Just then Ben looked up and said, "Here come the elephants!"

Every boy should see his first elephants like that, and not through a fence at a zoo. These came into view a mile away, walking around the hill point on the dusty Sheffield road, swinging their trunks and looking as big as two houses. They had walked a hundred and twenty miles from Fort Stockton.

Land Owners, Game Officials Confer On

Only a small group of Crockett County land owners were on hand at the Crockett County Courthouse Monday morning for a fish and game regulation meeting.

Among the officials on hand were District Chief Warden, Mutt Reinhart, Eldorado Warden, Bill Works, and Crockett County warden David Allen along with two state game biologist.

Among the matters discussed were minor changes in the fishing laws and the bow and arrow hunting season. Some counties have a bow and arrow season prior to the gun season on deer, but Crockett county does not presently make any distinction between the two methods of hunting.

Probable recommendation will be for a continuation of the permit method of taking antlerless deer in this county (with landowner permission) and the usual season on all types of game, the wardens indicated.

next town, Sonora. When the bull ride was announced, he leaped forward, paid his five bucks, and cinched the saadle to suit himself. He rode the bull to a fare-theewell, and collected fifty dollars.

The show was playing one night stands. When it opened in Eldorado, Coots was in a ringside seat. He picked up another fifty dollars.

That sort of thing could break a little wild west show, in those days, and it nearly did. In the town of Menard, the ringmaster refused to let Coots ride. He yelled for the sheriff — and once more rode the bull.

Coots was making himself a career out of riding that bull. But in Junction, the next evening, the show retired the act. I heard that the whole enterprise went bankrupt a few days later.

Moral: Never take a wild west show too far west.






