Registration Of County's Voters Moving Slowly

Voter registration in Crockett County is going very slowly, Mrs. Gertrude Perry, deputy tax-assessor collector, revealed earlier this week. Mrs. Perry said only 275 certificates had been issued as of Tuesday.

She said there were several applications given out that had not been returned to the office in order that a certificate might be issued.

All residents who expect to vote in any election this year must register except those 60 years of age and over. Those voters who will be 21 this year must apply for a voter registration certificate, rather than an exemption as has been the practice in the past.

Residents may call the tax office and ask that an application be mailed to them or pick up an application for themselves and members of their immediate families at the office. The applications may be mailed or returned in person for the issuance of a certificate. A certificate must be issued to qualify a person to vote. The application does not certify a person to vote.

Mrs. Perry said that out of the 1,200 to 1,300 persons in the county who can qualify to vote, 275 is an extremely low figure. She reminded those who have not applied for an application that January 31 is the deadline and urged that they apply for their certificates right away.

Ozonans Attend Austin Meeting Texas Educators

Some 1500 administrators from throughout the State of Texas have registered for what is expected to be the biggest meeting ever of the School Administrators Advisory Conference to be held in Austin Wednesday through Friday, January 4-6.

Delegates to the eighteenth annual conference will include administrators from public, private, and parochial schools, and colleges and universities, as well as county school superintendents.

The Texas Education Agency annually sponsors the Conference so delegates can discuss new educational programs, and review and improve procedures used by the Agency in its relations with local public schools. Also known as the Mid-Winter Conference, the annual get-together provides a two-way communication between school administrators and Agency staff members and gives the administrators an opportunity for exchanging ideas.

Glenn Ivy, Director of the Governor's Committee on Public School Education, will relate the activities of the Committee to date and project their future in his keynote address.

Dr. J. W. Edgar, Texas Commissioner of Education, will preside at the first general session at 9:00 a. m. Thursday, January 5. He will also address the delegates.

Attending the conference from Ozona are L. B. T. Sikes, superintendent, and A. O. Fields, auditor and coordinator of the Title I Program, Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965.

Sheriff Urges Caution In Use Of Santa's BB Guns

As usual after the Christmas season, there has been a rash of complaints from householders about youngsters with newly acquired BB guns. Sheriff Billy Mills has asked that parents whose children own these guns caution them about shooting around residences and business property.

Children should be instructed in gun handling at an early age and warned that BB guns can do as much damage to property as heavier firearms when used carelessly. A word of caution to the youngster with a new BB gun might be worth many dollars to the parent, who is liable for any damage caused by their child, accidentally or intentionally.

Sheriff Mills expressed hope that parents will cooperate with his department in keeping down further damage by children with these guns.

Lion Cagers To Play In Big Lake Tourney Today

The OHS Loin Basketball team will enter their second tournament of the season this weekend when they meet the Big Lake B Team today in the first round of the Big Lake Tournament. A win over the Owl B teamers would probably put the Lions against the Owl varsity in the second round on Friday night.

In action during the holidays, Coach Brooks Dozier's Lions played their two best games of the season in the Howard Payne Tournament in Brownwood. These two games followed an opening round loss to AA Ballinger 52-31 as the Lions could only hit 27% from the field and 5 of 21 from the free shot lane. George Cox scored 14 points for the Lions, and Sammy McLarty had 13 for Ballinger.

Playing Goldwaite in the consolation bracket, the Lions stopped Goldwaite's high scoring forward and had a 38-20 lead at halftime. With Rex Bland (19 pts) and Cox (18 pts.) leading the way, the Lions scored 27 points in the last quarter and racked up a 76-43 win over Class A Goldwaite, favorites for their own district title. Helping Bland and Cox with the scoring were Larry Kilgore (13) and David Huff (10).

In the third game against another AA ball club, Ozona lost to high scoring Jacksboro 62-52 after trailing 53-52 with 57 seconds to play. The Lions were forced into fouling in the last minute of play as they pressed to get the ball for the go-ahead shot at the bucket. In perhaps the best effort of the season, Bland again paced OHS with 16 points, followed by Kilgore with 10 and Huff with 10.

