

Success Of Screwworm Eradication Program Will Depend On Cooperation Of Ranchers In Reporting Outbreaks

College Station — Texas' Multi-million dollar screwworm control program is underway. It was launched Wednesday morning, Feb. 14, when sterile male screwworm flies were air-dropped over Hays county.

The release — first of its kind in the Southwest — was timed to coincide with a meeting of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation in Austin. More than 400 livestock producers and sportsmen from Texas and adjoining states attended the kick-off meeting. The fly release climaxed the efforts of thousands of stockmen and sportsmen who have worked on the program for many weeks.

C. G. Scruggs, president of the SAHRF, said the program involves the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Texas Animal Health Commission, Texas A&M College and the research foundation. He reported that contributions by stockmen and sportsmen now totaled approximately \$1,400,000. An intensive drive will be continued, SAHRF officials said, until the \$3 million goal is reached. Scientists, capitalizing on freeze-out of overwintering screwworms in January, believe there is an opportunity for lowering — if not totally eradicating — screwworms from Texas this year.

The program will follow the pattern of the successful eradication effort in Florida and the Southeast. Millions of artificially raised male screwworm flies, made sterile by exposure to radioactive material, will be released in the overwintering area in South Texas and in a "buffer zone" along the southern border of the state. A giant screwworm producing plant will be constructed in South Texas with an expected capacity of 50-75 million flies per week. Facilities at Kerrville Lab will eventually produce 20 million flies each week. Dr. S. Gartman, who has charge of the Kerrville fly facilities, will head operations at the new plant.

Speakers at the kick-off meeting included Dolph Briscoe, Jr., Uvalde, president, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association; Dr. F. J. Mulhern of USDA's animal disease eradication division, and Dr. R. S. Sharman, ADE staff officer, who explained how the program will operate.

Release of sterile flies is only half the job, they said. The remainder is up to the stockmen. If maggot infestation is found, stockmen are asked to remove 10 from the bottom of the wound and report to their county agent for a positive identification.

BOTTLE 'EM — REPORT 'EM — WHAT TO DO IF YOU FIND WORMS ON YOUR RANCH

Crockett county ranchmen are encouraged to be on the alert for screwworm cases in their livestock. Here's what USDA scientists on the screwworm program want stockman to do in case any screwworms are found:

1. Inspect all livestock frequently. Pay particular attention to the navels of newborn animals, a favorite site of the screwworm.

2. Collect 10 maggots from every infested wound. Place in a container of alcohol or water and immediately notify your county agent. (Containers for sending in samples of screwworms are also located at the Ranch Feed & Supply).

3. Do not move animals from any area unless all wounds are treated with Korlan screwworm smear.

4. Do not move animals out of counties where screwworms have been reported until the animals have been sprayed with Co-Ral or Korlan in accordance with instructions on the label, and all wounds treated with Korlan smear.

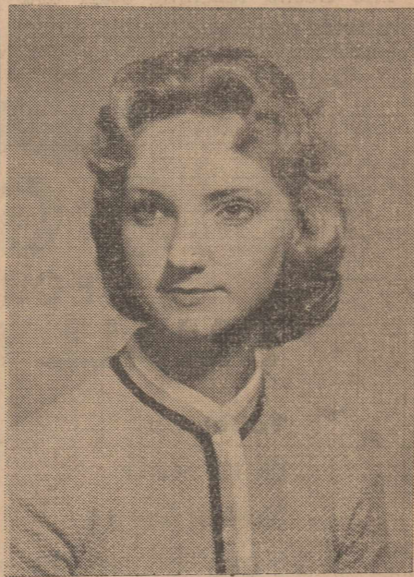
5. Do not accept or move animals from other states where screwworms may exist unless the cattle dealer, buyer, hauler or owner inspects and treats all animals at origin as indicated in item 4 above.

6. Remain alert to all information released through newspapers, television, radio or your county agent's office concerning the screwworm status in your county so you can prevent screwworm infested animals from entering your neighborhood or help find and promptly eliminate any screwworms that do enter.

