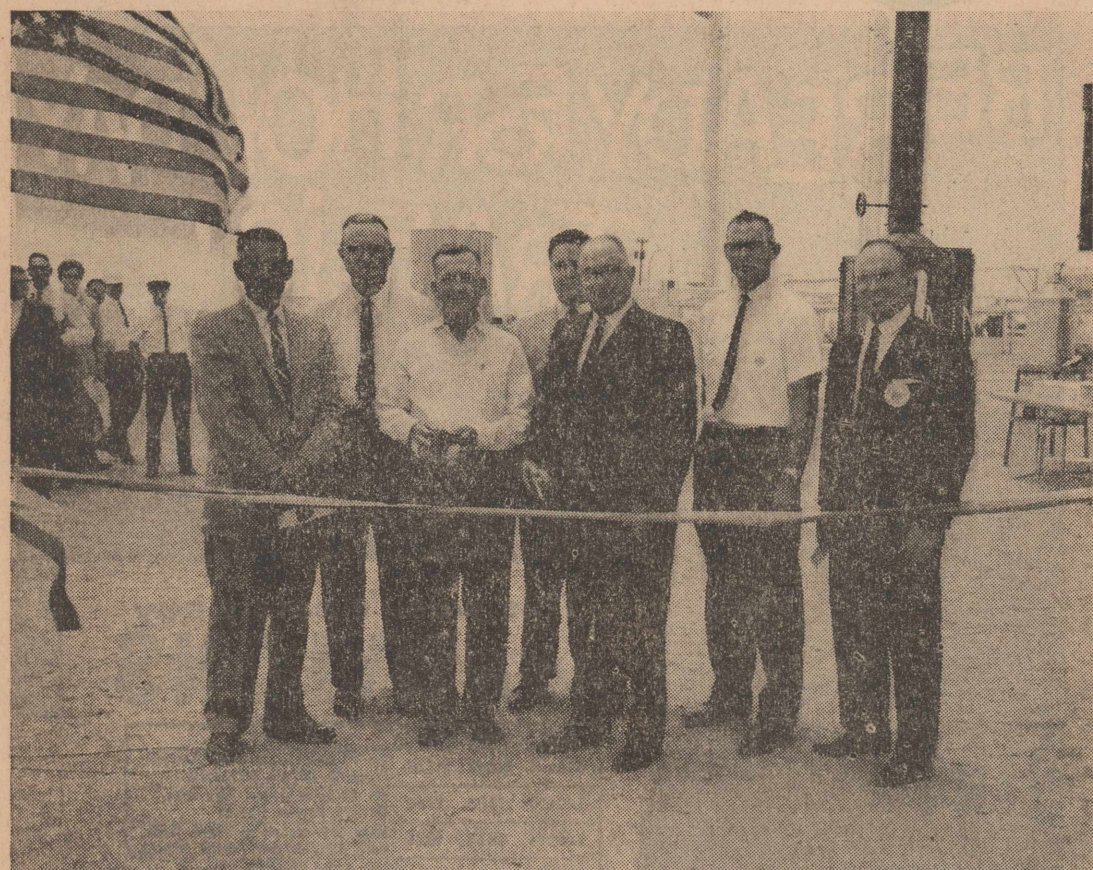

Shell Host At Barbecue Dinner At Plant Opening

Shell Oil Co. personnel were gracious hosts to about 300 West Texans, mostly Ozonans, Saturday when the company observed open house at its new Crockett county installation, Shell's Northwest Ozona Gasoline Plant, recently placed in operation.

Following a ribbon burning ceremony, in which County Judge Brock Jones officiated with a butane torch to cut the ribbon signifying opening of the facility to the visitors, a brief program including invocation by Rev. Max Brown, followed.

Odessa's famed Chuck Wagon Gang was ready with a barbecue dinner for all visitors served under a big tent under which tables and chairs had been arranged for the comfort of guests. The crowd overflowed the tent and tables were set up in one of the headquarters buildings and others outside for the "wide open."

S. R. Payne, supervisor of plant operations for Shell, was master of ceremonies. He called attention to the automated features of the plant which made its installation and operation feasible for the company.

County Judge Brock Jones welcomed Shell and congratulated the company on its modern facility.

"Shell is no stranger to us, however," Jones said. "Shell is one of the county's biggest taxpayers and we are mighty proud to have them with us."

