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## WHO PROFITS FROM TOWN LOT LEASING?

AN EDITORIAL

Quite suddenly owners of some town lots in Ozona are confronted with a decision on whether or not to join a "pool" of acreage in and around the town of Ozona for the purpose of providing a drillsite for oil and gas drilling ventures.

The county has advertised for bids to lease its acreage, including the streets and alleys and all county owned lands within the town limits. Other publicly owned lands are being sought.

The idea, as we understand it, is what is known as "pooling" acreage in the oil fields — a case where owners of small plots put their acreage in a common pool to make enough acres to permit the drilling of a test for oil — there is a minimum of acres on which a well may be drilled. By pooling, the small acreage owners all share in the proceeds, if any, from lease bonus and royalty on production.

We are much in favor of oil companies, oil exploration and development in Crockett county. Oil has enriched many Crockett county citizens and helped all of us by carrying a big part of the tax load to carry on the functions of a county government.

But oil and gas wells being smelly things, we are in favor of their keeping their distance. Already the winds waft in that familiar odor occasionally. We are all for the ranchman to collect his bonus and his one-eighth royalty wherever possible.

But as for our little town lot, we don't expect it ever to make us rich. A drilling block is 320 acres, we are told, and this pooling of town lots, although the leases provide no drilling in town, will make it possible for the drilling of wells mighty close to the town.

We don't believe Ozona people want a smelly little oil town if it can be avoided. And the rewards are not in line with the risk. Divide a one-eighth royalty in a gas and/or oil well into shares, first that for the owner of the major part of the acreage touching the town, and then from 500 to 1,000 individual lot owners of small lots in the town, and what do you guess a lot owner would get in the way of royalty? Not even cigarette money, we'd wager. If there's a bonus being paid, that's about all that will ever be realized.

As for county, school and water district lands, again the bad effects would far outweigh any possible advantage to any agency, we think. Foremost, we'd hate to gamble a million dollar water system for the meager promised profits. We'd just a little rather not have an oil or gas well drill go through and beyond our wonderful water supply zone. No telling what might get mixed in.

## Lancaster Hill Field Reopens Clearfork Pay

The re-opening of Clearfork production was assured in the Lancaster Hill multipay oil and gas field of Crockett County with the swabbing and flowing of new oil at Arvin Norwood Drilling Co., Midland, No. 1-16 Hunt-University, in 16-29 University, 25 miles west of Ozona.

Cleaned out to 2,990 feet, set 4½-inch casing at that depth, and perforated from 2,805-11 feet. Operator acidized through perforations with 1,000 gallons and swabbed back the load, plus 60 barrels of new oil, in 24 hours. Re-acidized with 4,000 gallons, it swabbed and flowed back the load, plus 131 barrels of new oil, in 24 hours.

The project has been shut in for storage.

Originally drilled by Hunt Petroleum Co., Dallas, at the No. 1-16 University, it was plugged Sept. 3, 1963, at 7,095 feet.

The original Clearfork opener, Macdonald Oil Corp., Midland, No. 1-3 D&E University, was finished Oct. 17, 1963, to pump 8.28 barrels of 36 gravity oil, plus 10 per cent water, through perforations between 2,900-910 feet.

Earlier upper Clearfork discovery became depleted and was re-completed from the San Andres.

## U. S. Highway 290 vs State 29 Cold War For Tourist Traffic Turns Hot; Firing Starts In Battle Of Words And Signs

Representatives from six towns along US Highway 290 contributed the ammunition and ordered firing to begin in the battle of words and signs between 290 and State 29 for the tourist traffic headed east. The order to "charge" was given at a meeting of these representatives in Sonora Tuesday afternoon, presided over by Ozona Chamber

of Commerce President Troy Williams, and attended by representatives from Sheffield, Sonora, Junction, Fredericksburg and Harper. The group voted to install three signs west of the U. S. 290 and State 29 junction near Sheffield, the first two teaser signs, one 8 by 16 feet and the other 12 by 24 feet, would in effect advise motorists "Don't Be Misled — Straight Ahead" on U. S. 290 to the LBJ Ranch, Austin, Houston and New Orleans. A big 12 by 36 foot sign is to be erected at the intersection of the highways urging motorists straight ahead.

