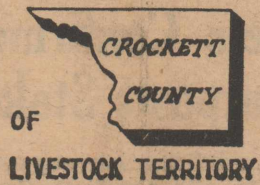

Mother looks puzzled. Boy says, "oh you know Mother, I can't think of his name but one of the titles is a lady's name, it's pretty famous, I think."

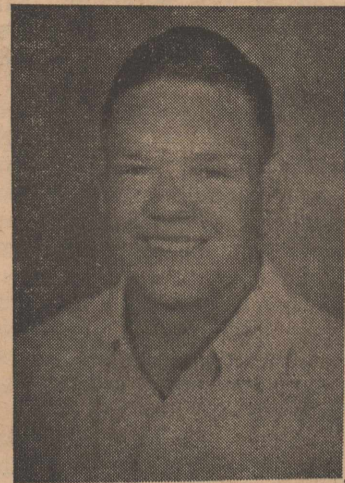
The mother racks her brain for modern English author who has written something with a woman's name as the title and can't come up with the answer.

### Texas Deserves More Than Another 'Yes Man' In The Senate

After carefully examining the literature sent to my desk by both aspirants for the office of U. S. Senator from Texas, to be decided by Texans in the coming election, I have to go along with Democratic Leader of the Senate, Mike Mansfield, when he said of Senator Tower, "He has performed in a way which does credit to the Senate and himself."

I find that Senator Tower can stand on his record over the past six years. He has consistently voted in a manner representing the views of the majority of Texans. I find that he is vitally interested in expediting an honorable end to the war in Viet Nam. His concern lies with the lives of the American boys fighting there, rather than using the conflict as a political football. He passionately believes in the freedom of the individual to make his own choice, as shown when he had the determination to stand up and fight to defend section 14b of the Taft-Hartley law, preserving our state's Right-to-Work law and allowing a man to retain the right to either join or not join a labor union. At present he

has his gun sights trained on inflation and is working to curb unnecessary government spending and hasty ill-conceived welfare programs that cost the taxpayer money and become so bogged down in red tape that they barely get off the ground.

On the other hand, from the three or four pieces of campaign material we get daily from Waggoner Carr's headquarters, I find that at least half of it is devoted to a smear campaign against Senator Tower, one fourth or more gives Mr. Carr's campaign itinerary along with Texas football ratings and about a fourth is taken from some of his political speeches. He really doesn't seem to be running for anything, just against Senator Tower. He recently visited with the President and his family while on a trip to Washington and I have no doubt he would be nice "me too" addition to the present administration.

### Graveside Services In Ozona Cemetery Today for Boyd Cox

After funeral services at 1 p. m. today from the Methodist Church in Rankin, graveside services will be held in Cedar Hill Cemetery in Ozona for Boyd R. Cox, 85, retired ranchman and oil man, who died Tuesday afternoon in the Rankin hospital after a long illness.

Mr. Cox was the husband of a native Ozonan, the former Lilly Perner sister of Mrs. W. R. Baggett, Mrs. Max Schneemann, Mrs. Roy Henderson and Mrs. Hugh Childress, Sr., and of Paul and Stephen Perner, all of Ozona.

Born Oct. 25 in 1881, in Bell County, Mr. Cox had been a West Texas resident most of his lifetime. He had resided in Rankin for the past 38 years. He was for many years livestock inspector for Upton county.

Surviving are the widow of Rankin; a brother, X. B. Cox Sr., of San Angelo; a sister, Mrs. Dove Slaven of San Antonio and several nieces and nephews.

## Lions Breeze To Easy Victory At Sanderson

Ozona mauled the winless Sanderson Eagles last Friday night in Sanderson 48-0 as George Cox spurred to 4 touchdowns while racking up 171 yards rushing in only 9 trips with the ball. After easily racing to a 39-0 advantage at halftime, Lion kicker Beto Ramos hit on 3 of 5 field goal attempts in an effort to hold the score down. Ramos' goals were from 27, 31, and 37 yards out.

The Lions first score came on the first play from scrimmage when Cox broke for 53 yards and the first score. The next time Ozona had the ball, on the first play again Cox went 46 yards for a score.

The third Ozona score came 7 minutes deep in the first quarter when Ramos went from the one. Just before the initial quarter ended, Cox got TD number 4 when he ran a pass interception back 43 yards. Prizes of silver dollars will be awarded the "Spookiest", "Funniest" and most "Original" costumes.