Construction on the plant was begun late last year and began test operations in April thus becoming the first market outlet for natural gas and gas by-products for the Northwest Ozona Canyon field.

Casinghead gas from 16 oil wells and gas from eight gas wells is gathered to the plant through a system of 13 miles of gathering lines and fifteen metering stations for processing at the plant. Residue gas, LPG and gasoline are the three products of the plant. The liquids are loaded through driver-attended automatic loading facilities into transport trucks. The LPG is an end product, ready for marketing as fuel for home heating, cooking or motor fuel. The natural gasoline is called "raw" gasoline and is mixed with crude oil and transported by pipeline to a refinery for further refining. The residue gas is sold to El Paso Natural Gas Co.

The plant is to be operated with a three-man crew. A. D. Rippetoe is operations foreman. Others on his staff are Jack Tankersley and Raymond Adcock.

Deadline for entries will be midnight July 5.

Rains Continue To Widen Smiles of Area Ranchers

Welcome rains continued to fall over much of Crockett County this week, with Ozona getting its heaviest rain of the year, an official 1.47 inches.

Most gauges on the south side of town showed closer to two inches and rains of up to 5 weeks fell just south and west of town.

The heavy rains sent draws just south of Ozona, including Taylor Box, on sharp rises and State 163 south was closed to traffic Tuesday. Countless water gaps were out but most ranchers were too busy smiling to complain.

Vic Montgomery reported just over an inch with measurements dropping sharply going west but heavy rains fell all the way into Sutton County, Demp Jones, Charlie Davidson, Frank McMullan and Early Baggett all reporting in the 3.5 to 5.00 inch brackets.

The rain marked the fourth straight week that Ozona has had just below or just over an inch and ranch land over most of the county is in better condition than it has been at this time a year for a long time.

The 1.47 inches brought the official fall to 10.51 which is also very high for this time of year.

Cloudy and sultry weather continued to prevail in the Ozona area thru mid-week and, though no rain is predicted for this area, the chances of more rainfall seemed very good.

Cooksey and other Sanderson leaders have organized their flood clean-up work and neighboring communities who wish to help have been allotted special days for volunteer crews in order to keep the clean-up moving in more orderly fashion.

Crockett County Judge Brock Jones is heading the Crockett county mission and has arranged for bus transportation for volunteer workers next Tuesday morning. At least fifty men are wanted to form the work crew.

Volunteers are asked to bring their own sack lunch and their own tools if possible. Tools needed will be hoes, rakes, shovels, brooms, wrecking bars, axes, etc. Some tools will be furnished if an individual can not supply his own.

Transportation by bus and car will be provided by Crockett county. Volunteers are asked to call the sheriff's office here or Judge Jones at once so that the list can be prepared and arrangements completed.

The workers will meet at the courthouse in Ozona at 4 a. m. next Tuesday, June 29. Each person is asked to bring a sack lunch as eating facilities are limited in Sanderson. Water will be provided. The men will be expected to put in the entire day cleaning up debris from over the town and helping townspeople in cleaning their homes, removing wrecked buildings, etc.

Flood clean-up has progressed at Sanderson to the point of needing the services of individual workers, about all the work having been done that could be done with heavy machinery, Sheriff Cooksey reported to local officials. Area towns have been assigned work days, Ft. Stockton, Alpine, Iraan, Sheffield, etc. having set dates on which volunteers will be asked to go to Sanderson to lend a hand to the exhausted local people.

Awaiting the time when storage facilities are available, several truck loads of furniture, household goods, clothing, etc. have been assembled here, Judge Jones reported. The materials will be needed in time but are being withheld pending advice from Sanderson relief workers to avoid over crowding storage facilities.

"It is very important that men who will volunteer for work in Sanderson call the sheriff's office here at once," Judge Jones said. "We hope there will be more volunteers than we can transport."

Rabies Outbreak Sends Dozens Of Ozonans for Shot

A dozen or more persons and possibly that many or more dogs will have rabies shots and boosters as a result of the death early this week of a 4 months old sheep dog puppy belonging to the Byron Stuart family.

After the dog's death while Mrs. Stuart was on her way with him to the veterinarian the vet suspected rabies and sent the dog's head to the State laboratory at Austin for examination. A report of positive rabies came back Tuesday and the neighborhood was immediately alerted. All members of the Stuart family, neighboring children and adults who may have handled or touched the dog, all are taking shots. Owners of dogs in the neighborhood also are having their dogs vaccinated.