Hiway Commission Agrees On Merits Of Comstock Road

Promise Consideration In Future Work Plans Of Commission

The Texas Highway Commission recognizes the need for widening and straightening of Highway 163 between Ozona and Comstock and the project will receive the Commission's "Most careful consideration" as future programs of work are formed by the Commission.

This was the gist of the information conveyed in a letter written by State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer to County Judge Jim Lindsey of Val Verde county, and to Crockett County Judge Ralph Jones, received during the past week.

The letter was in recognition of the January 25 appearance before the Commission of a delegation from Crockett and Val Verde Counties seeking action by the Commission to rebuild Highway 163 between Ozona and Comstock to remove one of the most hazardous pieces of highway in the state in preparation for an expected tremendous increase in traffic on the road once the new Amistad dam above Del Rio on the Rio Grande is completed.

Action to this end was initiated here some time ago by the Ozona Lions Club and a committee from that organization headed by its president Woody Mason, and members of the Crockett County Commissioner Court, joined by members of the Val Verde Commissioner Court and Del Rio Chamber of Commerce highway committee, were given a hearing by the Highway Commission in Austin on January 25, when the request for action by the Commission to rebuild the highway was presented by the two-county delegation.

"Careful consideration has been given by the Highway Commission to the presentation of your delegation on January 25th, requesting the widening and straightening of State Highway 163 between Comstock and Ozona, in Val Verde and Crockett Counties," Mr. Greer wrote.

"The Highway Commission has directed that you be advised that they are in agreement with you on the merit of the requested improvement of this highway, and as future programs of work are formed by the Commission on highways of this type, you may be assured that State Highway 163 will receive the most careful attention.

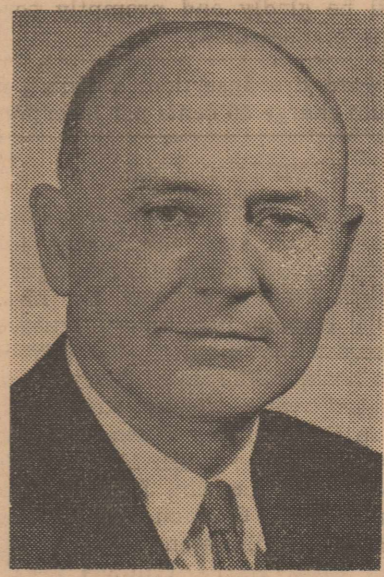
"The Highway Commission sincerely appreciates your able presentation of this mutual problem, as well as the cooperative attitude expressed by your group."

The Ozona High School girls basketball team will meet the Sanderson High School team in McCamey Tuesday night at 8 p. m., in a game to determine the bi-district championship and the right to advance in state play.

Coach Roger Gotcher's team absorbed a defeat at the hands of Rocksprings last Thursday but otherwise has been idle since winning the district title here February 6.

The Ozona team wound up its regular season play with an 18 and 6 won and lost mark and a 3 and 1 in district play.

Little is known of Sanderson except that they have been winners in the district 7-A title chase for several straight years having played bi-district here for the past three years.

The Ozona team was led in scoring during the district race by Don Nel Carnes who tallied 19 field goals and 20 free throws for 58 points and a 14.2 points per game average. Janie Lara, who was recently elected one of the team's co-captains, hit 14 field goals and 24 free throws for a 13 per game average and Beverly Alford had 16 field goals and 14 free throws for 46 points and a 11.5 average.

The defense has been anchored around Glenda Friend's rebounding strength and the floor play of Pauline Maness, Diana Coates, Robin Jones, and Janet Mason. Miss Friend was chosen all-district for the second successive year and was elected co-captain by her teammates last week.

A last-minute field goal by Carl Montgomery and two free throws by Hal Long sent the Ozona Lions into the regional tourney at Lubbock Saturday as the Lions downed the Sanderson Eagles 40 to 39 in a tight contest played in McCamey Friday night.

The critical stage of the game came in the final minute when the Lions blew a four point lead and fell behind by one at 36 to 37 and then came back for four straight points to win as they gave Sanderson the final basket at the buzzer.

Sub Rodney Stewart and Phil Carnes led the Lions attack with 10 and 12 respectively with Stewart getting his 10 in the first half and Carnes getting all but two of his points in the final two periods.