With the Lions hitting better from the field and if free throw shooting improves Ozona could be a threat for the West Zone title of District 8A.

Following the Big Lake Tournament this weekend, the Lions will be host to Sonora on January 13th prior to their own 16 team tournament on January 19-21.

Mrs. Montgomery Heads March Of Dimes Campaign

Mrs. Vic Montgomery has accepted the chairmanship of the January 1967 Crockett County March of Dimes campaign, according to an announcement earlier this week. She has served as chairman of the campaign for the past four years. Mrs. Montgomery, mother of two elementary grade children, is past-president of the Ozona PTA and an energetic worker in civic affairs and fund drives.

Upon accepting the appointment, Mrs. Montgomery said, "The March of Dimes is fighting birth defects because each year these tragic conditions rob more than a quarter - million American children of their birth-right: to enter the world healthy and grow normally. I think most of us would consider it alarming if we heard about an epidemic in which a new case struck every other minute, which was the second greatest destroyer of life, and which caused half of all cases of mental retardation."

"Yet," she pointed out, "birth defects are responsible for all this and for much more human damage. Many defects are not apparent at birth. They appear later in life, causing physical or mental disability. The March of Dimes is making important progress in birth defects, but we need increased public support to continue and to expand these programs."

Mrs. Montgomery noted the growing number of March of Dimes - supported centers where birth defect children receive superior treatment from teams of trained medical professionals. There are now 77 of these centers in operation.

"In addition," she said, "The March of Dimes is conducting a national educational program to inform every expectant mother of the importance of prenatal care in minimizing risks to the newborn child."

At noon the FFA Chapter will provide a barbecue dinner at \$1.00 a plate; proceeds above cost to go into the chapter treasury. Awards will be presented to winners of the morning and selection of champion lambs and calves will be made before the barbecue dinner.

Starting at 1:30 p. m. there will be a livestock judging contest for schools in the surrounding area. Banners will be presented to the three high teams with individual medals awarded to the three high individuals of the contest.

Girl Cagers Win One, Lose One In Comstock Games

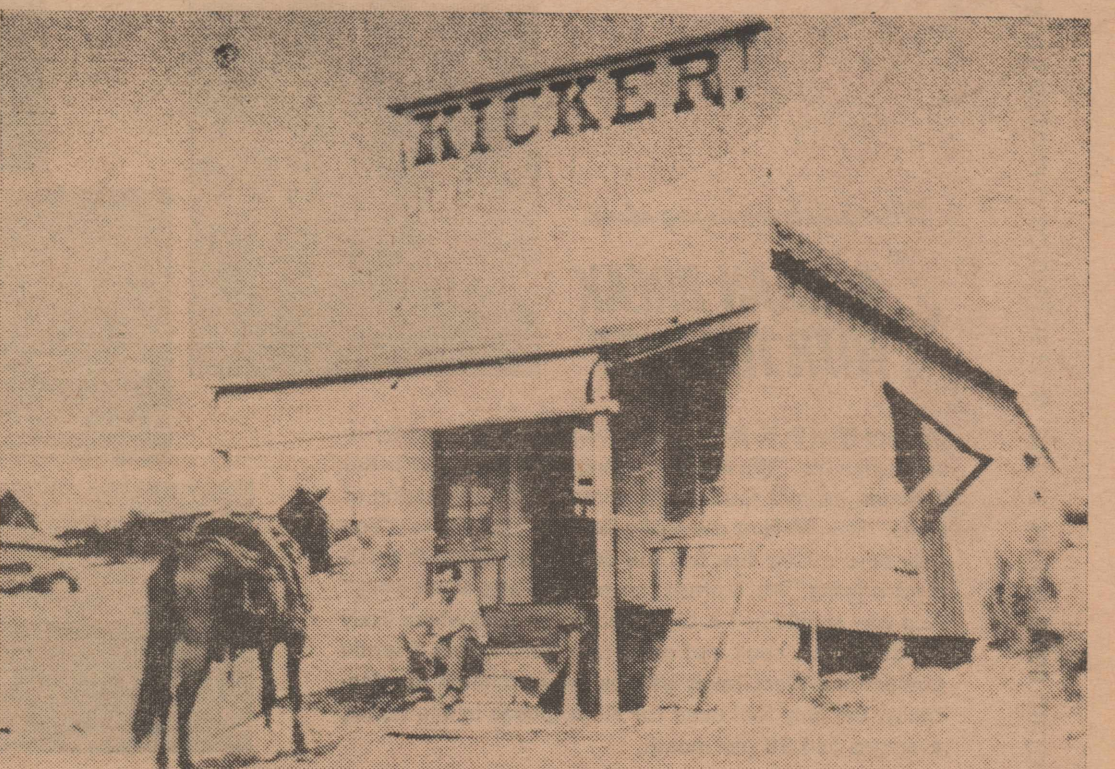
Ozona High School girls basketball teams won one and lost one in Comstock Tuesday night.