So far as the Stuart family knows, however, the puppy did not bite anyone or any dog. But he was sick for several days and members of the family handled him and some of the neighborhood children also came in contact with the animal.

Mr. and Mrs. Jim Doran yesterday were watching a small dog of theirs which is showing many of the same symptoms as Stuart's dog. If this animal should show positive rabid it will mean the number of Ozonans taking rabies shots will be sharply increased.

Residents report a town-wide invasion by skunks and it is believed the rabies may be being spread by these animals.

Sheriff Billy Mills and his staff yesterday were busy checking reports of sick animals and assisting in notifying all persons suspected of having come in contact with the infected dogs. Ozonans are urged to be on the lookout for invading wild varmints and to protect their pets as far as possible from such animals.

HALF-HEARTED MEN?

After the attack on Pearl Harbor in December, 1941, recruiting offices across this land were swamped with volunteers. Now at a time when enemy forces are daily attacking us and our allies in various parts of the world, Defense Department officials advise that military conscription must be continued, and that a pay raise (which might be justified for other reasons) plus special bonuses are needed to induce men to join and remain in our armed forces.

Does this mean that young men of today are somewhat lacking in those senses of responsibility and patriotism which rallied their fathers and uncles to the Nation's cause a generation ago? With the exception of the beatnik and degenerate element (which also had its counterpart during World War II), we don't think this is the case at all.

A more significant factor, in our opinion, is the difference between the Nation's cause of a generation ago and now. Victory was our goal in World War II; today the declared objective of our military commitment is "unconditional discussion." Is such a vague purpose worthy of a sensible man's dedication — and the risk of his life in battle?

Swivel-chair civilian strategists in State Department and the Pentagon may be enthused to try out their theories in far off Vietnam. But who in his right mind wants to risk his own neck for some grey flannel field marshal's political experiments?

The popular reaction to President Johnson's initial actions in the Dominican crisis offers a clue to what is required to spark young Americans to "rally round" the flag — clearcut objectives and decisive action, instead of the uncertain trumpet.

If and when the commander-in-chief makes clear that from here on we will strike the enemy down when he attacks, instead of pussyfooting around as we've been doing in Vietnam, we predict that most young Americans will demonstrate as much loyalty and dedication as did their fathers and grandfathers before them.

Stouthearted men cannot be expected to rally in support of half-hearted policies.

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — a total of 33 interim study committee were created during the recent legislative session.

Meetings of these committees will bring most of the legislators back to Austin during the next 18 months.

Studies will cover a wide area ranging from state and local tax policy to such subjects as livestock auctions and restorations of Santa Anna's battle flag.

Some committees will delve into: election laws, juvenile crime, rights of news media in reporting on persons charged with crime, liquor laws, the nursing profession, problems of farmers and ranchers, feasibility of a Pleasure Island State Park, public education, facilities for the criminally insane, and need for modernizing state fair facilities.

Governor Vetoes Spending — Gov. Connally red pencilled \$2,600,000 of what he termed non-essential items in the \$3,600,000 state budget for 1966-67.

Connally said he felt the Legislature in general appropriated wisely, but he lined item vetoed those he felt non-essential.

Lions and Cattle — A possible outbreak of Q fever has been averted by an alert Dallas veterinarian, U. S. Department of Agriculture animal diseases eradication officials say. A Nubian lion imposed to the Dallas zoo was found by Dr. Jack M. Brundrett to be carrying a Hemaphysalis leachi tick which carries the dread disease, as well as typhus fever.

Dr. S. K. Harris, acting veterinarian in charge of the Animal Inspection and Quarantine Division, also reports real progress being made in the back-tagging program for locating cattle with brucellosis.

During May, back tags were applied to 86,294 animals, providing information by which brucellosis can be traced back to the farm where the cattle originated.

Testing at auction markets reached 25,217 head of cattle of which 688 were reactors. Slaughter establishments found 730 reactors among 24,080 back-tagged animals which reached the federal, municipal and state inspected establishments.