Carl Montgomery and Van Miller did a splendid job of battling the big Eagles for the rebounds and in this department the game was most likely decided.

The Lions jumped into the lead on Phil Carnes free throw but then dropped behind as first Escamilla and then Harrell dropped in field goals to send the Eagles ahead for the only time in the first half 4 to 1.

The Lions took the lead soon after when Carnes hit a free throw Pete Montgomery stole the ball and sank a layup and Rodney Stewart hit this first of four straight long shots to send the Lions ahead 6 to 4.

Stewart hit his second shot and then the Eagles got another bucket from Escamilla to end the quarter at 8 to 6 with the Lions on top.

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Outpost To Gas Field South of Ozona Slated; Wildcat in NW Crockett

Texaco Inc., Midland, will drill the No. 1 W. M. Weatherred, a 6,000-foot Devonian wildcat, in Crockett County, eight miles southeast of McCamey and two miles east of the Pecos County portion of the El Cinco (Devonian and detrital) field.

Location is 467 feet from the southeast and 7,250 feet from the northeast lines of 30-31-H&TC. Mid-Tex Gas & Oil Corp., Midland, will drill the No. 1 Miller as a 3/4-mile northeast outpost to the newly opened four-well 3,200 foot sand (Wichita-Albany) portion of the Refoil multipay field of Crockett County, eight miles south of Ozona.

Location is 330 feet from the south and 2,310 feet from the west lines of 10-MN-GC&SF (Charles Schauer Grantee). Contract depth is 4,000 feet.

The field also produces oil from the Clearfork; Strawn gas-distillate production in the field has been re-assigned to the Hunt-Baggett field.

Bennett Carlton Flowers in the Methodist Church at Marianna. The couple moved to Grand Saline, Texas where Mr. Flowers was in the mercantile business. The year 1902 was one of drouth in East

Texas and many farmers and merchants went broke. The Flowers "borrowed \$100 and moved to Beaumont where we lived until 1906," Mrs. Flowers wrote in a brief account of her family history. They moved to San Angelo in that year and after a brief move to Carthage, Mo., and back to San Angelo in 1911, the family moved to Sheffield in 1912 and to Ozona in 1914, in the mercantile business in both places.

Mr. Flowers died here in 1916, victim of an accidental drowning.

Mrs. Flowers had been a member of the Ozona Eastern Star chapter since 1924. She had served two terms as Worthy Matron of the lodge and taught in the Methodist Sunday School for many years.

She is survived by one son, Richard Flowers of Ozona; one daughter, Mrs. Walter Augustine, also of Ozona; three granddaughters, Mrs. David Schweitzer of Roswell, N. M., Mrs. Jack Brewer, Jr., of Ozona, and Mrs. Arthur Alston of Pecos; and five great grandchildren.

