A re-run of "The Ozona Story" as gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

#### From The Stockman, May 4, 1933

With 20-cent wool and a rising market, scattered showers over the ranch area and promise of more, West Texas ranchmen are wearing broad smiles of satisfaction these days as the ranch business begins to pay off again after too long on the other side of the ledger.

Last Tuesday evening at the Baptist parsonage, Miss Eva Davis of Ozona became the bride of Carl Pettit of Rankin, Rev. M. M. Fulmer performing the ceremony. Mrs. Pettit is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Davis of Ozona. The couple are at home on their ranch near Rankin.

ara Leta Powell, county and district clerk, Jim Dudley, county treasurer, and A. O. Fields, Justice of the Peace, Justice Precinct 1, which includes all of Ozona and most of the county, voters in all voting precincts being eligible to vote for the Precinct 1 justice of the peace.

In district races of interest to local voters will be for Congressman, 16th district, in which incumbent J. T. Rutherford is opposed for renomination by Democrats Tom Diamond of El Paso, Dr. W. D. Kelley of Midland and Robert Frias of Odessa. Ed Foreman of Odessa is the unopposed Republican candidate for the Congressman's job and will oppose the Democratic nominee in the November general election.

In another district contest, State Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo is being challenged by former State Representative W. A. (Bill) Stroman of San Angelo. Other district office holders who are unopposed in their bids for new terms are State Representative James E. (Jim) Nugent of Kerrville, District Judge Steve Preslar of McCamey, and Associate Justice, 8th District, William E. Clayton of El Paso.

Voters will be called upon to vote for or against three propositions in an unusual referendum attached to this year's Democratic and Republican primary ballots. The first two propositions concern legalizing parimutuel wagering on horse racing and the last calls for an expression of opinion as to whether or not the poll tax as a prerequisite for voting should be abolished in Texas. Both of these objectives could be realized only by approval by the Legislature and the voters of a constitutional amendment. The result of the referendum voting, if all are approved, could be used as a mandate by the Legislature for submitting the amendments to accomplish the objectives.

**To Dedicate Tourist Marker At Castle Gap Near McCamey Friday**

Austin, Texas — Two members of the Texas Highway Commission will participate in ceremonies on Friday, May 4, dedicating a Tourist Marker at the site of Castle Gap near McCamey in Upton County.

Highway Commissioner Hal Woodward of Coleman will address a meeting at McCamey High School on "The Tourist Marker Program". Guests will also hear a talk by Highway Commissioner Charles F. Hawn of Athens. "Recent Development in Texas Travel" will be the topic of Hawn's talk.

Woodward is scheduled to preside at ceremonies for the dedication of the Tourist Marker at Castle Gap, famous early pass for southwestern trails 14 miles north west along the Upton - Crane County Line. Hawn will participate in the unveiling of the Tourist Marker.

Through Castle Gap, a mile-long gap between Castle and King Mountains, flowed the full panorama of Texas history. Making up this panorama were Indians, Spaniards, stage and trail herd drivers, settlers — and Forty-Niners.

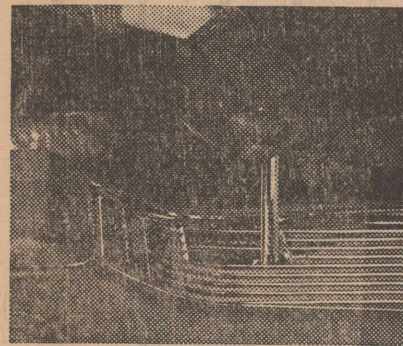

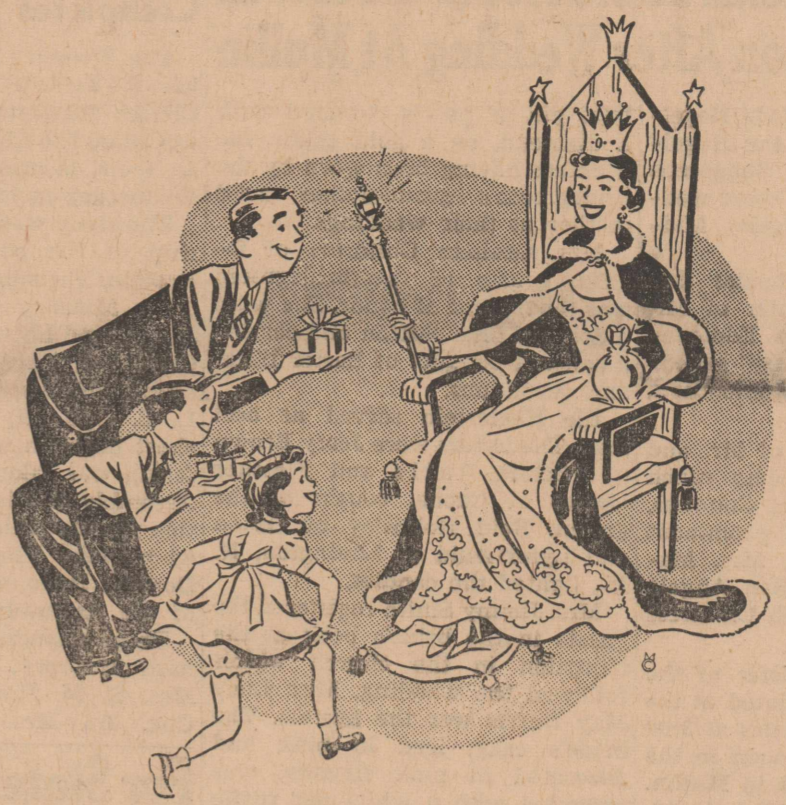


