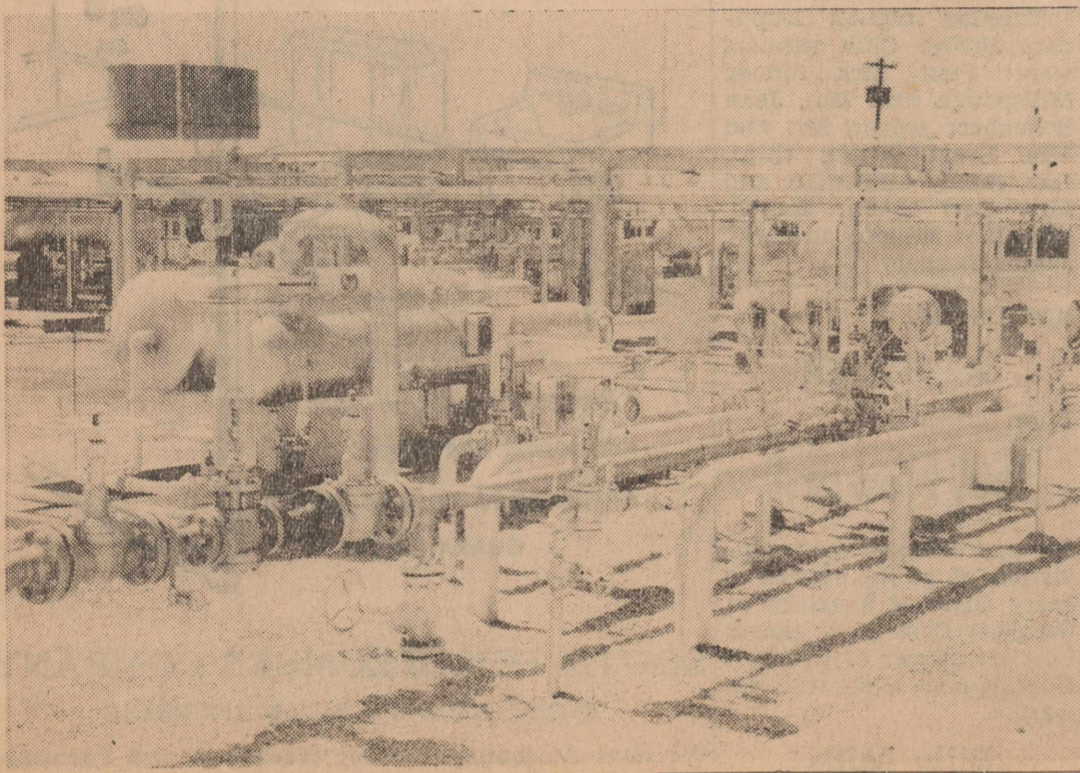
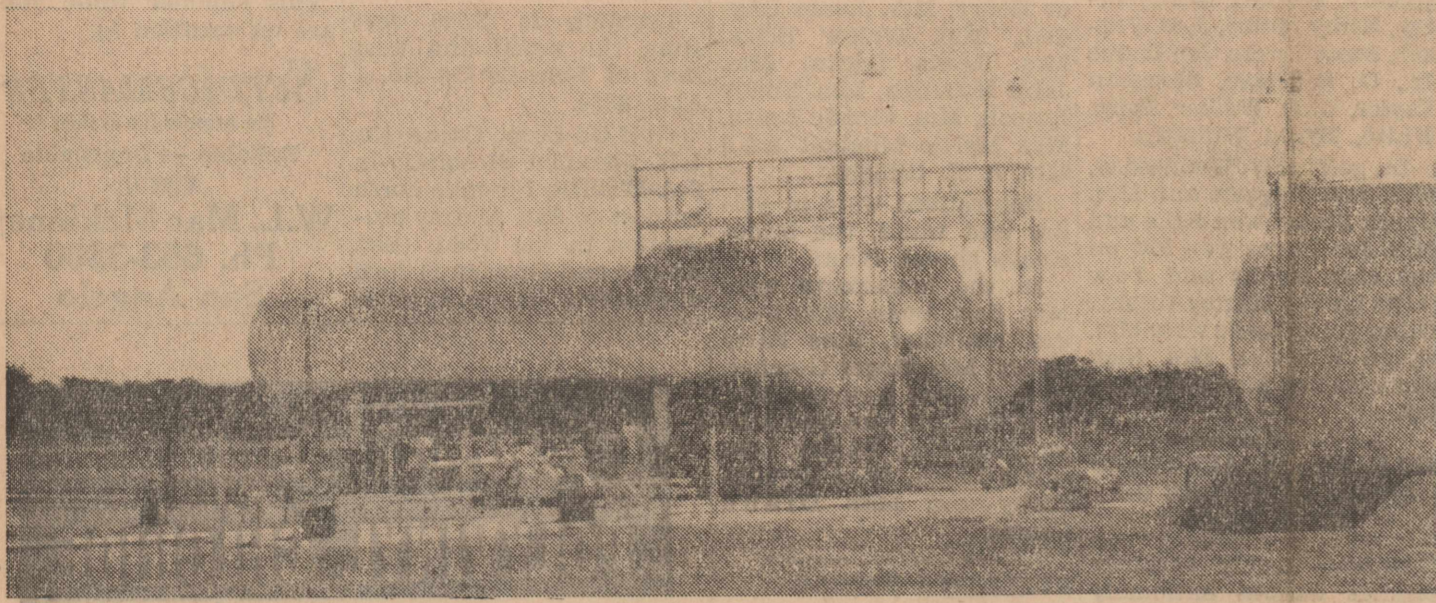

