Early Mailing Overseas Gift Packages Urged

Floyd Hokit, postmaster, announced some suggestions concerning overseas Christmas packages earlier this week.

Overseas packages should be mailed by November 11, unless sent air-mail and then should be mailed not later than December 10, to insure Christmas delivery.

Packages to Alaska and Hawaii need to be mailed by November 30, or by December 15, if sent air-mail. All APO numbers have been changed to 5 digits which are identical to Zip Code and should be included in the address.

In wrapping packages, use wood, metal or heavy corrugated board. Fill carton so goods will not shift around and use plenty of cushioning material. Wrap with heavy paper and strong cord. Place another address on the inside of package.

Some packages will have to have customs tags attached, Hokit said, and stated

further that if senders will check with the post office well in advance tags will be furnished if necessary. This regulation does not apply to all APO numbers.

Matches and lighter fluid are prohibited items. Tobacco products are prohibited to some countries, so check with the post office before mailing.

Anyone who has any question about overseas mailing is asked to call or check at the post office.



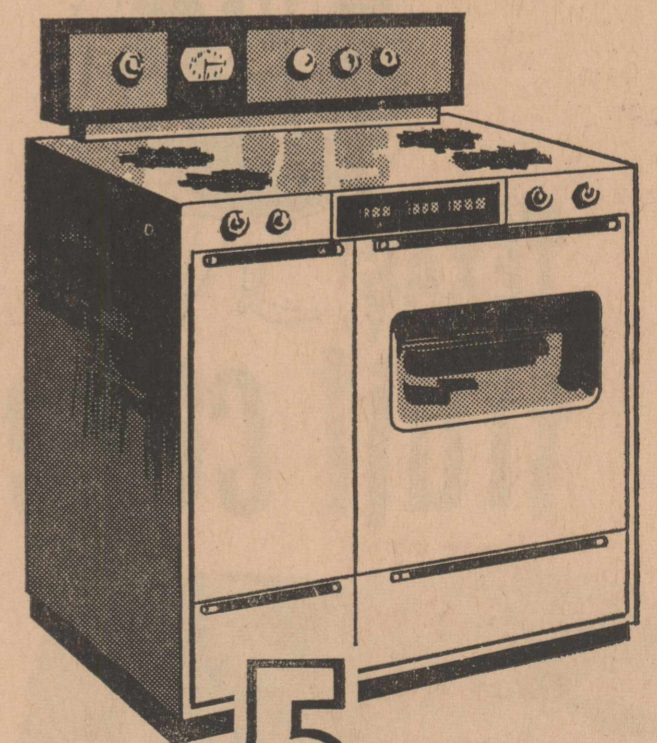

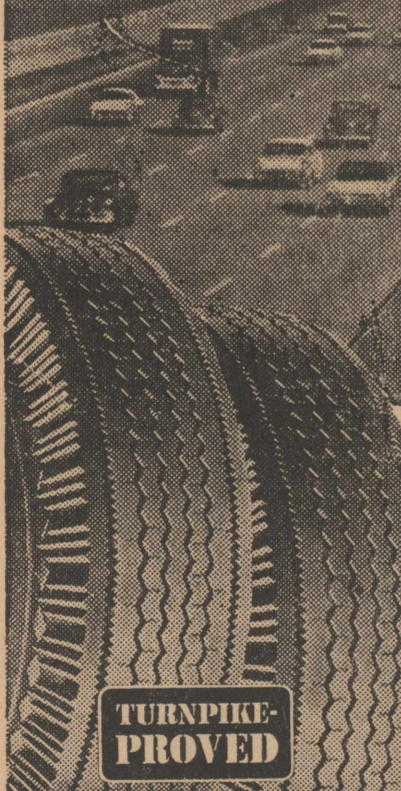

REGISTRATION BEGINS FOR NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP TEST

Students who expect to complete their secondary school requirements at Ozona High School and enter college in 1967 can register now at the school office for the 1966-1967 National Merit Scholarship Program, Principal Mr. J. A. Peltó announced today.

The first step for all students who wish to enter the nationwide competition is to take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT), which will be given in the school at 9:00 a. m. Saturday, February 26, 1966.

The highest-scoring students in each state will be named Semifinalists and will receive further consideration in the Merit Program. In addition to these awards made

by NMSC, more than 280 business corporations, foundations, colleges, professional associations, unions, trusts, other organizations, and individuals give scholarships through the Merit Program.

Some 2,000 Merit Scholarships were awarded last year with stipends ranging from \$400 to \$6,000 for four college years. A winner's stipend is determined by assessing the amount of financial assistance he will need at the college he will attend.

