County Pays Off Debt Balance On Diamond Jubilee

The financial fiasco that was the Crockett County Diamond Jubilee finally fell in the lap of the taxpayers when the Crockett County Commissioners Court meeting Monday voted a second contribution toward retiring the deficit, picking up the final tab of \$763.89.

When the four-day June celebration, which featured a nightly pageant at the football stadium, ending with a spectacular fireworks display, closed, the Jubilee committee counted up a net deficit announced at around \$2900.

After an announced plan to seek voluntary contributions from interested citizens was offered, a request was made of the county Commissioners Court to hull out some county funds toward taking care of the debt. The court responded with a donation of \$1,250.

There was more planning to seek citizens contributions but no drive seemed ever to get off the ground and the debt dragged until the Jubilee chairman, James Baggett, and vice chairman Bill Seahorn appeared before the court Monday to ask county funds to pay off the \$763.89 balance.

The Rogers Company, an Ohio based promotion firm, was employed by the Jubilee planners to stage the pageant and Mr. and Mrs. Mel Eckerstrom of the company spent some six weeks here planning and staging the historical spectacular for a fee of \$5,500.

Ozona FFA Wins Dist. Leadership Contest Places

Ozona FFA competed in the Concho District Leadership contests last Thursday in Eldorado and brought home a first place, two seconds and one fourth out of five teams entering the competition.

The radio broadcasting team, consisting of Larry Kilgore, Wesley West and Duwayne Vinson won the right to participate in the Area II Contest to be held in Big Spring, November 19 by winning first place in this division.

Teams placing second from Ozona were the Senior Chapter Conducting and the FFA Quiz teams. The OHS Basketball team will get the season underway this Saturday night when they entertain the McCamey Badgers in Davidson Memorial Gymnasium with B & A games set for 6:15 and 8 p. m.

Lion Coach Brooks Dozier will have 4 lettermen returning from last year's team that finished with a 16-10 record. George Cox, 5'10½" is the only Senior letterman. Rex Bland, 6'1"; Larry Kilgore, 6'1"; and Marlin Farris, 6'5", are the three returning one year lettermen. Bland is a senior, while Kilgore is a junior and Farris, a sophomore.

Expected to round-out the 10 man varsity squad are senior Oscar Flores, 5'9"; sophomores Randel Clepper, 5'11"; Donald Huff, 6'; David Huff, 6'; Rodney Pagan, 5'10"; and junior Duane Childress, 5'7". Beto Vargas and James Appel are also candidates for the A squad.

Assistant Coach H. O. Hoover has several freshmen and sophomores trying for spots on the B-Team.

Once again District 8A will be divided into East and West Zones with the Lions in the West Zone. Board Prepares Rules For Use Of Park Facilities

At the request of the Commissioners Court the Memorial Fair Park Board submitted a set of suggested rules of operation for the park facilities which were read and approved by the Court in its November meeting Monday.

Four principal rules were formulated by the board for the park operation. They are:

1. No trading or holding of livestock at the park by any individual will be allowed.
2. An individual, local or transient, may keep a horse overnight in the park facilities.
3. Any club or individual desiring to keep livestock at the park for practice purposes must make arrangements in advance with the Park Board.
4. The club or individual using the Park facilities for the purpose of practicing will not be permitted to trade in livestock from the Park unless it is a final sale at the time of completion of the event or practice.

Lions Finish Second In District With 13-12 Thriller Over Eldorado

A second half comeback by the Lions, wiping out a 12 point Eldorado halftime lead, gave Ozona a 13-12 victory over the Eagles last Friday night as the Lions closed out the 1966 gridiron campaign with an 8-2 season record and a 6-1 district record — good enough for sole possession of second place in the 8 team 8A circuit.

The running of Fleet Coates and Thomas DeHoyos plus the determined efforts of both the offensive and

defensive lines spurred Ozona on to its sixth straight win. Coates paced the Lions' rushing game with 138 yards while DeHoyos added 53 yards and raced 40 with a fumble for a score. It was the toe of placekicker Beto Ramos that brought about the narrow 1 point win as Ramos was on the mark following the first score, narrowing the gap to 7-12 before the last period TD brought the Lions from behind.

Midway of the first quarter, halfback Pat Childers surprised the Lions with a 48-yard scamper to paydirt, giving the Eagles a 6-0 lead. The try for the extra point was wide. Eldorado had taken possession of the ball at their own 34 prior to the scoring run.

Held to only 77 yards rushing in the first half, the Lions could not get their offense in gear in the first or second quarter, with the exception of a run of Ramos to the Eagle 5 yard line that was wiped out by an off-sides penalty.

With less than a minute to play in the first half, Childers, swiped a stray Lion aerial, returning 52 yards to the Ozona 13. On the next play, quarterback Danny Habert passed to tall Donald Rogers in the end zone for the score. A passing attempt for the two points was no good, and Eldorado enjoyed a two touchdown advantage as the half ended.

With the Ozona defensive line putting a damper on the speedy Eldorado backs, the Lions hit the Eagles full-back at the line of scrimmage on a third down try and the ball popped into the air and was grabbed by T. DeHoyos, who sped down the sidelines untouched for a touchdown. Ramos added the extra point, closing the Eagle margin to 5 points.