The battle of words and signs was launched when towns along State 29, through Iraan, Eldorado, Menard, Mason and Llano, placed a sign at the new state highway's juncture with U. S. 290 west of Sheffield, advising motorists to take the 29 highway as the shortest route east.

Work on erecting the signs is expected to get under way with a minimum of delay. Representing Ozona at the Sonora meeting were President Troy Williams, and Sonny Henderson, chairman of the tourist committee, and Manager Luther Walker.

Six candidates are announced for the four available offices and their names will appear on the ballot in the following order:

Two present members of the board are seeking re-election. They are James Childress and B. W. Stuart. The other two members whose terms expire are not candidates since they both are moving away from Ozona. They are Dick Henderson and Dr. Ralph Simon.

Voters will be asked to mark out the names of those they do not wish to vote for and leave the names of the candidates for whom they wish their ballot counted. Names others than those on the ballot may be written in but only four names should be left as receiving affirmative votes.

In addition to the district trustees, the annual election will also name trustees to the county board. Unopposed candidates for the three positions open on this board are Charlie Black in precinct 2, Jeff Owens in Precinct 3 and Marshall Montgomery in Precinct 4.

### Ozona Bus Driver Is Nominated For Award

An Ozona school bus driver has been nominated and recommended as Texas School Bus Driver of the Year.

Claud Haskell Leath, a bus driver for Ozona school 11 years, was nominated by School Supt. L. B. T. Sikes.

His record was investigated by Frank Perkins, safety officer of the San Angelo subdistrict of the Texas Department of Public Safety. Perkins sent results of the investigation to a contest committee and "highly recommended" Leath for the award.

Perkins pointed out that Leath has had 33 years of driving experience. He also has driven 600,000 miles — 210,000 of them as school bus driver — without a traffic accident.

Six regional candidates for the state award will be chosen, Perkins said.

### \$318,928 In Wool Incentive Checks Mailed Producers

Additional \$44,341 In Lamb Checks Will Go Out Later

Checks totalling \$318,928 went out to 156 Crockett county wool producers yesterday from the local office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office, representing the government's incentive payment on the 1963 wool sales in the county.

Another \$44,341 in checks will later go to 133 producers who sold unshorn lambs during the year and will receive payment representing the amount of wool conveyed by the lamb sale.

Funds with which the incentive payments are made is derived from U. S. custom collection of duty on imported wool. The purpose of the program is to promote greater production of wool in the United States, which now has to import a considerable portion of the wool it uses.

Producers paid a total of \$28,682 out of the incentive payments into a wool and lamb promotion fund which is being administered through the American Sheep Producers Council. The funds thus derived carry on a continuous national advertising and promotion program to induce greater use of domestic wool and more lamb on American dinner tables.

The incentive amounts paid out here this year are down somewhat from last year, since the rate is somewhat smaller and there were more producers participating last year.

For the 1962 marketing year, 169 producers received payments totalling \$340,753 on wool sales and \$47,379 on lamb sales, and \$47,379 on lamb sales.

after the flood residence lots in the area of the hospital addition. Mr. Henderson also gave the site for the Crockett County airport and has maintained the airport as a public facility.

With the only proviso being that the civic center, which will be for the use of all organized groups and responsible individuals for public gatherings of all kinds, be dedicated to the memory of the pioneers of Crockett County and open to the beneficial use of the youth of Ozona and Crockett county, Mr. Henderson offered to donate the building site for the proposed structure.

In fact, he offered a choice between two sites.

