From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas-Gov. John Connally's sudden cancellation of plans to go to Japan and Viet Nam this week added a note of tension to the Austin scene.

Connally's statement indicates that he sees the possibility of a special session of the Legislature on congressional legislative redistricting or voter registration.

"We are awaiting federal court decisions on the poll tax, congressional redistricting and House redistricting, any one of which could cause action on my part within the next few weeks," Connally stated.

If federal judges throw out either congressional or house reapportionment acts of the 59th Legislature — without specifically additional time for redrawing lines in regular sesion — Connally may have to call a hurry-up session before the early 1966 filing deadline.

Should the federal courts invalidate the poll tax as a voting requirement, Texas could be left without a voter registration procedure. This, too, could make a special session necessary on short notice.

Hearing on the attorney general's suit attacking the poll tax is not until mid-November.