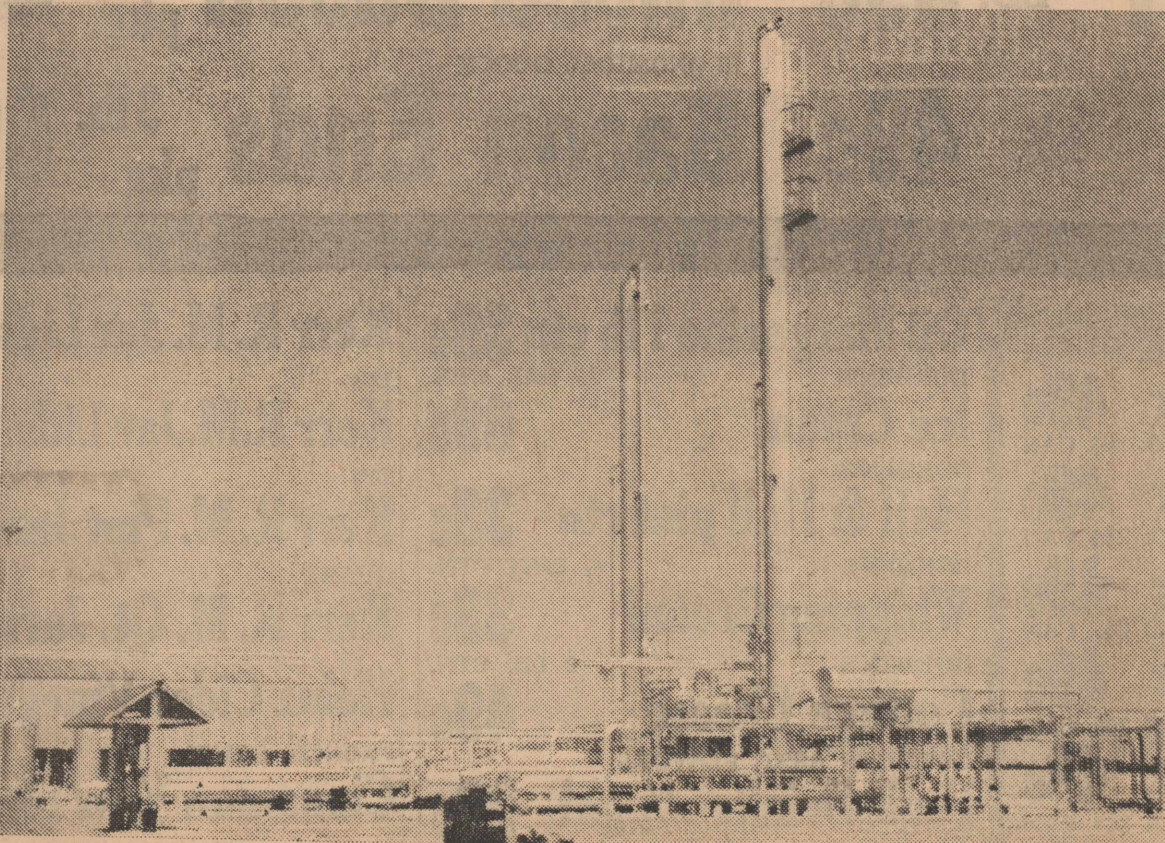

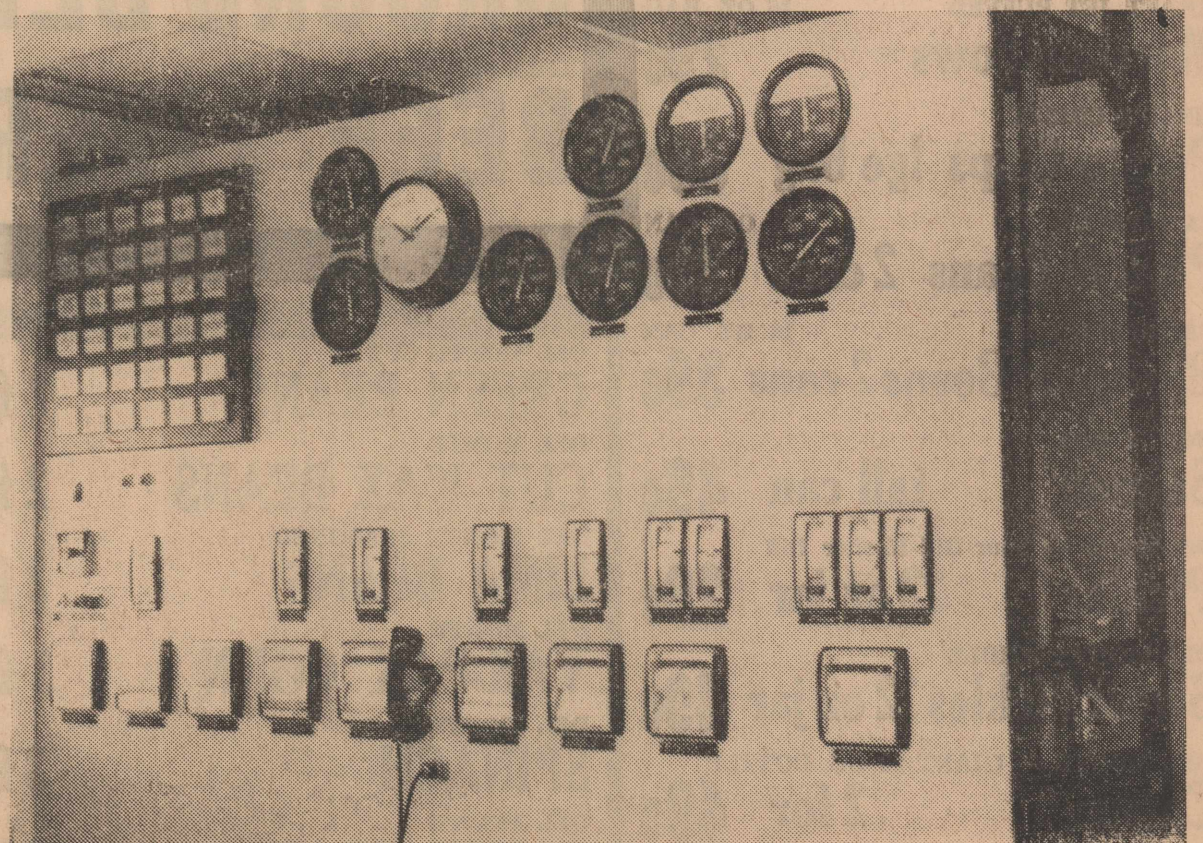

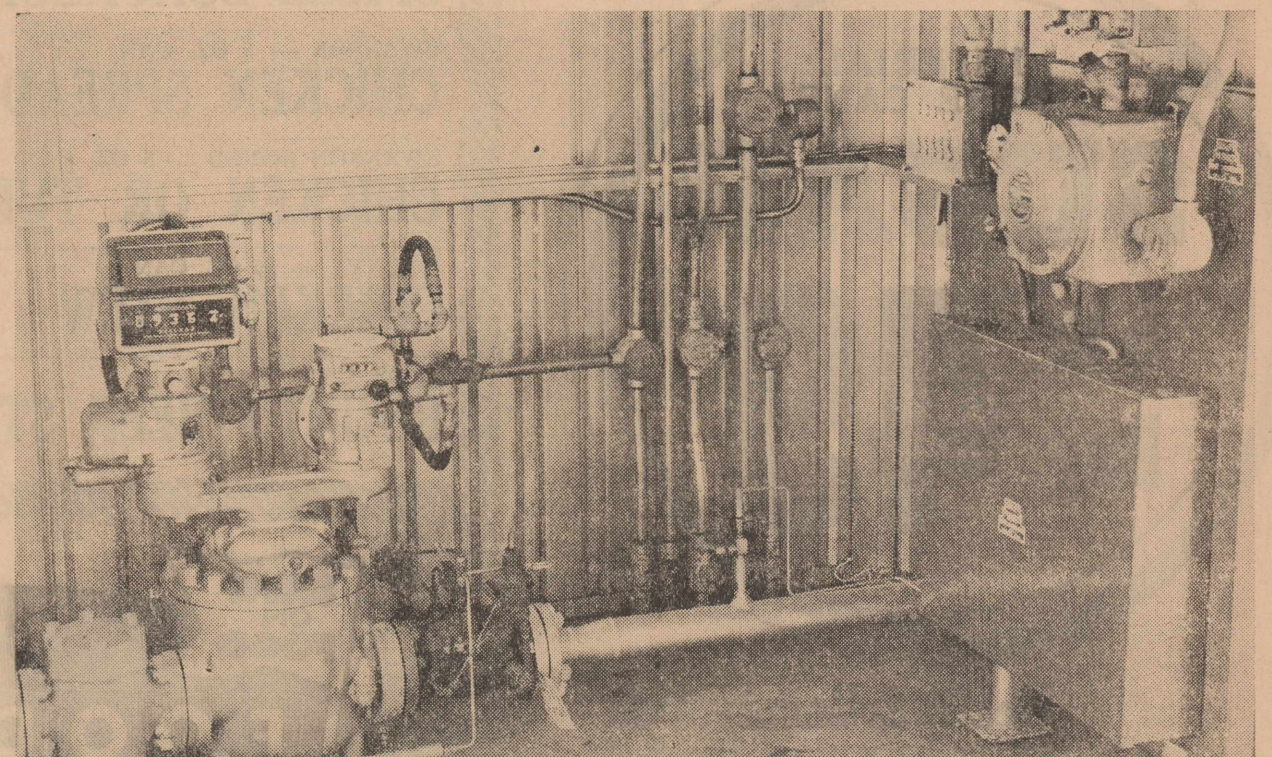


UP, UP, UP the deethanizer and debutanizer columns rise above the area. In these columns the feed is fractionated into LPG and natural gasoline products.

