





Rothstein began betting at odds 20 to 1 and even 30 to 1. The horse was running in the last race so Rothstein told his agents to wait to bet only a few minutes before the race, so as not to change the odds. However, some of them got anxious and started to bet too soon. Word leaked out and by the time of the race, the odds had dropped to 13 to 5. Sidereal won and paid off \$770,000 to Rothstein, but to his dying day, Rothstein would fly into a rage at the mention of the race and curse the agents who had disobeyed his orders.