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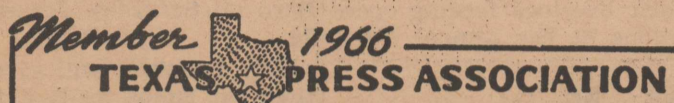

THE BERKELEY BUMS

It is probably safe to say that no University in the United States has received such consistently bad publicity as the University of California at Berkeley, thanks to the antics of the Skid Row scholars who infest the place. Recipe of the Week

Kitty's Kitchen

Pork Chops Oriental

6 double thick pork chops
1 cup cooked white rice
½ medium bell pepper sliced in thin strips
½ cup bean sprouts
¼ cup diced onions
1 diced pimento
3 stalks diced celery
4 tablespoons soy sauce
1 raw egg
½ teaspoon paprika
1 small can stems and pieces mushrooms (drained)
1 tablespoon flour
1 cup cold chicken stock
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
Salt and pepper to taste

Have butcher cut six pork chops double thick and make a pocket for stuffing. In a heavy skillet saute onions, bell peppers, celery, bean sprouts, pimento and mushrooms in two tablespoons butter or margarine until onions become transparent but not brown. Move ingredients to side of skillet and in center place cooked white rice. Make a hole in center of rice to bottom of skillet and add one tablespoon butter, when melted, place whole egg in center. When egg has set add 2 tablespoons soy sauce, paprika and gently stir until all ingredients are well mixed and egg is done and distributed throughout. Add salt and pepper to taste. Stuff pork chops with mixture and place in shallow baking pan. Bake in moderate oven until chops are done and well browned. Remove chops from pan and pour off all grease. To remaining brown drippings add 1 tablespoon flour dissolved in 1 cup chicken stock and 2 tablespoons soy sauce, stir until sauce thickens. Serve sauce over chops. Makes 6 servings.

Marksmen in a competitive pistol-shoot make the sport look ridiculously easy. But a person who has never fired a handgun can't seem to hit the side of a barn even when all doors are shut!

Handgunning is one of the most demanding of all outdoor sports. But it also is one of the most fascinating.

Tin-can plinking with a pistol is a relaxing way to spend an idle afternoon in the wide-open spaces. But precision pistol shooting requires the utmost in concentration. A man who hits the target regularly forgets all his personal and business problems. And that is about as good a back-pat as you can give to any sport.

One of the best pistol shots in the business is Billie R. McElroy. He's the special firearms instructor who teaches every Texas peace officer to shoot. The Texas Department of Public Safety employee also is a top-notch competitive shooter.

Here's his step-by-step guide to learning to shoot a handgun:

Grasp the gun firmly in the shooting hand with the grip seated against the heel of the hand. Barrel should be a prolongation of the wrist and forearm. Your hand should be high on the grip with the middle finger under the trigger guard. Hold the grip firmly but not so tight as to cause tremors.

Placement of the feet should be relaxed and comfortable. If you are not at ease you will be forcing your

shots to go in an unnatural position.

Take a stance about 45 degrees from the target, extending your arm toward the target.

Shooting hand should be fully extended toward the target, wrist and elbow locked. Other hand should be placed in your pocket in a relaxed position. Shooting arm should be slightly higher than your other arm and shoulder. But not strained into a higher position.