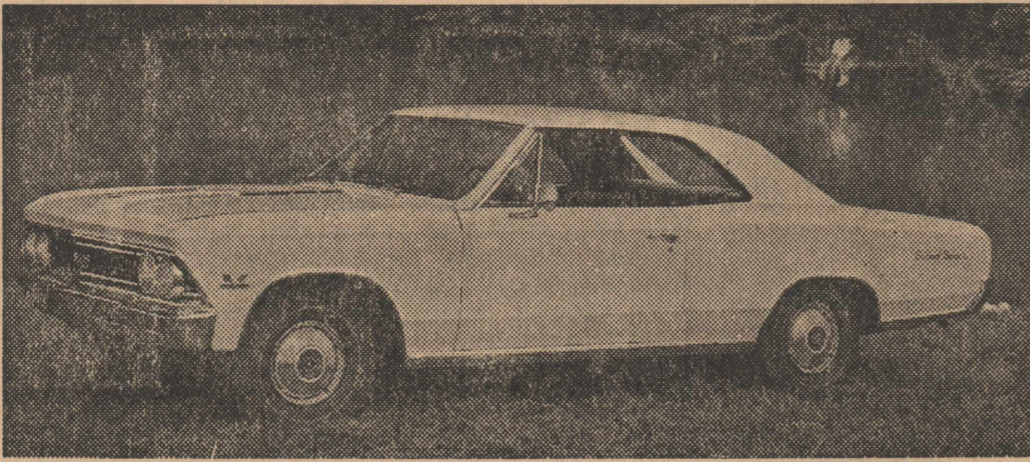

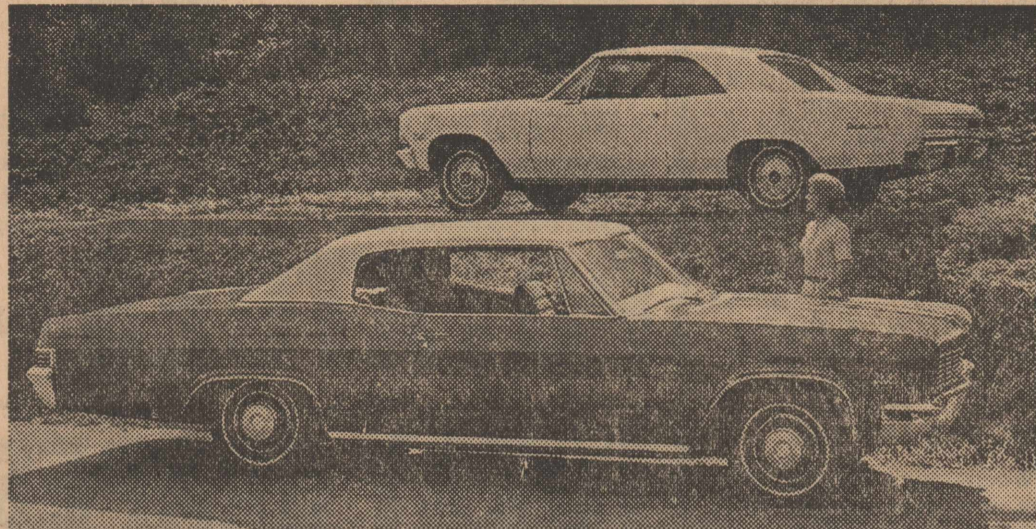

TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN by Vera Sanford

Wax Car — Wax Gun — Guns stay shiny if you wax 'em every time you wax your car. The hard-gloss wax gives guns and cars the same protection and beauty.

Penlight Useful — Handy around camp — and a big help to the fisherman too — is a small penlight. Hang it on a cord around your neck. Then you always have a light, but you don't lose a hand holding it. Real handy when it comes to tying on hooks, swivels, lures, etc at night. In such cases fishermen often place the penlight in the mouth so the rays go directly where they are looking.

Preserving Leather - Here's a modern version of an old Indian formula for preserving leather hunting boots. Mix a half pint of carbon tetrachloride with five spoonfuls of deer tallow and blend until mixture is smooth. Rub down leather goods with the liquid. Carbon-tet allows tallow to flow and be absorbed. Deer tallow keeps leather soft and pliable.

Quickie Dishwasher-Dryer — Take a mesh onion bag your next camping trip. After dinner put silverware therein and dip in boiling water. Let dry in a tree. No work, no worry, no waste.

Easy way to Dry Line — Thread a needle with the end of your nylon fishing line, then run it through a sponge.

Draw line through sponge and you've got it really dry.

Emergency Line Guide — What do you do when you're on a fishing trip and you break a line guide on your only fishing rod? Here's one answer to the problem. Just clip the catch section off a safety pin. Bend shank so legs project both ways from eye. Lash these legs to rod with monofilament. Works great!

Substitute Shearpin — Among the many items that can be used temporarily to replace a shear pin is a fish hook (or a couple of fish hooks).

Double-Tie Boot Laces — Walk through the woods and you know what happens to boot laces. They frequently become untied. Stop this quick by tying large bows, then tying the bows. Looping one bow through the other holds laces fast. Still they untie easily at day's end.