### REMEMBERING 1954 — Ozonans Act To Help Sufferers In Sanderson Flood

News of Sanderson's disastrous flood early Friday morning brought back some grim memories to many Ozonans who recalled a similar scene of devastation in their own town in the early morning hours of June 28, 1954.

And remembering, Ozonans acted quickly to do what they could to bring relief to the survivors of the Sanderson disaster, as did their West Texas neighbors on that nightmarish morning.

Sheriff Billy Mills and his deputies joined other West Texas officers in converging on the stricken community to aid in rescue operations and in patrolling the devastated areas. Sheriff Mills, was in charge of the hunt for bodies of flood victims downstream on Sanderson draw.

A loudspeaker was rigged on a truck and the services of Rev. Leonard Garrett of the Methodist Church and Rev. Max Brown of the First Baptist Church, were given as announcers to call attention of Ozonans to the collection of clothing, household goods and money for the local Sanderson relief fund. Circulars were printed and distributed over the town announcing the drive and the fire station was designated as collection headquarters for materials. The bank and water office were designated as receivers for money donations.

An Ozona fire truck was sent to the flood ravaged neighboring town early Friday and remained there to assist in pumping out flooded basements and pools. Several truck loads of clothing, food and household goods were sent from Ozona immediately and Bill Cooper, water department manager, took a supply of chlorine to the town's water system purification.

Word here early this week was that only money and household articles are needed at present, clothing and food being sufficient to meet the immediate needs. The town had counted 16 dead, equalling Ozona's loss of life in the 1954 flood, but ten others were still missing and their bodies may never be found.

### Sister Of Ozona Pair Dies; Funeral Sat. In Ft. Worth

Mrs. Lloyd H. McLaughlin, 59, sister of Mrs. O. D. West and Ivy Mayfield of Ozona died, last Thursday in a Wichita Falls hospital.

Mrs. McLaughlin was born June 25, 1905, in Talpa, Texas. She was a member of the Presbyterian church. Survivors include the husband; a daughter, Mrs. Gerald McNevin, Jr., of Richardson, Texas; a son, Robert of Dallas; two sisters, Mrs. West and Mrs. Irene Cribbs of Houston; and three brothers, Leo Mayfield of Brownwood, Everett Mayfield of Abilene and Ivy Mayfield of Ozona.