Your body should be erect, but not stiff. Muscles should be relaxed with the weight of your abdomen falling solidly distributed on both legs. Sighting itself consists of two distinct phases: sight alignment and sight picture.

Sight alignment is when the front sight is centered in and level with the top of the rear sight. This is accomplished by looking at the front sight. The back sight and target will be fuzzy.

Remember, if you see the target clearly you are not looking at the front sight. Therefore, you cannot ascertain whether or not you have correct sight alignment. Any error in sight alignment will be multiplied by about 150 with the target 25 yards away.

You will not be able to hold the handgun on target, which is sight picture. But with proper grip and stance you will be able to keep proper alignment while firing.

Sight picture is sight alignment plus the target. Some shooters prefer to aim so the bull's-eye is resting

right on top of the front sight; others like to center the sight on the target. Personal preference should dictate your choice.

Ideal situation is to be able to press the trigger straight to the rear without disturbing correct sight alignment and sight picture. Mastery of this difficult feat should not be attempted until fundamentals of grip, stance and sighting are completely understood and practiced. This will avoid developing bad shooting habits.

Release of the hammer to fire the handgun should be accomplished by a steady, even pressure on the trigger. Even when the sights move away from the target, the pressure should be maintained. As the sights return to target, added pressure is applied until the hammer is tripped. This can be practiced by "dry firing"—snapping the empty gun until the habit of slowly building up pressure will not disturb the sight alignment and sight picture.

Breath control also is important. Breathing will tend to throw you off target. Before sighting on the target, get the correct sight picture and start applying proper trigger control. Then draw a medium breath and align

sights. Next, take a shallow breath and cut it off in the throat, get the correct sight picture and start applying proper trigger control. Firing should occur within about five seconds.

Don't expect any miracles in the beginning. Accurate pistol shooting requires concentration and practice. Perfection only comes after hours of dry firing, followed by actual blasting at a target.

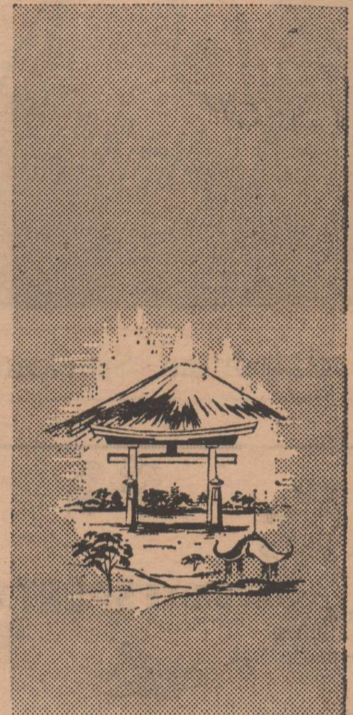
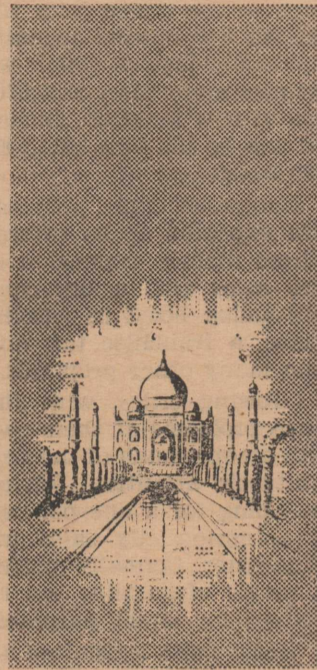
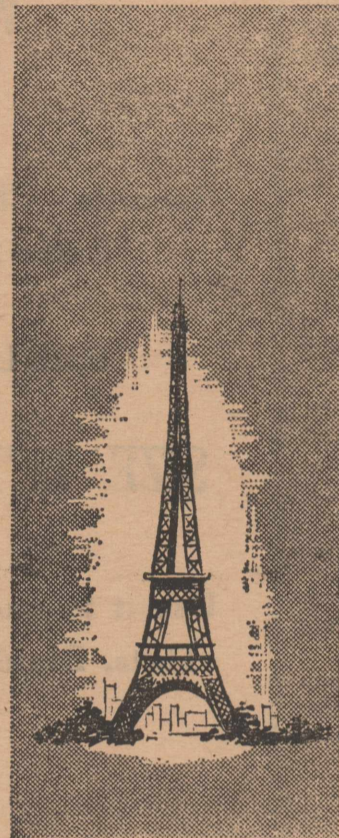

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Come Tuesday, Texas Legislators will be back in session at the state capitol.

