Officers were notified and they in turn alerted officers in other counties. However, with at least a 12-hour head-start, the couple had not been apprehended at press time.

Local officers have received information that the couple headed west from Ozona. They are confident that they will be in custody in the next few days.

Lion Cagers To Sanderson Fri. For Dist. Opener

The Ozona Lions travel to Sanderson tomorrow night for their first district clash. The Lions, sporting a 2-2 record prior to Tuesday's game with Eldorado, split in games with Mertzon and Crane in action last week.

The Lions, handicapped by fouls, beat a hard-fighting Mertzon crew 55-49. With a total of 33 personal fouls, the Lions were never able to build up a substantial lead against the Mertzon 5. High point man and top rebounder for Ozona was Win Saunders with 20 points and 12 rebounds. Saunders was followed by Pon Seahorn with 10 points.

In Crane last Friday, the Lions dropped a hard fought decision to the big, talented Cranes. Sparked by their 6'5" ace, Bob McKay, who scored 39 points, Crane used their superior height to great advantage to come out with a 71-55 win over the Lions. Coach Brooks Dozier felt that his crew had played one of its better ball games of the young season.

Ozona trailed 56-50 with a little over 4 minutes to play and hit nearly 45% from the field, but Crane hit a phenomenal 62% in the fast moving game. Guard Billy Carson led the Lion attack with 16 points, while Rex Bland and Saunders chipped in with 11 and 10 respectively.

The Lions travel to Mertzon this Tuesday to engage the Hornets in a return bout. This will be the last game for the Lions before the Christmas Holidays. Then, on the 27th of December the Lions will enter the Brownwood Tournament.

Directors Vote To Hire Rogers Co. For Jubilee

Eleven directors of the forthcoming Diamond Jubilee met at the high school last Saturday afternoon and voted to employ the Rogers Producing Co. of Fostoria, Ohio, to co-ordinate the celebration. Seven voted for, and one against with the remainder abstaining.

James Baggett, chairman, called the meeting to order and asked Mel Eckerstrom, representative of the Rogers Co., to outline the celebration program. Eckerstrom went over the entire program again for the benefit of those who did not attend the meeting the previous week.

There was a question and answer period during which such questions as "can the celebration be condensed to a three-day period?", "where will the 5,450 people come from who are estimated as attending the pageant?", "if the celebration is not a financial success, who will pay the difference?" and "can the Rogers Plan of Action be altered?"

Eckerstrom advised against cutting the celebration down to a three-day period but did not rule out the possibility. He said the attendance figure was derived from expected participation of the surrounding towns and trade territory. Eckerstrom said the Rogers Co. had never had a financial failure when the proposed plan of action was followed to the letter and the citizens gave 100% co-operation.

The group was sharply divided on the time element, however, voted 7 to 1 to adopt the plan after a motion was made by James Baggett and seconded by Bill Seahorn.

In the near future a Rogers Co. representative will meet with different organizations and clubs and make final decisions as to changes in the proposal and time to be covered by the celebration.

Lionettes Win Consolation At Garden City

The Ozona Lionettes won the consolation championship at the Garden City Tournament last week-end. In the opening game, the Ozona fems lost to Norton 56-43.

In the first game of the consolation bracket, Lakeview B moved out to a 16-2 lead before Ozona made its move. With Lana Alford, Lynn Cox, and Mary Payne finding the basket with regularity, the gls won 45-44.

In the consolation championship game, the starting six for Ozona only played half of the game as the Lionettes romped to a 49-20 win over Sterling City. Good defensive play by Vicki Montgomery, Lynn Cox, Connie Williams, and Diltzie Bland helped the Lionettes.

Lana Alford, senior forward, led the scoring with 73 points in 3 games. Lana hit for 24, 21, and 28 points and made the All-Tournament team.

This past Tuesday night, the Lionettes were hosts to the powerful Eldorado sextet. Tomorrow night the girls will begin District play when they travel to Sanderson.

Commissioners Propose 20 Pct. Salary Hike For County Officials

Officials Study Texas Criminal Code Provisions

To better familiarize themselves with recent changes in the Texas Criminal Code, to go into effect January 1, 1966, several Crockett county and judicial district officers have attended one or more recent institutes and seminars presented by the Attorney General of Texas and the Law School of the University of Texas.

Among those attending such instructional institutes have been Sheriff Billy Mills, Deputies Levon Parker and Jack Hyde, Justice of the Peace A. O. Fields, County Attorney Fred Chandler and District Attorney Dixon Mahon.