Funeral services were held at 10 o'clock Saturday morning from the Calvary Presbyterian Church in Ft. Worth.

Shell Oil Company's Northwest Ozona Plant will have its official opening on Saturday, June 19. Brock Jones, county judge of Crockett county, will cut the ribbon at 12 noon to begin at 12:00 noon to begin the day's activities which include barbecue served by the Odessa Chuck Wagon Gang and tours of the plant facilities. Becky Bland, a third rodeo member of the Bland family, won the barrel race in the McCamey rodeo while her sister, Diltzie, won the roping.

Miss Mary Ann Pitts daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Pitts, won first in pole bending, second in the barrel race and fourth in roping at Ft. Stockton.

Carey Pitts was injured while taking part in the bareback bronc riding event at Marfa and has been sidelined for the next few weeks.

### Miss Wool To Be Crowned Friday Night In Odessa

Miss Wool of Texas, to be crowned in Odessa Friday night will be 1965's best-dressed fashion ambassador of woolens designed and manufactured in Texas.

The 97-piece wardrobe of 57 woolen outfits, to be awarded the new title holder, has been donated by 'Texas' leading fashion firms and completely accessorized with millinery, jewelry, glove, lingerie, hand bag, and shoe contributions from women's accessory manufacturers.

Assembled and edited by Jim Battersby and Associates Public Relations Firm of San Antonio, the high fashion wardrobe will be modeled by the twelve finalists during the pageant. As the finalists walk the runway, modeling at 1965's first and largest public preview of Texas woolen fashions, a panel of three judges will be making final decisions as to who will be the new Miss Wool of Texas.

Following her coronation, Miss Wool, her chaperon, and director — Mr. Battersby, will embark on a state wide tour as the official ambassador for The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association.

Although the formal opening party Saturday is essentially an adult affair, the company plans to invite school classes to tour the plant, if interested, when schools open here in the fall.

Through a network of thirteen miles of gathering line and fifteen metering stations, Shell gathers low pressure casinghead gas from sixteen oil wells and gas from eight Railroad Commission of Texas Rule 49-B gas wells and transports this gas to the plant for processing.

The plant incorporates the compression - refrigeration type process. Basically, this process compresses the low pressure casinghead (oil well) gas through three stages of compression from 3 to 850 psi and refrigerates the gas to -20 degrees F. At this pressure and temperature about 55% of the propane and essentially all of the heavier hydrocarbons (butane and natural gasoline) in this gas will turn to the liquid state. The gas is then separated from the liquid and sold to the El Paso Natural Gas Company as residue gas.

The propane and butanes are separated from the gasoline by fractionation. Residue gas, LPG and gasoline are the three products of this plant. The low pressure gas wells are produced at 70 psi and can bypass (Continued on Last Page)

### Road Building Problems Ironed At Conference

Liaison between road building contractor, Highway Department engineers and employes, traffic control officers and the general public is established by the pre-construction conference method adopted by the Texas Highway Department and demonstrated in such a meeting here Monday preliminary to start of work on a segment of Highway 163 south from Ozona.

The meeting was held in the office of W. L. Dixon, resident engineer for the State Highway Department here. Representatives of the contractors on the 5-mile project, Border Construction Co. of Monahans, were on hand as were members of the Department of Public Safety Highway Patrol stationed here, division maintenance representatives and the press.

The contractor representatives, Earl Williams and Joe Cox, explained how they planned to prepare detours around construction obstacles and their general plan of work. Joe Brownlee and Jim Browne, patrolmen were present and were briefed on their role in working with the contractor in managing traffic in the best interest of the public. (Continued on Last Page)

### Child Injured When Car Wheel Rolls Over Chest

Grant Hickman, 3-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Hickman, is well on the road to recovery after suffering serious injury in a close brush with death Tuesday morning.