Pressing money matters and certain new taxes head the "worry list" confronting the lawmakers. But a broad montage of other problems on the agenda promises an interesting, high-voltage session.

Gov. John Connally in his "state of the state" message to the solons later this month will outline spending recommendations which will require more than \$100,000,000 in new taxation.

Numerous tax proposals are expected to be offered. These include expansion on the sales tax, a one-cent-per-gallon boost in gasoline taxes, a franchise tax raise and many other proposals.

Growing cities, with finance problems of their own, will occupy much of the Legislature's attention. Mayors will plug for a one-per-cent local option city sales tax.

While most legislators apparently are prepared to vote for new taxes, few indicate they will support a \$44,000,000 raise in state college tuition.

Headline topics before lawmakers this year will include:

- Teacher pay raise — teachers want raises ranging from \$61 to \$100 a month. This would cost the state some \$68,000,000 a year. A majority of lawmakers are committed to some form of increase. Connally is expected to recommend much less.
• Constitutional revision — the governor and the State Democratic Party advocate revision by convention. L. Gov. Preston Smith favors a more-cautious approach.
• Legalized sale of mixed

drinks and horse racing.
• Annual legislative sessions.
• A long-range plan for water pollution control.
• A 20-per-cent pay raise for all state employees.

• Driver safety legislation: increasing the minimum age for drivers to 16 and requiring periodic re-examination of all drivers.

Among other measures to be considered are: a minimum wage bill; an industrial safety act; increased workmen's compensation benefits; reconsideration of some provisions of the new code of criminal procedure; day light saving time (should Texas accept it or pass a special act to retain standard time?); and a \$75,000,000 bond-financed, 12-year program advocated by the governor to acquire and develop new state parks.

Whitman's Insurance — Group Life and Health Insurance Company of Dallas has asked a district court to rule who should receive the benefits of a \$10,000 life insurance policy on the late Kathleen L. Whitman.

She was the wife of Charles J. Whitman, the UT Tower Sniper. Mrs. Whitman was stabbed before he began his shooting rampage on August 1. Numerous claims have been filed against Whitman's estate as a result of his shooting spree. He had been named beneficiary under his wife's policy.

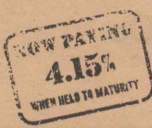

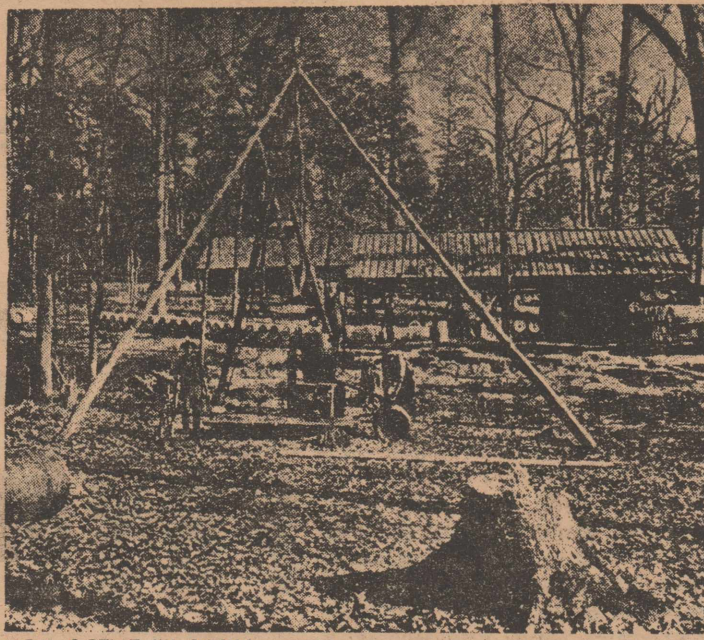

Right To Work Advocates Plan Legislative Slate

Washington, D. C. — The National Right to Work Committee today released the text of four proposed federal laws to limit compulsory unionism that it hopes will be introduced and thoroughly considered by the 90th Congress.

