#### PEACE THROUGH NATIONAL POWER

Secretary of State Dean Rusk ha sannounced that he is willing to have the Vietcong sit in on negotiations chairman of the Citizens for peace in Vietnam, even though he doesn't expect the Communists to be interested in negotiations until after they have spent the summer trying to win the war. We note also that Mr. Rusk and some of his underlings have spent considerable time lately in private discourse with Soviet officials. And despite public saber-rattling by the Kremlin, it has been reported that our officials find those private conferences quite encouraging — if not toward quick settlement in Vietnam, perhaps toward some larger accord with the

way for ending that war. Well, it's rather difficult for us to understand this official policy of trying to pinpointed one of the reasons in a speech he made last March. He said:

"Today Arms Control efforts are adversely affecting our national policy and military posture, from stratgey to weapons in my opinion. This influence is one of the most pervasive of all the forces at work today in restricting a more positive national policy worthy of the United States"

The retired general, who has certainly been in a position to know such things, is convinced that some of our civilian officials in the Defence Department are more interested in their "arms control and disarmament" theories than they are in maintaining adequate military preparedness, or in defeating Communists in Vietnam and elsewhere. He advised that in their quest for peace, the proponents of disarmament should remember that "the peace of the world, as far as overt conflict is concerned, has been maintained for nearly two decades primarily by the preponderant power of American Arms and American Industry. Let us be sure of the soundness of any substitute before we destroy or degrade this power."

Somehow this makes more sense to us than trynig to negotiate a disarmament agreement with Commuists on the one hand, while having to fight them on the other.