The child was rushed to Shannion Hospital in San Angelo Tuesday morning after he was run over by the family car.

Preliminary examination at the Crockett County Hospital, including x-rays, revealed a partially collapsed lung. Examination at Shannion later in the day revealed that the lung, while partially collapsed, was not punctured and confirmed the belief that the child had no broken bones, though the car rolled over either all, or a large portion of his chest.

Doctors were still not sure about possible injury to the internal organs and were keeping him under observation.

The accident occurred at the home of W. H. Chandler Tuesday morning when Mrs. Hickman went into the Chandler home, leaving Grant and his two cousins, one 3 and the other 6, in the car.

The car, which was sitting in the drive, was in "park" and Grant told his father that he pushed the car out of gear and when the car began to roll decided to get out. He opened the door, jumped to the ground and the car door struck him knocking him down and under the left front wheel, which rolled across his chest. The cries of the other two boys brought the mother to the scene where she found her son lying in the drive.

The child's father and Hack Leath rushed from the swimming pool to the hospital where Leath and his wife drove the Hickman's to San Angelo, following examination.

### Flood Damage To Hwy 90 Creates 290 Traffic Jam

U. S. Highway 290 through Ozona, usually a busy passageway at this time of season, has been a real broadway of America this week, as traffic diverted from U. S. Highway 90 because of extensive damage in and around Sanderson, has poured through Ozona on their way both east and west.

Ozona cafes, gasoline stations and motels in particular have been affected by the increased rate of travel. One motel reported that it turned away over fifty cars one night this week after reaching capacity and cafes have been getting heavy rushes during the meal hours and for a number of hours in the evening from passing motorists.

The highway at Sanderson has been opened again this week but is considered to be no more than passable at places and, as a result, much of the traffic along U. S. 90 is still taking the alternate U. S. 290 route.

At the height of the traffic last Saturday afternoon cars were lining up two abreast at the stop light despite the fact that local traffic in Ozona itself was almost at a standstill.

### Ozona Lutheran Church Concludes Vacation School

The Ozona Lutheran Church will conclude its two weeks vacation Bible School with a closing out service to be held at the church at 7:30 p. m. Friday.

The school enrolled twenty pupils during its two weeks run and had as its theme, Children Pray.

The recently established church is located in the building formerly used by the House of Flowers in the 1300 block of Avenue F.

### Inch Rain Here Brings Total To 8.84 In. For Year

Ozona received .97 of an inch of rain last Friday, marking the third week in a row with rains of near an inch or more.

Ozona collected .95 of an inch on May 30, added 1.35 inches on June 3rd and then came up with last week's .97, bringing the total for the year up to 8.48.

Rains during the three week period have been rather general over the county, though some areas have not had all three rains and amounts in the different rains have varied from much lighter than that in Ozona to nearly four times as heavy.

The rains have brought the parched range into the best condition it has been at this time of year in some time as well as having stayed off some of the very hot weather that usually experienced by this time in June.

In remaining relatively cool at this time of year, fronts which have triggered rains have not stalled but have pushed on into Texas, triggering some turbulent weather but mostly just very welcome rain.

Hale Center in the Panhandle took high damage in a tornado and Sanderson nearby lost 16 lives and considerable property in a flash flood early Friday morning.

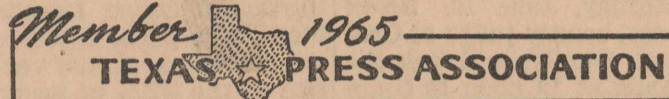

**Major Injured In Paris Air Crash Brother of Ozona**

The crash of a B58 jet Hustler bomber at LeBourget Airfield near Paris, reported in Wednesday morning news, resulted in injury to Major Harold Covington, brother of Bill Covington of Ozona.