The four bills, which have been presented to various Congressional leaders, is the first step in the National Committee's, long-range legislative program geared to keeping the public attention focused on the many injustices which stem from the compulsory union shop.

The bills would . . . Amend the Internal Revenue Code so as to provide exemption from federal income tax to voluntary but not compulsory labor organizations.

. . . Amend Section 8 (a) (3) of the National Labor Relations Act (Taft-Hartley) so that compulsory union shop agreements now generally permissible unless prohibited by state law, would be permissible only where expressly authorized by state law.

. . . Amend the Railway Labor Act returning the Right to Work provision to the railroad and airline industries.

. . . Amend the National Labor Relations Act by eliminating provisions in Sections 7 and 8, which sanction union membership, and the requirement in Section 9 (a) of the act that unions must serve as exclusive bargaining representatives for all employees. The elimination of Section 9 (a) will mean that unions thenceforth would be obliged only to bargain for their own members.

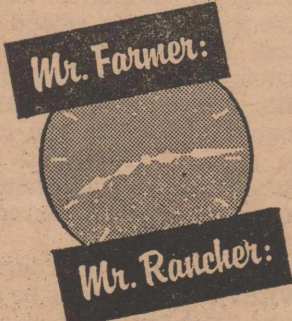
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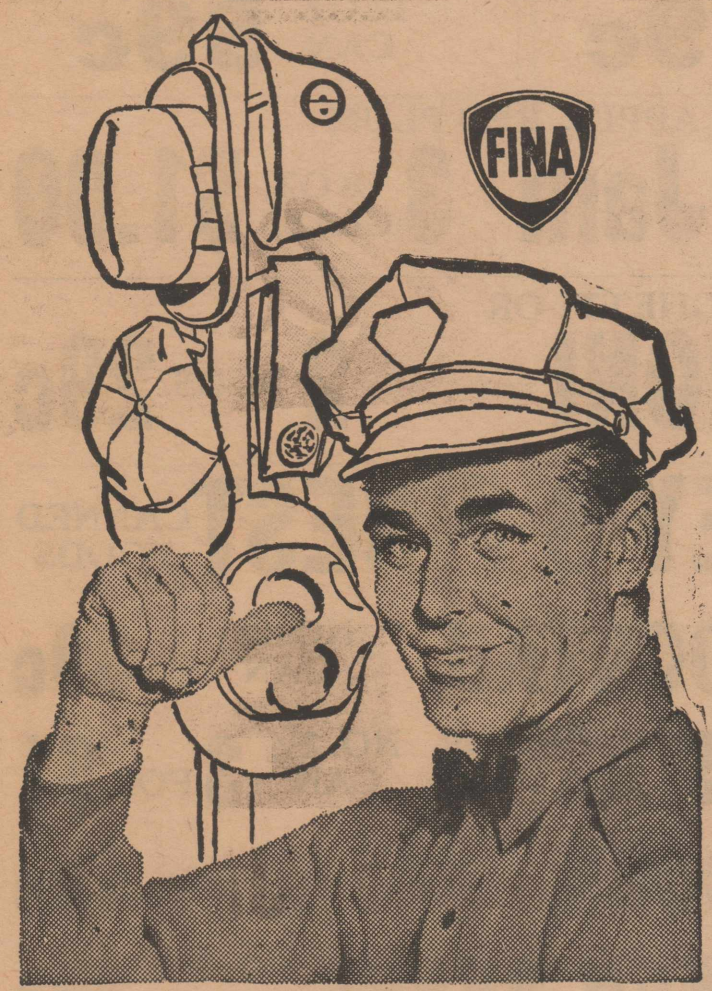
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VOTER REGISTRATION Now In Progress

Mrs. Jimmy Sutton served as matron-of-honor and Monroe Dacy, brother of the groom, was best man.


An arrangement of white glads and mums decorated the church sanctuary where the ceremony was performed.
