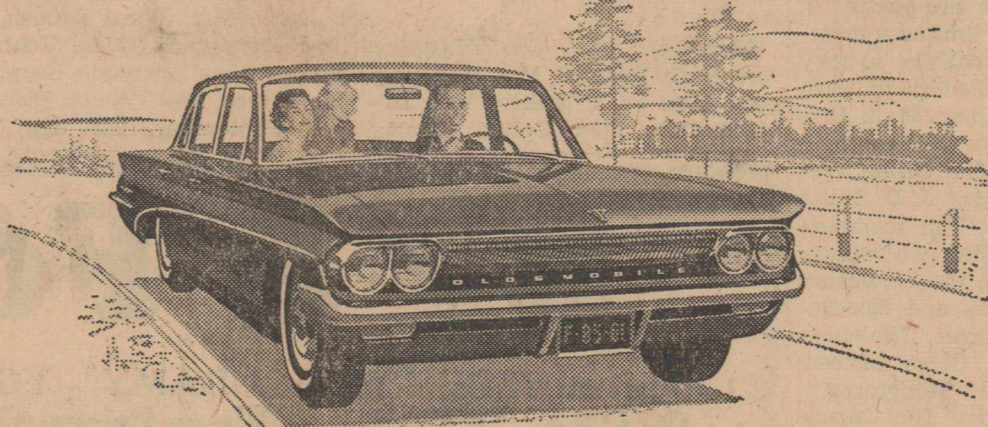
LIONS ON STRAIGHT EAGLE DIET

ceived 654 votes for the office for which he was not running, while Tower garnered 466. Results in this race left Texas without a U. S. Senator and a special election will have to be called in order to elect a man for the unclaimed office.

Robert Calvert was the champion vote getter in Crockett Co. as he polled a record 1161 of the total 1218 cast.

Only two candidates had write-in opponents, Sheriff Billy Mills lost one vote when Tom Mitchell polled one vote for Sheriff and Ralph Jones lost 35 votes, all cast for write-in candidate Armando Reina.

Crockett County voters passed all four of the amendments on the ballot by substantial margins.

The 1960 elections marked the third time in a row that Crockett County has left the Democratic ticket in the Presidential race. Indications are that party platform rather than candidates has been the underlying reason for the bolt, but doubtless Eisenhower's personal popularity was an effective factor in the 1952 and 1956 races.

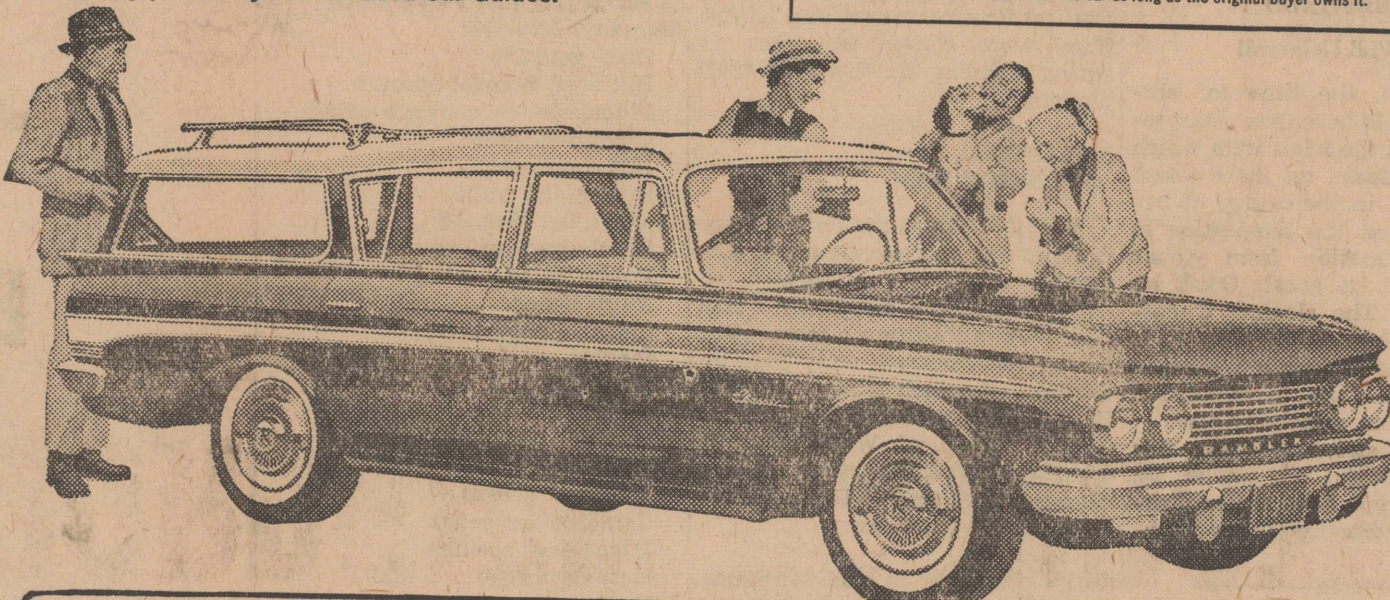

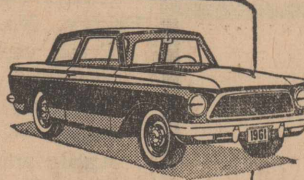