Women's Bowling Assn. Holds Annual Meeting

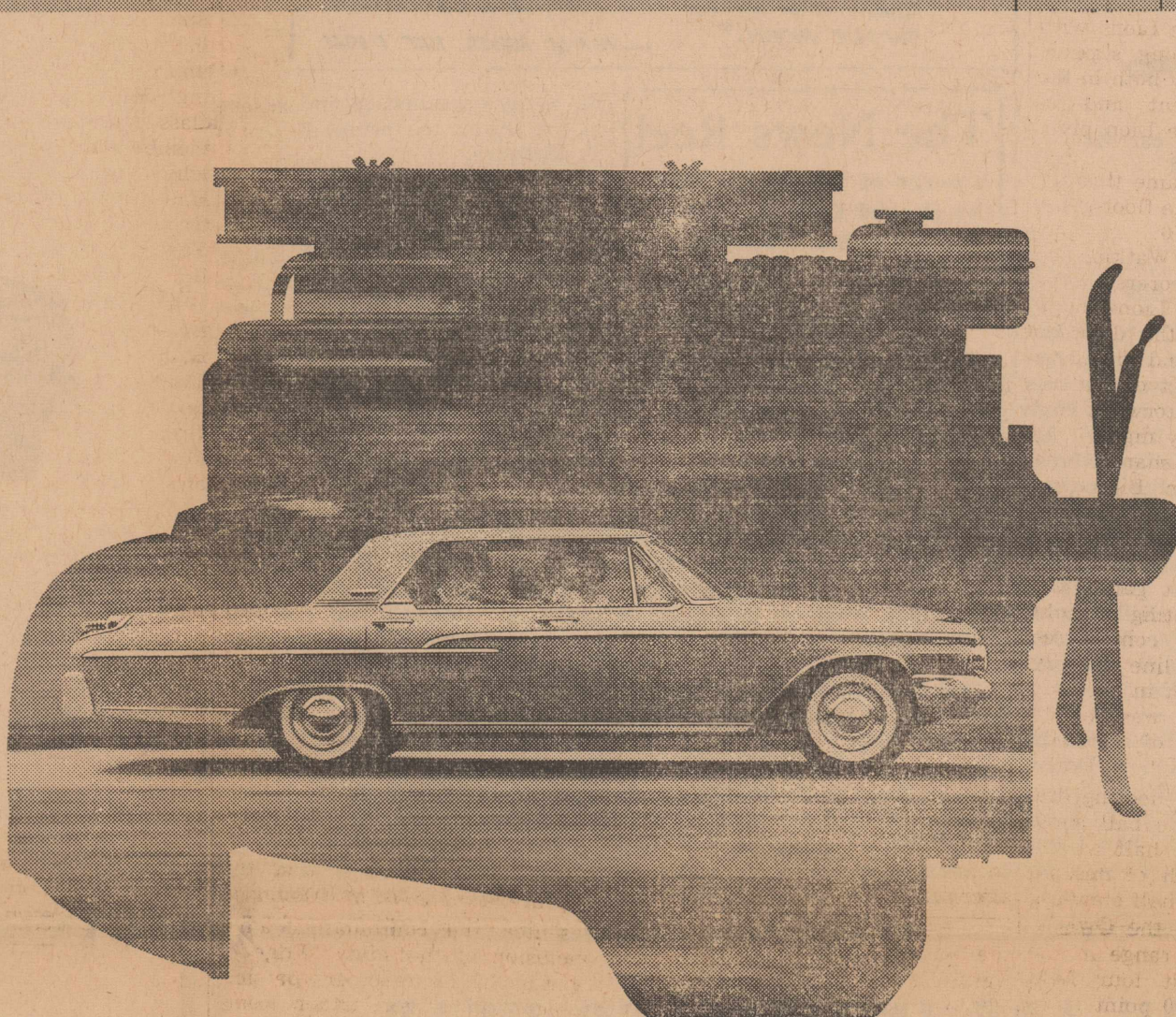

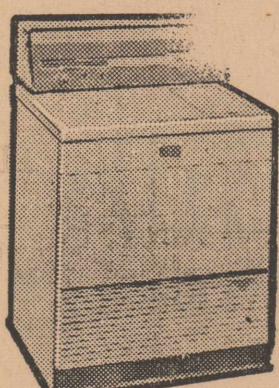

Notes From The County Agent's Office

To make the screwworm program work in Texas will require the utmost cooperation of ranchmen in watching for and reporting screwworm cases, with samples of the worms. Those ranchmen who depend on hired help in this instance should caution them to be on the alert for screwworm in livestock and report same to you immediately.

If there is a screwworm outbreak on a ranch, sterile flies will be released immediately in the vicinity to stamp out the menace. A good majority of livestock producers in Crockett county supported the screwworm program with contributions and this county is second only to Vel Verde county in total contribution in the state. Contributions will still be accepted at the Ozona National Bank for this program until total monies needed for the state program is reached.

Texas is the leading state for sheep and lambs with a 1961 inventory count of 6,159,000 head or 19% of the U. S. total. Indications are that our sheep and lamb numbers will increase this year while the U. S. figure will decline slightly, according to El Uvacek, Texas Livestock Marketing Specialist.

Mr. Uvacek predicts that we will have a more normal seasonal pattern of sheep prices during the new year. He thinks that slaughter lamb prices will improve from now to April, with a gradual decline from the new spring lamb prices in May or June until the end of the year. Spring lambs should bring considerably better prices this year, things Mr. Uvacek.