All the participants agree that procedure from arrest to trial has been further complicated by the new code. District Attorney Mahon states that Justice of the Peace A. O. Fields had the most to gain from these sessions as his job concerning arraignment and examining trials of persons accused of felonies has progressed to a point where one procedural misstep will lead to complete freedom for the criminal.

Mahon also said that this applies to the law enforcement officers to a great degree in making arrests, taking voluntary statements and confessions.

Ozonans' Grandson Named Outstanding Hi School Student

Mike Allen, 18-year-old senior in Redbank High School in Chattanooga, Tenn. son of Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Allen of that city and a grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Perner of Ozona, has been named "outstanding student" from his high school by the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame of Chattanooga University, according to an article appearing in the Chattanooga press.

The Foundation makes nominations of one outstanding student from each of the 35 high schools in the area on recommendation of the coaches, and principals. Selection is based on athletic ability, scholarship and leadership abilities.

Young Allen was a tackle on the Redbank High School football team, a member of the Key Club, Letterman's Club, won an award as an outstanding track star and was member of a national honorary society. Scholastically he ranked 8th in a class of 276.

Locate Wildcat Test In Crockett

Greathouse, Pierce & Davis, Midland, will drill a 7,800-foot wildcat in Crockett County, 12 miles northeast of Ozona and 1 1/2 miles southwest of a one-well 12-mile northeast extension area of the Ozona (Canyon sand gas) field. It is the No. 1 Bailey.

Location is 660 feet from the north and east lines of 2-GH-GC&SF. Ground elevation is 2,429 feet.

It is also 1 1/4 miles southeast of Shell Oil Co. 1 J. R. Bailey Estate, an 8,012-foot failure, abandoned July 23, 1964, after unsuccessful tests of the Canyon through perforations to 7,649 to 7,765 feet.

Girl Scouts To Sing Carols In Park Tues. Night

One hundred and seventy-five girls will take part in the singing of ten carols while Cadette Troop 19 pose in the Nativity Scene under the direction of Mrs. Dorothy Price. Every Girl Scout troop in the Ozona Chapter will take part in the presentation, from Brownies up.

After the caroling, the girls will go to the Civic Center for a Christmas party.

Mrs. Max Morris and Miss Ethel Wolf are co-chairmen for the project. They urge the public to attend and join them in the park or enjoy the presentation from their cars. In case of inclement weather, the entire group will be moved to the Civic Center.

Shell Spots 4th Mitchell Test In Southwest Crockett

Shell Oil Co. will drill the No. 4 Mitchell as a 1 1/4-mile south outpost to its No. 1 Mitchell, opener and lone producer in the JM (Ellenburger gas) field of southwest Crockett County, 34 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location, on a 16,645-acre lease, is 2,100 feet from the south and 2,300 feet from the west lines of 10-3-TCRR. Contrace depth is 16,000 feet; derrick floor elevation, 2,300 feet.

The discovery was finalized Oct. 21 for a calculated absolute open flow of 130 million cubic feet of gas per day from open hole between 12,105-13,700 feet.

Judging Christmas Home Decorations Friday Evening

Tomorrow at 7 p. m. judging will begin in the Ozona Garden Club sponsored "Christmas Decorations of Homes" contest. Big Lake judges will be on hand.

Midland Man To Speak At Rotary Banquet Fri. Night

J. W. Miller, president of Globe Exploration Co. of Midland, will be the speaker at the annual Ladies Night Banquet of the Ozona Rotary Club Friday night.

The banquet will be at the high school cafeteria starting at 7 p. m. Mr. Miller will be accompanied to Ozona by Joe Bailey, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Bailey, and will be a guest in the Bailey home for an overnight stay Friday night.

will draw a total of \$5,250 per year, salary and expense allowance, against a former total of \$4,525.

Other county officers to draw raises were the Sheriff assessor and collector of taxes, whose present maximum salary of \$6,870 per year will be raised to \$8,244, and the county and district clerk, whose present maximum salary of \$6,750 will be raised to \$8,100.

The raises in salary above present maximums allowed under state law will be made possible under application of a new law, House Bill 374, passed by the recent session of the Texas Legislature, providing a 20 percent allowable increase in county salaries where authorized by Commissioners Courts.

Precinct 1 Justice of the Peace salary will also be raised 20 percent, from the present \$3,300 to \$3,960 per year. Although the J. P. office collects much more than the salary item, the office is on a salary basis, none of the fees from fines going directly to the office.