The plane, which had made several passes over the field during the international air show now being staged there, made its final approach and suddenly went down just short of the end of the runway, striking some landing lights and bursting into flames. One member of the crew was killed outright and a second member burned severely.

An Air Force helicopter stationed near the runway was on the site of the crash within seconds and moved the injured, including Major Covington, to Percy Military Hospital which specializes in treatment of burns.

At latest report Major Covington's condition was considered good.

**1964 Crockett Co. Infant Mortality Record Is Cited**

Figures compiled by the Department of vital statistics and released to county chairmen of the National Foundation March of Dimes revealed that Crockett Co. has been fortunate during the past year in that it had no deaths among infants due to congenital defects.

The statistics compilers emphasized that all counties do not have complete registration and that the figures do not show deaths due to other than congenital causes.

The number of deaths and defects in children from congenital causes is now greater than those caused by polio at its peak.

Crockett County reported 119 live births last year with no infants deaths, no neonatal deaths, no maternal deaths and one fetal death.

Sutton reported 79 live births with one infant death one neonatal death and no maternal or fatal deaths.

Hidalgo and Nueces Counties both reported between 5,800 and 6,100 live births with about 400 deaths in each county.

Since Polio has now been controlled the March of Dimes foundation has been exerting its efforts to battle congenital birth defects.

Mrs. Vic Montgomery is March of Dimes chairman in Crockett county.

**Gulf To Drill Deep Wildcat In North Crockett**

Gulf Oil Corp., Crane, will drill the No. 1-A M. West, et al, an 8,900-foot wildcat in Crockett County, 12½ miles north of Ozona, 2½ miles northwest of Brandywine 1 West, recent Ellenburger discovery, and surrounded by shallow failures.

Location is 2,500 feet from the north and west lines of Runnels Csl No. 1 Abst. 2830.

Gulf Oil Corp., Crane, No. 1-H Shannon Hospital, in 8-A-EL&RR, 1¼-mile north outpost to San Andres production in the Todd, (San Andres and Grayburg) field of Crockett County, 21 miles

northwest of Ozona, flowed 43 barrels of fluid, cut 50 per cent oil, 50 per cent load water, in 24 hours, from the San Andres.

Flow was through perforations between 1,940 - 42 feet. Testing continued with some load remaining to be recovered.

### Deep Wildcat Set In Crockett Co., Producer Fnaled

McFarland Corp., Midland, will drill an 8,600-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crockett County, nine miles north of Ozona and 3 1/2 miles southwest of the one-well Ozona, North (lower Ellenburger) field, but separated by depleted Ellenburger and upper Pennsylvanian producers and dry holes. It is No 1-14 Holt. Location is 1,783 feet

from the north and 1,880 feet from the east lines of 14-OP-GC&SF. Ground elevation is 2,548 feet.

Signal Oil & Gas Co., and Marathon Oil Co., Midland, re-completed the No. 42-1 J. H. Tippet, former gas producer, as a fifth lower Leonard oil producer and a 1/2 mile north and slightly east extension and as a 5/8 mile southeast extension to that pay in the Tippet multipay field of Crockett County, 12 miles southeast of McCamey.

It was finalized for a daily flowing potential of 98 barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus

30 per cent water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,000-1. Production was through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations between 4,690-4,712 feet, which had been fractured with 5,000 gallons.

Top of pay was picked at 4,690 feet on kelly bushing elevation of 2,320 feet. Total depth is 6,174 feet, with 5 1/2-inch casing set at 6,097.

Original completion was by Bankline & Hurt in 1954. Location is 5,740 feet from the northeast and

440 feet from the northwest lines of 42-31-H&TC.