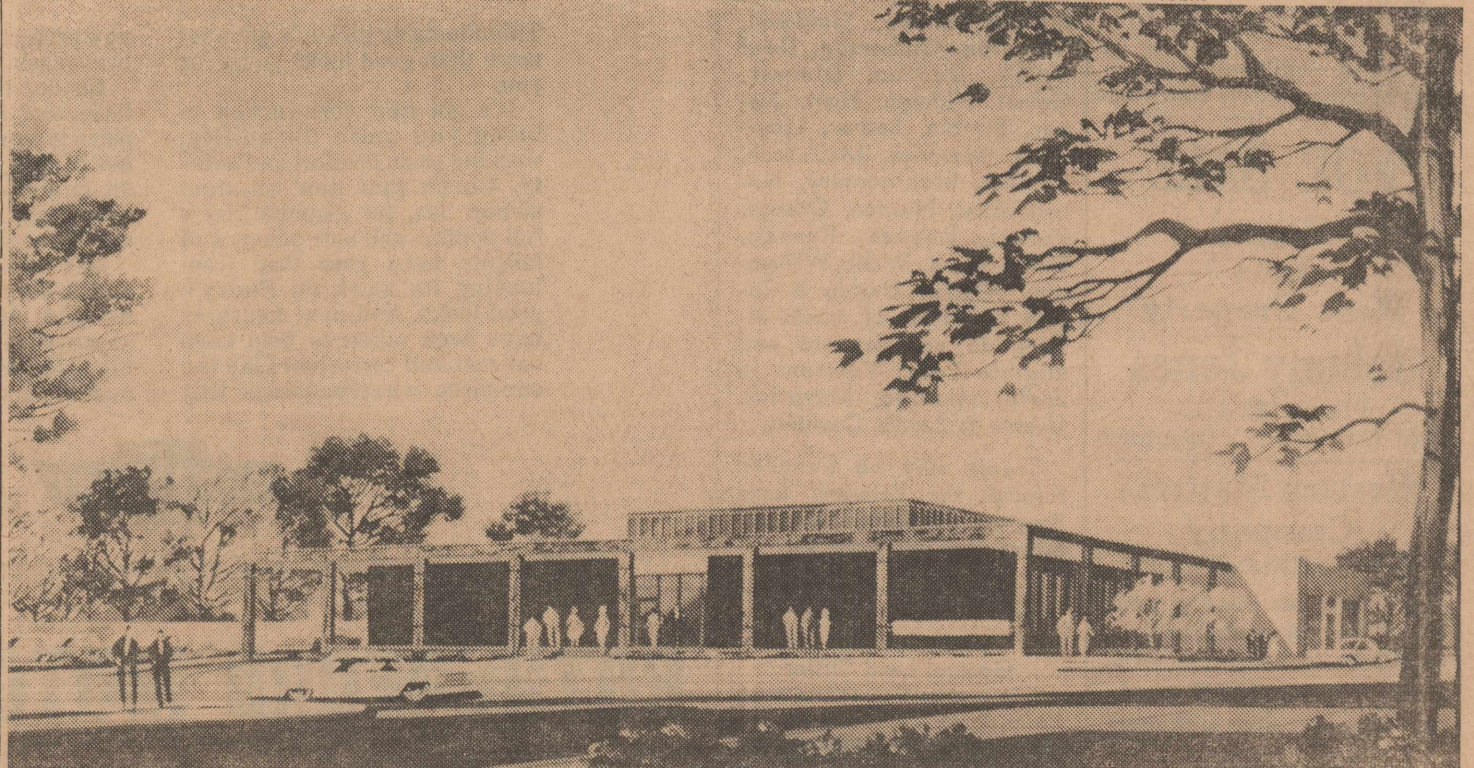
Coming in on defensive will be Coates, Applewhite, and Childress.

**AIDING THE ENEMY**

Should "Americans" be permitted to send blood and money to the Viet Cong? That was the subject of hearings held last month in Washington by the House Committee on Un-American Activities. The report of the Committee on those hearings has just been released.

You remember what happened at the hearings. The Communists, their attorneys and their stooges organized raucous demonstrations in the hearing room and many were removed kicking and screaming by the U. S. Marshals. The demonstrations were staged to focus public attention away from the facts developed in the testimony before the Committee.