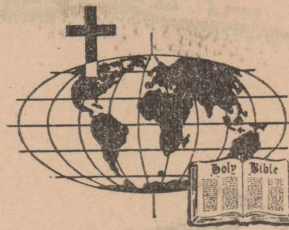

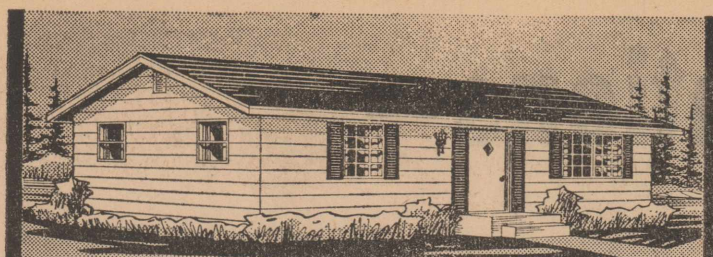

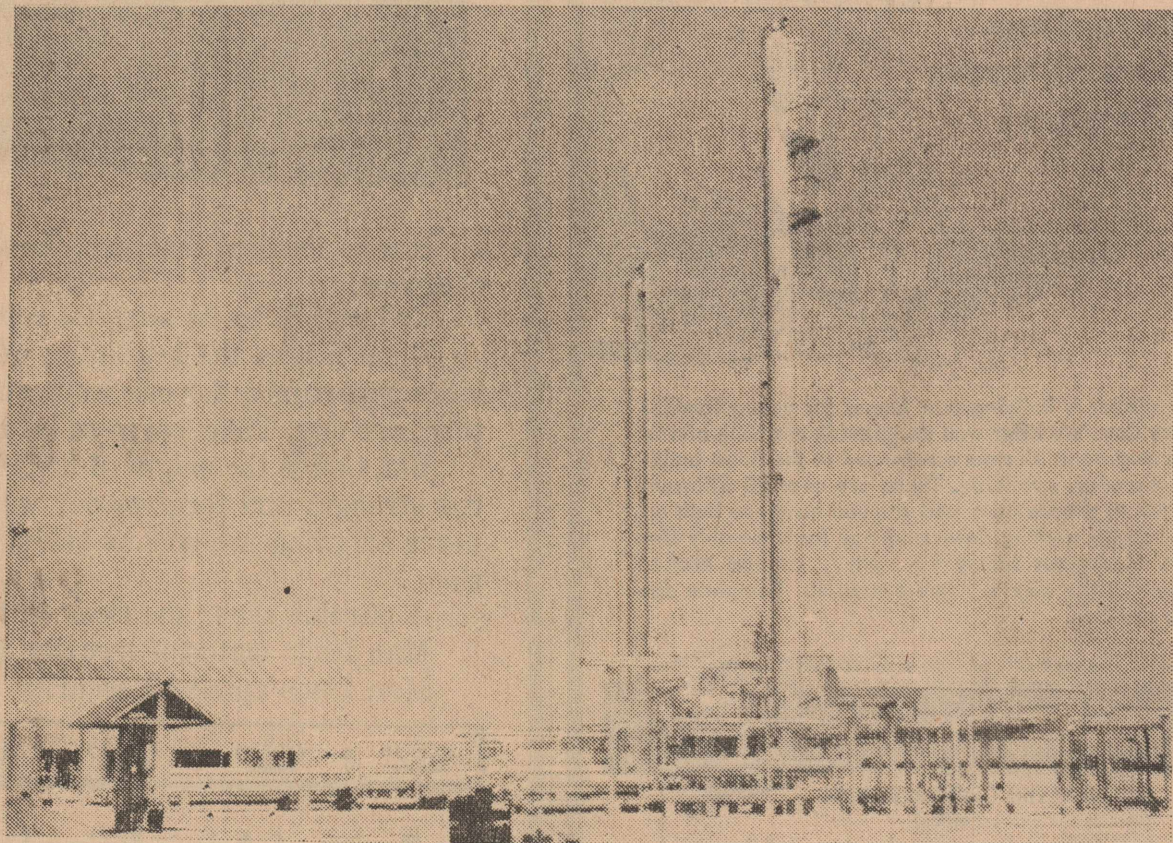

Sonora Diamond Jubilee Planned August 15 To 21

Sonora, Texas — Residents of Sonora and Sutton County will turn the calendar back 75 years August 15-21 when they observe the Diamond Anniversary of this West Texas community whose history outlows in as colorful as any in the West.

Old-fashioned fun and general hullabaloo will be the theme of the six-day celebration which will feature town-wide decoration, costume and beard contests, shoot-outs and other activities during the week.

The Diamond Jubilee celebration will begin Sunday afternoon, August 15, with an old-time basket dinner, preaching and hymn-singing on the lawn of the Sutton County courthouse Dr. Andrew Edginton, president of Schreiner Institute, Kerrville will preach the sermon.

An open house and reception is scheduled for Friday, August 20, with former residents, members of pioneer families, and out of town guests as honorees.

The Jubilee Parade, with bands, wagons, antique cars and other entries, will be held on Saturday morning and is to be followed by a barbecue. A pageant depicting the history of the town and county will be presented Friday and Saturday nights at the Sonora Park and Horse Show grounds. Street dancing is scheduled for Saturday night with floor shows at intermissions.