First, is a lot on the corner of First Street and Avenue H, across the street north from the football stadium and east from the county medical clinic. This site would afford plenty of parking space most of the time and would have many advantages as an economical building site because of the level terrain and available utilities, water and sewage.

The other preferred site is on Highway 163 at the north edge of Ozona. This too is level ground and advantageously located. It would require some additional land to provide parking room off the highway, in addition to street parking nearby. Final selection and acceptance of the site will be in the hands of the Commissioners Court.

An election has been called by the Commissioners Court for Saturday, April 18, when voters will pass on the question of the issuance of \$125,000 in county bonds to be used for the construction of a civic center. Eligible to vote on this question will be qualified voters who render real or personal property for taxation in the county.

The proposed bond issue will be for a term of not more than ten years and will bear interest at a rate not to exceed 4½ percent, according to the court's order. Ordinarily, Crockett county can sell its bonds at a much cheaper rate than the maximum specified in the election order.

Voters will mark out one of two phrases which will appear on their ballot, leaving the statement which will indicate the way they wish to vote. The ballot will carry the words "For the issuance of the bonds and the levying of tax in payment thereof" and "Against the issuance of the bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof."

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## WAR — OR REGIMENTATION?

The President's latest declaration of "War on Poverty" has a little confused. This one, he says is to be "national," its objective, "total victory."

What happened to that brush fire war on poverty that was to be fought in those "distressed areas" and feature job retraining for workers who had been out-jobbed by progress, mechanization or other misfortune? Would no one admit his was a depressed area? Did no one want to be retrained? Was this total defeat?

And where was this national poverty lurking last year when our leaders were bragging about the "GNP" up there in the stratosphere, about our prosperity and our obligation to continue our multi-billion-a-year war on global poverty?

And this year, we thought, that income tax reduction was for the purpose of giving the economy a further shot in the arm so that it might take up the unemployment slack. But, apparently, President Johnson has lost confidence in this prescription before it has had a chance to work.

So we are to revert, if Congress is willing, to Depression-days leaf-raking — but on a grander scale — a program that the President has said "charts an entirely new course of hope for our people."

Heaven help America if the "hope for our people" is the Federal handout!

"Total victory," indeed! But for whom?

## LBJ AND HIS SILVER STAR

"For 17 years," said the radio announcer advertising a national adventure magazine, "Lyndon Johnson has won a miniature medal in his coat lapel . . . which he won for heroism and coolness under fire during World War II." For the full story on how LBJ won the Silver Star, the announcer suggested that listeners hurry to buy a copy of the magazine.

To save its readers the trouble, the GOP Newsletter contacted the Defense Department's Public Information Office for information on LBJ and his citation. The Department came up with a biographical sheet, dated Dec. 9, 1960, which showed that Johnson was appointed a Lieutenant Commander in the U. S. Naval Reserve on Jan. 21, 1940, and went into active duty on Dec. 10, 1941, shortly after Pearl Harbor was attacked. Ordered to the Pacific for inspection duty, he served in New Zealand and Australia and was awarded the Army Silver Star. The full text of the citation reads as follows:

"For gallantry in action in the vicinity of Port Moresby and Salamaua, New Guinea, on June 9, 1942. While on a mission of obtaining information in the Southwest Pacific area, Lieutenant Commander Johnson, in order to obtain personal knowledge of combat conditions, volunteered as an observer on a hazardous aerial combat mission over hostile positions in New Guinea. As our planes neared the target area they were intercepted by eight hostile fighters. When, at this time the plane in which Lieutenant Commander Johnson was an observer, developed mechanical trouble and was forced to turn back alone, presenting a vulnerable target to the enemy fighters, he evidenced marked coolness in spite of the hazards involved. His gallant action enabled him to obtain and return with valuable information."

The Department's data sheet adds this footnote about LBJ: "On July 16, 1942, he was released from active duty under honorable conditions. (President Roosevelt had ruled that national legislators might not serve in the armed forces.)"