Sworn testimony revealed that members and paid employees of the Progressive Labor Party, a group controlled by Red China, were the prime organizers of the campaigns to aid the Viet Cong and to prevent the movement of U. S. troops and supplies to Vietnam. Most of the Communist witnesses readily admitted the facts, while hoping that the demonstrations would keep them from being prominently printed in the newspapers.

The actions of these Reds to help their comrades kill American G.I.'s would be treason if we were at war. But, although Americans are in combat against the Communists, we have not declared war. Therefore these acts go unpunished.

Congressman Pool, of Texas, has introduced a bill to outlaw such activities while the United States is involved in an armed conflict. The Pool bill does not prevent anyone from disagreeing with the administration position on Vietnam, but it does prevent giving aid to the enemy. Mr. Pool was the Subcommittee chairman during last month's hearings.

Spokesmen for the administration, including Deputy Attorney General Ramsey Clark, testified that existing laws cover these acts. If this claim is true, then Mr. Clark and his boss, the departing Attorney General Katzenbach, must have neglected their duties, since no one has been arrested or imprisoned.

Perhaps the new Attorney General should have been asked about this before he was confirmed by the Senate.

**Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen**

**GREEN RICE**

Cook 1 cup quick-cooking rice according to directions on pkg.  
Carefully stir in:  
2 eggs, well beaten  
1 cup milk  
1/4 cup butter (melted)  
1/2 cup sharp cheese (grated)  
1 tbsps. grated onion  
1/3 cup minced parsley  
1/2 cup minced raw spinach  
2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce  
1/2 teas. salt

Pour mixture into greased and floured 2-qt. casserole. Bake at 325 degrees about 45 minutes. Serve hot with meat and salad. Serves 8.

There are many recipes for green rice, but this is the fastest and easiest one I have found and the delightful part about it, it tastes just as good.

**CUB TEAM CHOOSES CAPTAINS FOR YEAR**

Captains for the year were chosen Tuesday for the Cub football team. They are half-back David Pagan, quarterback Jim Montgomery, center Tom Davidson and half-back Gregory Stuart. The four boys were chosen by vote of their teammates.

Frank Mills, father of Crockett County Sheriff Billy Mills, and Mrs. Mills are moving here from Kerrville. Mr. Mills is a former sheriff of Coleman County and a retired Texas Ranger. His duty in the Texas Rangers dates back to 1920.

**Buckhorn Field Gets Confirmer; Outposts Staked**

A confirmation was assured in one Crockett County field and location staked for another; also two outposts were staked to another field.

A 3/4-mile southeast extension and second producer has been assured in the Buckhorn (Ellenburger gas) field, with the flowing of gas and distillate through perforations at Tamarack Petroleum Co. in Midland, No. 1-15 Smith, 14 miles northeast of Ozona.

Tested 24 hours from open hole at 8,137-73 feet, it flowed 76 barrels of condensate and nine barrels of water, plus gas at the daily rate of 1.2 million cubic feet; then tested 24 hours, it made 76 barrels of condensate and nine barrels of water, plus gas at the daily rate of 1.15 million cubic feet daily.

The well was shut in to a wait potential test.

Amended location is 660 feet from the south and west lines of 15-AB-D&SE.

The gas opener, Willets & Craig, Midland, No. 1-16 Smith, former Ellenburger oil producer, was finalized July 24, 1958, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 46 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 23,900-1, through perforations at 7,952-8,086 feet.

Tamarack will drill the No. 1-4 Childress as a 3/4-mile southeast outpost to the No. 1-15 Smith, 1,980 feet from the north and east lines of 4-CD - D&SERR. Contract depth is 8,500 feet; ground elevation 2,495 feet.

The field also formerly

produced oil from the Ellenburger.

Shell Oil Co. was running 7-inch liner at its No. 1-110 Mitchell, in 110-1-11&GN, indicated third producer and 1/2-mile northwest extension to the Crockett County Ellenburger area of the Brown-Basset multipay field, 39 miles southwest of Ozona and seven miles west of the JM (Ellenburger gas) field.

Drilled to 14,810 feet on a 17,000-foot contract, it flowed at the maximum daily rate of 17.4 million cubic feet when drilling reached 13,840 feet.