Late in the third quarter, the Lions began a drive from their own 16 that carried inside the Eldorado 10 before it was stalled. Coates and DeHoyos did most of the damage with Coates hitting the tackles an ends while DeHoyos went up the middle.

Sparked by a 44-yard run by Coates, the Lions drove again to the Eldorado 6 where Ramos bulled his way into the end zone, breaking two tackles on the way. The Lions went for two points, but Ramos, on a pass-run option, was stopped just shy of the flag. With 4 minutes to go Ozona led 13-12.

But the ball game wasn't over, and both teams provided the fans with lots of action and excitement as the clock slowly ticked away.

Eldorado pushed to the Lion 20 where John Mayo attempted a go-ahead field goal only to have the kick blocked by the onrushing Ozona linemen. After three downs the Lions were forced to kick, but the punt was blocked by Eldorado, and the Eagles had another chance.

This Eldorado threat was killed when Coates intercepted a pass with less than a minute to play.

The Lions played the game without their stellar, high scoring halfback, George Cox, who was sidelined with a leg injury.

Ozona led in first downs 17-11; yards rushing, 228-146; Eldorado led in passing 5-21-1 for 85 yards to 3-7-1 and 26 yards for the Lions. Both teams fumbled once.

Wool Contest Entry Deadline Set For Dec. 1

The deadline for entering the Make-It-Yourself-With-Wool contests is December 1, according to Mrs. Buster Deaton, District Director.

Mrs. Deaton announced that the District Contest will be held Dec. 10, in the Civic Center Auditorium.

The contest is open to girls and women, with four age divisions. The sub-deb division takes in girls age 10-13; junior divisions, ages 13 thru 16; senior division, ages 17 thru 21, and all over 21 years of age will be entered in the adult division.

Entry forms may be obtained from Mrs. Deaton or Miss Loretta White, who is the county contest director.

Garments must be made from wool fabric loomed in the United States. Judging will be based on workmanship, beauty of design, coordination of design and fabric with the individual and fashion.

The winners from each division and category will be eligible to participate in the state contest to be held early next year. Several valuable prizes will be given to district winners in all divisions.

Postal Airlift To Speed Mail To Men In Overseas Bases

Postmaster Floyd Hokit announced today that all first-class mail, personal sound recordings and parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be airlifted on a space-available basis between the United States and all military post offices overseas. Also, second class publications featuring current news of interest to the military will be airlifted from San Francisco to the Armed Forces in Viet Nam.

The parcels described above, paid at surface rates will be moved by surface transportation within the States from the point of mailing to the port of embarkation, Hokit explained. To speed up separation and delivery of the parcels falling in this category, all parcels must be clearly marked upon acceptance at the post office with the letters SAM (surface airlift mail).

Christmas parcels weighing 5 pounds and under, even though being airlifted on a space - available basis should be mailed no later than Dec. 1, airmail parcels no later than Dec. 10.

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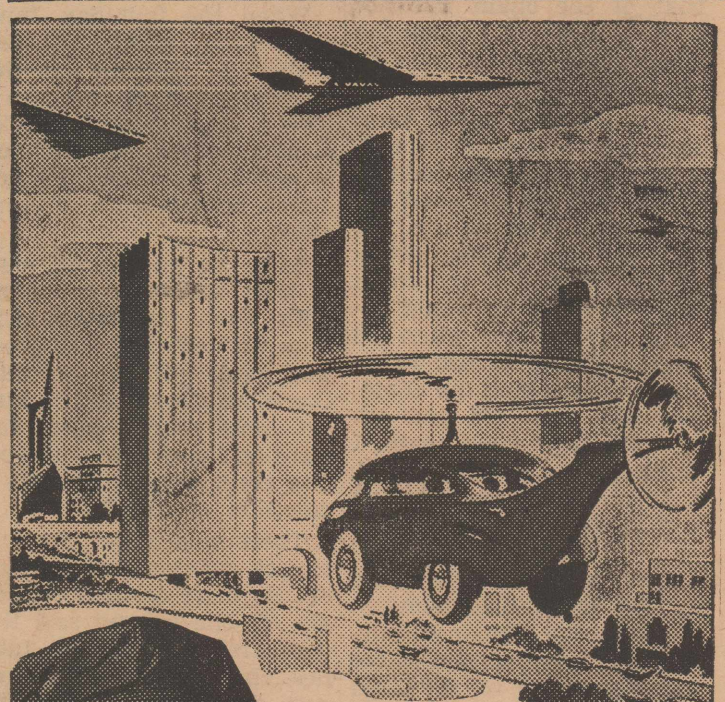
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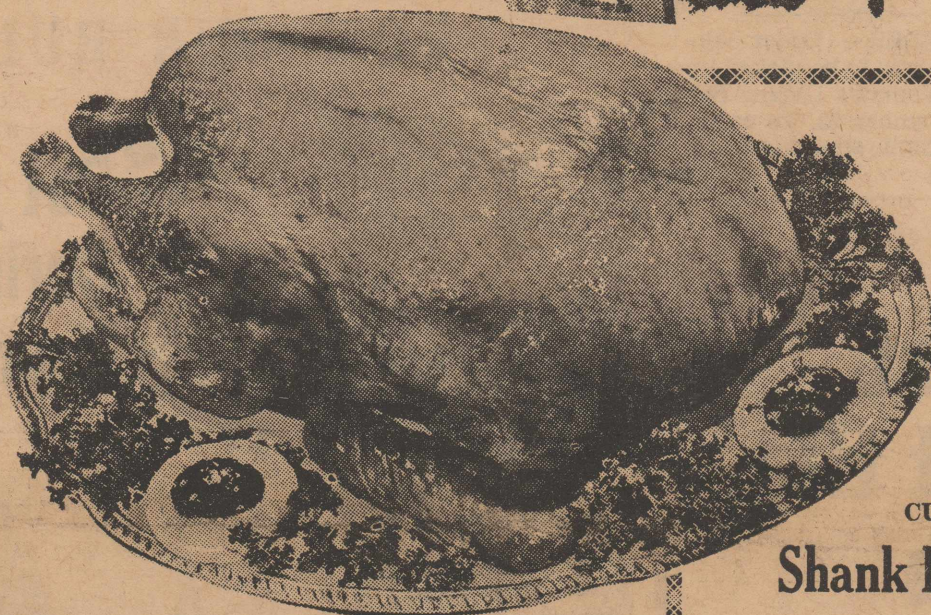