Sonora, once the hang-out of such Western badmen as Will Carver, Black Jack Ketchum, Kid Curry, King Fisher and John Wesley Hardin, was founded in 1890 by the late Charles A. Adams shortly after the creation of Sutton County from a portion of Crockett County. The area was settled by sheepmen and is now one of the largest wool and mohair producing counties in Texas.

Sonora is the burial place of Will Garver, member of the notorious Hole-in-the-Wall Gang also known as the Wild Bunch from Robber's Roost. Carver was killed in downtown Sonora April 2, 1901 in a gun battle with then Sutton County Sheriff E. S. (Lije) Briant, one of West Texas' most famed law enforcement officials. The stone on Carver's grave in Sonora Cemetery bears only the date of his death.

Sikes To Have Part In Workshop For School Supts.

Austin, Texas — Nine Texas school superintendents will conduct sessions on administrative decision-making during a workshop Monday through Wednesday (June 28-30) at The University of Texas.

"Decisions in Communities" will be discussed by Dr. Thomas with the assistance of Q. M. Martin of Carthage (Tuesday) and L. J. Edmondson of Pampa and H. S. Pearson of Calvert (Wednesday).

Dr. Harris will conduct sessions on "Decisions in Sulphur" with Tom Linam of Sulphur Springs (Tuesday) and J. C. Rogers of Lamar Consolidated, Richmond-Rosenberg, and C. L. West of Odom (Wednesday).

Exercises on individual decision-making will be the focus of "Decisions at Desks" conducted by Dr. Bessent with S. M. Anderson of Big Spring (Tuesday) and Neal B. Dillman of Muleshoe and R. R. King of Vernon (Wednesday).

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members."

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible."