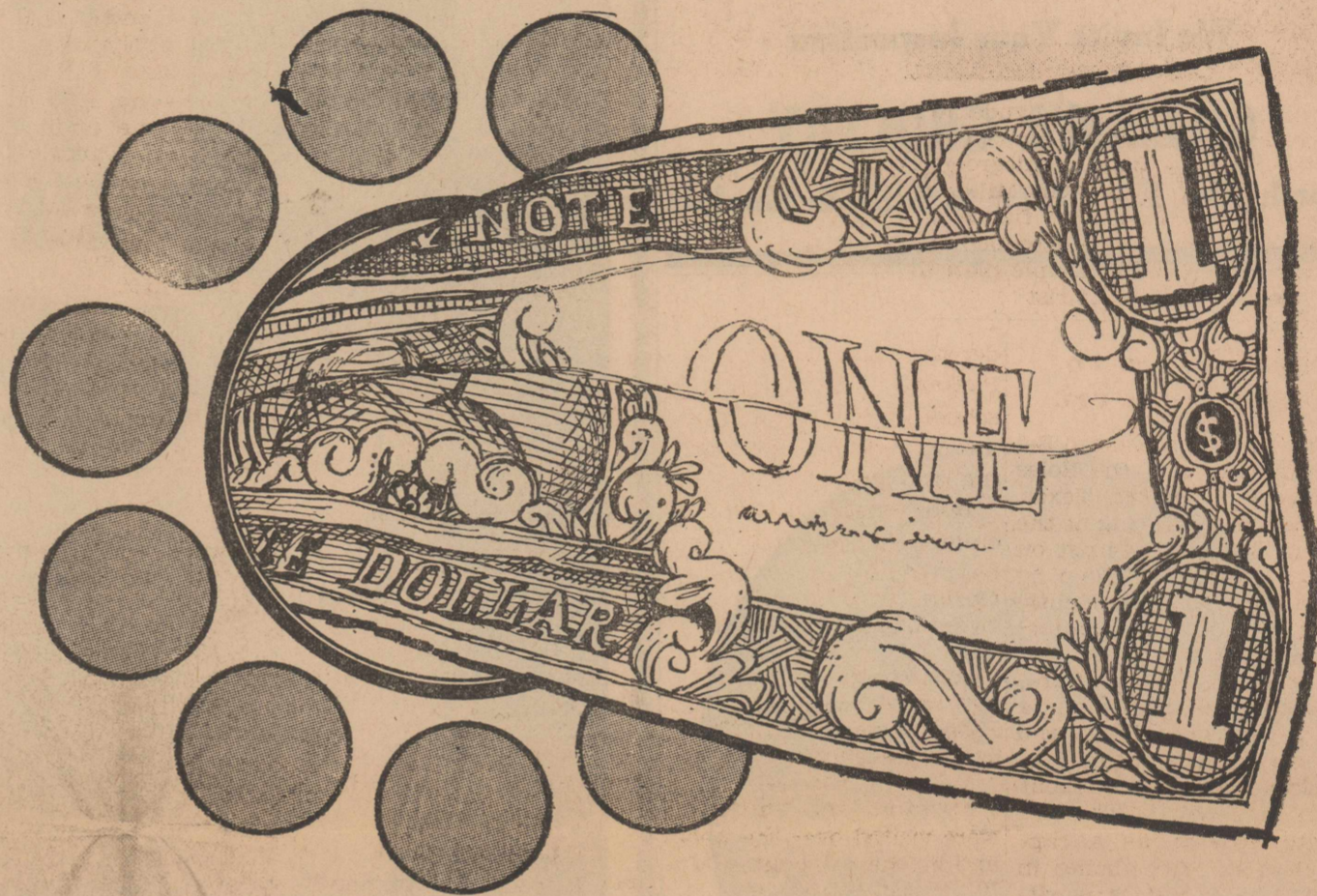

The No. 1-8 Todd was finished Jan. 20 to pump 94 barrels of oil through perforations between 2,216-26 feet; the No. 2-8 Todd was finished March 1 to pump 82.8 barrels of oil through perforations between 2,125-139 feet.