Ryan Consolidated Petroleum Corp., will drill the No. 2 Cox as a 3/8-mile west and very slightly north outpost to the Ozona Canyon sand gas field, 20 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 1,800 feet from the south and 1,320 feet from the west lines of 22-2-I&GN. Contract depth is 7,200 feet; elevation, 2,218 feet.

Delta Drilling Co. and Pauley Petroleum Inc., Midland, is drilling on Meadows as a 3/8-mile south-southeast outpost to the nearest production in the Ozona (Canyon sand) field four miles southwest of Ozona.

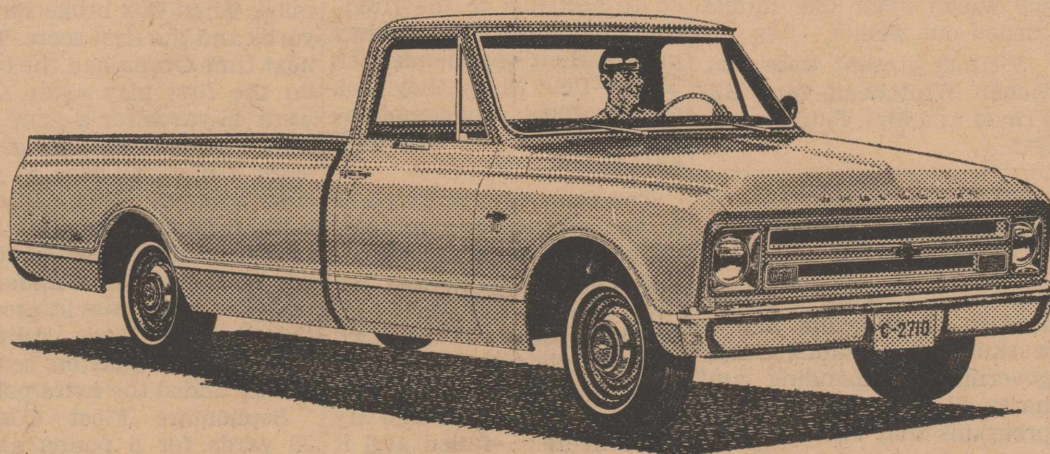

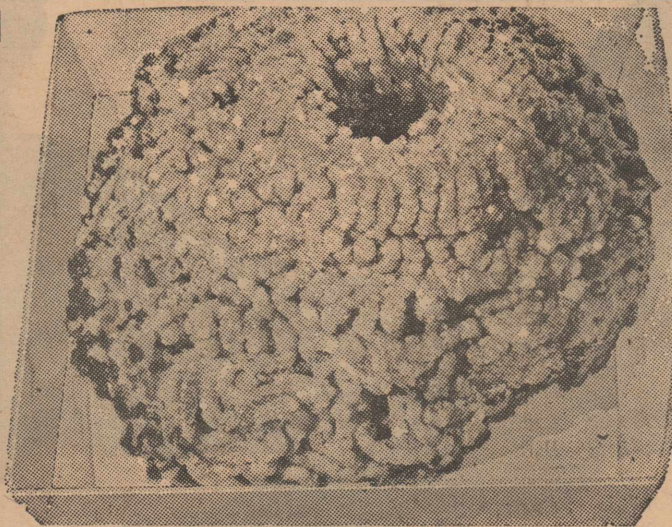

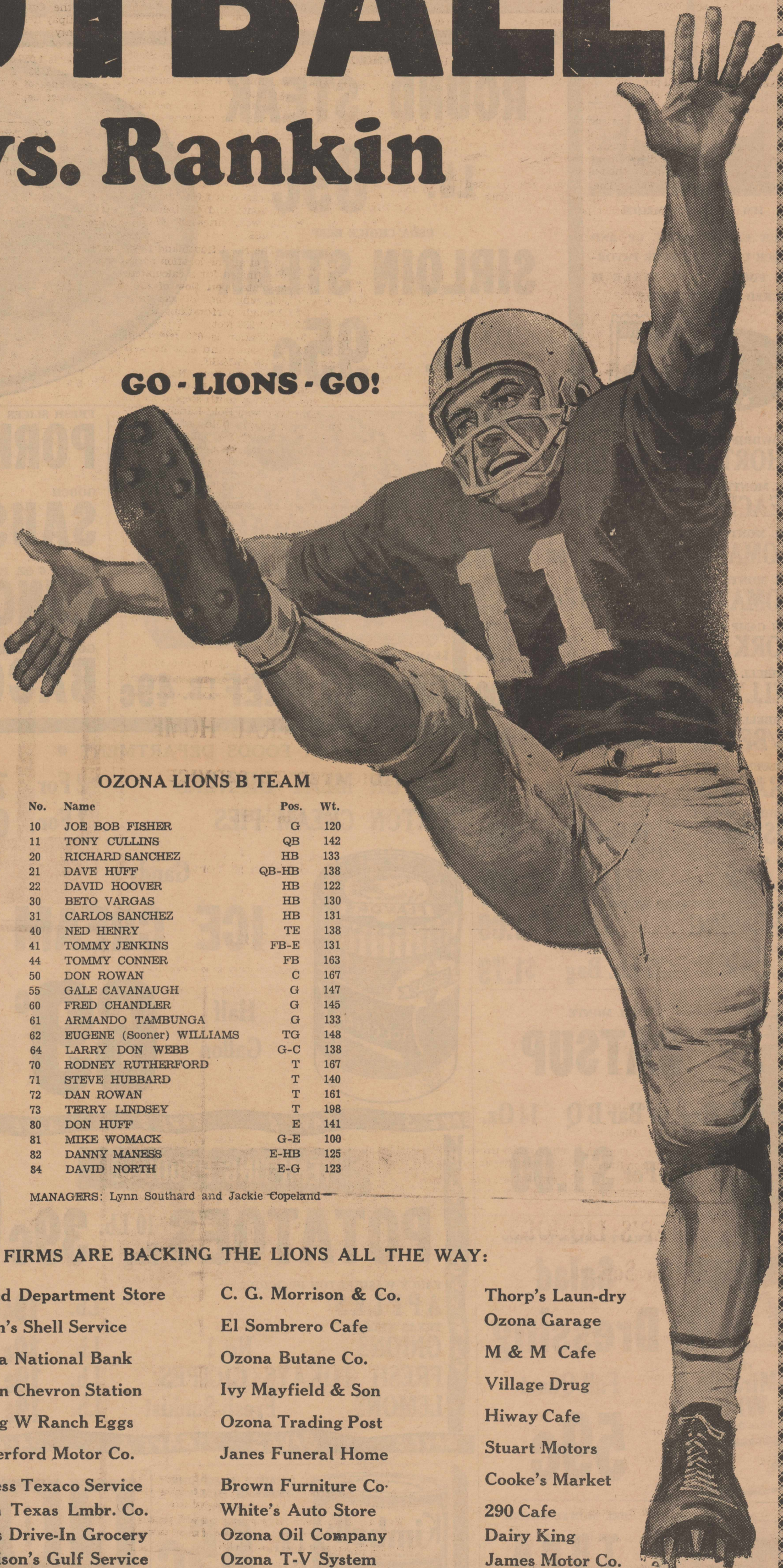

**Northwest Ozona Field Area Gains Two New Producers**

The Donham multipay gas field of Crockett County gained its second and third Grayburg producers with completion of two projects by Savage Oil Co., Midland, 15 miles northwest of Ozona.

The No. 1 Joe Bean-Shell Oil Co., one location east, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 430,000 cubic feet of gas per day through perforations at 1,118-84 feet.

Slated as a 1,600-foot San Andres lime wildcat, it was drilled to 1,334 feet, where 4½-inch casing was set.

Location is 2,069 feet from the south and 467 feet from the west lines of 47-UV-GC&SF.

The No. 1 Southland Royalty, et al, one location north was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 670,000 cubic feet of gas daily through perforations at 1,174-1,230 feet.

Location is 660 feet from the south and east lines of 56-UV-GC&SF.

Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1 T. D. Williams, in 14-OP-GC&SF, location south stepout to the two-well Hold Ranch (Ellenburger) field of Crockett County, 8½ miles north of Ozona, swabbed 10 barrels of new oil along with the load. Recovery was from open hole at 7,928-75 feet, which

had been acidized with 2,000 gallons and flushed with oil. Testing continued.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. will drill the No. 4-D Alma Cox as a ¾-mile south and very slightly west stepout to the three-well Spraberry oil area of the Ozona, Northwest multipay field of Crockett County, three miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 1,057 feet from the south and 933 feet from the west lines of 48-OP-GC&SF. Contract depth is 4,300 feet.