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

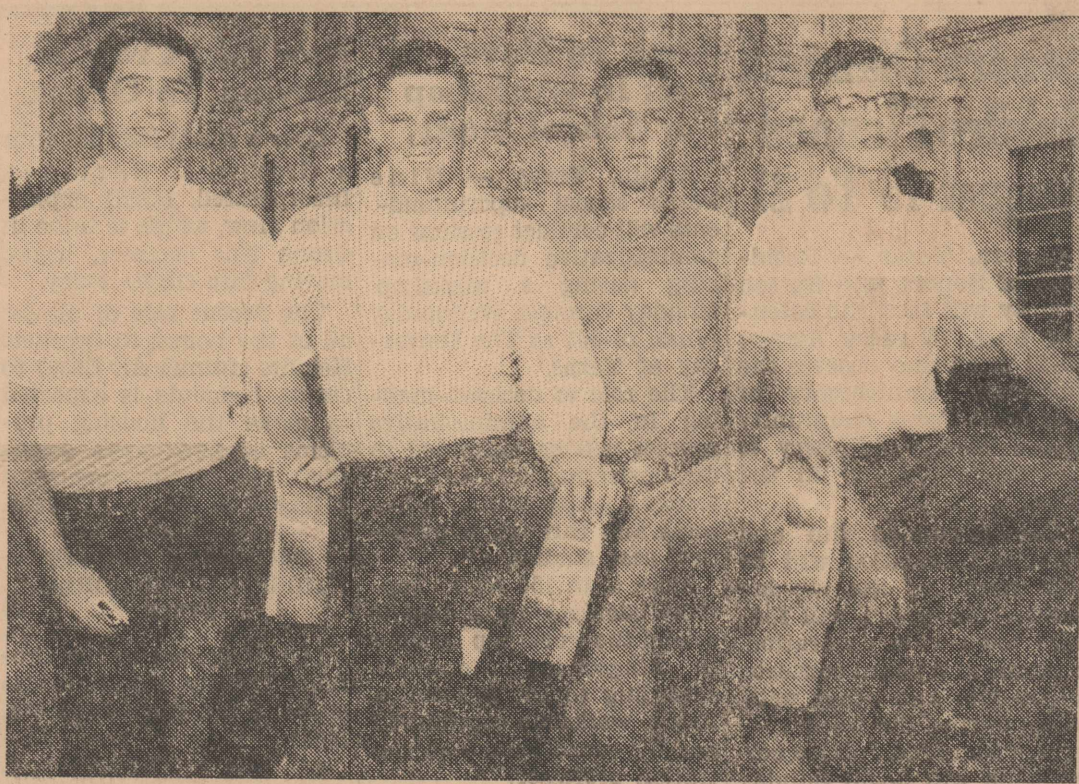

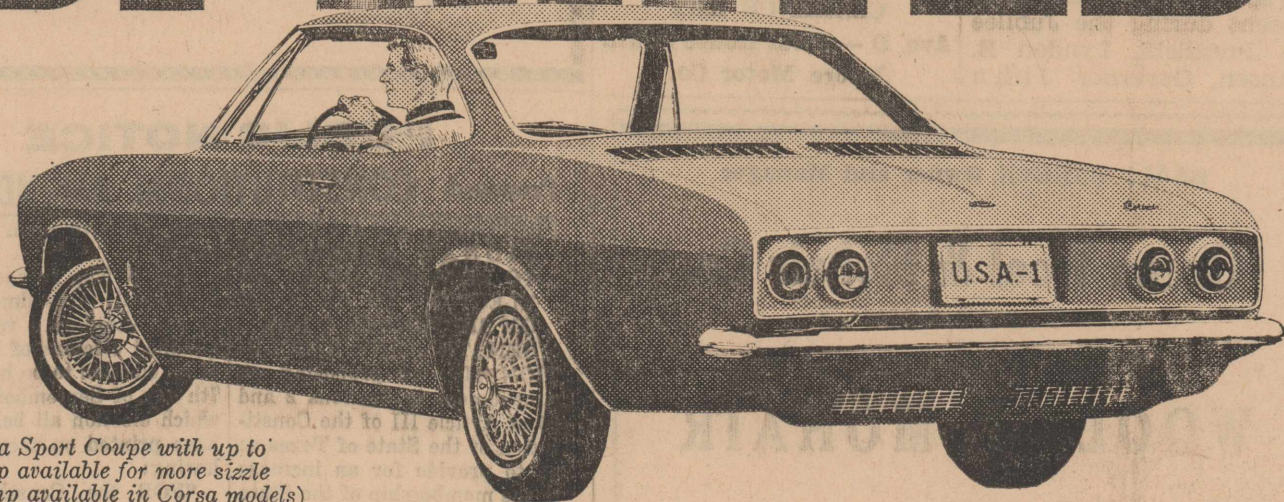