A 1 1/2 mile northwest extension was indicated to San Andres production in the Todd multipay field of Crockett County with the flowing of 16 barrels of load water and five barrels of new oil on three one-hour tests during the last three days at Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1-H Shannon Hospital, in 8-A-EL&RR 21 miles northwest of Ozona.

Flow was through perforations between 2,043-45 feet. No choke was reported.

Testing continued with 179 barrels of load water remaining to recover.

**Indians Wear Out Base Paths In 12-2 Rout of S. A. Hawks**

The Ozona Indians scored five runs in the sixth inning Sunday afternoon at Powell field to rout the San Angelo Hawks 12 to 2.

The Indians built up a 5 to 0 lead before the explosion and aside from two runs punched across by the Hawks in the seventh frame the visitors were never an offensive threat.

Cookie Zamarrappa and Albino Sanchez split pitching chores for the Ozona team and limited the Hawks to just six hits, three of which came in the 7th when the Hawks scored both of their runs.

After playing two scoreless frames, the Ozona team jumped out front to stay, in the third, when they marched around the bases on 6 walks.

The Indians added two more in the fourth on a home run by Cico Galvan and a walk and a three base error on a fly ball hit by Stanley Najjar.

After being blanked in the fifth, the Ozona team then took advantage of 5 hits and some loose fielding to run in 5 more tallies and ice the game away.

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members.

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall be-

come effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

blic. The officers and contractors exchanged pledges of cooperation in keeping traffic moving in the best way possible, during the construction.

The 5-mile stretch of road, from the edge of Ozona south, will require a maximum of six months for completion. There will be 14 concrete drainage structures to be built and the entire stretch of road will be rebuilt to standard 24-foot wide highway. Total cost of the 5-mile segment will be \$225,500.

Construction work was to have started on the project the first of this week but was delayed a few days because the company's equipment was required in making repairs after the flood at Sanderson. Work was expected to begin today.

the first stage of compression thus entering the plant at the suction of the second stage of compression. The high pressure gas wells bypass the compressors completely. The plant has 1000 horsepower installed for gas compression and 300 horsepower for refrigerant compression.

The plant is semi-automated and many of the process variables are instrument controlled. The panel board located in the office building indicates records or controls most of the important process variables. The annunciator panel located on the main panel board will sound an alarm and indicate malfunctions should be corrected, such as an engine shutting down.

The plant is designed to be unattended from twelve to sixteen hours per day. Should a process upset or alarm occur when the plant is unattended, the annunciator panel is wired to ring

the plant foreman's home phone, indicating an alarm. A. D. Rippetoe, Operations Foreman, supervises operations of the new plant. He is assisted by R. W. Adecock, Operator 1, and Jack Tankersley, Operator 1 — Repairman; all are residents of Ozona.

The Northwest Ozona Plant is designed to process 10 million cubic feet gas per day initially and is so designed that the plant can be easily expanded to process 20 million cubic feet gas per day. The fractionating section of the plant, including columns, reboilers and oil heater presently have the capacity to process the liquids from 20 million cubic feet of gas per day. At design conditions of 10 million cubic feet gas per day, about 9.2 million cubic feet gas will be sold to a gas transmission company.

The liquids extracted from this gas are 13,500 gallons per day of LPG and 2,800 gallons per day of natural gasoline. Both the LPG and natural gasoline are loaded through driver attended automatic loading facilities into transport trucks. The LPG is an end product ready for marketing as fuel for home heating, cooking, flame cultivation or motor fuel for LPG or dual fuel engines.

The natural gasoline is a 12 pound Reid vapor pressure gasoline product, is called "raw" gasoline, and is mixed with crude oil and transported by pipeline to a refinery where the gasoline is further refined into gasoline as is normally purchased from a service station.

This facility should contribute much to the further development of the Northwest Ozona Field as well as to the local economy of Ozona.