CONSIDERATION IS THE WORD

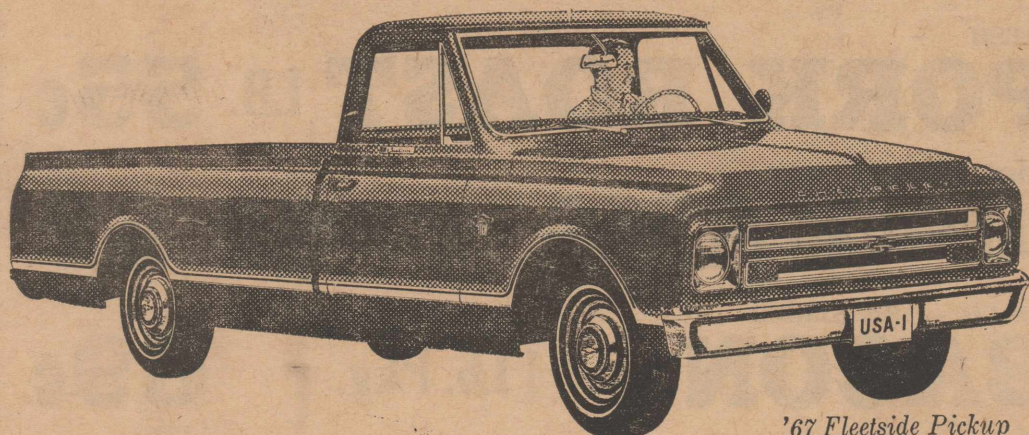

Deep Wildcat In Crockett Flows; Offset Spotted

Stanard Oil Co. of Texas, will drill the No. 2-35 University, an 8,300-foot Ellenburger wildcat, one location southeast of B. L. McFarland Inc. No. 1-35 University, Crockett County assured Ellenburger oil discovery 13 miles southwest of Big Lake, one mile north of the shallow World field, and 2 3/4 miles northeast of the Ranch (Strawn) field.

Location is 1,650 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the west lines of 35-7-University.

The No. 1-35 University, same section, assured production through perforations at 8,050-70 feet.

Shell Oil Co., will drill the No. 10 Mitchell as a 1 7/8-mile southeast outpost to the five-well JM (Ellenburger gas) field of southwest Crockett County, 35 miles southwest of Ozona and 7/8 mile southeast of its No. 7 Mitchell, which is in the process of completion.

Location is 2,026 feet from the south and 1,422 feet from the west lines of 72-Q2-GC&SF. Contract depth is 15,000 feet; estimated derrick floor elevation, 2,000 feet.

Frio Oil & Gas Co., San Antonio, will drill the No. 7 W. C. Montgomery as a 3/4-mile south-southwest outpost to the Ozona (Canyon sand) field of Crockett County, 12 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 540 feet from the south and 195 feet from the west lines of 1-AAA-TCRR. Contract depth is 7,000 feet; elevation, 2,462 feet.

McGrath & Smith, Midland, No. 1-A Todd Ranch, in 36-WX-GC&SF, Crockett County San Andres gas discovery, 15 miles northwest of Ozona and two miles northeast of the shallow Howard Draw field, was flowing gas at the daily rate of 1,052,000 cubic feet.

Shell Oil Co. No. 1-110 Mitchell, in 110-1-I&GN, 1/2-mile northwest extension and third producer for the Crockett County Ellenburger area of the Brown-Bassett multipay field, 39 miles southwest of Ozona, and seven miles west of the JM (Ellenburger gas) field, flowed 17 hours, making 35 barrels of lead water, plus gas at the daily rate of 6 million cubic feet.