County Commissioners salaries are presently \$3,625 per year, plus a \$75 per month car expense allowance. The salary raise will be to \$4,350, plus the same car expense allowance. No expense allowances are given other officers except the county judge, whose car expense allowance is \$50 per month. Cars are furnished the sheriff's office, of course. No changes were proposed in salaries of the county judge, now \$6750 per year; the county attorney, now \$4,200 a year, nor the county treasurer, now \$3,150 per year.

County Commissioners can not raise their own salaries without at the same time raising a like percentage amount the salary of at least one other elective county officer. Notice of the proposed raise must be published twice in a newspaper after the court approves the proposed raise.

Junior Hi Cage Squads Register Wins at Barnhart

Ozona Junior High 7th and 8th grade basketball squads both chalked up wins last Thursday night against Barnhart. A much improved seventh grade squad won by a score of 28-18 while the eighth grade squad got a 34-28 win, their first of the season.

In a rematch with Sonora Monday night the seventh grade squad remained undefeated with a score of 26-19 while the eighth grade suffered a 28-35 loss.

Both teams are improving steadily with David Pagan leading the pack in scoring. They will play in Barnhart tonight with the first game starting at 5:30 p. m. There will be no games during the holiday period.

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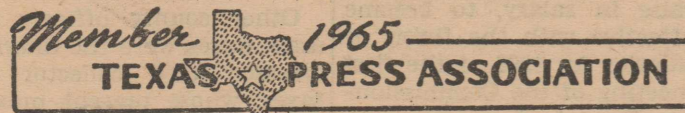

FALSE WITNESS

One of the disturbing signs of these times is the readiness of some supposedly intelligent and responsible persons to accept and publicize, without question, an accused lawbreaker's claim that he was abused by the police. Take the case in Jackson, Mississippi, last June, when several hundred persons were arrested while picketing the State Legislature, for parading without permit and refusing to disperse when so ordered. Agents of the US Justice Department, "civil rights" attorneys and representatives of national news media were on hand during arrest and confinement of the demonstrators. None of them reported any undue force used by the police. But then a 3-man committee from the National Council of Churches talked with demonstrator-prisoners for only two hours (by their own statements), and thereafter presented to a group of US Congressmen their "official" report charging the Jackson police with "Hitlerite" tactics, including gassing and beating of prisoners, kicking

pregnant women in the stomachs, forcing women to undress in front of policemen, denial of food and medical treatment, and other such atrocities.

Headlines of several prominent newspapers blared this "news," TV commentators on nationwide networks "sorrowfully" reported it, several members of Congress from other regions deplored the "police state" situation in the South which it seemed to represent — all without checking or waiting for proper authorities to check the validity of those charges against the Jackson police. Meanwhile, the Mayor of Jackson and Mississippi State officials were demanding a Federal investigation to clear up the matter.

That investigation was completed many weeks ago, and not one single charge against the Jackson police has been filed by the Justice Department. But we haven't seen any banner headlines announcing their exonera-

tion of the NCC group's accusations. We've heard no apologies or corrections from any of the commentators or Congressmen who propagated those false stories across the nation. Nor have we seen any sign that those "clergymen" who made up the NCC committee have done anything to atone for bearing false witness against the policemen of that Southern city.

There is a warning note in all this for every community in the land. While the Southern states and communities have been the main targets so far, false charges of police brutality are now being made in other areas, too. The FBI has investigated 1787 such allegations this year. Only 13 were found to warrant indictments. It is understandable that an accused lawbreaker might in turn accuse the police of mistreating him. But when clergymen, newsmen and public officials promote charges of police brutality without first making sure of the facts, there is reason for the rest of us to question either their intelligence or their motives.

Phone Excise Tax To Be Cut Jan. 1

All telephone bills will be reduced effective January 1, 1966, E. H. Danner, president of General Telephone of the Southwest and Southwestern States Telephone Companies, reminded telephone customers this week. The Federal excise tax on local telephone service and long distance calls will be lowered from the present 10 per cent to 3 per cent as a result of legislation approved by Congress and signed into law last summer. On each succeeding January 1 an additional 1 per cent cut will occur so that by 1969 the entire 10 per cent Federal excise tax on telephone service will be ended.

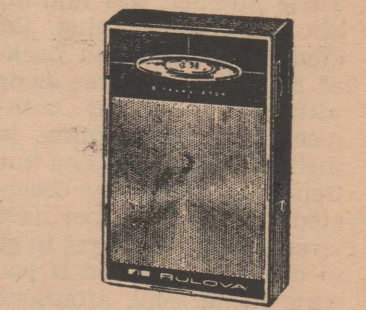
